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Introduction.

General Quarter Sessions of the Peace.

The General Quarter Sessions of the Peace was a court of record originally established in England as early as the reign of the "Black Prince" Edward III. "Keepers of the Peace" were first created by statute in 1327 (Act 1, Edw. III, statute 2 c. 16), and by 1350 they were required by law to hold sessions in every county four times in a year. Under legislation passed in March 1361, these laymen became known as "Justices of the Peace". The jurisdiction of this court was extended to the trying of all felonies and trespasses, although the commissions to the justices provided that in case of difficulties no judgments would be delivered except in the presence of a justice of the Court of King's Bench or Common Pleas or a judge of the assize (34 Edw. III c. 1).¹ By convention the Sessions did not try cases any greater than simple felonies, nor did it have jurisdiction over cases of forgery and perjury; more serious crimes, capital felonies such as murder, burglary and treason could not be tried under the Sessions of the Peace but rather were reserved for the Assizes. The Justices of the Peace could try inferior cases without a jury. The court heard all cases which involved property above £10 but not exceeding £30. In Medieval England it appears that the Quarter Sessions in certain cases could exercise their power with a death penalty although the court ceased to do this during the 16th century.²

The Quarter Sessions was a court with which the Loyalists would have been familiar since it had been established in the American provinces since the 17th century. The first Quarter Sessions was held in the Province of Quebec in October 1764. The court was formally established under the Quebec Act of 1774 and confirmed by an ordinance dated March 4, 1777. Hence before the creation of Upper Canada the first Quarter Sessions for Niagara technically fell within the jurisdiction of the Montreal District.³ Legislation which repealed certain parts of the Quebec Act also confirmed other established institutions, such as the courts, upon the creation of the Province of Upper Canada in 1791.⁴

Blackstone described the scope of this Court as determining "the smaller misdemesnors against the public or commonwealth, not amounting to felony; and especially offences relating to the game, highways, alehouses, bastard children, the settlement and provision for the poor, vagrants, servants wages, apprentices, and popish recusants."⁵ If the crime was of sufficient seriousness it could be removed by writ from the Quarter Sessions to the Court of King's Bench.

The times for the sittings of this court was also determined by legislation. Under 2 Hen. V c. 4 (1413-14), it was required that the Sessions be held in every County once in every quarter during the first week after Michaelmas day (September 29th), the first week after Epiphany (January 6th), the first week after the close of Easter and in the week after the translation of Saint Thomas Becket or "Saint Thomas the Martyr" (July 7th.) Therefore three of the four court sittings fell at regularly determinate dates each and every year with the exception of Easter term which could

vary between the end of March and early May depending upon when the holiday was observed. The first Quarter Sessions in Niagara were held at Navy Hall, but moved to the Council Chamber in the 1790's. Under legislation passed in Upper Canada the Sessions were to be held at the Court House in the town of Niagara on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October.⁶ These times were found to be inconvenient for the conduct of business and in March 1830 the court dates were fixed at the fourth Tuesday in January and March, the second Tuesday in July and the third Tuesday in October.⁷

Special Sessions and adjournments for the further conduct of business could be scheduled by a quorum of the magistrates. On one occasion in 1804 a Special Sessions dealing with a liquor violation was held in Grimsby, and at least one General Session of the Peace was permitted to be held in Grimsby by an act of the legislature during the summer of 1815.⁸

Furthermore, the court had to be held before two or more justices of the peace whose authority was granted to them by a commission of the peace as well as by statute. Justices were not to be held punishable for their actions in Sessions unless it could be proved that it was a "manifest act of oppression or willful abuse of power." The records or rolls of the Sessions were to be committed to the custody of one of the justices who was known as the *custos rotulorum* and who was the principal civil officer in the county. The Clerk of the Peace for the County normally served as the "sufficient deputy" in the place of the *custos rotulorum*.

In order to hold the Sessions it was necessary for the following parties to appear in addition to the two justices and the Clerk of the Peace: 1) the sheriff and/or his deputy 2) the coroners 3) constables 4) the gaoler 5) jurors 6) all persons to answer charges, prosecute or give evidence. Jurors were to be notified by the sheriff to appear in court based upon a precept or order made out by any two justices at least fifteen days before the court date.

The Sessions were empowered to levy fines for the punishment of crimes as well as for contempt such as non-attendance by jurors. The Sessions were also empowered to commit persons to gaol for punishment, for contemptuous behaviour in court, or for non-payment of fines. Note, however, that the Sessions did not hold a commission for general gaol delivery, nor could the magistrates sentence any person convicted of a crime to the penitentiary for a period longer than two years.

The Quarter Sessions was the main government institution responsible for local district administration down to 1841. The court heard criminal matters and breaches of the peace including assaults, misdemeanours and petit larceny. It also held jurisdiction over the following areas: the establishment of divisions for the Court of Requests, appointment of Justices of the Peace, the levy of special tax rates for local improvements, approval and funding for road and bridge repairs, maintenance of public offices such as the Court and jail, Surrogate Court and Land Registry office, assigning gaol limits,⁹ the appointment and fees for a High Constable and a local

constabulary, determining a salary for the gaoler, confirmation of the appointment or election of town and township officials, regulatation of pound keeper's fees, the maintenance of the insane, blind, deaf and indigent inhabitants of the district, regulation of the price of bread, appointment of inspectors of weights and measures, establishment of fire regulations, appointment of a market clerk, approval over by-laws for the prevention of animals running at large, payment for wolf scalps, trial of cases involving the seizure of contraband goods, approval of tavern, shop and still licences, the granting of certificates which permitted the solemnization of marriage by Non-Conformist clergy, and the granting of certificates in the case of the death of a subscribing witness to a deed or other document in order that the document could be registered. During the late 1790's the magistrates in Quarter Sessions could hear evidence of Loyalty and recommend names to be enrolled on the UEL list, and after 1806 the court issued affidavits of identity or parentage for land petitions. It was noted by Riddell that the powers of the Quarter Sessions in England were more circumscribed, limited mainly to matters involving highways and bridges, poor laws, the care of illegitimate children, servants and the regulation of wages. The powers extended to the Quarter Sessions in Upper and Lower Canada "had no precedent in England."¹⁰

The first major legislative change to the Quarter Sessions occurred in 1841 when the chairman of the Sessions also served as District Court judge. In 1868-69 the quarterly sittings of the court was changed to a semi-annual sitting and the name of the court itself was changed to the Court of General Sessions of the Peace.¹¹ In 1909 the authority of the court was extended to "try all criminal offences except homicide" as well as crimes listed under Section 583 of the Criminal Code of Canada. The court could also hear appeals for summary convictions (*Statutes of Ontario* 1909 c. 30.) In 1933 some of the powers of the court were transferred to the Courty Courts, and in 1984 the remaining powers of the General Sessions of the Peace became integrated within the District Courts of Ontario.

For a summation of the general proceedings of the Sessions see Appendix "A," taken from W.C. Keele's *The Provincial Justice or Magistrate's Manual* (1851.)

According to Carnochan, the first gaol in Niagara was built in 1795 "on a spot known as Graham's Hotel, the Black Swan, opposite the Rectory and Masonic Hall."¹² It is said that as many as 300 prisoners were confined within its walls, charged with disloyalty, in 1812. The building was set ablaze by hot shot from Fort Niagara on the day of the Battle of Queenston Heights and totally destroyed. Tenders were advertised for the new Court House, which later became famous as Miss Rye's "Western Home," in the *Niagara Spectator* in May 1816. Construction on this new building commenced under contractor Josiah Cushman and the structure was completed in 1817. It served as the District gaol until it was replaced by the St. Catharines jail built on Niagara Street in 1864.

NOTE: This publication was designed to serve strictly as a guide and index to the original records and is intended primarily for historical and genealogical research purposes. The records have not

been transcribed *verbatim*, and due to the overall length of this publication some details have necessarily been omitted. For this reason, and also due to possible errors in the interpretation of the 19th century script, it is recommended that researchers consult the actual documents.

These records comprise part of the RG22-372 series, Lincoln County Court, General Quarter Sessions of the Peace Records, held by the Archives of Ontario. Researchers must submit a stacks request in person in the main reading room at the Archives of Ontario, or through a telephone request, including the box and year. Thus, for example, if a researcher wishes to see the Criminal Calendar of Prisoners confined in the Niagara jail in July 1829--a document which was filed during the October sessions of that year--a request would be submitted for RG22-372 box 4, Lincoln County Court General Sessions of the Peace, October 1829.

These records are no longer stored on-site at the Archives of Ontario at 77 Grenville Street, Toronto. Any request for these records should be submitted by researchers at least one day prior to their intended visit to the Archives.

The index for this volume does not refer to page numbers, but rather to the actual file in which the name or subject matter is found. For example, the first reference to Ralfe Clench in this book is in the April sessions for 1828 in file 1-1.

Isaac Chambers (constable) before *James Cummings. William Burtch* went to the house of *David Skinner* in Stamford to serve a summons on December 31, 1827 in favour of *Edward Turley*. He was knocked down by a blow with the fist and kick of the foot. Warrant issued January 2, 1828.

David Skinner (yeoman) before **Samuel Street**. William Burtch (well digger) and **Titus Root** (coal burner) burst open the door bolted on the inside with an iron bolt and staple. Entered with violence, put a hand on my collar and said "here's a warrant for you." Believed it to be a forgery. Drew him nearly to the floor, injured his hip, said "he would kick his guts out." Root near the door in disguise, old large broad brimmed hat, face hidden by his shirt. In fear that Root means to injure his property.

William Pew (constable) believes Burtch and Root are locked up in Root's house. Hindered by Root's wife. Wishes to have authority to break the door in order to apprehend them. Apprehended and committed to gaol January 3, 1828.

Recognizance David Skinner £25, surety *John Potts* (Crowland, yeoman) £25, January 5, 1828; *Margaret Green* and John Potts £5 each.

Titus Root (plaintiff) vs. David Skinner (defendant) September 1, 1828 (signed *Charles Richardson*, Clerk of the Peace) *Robert Dickson* demands plea. *William Campbell*, *J. Clench*. *Joseph Depew* (Bertie, yeoman) £100 surety for Root, also 200 acres lot 29 Concession 5 Garafraxa Township (Halton.)

Letter to Charles Richardson, September 12, 1828. re: bonds for Root, Mickelbone, King, Gilbert, Hosier, *Abraham Nevills*. Titus Root said his two witnesses have gone to the Grand River, can't start trial until their return.

Letter September 29, 1828, *James King* to Root said his wife cannot come on Tuesday or Wednesday.

Letter October 29, 1828, Root to Macklebone re: King's note. 'Get John to go over.'

File 1-4, Tavern and shop licences.

Edward Evans, Captain of Haldimand Military, to *Ralfe Clench*, December 29, 1827. Wishes that the licence for his stand be transferred to his son *John Evans*. Will be down to pay the expense as soon as there is "good slaying."

Sugarloaf, December 24, 1827. A tavern is wanted from *Miner's Road* through the Marsh to *Marshville* where they are building the Canal. *Samuel Barrick* of Wainfleet named as a fit man. Signed *James Brenan*, *David Morgan*, *T.L. Kinnard*, *Andrew Barrick*, *Jonas Minors*, *John Zavitz*.

Laurence Furry. Has built a commodious house and stables on Lake Erie 8 miles west of the Grand River. Prays for a licence, Moulton, December 27, 1827. Signed J. Warren, Michael Graybill, David Morgan, Abraham Starnawan(?), Abraham Minor, Samuel Spers, John Lap, David Deamud, William Norton, Abraham Cowel, Henry Furry, Elijah H. Wedge (?)

Andrew Heron Jr. Keeps a ferry at Niagara, inconvenient with no tavern licence.

Christopher Lymburner of Canboro, yeoman. Took a house in the settlement occupied as a licenced tavern, prays for a licence. December 1827.

Andrew Martin. Inconvenience with no licence, prays for licence in Wainfleet. Signed "his X mark," William B. Yates, John Haney.

Leonard Misener, situated on the route of the *Welland Canal* in Wainfleet. An honest, industrious man. Prays for licence. Certificate of character by *Crowell Willson*, Crowland, December 21, 1827.

Peter Misener of Willoughby, prays for a licence. Keeps a house formerly kept by [D.P. Zak?]

Mr. Montague, Grand River, January 3, 1828. Kept a respectable tavern for one year. Prays for licence. Letter of recommendation from *Lieutenant James Mitchell* (68th) to *Ralfe Clench*.

Goods found concealed in the trunk of Nathaniel Douglass, cooper, and Thomas Sims (aka Simmons), innkeeper. Search warrant issued, and warrant to arrest Douglas and Sims and bring them before us to answer charges, June 24, 1828. Goods found in the trunk of Thomas Simmons, aka Sims, the keeper of Lee's bar, which were bought from Nathaniel Douglass. Douglass discharged from account, had liberty to redeem the articles by paying order and returning a half dollar (Samuel Street, June 27, 1828.) Douglass bought the coat in Ancaster, the vest and pantaloons bought by Street for me at *McMicking's store* in Chippawa. The hat was bought of *Joseph Moore* in Chippawa, in the employ of Mr. Street as cooper. (Samuel Street, June 27, 1828.) The fustian was found between two beds occupied by R.H. Lees and *Robert Chapman*, a cooper in the employ of George Shutts, in the same room where Douglass lodges, and found by Samuel Hicks. George Shutts: his property was found in Simmons' trunk, taken from my trunk on the 23rd. Recognizance: Nathaniel Douglass and Thomas Simmons £25 each, R.H. Lee and Samuel Hicks £12.10.0. each. Recognizance to appear: Frederick Foltz, Samuel Hicks, R.H. Lee, Marcus Blanchard £10 each, George Shutts £25. File includes Samuel Hicks account to arrest Douglass, Simmons, £10 plus mileage and detention (not finding a magistrate to take the recognizance) 5/- and 18/-.

Charles William Edwards, Niagara, mason. In fear and terror for his personal property, received bodily injury, violent abusive and threatening language by *George Courtney*, *Edward Courtney* and *Margaret Courtney*. Signed *Charles Richardson*, July 10, 1828. Warrant issued for Charles William Edwards, *Mary Edwards* and *William Edwards*, July 11, 1828 signed *Alexander Hamilton*. Taken by *Richard Leonard* and *Peter Pawling*.

Edward Courtney, Niagara, labourer. Evidence taken before *Charles Richardson:* Plaintiff in fear of life from threatening language of *Charles William Edwards*, *Mary Edwards* and *William Edwards*. Signed "his X mark" July 11, 1828.

William Lamon, charged by *Garret Lee* of the *Talbot Settlement* with theft. Warrant for arrest issued by *James Kerby* to *John J. Harris*, constable. Evidence taken August 18, 1828, while on board the schooner *Dauntless*, Lee missed a \$10 note of the *Bank of Upper Canada*. He informed *Captain Helmer*, that if anyone took it, it must be his boy the cook. Found the note in his bag, 50/- payable November 4, 1823,

signed by *J.H. Dunn* and *William Allan*. Defendant signed "his X mark" at Fort Erie and acknowledged the theft. Bound over for the Assizes, September 22, 1828.

He was going from the stable to the house when he was assaulted by Thompson and John Haverland who used abusive language. John Pender- was in stable, heard Thompson say the gun was well loaded with powder and ball. Haverland held Gilmour by the collar against his will. Gilmour wished to go to Griffins store, Haverland said he could not without leave. James Porter- in the service of Jacob Nelles, went from the barn to the house to get oats for the horses. Heard Gilmour ask to go to lodgings, Thompson said if Gilmour doesn't go "he'd knock him down." John Carrigan called Thompson to "fetch the rascal along, he would find him lodgings until the morning." Charles Hobbs- was in the service of Jacob Nelles. Said the men had hold of Gilmour and were beating him with a stick. He asked to be let go to his lodgings, was a stranger here. Thompson replied he would not allow him to go, take him to Carrigan's house. Denis Haviland, Grimsby- called at the house of Jacob Nelles on pretext of making up a quarrel between one Yanker John and the brother of the deponent. After John and Denis got into the barroom, Nelles closed the door to prevent them from leaving. Was assaulted by Jacob Nelles, John Owens, William Porter, John Pinder. John Thompson- heard a great noise at Jacob Nelles' house, door was barred. He forced the door assisted by the prisoner and Pinder.

Leonard Misener, Town Clerk of Wainfleet, charge for 3 years fees from 1826-1828, £1.10.0. January 12, 1829. Signed *Alexander Hamilton*, January 17, 1829. Fees were not received "in consequence of my living so remote from this place also making application at times when the Clerk of the Peace was absent. I now therefore pray your worships to take it into consideration and greatly oblige your humble servant."

Charges re: *Christopher Armstrong*, the poor man that died in the house of *Patrick Handy*, auctioneer in Niagara, is well known to *Mr. Muirhead*, *McDougall* and *Dr. Tiffany*. "The smell was insupportable to any person." Provided 8 days and nights lodging; candles; dirteying bed and sheets and blankets and quilts; to liquor obliged to be given to persons to wash and clean said Armstrong; soap; snuff; 4 yards of white cotton to make a winding sheet to get round his corps; loss sustained on account of persons not being able to sleep in my house from the time that he came there until his decease, total £6.3.0. The last charge not allowed, amount paid £4.12.6. Signed *Alexander Hamilton*, January 17, 1829.

Stole 8 handkerchiefs, 3 pairs of socks, three papers pins, and other goods worth 5/-. Filed by *Charles Richardson*, January 13, 1829.

Alexander Caughill, Niagara, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against *Elijah Armstrong*, Niagara, tavernkeeper, on November 24, 1828. Evidence taken before *John Crooks*. Filed by *Charles Richardson* January 13, 1829.

Undated memorandum of evidence by *R. Brady*: "Ask *A. Hucheson* wether *R. Lappan* did not leave the road and go to the house and I tried to perswade him to come away. Ask young *David Kergill* if I did not try to get him to come away when he came to the window. Also told him the said Kergil to take something and beat the said R. Lappan away if he would not come away from the door. Moreover the house was broke before I got over the fence. Prove this by A. Hucheson."

File 3-6. Insane and Destitute Accounts.

Letter from *John A. Stevenson* to *James Muirhead*, January 13, 1829. Re: *John Ellis*, who was discontinued on the pauper list for no reason. He received shelter here when refused it by his own relations. He is sick and lame. The modicum he received was barely sufficient to clothe him. He should obtain a grant for the period from last April to the present. (Rejected, signed *Alexander Hamilton*.)

William Ducat, Thorold. He is very poor, with a wife and family reduced to the lowest state of "reatchedness." Has a white swelling. Has lived six months on charity. Unless assisted they "must perish with hunger." Prays for a small sum, "such releaf as will preserve life untill the Lord in His wisdom may be pleased either to remove me by death or send Releaf some other way." Signed Isaac Overholt, John J. Brown. (Rejected, signed *Alexander Hamilton*.)

Susan Mark, a wandering old female without home or relations. Taken up wandering in Stamford, was on the pauper list. Allowance not called for by *John McMicking* (he didn't know where to find her.) She

called on *Mr. Leeming* for charity. She might be placed on the list at 3/9- if Leeming applies and she stays there. (Rejected, signed *Alexander Hamilton*.)

Widow Cantrel, lived on section 20 of the *Welland Canal* at *Bell, Richardson & Co.* three years ago. Was honest and industrious, husband went up country to get land in July, took sick and died. The widow and children lay sick with fever and ague. Made a comfortable living while in health, but are now destitute. Signed *George Keefer*, December 3, 1828. *Margaret Cantril*, widow of *Thomas Cantril*, of Ireland. Came to Upper Canada 10 years ago, lived 3 years on the Welland Canal. Husband went to Guelph for land in July, fell ill with fever and died. Widow sick since August, has five children. Weak, can't support her children. Signed "her X mark" January 15, 1829. (Rejected, signed *Alexander Hamilton*.)

Has resided many years in town, character is well known. Must have had some misrepresentation, otherwise you would not have rejected the petition. Additional recommendations from E.B. Strong, Adam Snyder, Charles Field, Robert Field, Adam Crysler, [-----?], Andrew Heron, John Eaglesum, R.H. Lee, Richard Handcock, Charles Edwards, Francis Moore. January 15, 1829. Rejected, signed Alexander Hamilton.

Evidence taken before *Robert Grant*, December 1, 1828: plaintiff had one blue cloth frock coat, 2 vests stolen. Henry Woodruff, St. Davids, saddler: he bought the coat from Bradford, gave him an old coat and \$2.00 in exchange. Personally appeared before Alex Hamilton, JP, James Anderson, who saith: Louis Dangerfield, a man of colour, labourer, was sent to him by Mr. James Wilkens of Stamford to work on his (Wilkiens') farm and to be boarded at deponents, on Monday 8th Dec.; Dangerfield remained in the house 3 days and 3 nights. A man named Craig also boarded with him; asked the deponent if he had missed any bed clothes; saw a blanket the property of the deponent on Dangerfields' bed, now residing near the village of *St. Davids*; deponent says on further investigation he found a blanket missing from the bed which Dangerfield occupied during his stay; believes Dangerfield took the blanket, prays for a search warrant for finding the goods in Dangerfield's house. [signed] James Anderson, before A. Hamilton, 12 Dec. 1828. Warrant granted; Dec. 13th the constable brought before me the said blanket found in Dangerfield's house, identified by Anderson as his property; defendant being asked if he had anything to say, alleges the blanket was brought to his house by Henry Craig, but not substantiated by any proof; constable states that upon Dangerfield being seized he attempted to make his escape by drawing his arms out of his coat and running away but he was afterwards taken; recognizance to appear James Anderson £20, Edgar Berryman and James Law, both of Stamford sureties £10 each; granted warrant of commitment Dec. 13, 1828. Fees 6/3-; filed by Charles Richardson, 13 Jany. 1829.

William Muckle, Stamford, yeoman. Charged with assault against *Benjamin Robert Ottley*, Stamford, Esquire, on December 6, 1828. True bill: *George A. Ball* (foreman.) Witnesses: Benjamin Robert Ottley, *Isabella Thompson*. Verdict: guilty. Fine 10/- plus costs, signed *Alexander Hamilton* January 17, 1829.

Evidence taken before *Charles Richardson*: Ottley in fear and terror of his personal safety, due to the threats of Muckle. Evidence taken before *Robert Grant*: John Ottley, my minor son, was assaulted by defendant and struck with a horse whip on December 5th. Today (December 6) he put his fist to my nose, challenged me to fight in the road. Said if I went to the barn to milk the cows he would horse whip me. Isabella Thompson: have been the servant of Ottley for 3 months. His son was whipped; heard Muckle challenge Ottley to a fight or be whipped. Told *Mrs. Ottley* that he'd do the same to her if she got in his way. Ottley refused to fight under bond of £500 to keep the peace. Muckle said "If you will only come out and fight me I will clear you of the law, or I will not take the law of you." Recognizance: William Muckle £10, sureties *William Dunbar* and *C. Wadsworth* £5 each.

Nathan Plumstead, Grantham, labourer. Charged with larceny, stole satinette trowsers (2/-), coat (2/-) and vest (1-) the property of *Peter Young*, Grantham, innkeeper, on October 26, 1828. True bill: *George A. Ball*. Witnesses: Peter Young, *Andrew Rorback*. Plea: guilty. Sentence 2 months in jail and 39 lashes. Signed *Alexander Hamilton*. Evidence taken before *Robert Grant* at Queenston, October 28: between 6 and 7 pm Plumstead was in the barroom. Deponent went to make a fire in the kitchen, Plumstead was by the door and asked for the bill. Said he intended to go to St. Catharines. It would be more convenient for the residents of Canboro' Walpole and Rainham, who can go and return the same day, but the trip takes three days for them to get to the mouth of the river. Mention this to *Mr. Evans* (the judge), *Mr. Anthony* prefers Huff's.

Zachariah Mudge, Government House, April 24, 1829 to *Charles Richardson*: please make a return of the assessment for Niagara for 1828 agreeable to the form of statute in 59 Geo. III ch. 3.6.

Charles Richardson, Niagara, April 1829, to the *Treasurer of the London District*. Please pay the road taxes for Walpole and Rainham to *Edward Evans* and *William Anthony*.

Charles Richardson to *Zachariah Mudge*, April 3, 1829. Encloses a statement re: emoluments and offices held by me, agreeable to yours of the 18th ult. Charles Richardson, Clerk of the Peace, Niagara District, December 31, 1828, was appointed to his office on February 21, 1828 but not sworn into it until April 8th. Collects no salary, only fees which amounted to £151.13.5. Has no other place of profit except his practice as attorney and barrister, executed by principal. Holds a Commission under the *Heir and Devisee Act*, and for taking oaths and affidavits, and recognizances of bail.

Zachariah Mudge, Government House, to *Charles Richardson*, March 18, 1829. Has enclosed a form, the Lieutenant Governor desires information on each head. [The blank form to be filled in concerned information regarding manufactures, grist and saw mills, the number of ships built in 1828 with their burthen, iron ore deposits, mines and beds, plaster beds, salt works and general remarks. This form had one category filled in by Richardson, which specified "only one salt works at St. Catharines."]

Charles Richardson to *Zachariah Mudge*, April 3, 1829. I will make it out as soon as possible, as soon as I get the necessary information from individuals in the District "there being no documents in my office which I could adopt as a guide in making my report." This refers to the blank form sent by Mudge on March 18th.

Evidence taken before James Macklem and James Cummings on February 28: Lacey had an execution from James Macklem against the goods of Joseph Badgely of Thorold in favour of **David Earl** to make the sum £4.12.3 obtained in court June 7, 1828. He came to defendants house and knocked at the door, said he had an execution for Badgely, told him to "read it or I'll read it to you." Badgely said "get out of my house you damn'd old scoundrell, or I will split your brains out." took up the fire tongs and made a blow at the deponent. I avoided the blow by taking hold of the tongs. His wife assisted to get me out of the house. Badgely put his head out the window and said if deponent came into his enclosure "he would split the damn'd old thief's brains out." His wife swore she'd scald him, called him a "damn'd old scoundrel." Deponent couldn't do his duty, was in danger of his life. Pitcher was given to her by James Ramsey, Hepburn's clerk. She doesn't know the name of Mr. McMicking's clerk. She was in the company of William Green, drove in a wagon from Lundy's Lane, where she bought a half dozen chairs. Stopped at Secord's for a snack to eat after candle light. Went to Solomon Fisher's one mile from Chippawa. Signed "her X mark" April 2, 1829. William Green: has lived at Benjamin Doan's at Humberstone for five months. Got chairs at Lundy's Lane. Went to Chippawa and bought plates and a pitcher at McMicking's, painted in the same manner as the one Secord claims. Saw the iron in her hand there, she showed it to me and said "I have an iron, I won't have to borrow one." We put the stuff in the wagon, drove to Secords and had a snack in the evening. Did not see the boots. She had on shoes. Signed "his X mark." James Ramsey, clerk to William Hepburn- sold the prisoner a frying pan and 1 lbs. of muscovado sugar. Didn't recall selling a pitcher, none of that pattern in the shop. Confident he didn't sell the pitcher to the prisoner. *Alexander Duggan*, clerk to Mr. McMicking-never sold prisoner an iron, doesn't know the price. James Secord- pitcher and iron are identical to his, has particular marks therein. Susan House-the piece of white cotton is from James Macklem, says her husband bought it at a shop in the Deep Cut last December, lacked a little of 8 yards- ¹/₂ yard at the shop of *Mr. McGill*, he was in the shop, bought it from his clerk. James Macklemthe cotton is from my shop, his price is marked in figures on the same. James Secord, innkeeper, Chippawa- before James Cummings, April 2, 1829- had a 1 gallon earthen pitcher taken, a farmers coat of arms on it, iron #6 (Swindell) and common boots from the barroom. A traveller pulled them off and left before going to bed. James Macklem before James Cummings- Susan House came to my shop with a man she called *W. Bland*, bought 2 pairs of hinges, 7 lights of window glass, a gallon of whiskey (for Bland.) Bland- we got into the sleigh and found we had the cotton. I knew she didn't buy it. Deponent- has no means to identify it, cotton being alike but there is a shop mark on it. Susan House- I came to Chippawa with **Phillip Bland** in a one horse sleigh to go for whiskey at Macklems- charged goods to Harmonius House. Went up Lyon's Creek, Bland asked if she could keep a secret- he said "I am a new beginner, got cotton at Macklems. If you don't tell, I'll give you half." Prisoner swore not to tell. He took the cloth and tore it in two and gave her part- she never used it- was brought from her house by the constables.

Solomon B. Rose, charged with blasphemy by **Jacob Hosteder**, Grantham. Evidence taken before **David Thompson** and **Alexander Hamilton**, July 17, 1829: witness was at the school house at 10 Mile Creek on June 28, after preaching a sermon the defendant made use of words "that he would to God the Church of England prayer books, creeds, catchechisms, were gathered or put into a heap or pile and burnt, that he would they were eradicated from the face of the earth, that they had done more harm than good" and that "the Trinitarian doctrine was an error" and "that Christ was not the very and eternal God." **Matthew McMullin**, Grantham, heard Rose accused by J. Hosteder; **Abraham Secord**, Grantham, heard the defendant say that the words of the Bible were not all God's words, some were the devil's words, that all between the lids of the Bible is not all scripture; **George Read**, Grantham, testified the same as J. Hosteder; other witnesses with similar testimony (all of Grantham) **Isaac Westover**, **Alexander Wilson** (teacher), **Thomas Darling**, **John Darby**, **Robert Hodkison**. Recognizances for witnesses to appear, each bound £10.

Jeremiah Callaghan (or *Calahan*) charged with felony, the theft of some bills from the pocketbook of *George McMaster*. Recognizance to appear taken before *James Black*, St. Catharines, July 16, 1829: George McMaster £10, *Joseph Markwell* and *Charles Campbell* £5 each.

File 4-6, Presentments.

To provide against mischief and nuisances in the town of Niagara. People are in the habit of shooting musquets and firing squibs, to the danger of setting fire to property or maiming subjects; despite police and regulations, swine still run at large in the town- resolved that no hogs are to be allowed to run except ones with a ring through the nose; those riding horses and driving carriages and wagons and carts at such rate and who pass each other endanger His Majesty's subjects; "an alarming and increasing evil in this town is...so many women of loose habits in the practice of prowling our streets at all hours in the night and infesting the stables and other out houses in the town and stealing such loose property as happens to fall in their way;" those carrying unlawful weapons for the purpose of gratifying a malignant and vindictive spirit, to the great danger of His Majesty's liege subjects...all of which are respectfully submitted as being highly injurious to the property of the said town of Niagara and to the peace comfort and security of His Majesty's subjects." Grand Jury Room, *David Thompson* (foreman) July 18, 1829.

For the better security of His Majesty's subjects, a *fire engine* and other apparatus be furnished from rent on market lots. Each landlord in town to furnish two engine buckets. Grand Jury Room, *David Thompson* (foreman) July 18, 1829. Filed by *Charles Richardson*.

The complaint of *John Casey*, a prisoner in the debtor's ward. He has been grossly and frequently insulted, abused and ill treated by a coloured man in the employ of the sheriff without the least reproof. Wishes for some means to prevent the abuse. The cells were examined, and the jury commends the sheriff and gaoler for clean and comfortable cells. All the prisoners were satisfied except said Carey [sic.] Grand Jury Room, *David Thompson* (foreman) July 18, 1829. Filed by *Charles Richardson*. Charges brought against gaoler *Peter Wheeler* by Casey: a gross violation of the printed regulations of the gaol, intercourse or conversation with prisoners between 8am and 4 pm was not enforced regarding my friends; a coloured man, hired to flog, assailed me at the diamond of the door "with gross abuse, scurrility, curses and threats;" the gaoler's "barbarous and inhuman conduct towards the unfortunate criminal which, to the feelings of any heart less hardened than Pharaoh's must, in my humble opinion, give a sensible shock." The crime was singing aloud, they damned him and swore vehemently to put him in chains and put him in the dungeon, close to the kitchen fire with no opening for air. This must "inevitably produce suffocation." Prisoner soon fainted but was revived with cold water. Prisoner hasn't caused so much disturbance as the coloured man. When mentioned to the gaoler "he damned me and said he should sing as much as he pleased." Hopes for redress.

File 4-7, Insane and Destitute.

Hannah Winters, Grantham. Wickedly and maliciously contrived to aggrieve Levi Crawford.

Robert Addison: "One poor family in particular on whoes behalf I venture to address your worships is in a most pitiable situation. The man is call'd **Black Tom**, a hard working and industrious man, his wife has been struck by the palsy for years and is quite unable to walk, or even feed herself. He has three young children, and much of his time must be taken up in waiting on his wife. In such a situation, without help, some of them must perish. I am, gentlemen, your most humble servant."

Robert Addison's Representation regarding paupers. "To the Magistrates of the District of Niagara in Quarter Sessions assembled. Worshipful gentlemen,

I am sorry to understand that notice has been given that the allowance to paupers is to be discontinued, many of them I fear will be reduced to extreme distress, for bread is very dear, and most of these miserable human beings are utterly incapable of helping themselves."

Cockcroft*, surgeon, for Green. July 20, 1829.

Letter of *Thomas Creen*, October 12, 1829 re: *William Ross*. A pauper, in utter poverty and a helpless situation. Requires the constant presence and assistance of his wife, has young children. *Sarah Ross* wife of William Ross: the family emigrated from Ireland last year. He is confined to bed and can't work, she must attend him. They have five children. Signed "her X mark" July 15, 1829. Allowed 7/6- per week, signed *James Muirhead*.

Evidence taken before David Thompson and *Charles Richardson*, July 20, 1829: Forsyth violently assaulted deponent, the next day he refused to aid him in the execution of his duty. Verdict: not guilty, signed *James Muirhead* October 16, 1829.

Michael Gannon, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *John M. Monagh*, labourer, on June 23, 1829. Witnesses: John M. Monagh. Hicks said he would not show them. Buchner said he would go in the house and levy on what he found. Hicks said he'd knock him down. He attempted to go to the door but Hicks struck him. He tried a second time and received a blow. Peter McCall, Grantham, shipwright. Charged with larceny, theft of one iron crowbar (value 5/-) the property of John Martindale Sr, on April 25, 1828. No bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Daniel Doran (or Dorrin), William Hepburne, John Martindale. Evidence of Daniel Dorin before George Adams, July 7: I went to work for McCall on the day the schooner Peacock went to the mouth of 12 Mile Creek harbour. Went on board Mr. Northrop's scow, took the crowbar and took it to another scow. Hepburn: the crowbar described by Dorrin was the same, reddish or rusty coloured. It laid among brick or stone and was unused for a long time. John Martindale Sr: McCall took the crowbar from the scow, the property of Job Northrop, near the lock at the mouth of the Welland Canal. David Blair, Port Dalhousie: was in the employ of McCall in 1828 at the 12 Mile Creek before moving to Mr. Clark's at 16 Mile Creek. McCall's wife asked what to do with the wrench? He said take it along, and carried it upstairs. It was then carried to the harbour and left at the home of Martindale. Doesn't know if it was stolen, but said it cost half a dollar, was about 4 foot long and contained 40 lbs of iron, signed "his X mark." Rachel Blair: lived with McCall in May 1828. Brought home 11/2 barrels of pork which were taken into the cellar. Five barrels of pork were stolen, paid nothing, which were later buried in the garden. John Tinlin said he'd never do the like again. Took the pork off the wharf at Youngs Town, also roap picked into oakum. She received 20/- from McCall for picking it. Daniel Gregory and John Tinlin were in company with him. Signed "her X mark." John Blair: found an iron hook for turning logs and timber in the straw where potatoes and turnips were buried. 6 or 7 lbs. I put the hook on the floor and asked what it was used for? Mc Call said for turning over timber. Recognizance to appear taken before George Adams, July 11: Peter McCall £25, sureties John Gregory and James Tinline £12.10.0. each; John Martindale, William Hepburn, Jesse Pawling, Rossiel O'Brien, Daniel Dorrin, Daniel Blair, Thomas Akenhead, Rufus Davis, Rachel Blair and George Brown £12.10.0 each.

File 4-23

Peter McCall, Niagara, shipwright. Charged with larceny, stealing 2 iron chisels (2/-), one slicker (3/-), and a handsaw (2/-) the property of **Rufus Davis**, on June 1, 1828. No bill: **David Thompson** (foreman). Witnesses: Rufus Davis, **Thomas Akenhead**. Evidence taken before **George Adams**, July 7: Thomas Akenhead, Port Dalhousie: in June 1828 two chisels, a slicker (an instrument to dress mortices) and a handsaw were in the chest of McCall at 12 Mile Creek, the tools of Rufus Davis. The chest was locked, they were clandestinely taken. **George Brown**, Louth: was with **Jesse Pawling** and McCall in November 1827 travelling to Chippawa in a wagon. There was an axe in a stump near a barn, Pawling wouldn't get it so McCall did. I believe it belonged to **George Keefer**. **Roziel O'Brien**: Showed an axe which resembled a cooper's axe but neither Pawling nor Brown had the courage to take it. McCall pointed to the stump where he got it from (November 1827.) Rufus Davis: I missed some tools in May or June 1828. Two chisels, a slick and saw were locked in a chest. I challenged McCall about it. Jesse Pawling: Went to Chippawa in November 1827. Between **Jacob Ball's** and the **Beaverdam** we saw a "handy axe" and

planned to get it. I wouldn't take it, but McCall got over the fence in a field and got the axe off a stump. Was a cooper's axe? *William Hepburn*: in the spring of 1828 an iron wrench, 4 feet long, the property of the *Welland Canal Company* was missing. Did McCall have the wrench? He said he paid a quarter dollar for it from *Sloan's Boatmen*, I was surprised to find such property in his possession. Rufus Davis: in November 1828 I heard McCall say to O'Brien he had had no cant hook since he lived at the harbour, it must belong to someone else.

Peter McCall, Grantham, shipwright. Charged with larceny, stealing one iron wrench, the property of *Thomas Akenhead*, (value 5/-) on May 1, 1828. No bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Akenhead, Blair, Hepburn.

Peter McCall, Grantham, shipwright. Charged with larceny, theft of one iron cant hook the property of *Rosial O'Brien*, (value 4/-) on December 1, 1828. No bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) True bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Isabella Proctor. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead*, June 15: in the absence of my husband, defendant made use of very improper language. I went down to the backyard where he struck her with a blow with his fist, knocked her down, and used threatening language. *James Barker* and *John Skelton* of Niagara did aid and abet McCullough in his outrageous conduct. Requires security to keep the peace, apprehensive of bodily harm, signed "her X mark." Recognizance to appear: John McCullough £20, *Matthew Dobie* £10. Verdict: not guilty, signed *James Muirhead*.

John McCullogh, Niagara, blacksmith. Charged with assault and battery against *Francis Proctor*, on June 15, 1829. No bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Francis Proctor. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall*, June 15. Recognizance: John and *Helen McCullock* £10, sureties *Jacob Dockstator* and *Thomas Whitten* £5 each.

John McCullough, Niagara, blacksmith, and *Helen McCullough*, Niagara. Charged with assault and battery against *Francis Proctor* on June 15, 1829. No bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Francis Proctor, *Hugh Shaw*.

John McMonagle, Niagara, yeoman. Presentment: Keeps a very irregular and disorderly house which annoys and disturbs his neighbours. "A common receptacle for all kinds of people, and for people of colour," a haunt of crime. Steps must be taken to inquire into the premises. Signed *David Thompson* (foreman) July 18,1829, filed by *Charles Richardson*. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: *Mary Hughs, George Varey, James Kennedy* and his wife, May 18: defendant kept a house for lucre and

gain, men and women of evil fame and of dishonest conversation, assemble for drinking, tippling, whoring and misbehaving themselves. Verdict: guilty, signed *James Muirhead*.

John Simpson, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a bank note (value 5/-) the property of *Burnett Ulman*, Niagara, yeoman, on May 16, 1829. True bill: *David Thompson* (foreman). Witnesses: Burnett Ulman, *Peter G. Smite*. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead*, May 18: Ulman slept at the house of *Robert Gray*, innkeeper. Simpson occupied the same bed, but got up earlier. Letter from *Crowell Willson* to *Charles Richardson*, Crowland, March 25, 1830: Was informed last evening of the change in date for the session. Have been confined to bed some weeks by a "canser" in my lip. I have bound *Charles Willson* on the complaint of *John Segar* for assault and battery. Segar has not come to post a bond to prosecute which he agreed to when I issued the warrant. He's gone down but I can't say whether he'll appear. I sent Willson's recognizance down by him (an uncommon way of doing business) but I had no other way of conveyance.

Enclosure: recognizance taken before Crowell Willson, March 6, 1830: Charles Willson, Crowland, yeoman, £10, surety *John Haun*, Crowland, yeoman, £5. Remark, July 13, 1830: Segar vs. Willson, settled by consent of parties. On examination it appeared to be too frivolous to bring before the Court, signed Crowell Willson.

Evidence of *Rachel Boston*, wife of *James Boston*, St. David's, coloured woman, taken before *Robert Grant* and *Alexander Hamilton*, April 11, 1830: *Tobias Battimore* and *Augustus Washington* (coloured men) were in an adjoining part of the house on the 10th. The conversation and circumstances- they were playing cards. Washington charged Battimore with cheating. Washington said "damn you I have won it three times already and I won't give it up to you." Battimore said "if you don't give up the money I will sacrifice you." A scuffle ensued, Washington turned Battimore out of doors. I heard a cry of "murder." I ran to the door, called to my husband who was 15 rods away at *Mr. Campbell's* house. Battimore came

from around the house at the back door. I found Washington in the house in a chair with his face all bloody from a wound in his forehead, rocking back and forth stupified. He said Battimore struck him with an axe. The question was repeated 2 or 3 times to be sure. I helped him into his part of the house, where he now lies dangerously ill. Battimore struck him at the door, blood in three spots on the wall near the door, and knocked Washington into the fire. Rachel and James Boston swore to the truth of the statement, signed "her X mark" and "his X mark." Tobias Battimore: readily confessed to gambling with Washington. Had a quarrel, Washington seized him by the throat and threatened to kill me. In fear and defense I struck Washington with the axe handle. Washington had my finger his mouth and was biting it, and continued to bite until I struck a blow with my fist and the scuffle ended, signed "his X mark." Commitment issued same date to the common gaol. Recognizance: *Richard Woodruff* bound £10 for Rachel and James Boston to appear, April 12, 1830. James Boston bound £10 April 13, 1830. Letter attached from Alexander Hamilton, April 11, 1830: Washington too ill, in danger of his life, to be brought down. Robert Grant thought it unadviseable to grant Tobias Battimore bail. On April 12th Grant and I proceeded to St. David's and found Washington quite unable to give evidence, lying with his eyes shut and apparently insensible to everything around him. He is attended by *Dr. Cockcroft*.

John Moore Sr. Born in Ireland in 1741, joined the army in 1762 and went to Portugal where he was wounded at Lisbon. Went to New York in 1765 where he taught school. He refused to swear allegiance to the Republicans and came to Upper Canada. He taught school at Grimsby, Stoney Creek, Clinton, Louth and Stamford. He is now unfit to teach due to his advanced age and infirmities. He was an assessor in Grimsby and Clinton as well as a school trustee. He signed a petition to parliament with a request to establish Township Schools. He has no savings from his scanty salary. Now aged 90 years, he is helpless and infirm, destitute of subsistence. Prays for a small pension "to preserve him during the brief remainder of his days, free from the distresses of abject poverty." October 11, 1830.

Catherine Frank, widow of *Henry Frank* of Gainsborough. Since the death of her husband she has laboured under the disadvantage of "my idiot or indeed a lunatic girl, my daughter" is incapable of support and "retards the progress of those who might assist me in earning a scanty subsistence." Prays for the grant of a sum agreeable to the Statute regarding Idiots and Lunatics, "her X mark" September 3, 1830. Evidence of John Cox, Niagara, yeoman and Hugh Freel, Niagara, yeoman, taken before Daniel McDougall on January 8, 1831: the West Line was opened as a common and public highway under the provisions of 50 Geo. III. ch. 1.13 (1828.) William M. Ball stopped up the west end, leading into the Black Swamp Road, by erecting rail fences across it which still continues; and heard John Wilson say "he had shut up the road" on the east end leading into the Queenston Road and river. Hugh Freel- testified that 2 other fences were put up by Wilson. He saw Wilson and two sons repairing the fence, believes it was put up to stop His Majesty's subjects from travelling on the road. Subpoena dated January 8 by Daniel McDougall and Ralph M. Crysler for Charles Richardson to appear on January 17, and to bring all books and papers along regarding the West Line Road. John Cox, sworn: an order was given to the pathmaster to open the West Line, which was done by *Rheddy Cusack*. Road shut up by William M. Ball and John Wilson. Statute labour was performed on the road in the spring of 1828 after it was opened. He was present with the surveyor when the survey was made- road ran through Wilson's orchard and Ball's garden. Trees which had been planted were dug up and destroyed without the consent of the owners (two trees were at least 26 years old.) The act of the pathmaster was illegal, the proceeding null and void. [Note: see box 29 file 5, John Wilson's account and sketch of the estate "thrown waste by opening of West Line Road."]

Welfare and Credit of the Niagara District. The withdrawal of succor from the paupers of this District grieves us. We pray that you gratify the inhabitants with an extension instead of a restriction of the *paupers list*. This populous and wealthy District can afford to maintain a few paupers. Precautions must be taken against unworthy applicants to guard against wasteful appropriation. Increase the District *food allowance for the gaol* prisoners, they complain of insufficiency. Place prisoners committed before their trial in a separate cell from those already convicted. *Licences* in the District are not equitably proportioned. Road allowance through Louth and Clinton. A road along the lakeshore through Louth and Clinton has been used for many years, but is too narrow at **James O'Connolly's**. There is dangerous passing in several places. He is opposed to increase the road width there which is warranted by law. If he can't be induced to remove fruit trees on equitable principles, we may remove it to some proper place above his orchard and give him remuneration for damages he may sustain. The road should continue along the lake until it intersects the **Old Lake Road** on the east side of the 12 Mile Creek. Signed **Nathan Pawling**. [January?] 1831.

Sir, In transmitting the return required by the Honorable the Commons House of Assembly I am under the necessity of confining myself to such changes as have received the sanction of the court from time to time, never having kept any account of casual emoluments. It is not unlikely that I may have received from £150 to £200 since I have been in office over and above the sums mentioned in the accompanying accounts and the annual allowance of £30 for making out the collectors rolls and transmitting the aggregate amount of assessments to your office. With regard to the table of fees adopted by the Court of Quarter Sessions in this District, I beg leave to state that previous to its' being reported by the committee, reference was had to the allowances made to the Clerks of the Peace in the Home, London and Gore Districts, and my material alterations made in the items of charges as will appear by the statements made to me by the late Mr. Heward of York and Mr. Askin of the London District—copies of which I take the liberty of inclosing. In addition to the sums stated to have been received by me out of the District Treasury, I have to observe that the Court has made an annual allowance of £8.10.0. to defray the expense of delivering the rolls to the different collectors & although I have not derived the least advantage therefrom the charge would appear as [agt?] myself without this explanation. There is also another sum stated to have been paid out of the District Treasury amounting to $\pounds 25.10.0$, with respect to which I beg to observe that the money was not paid to me but to a carpenter who had made repairs to the Court House under my superintendance. Upon reference to the records of the Court I find that on the 9th [Jany?] 1822 a trial was had on the Report of the Surveyor of Highways & a special verdict rendered; that on the 11th Oct. following the individuals interested in the subject matter of the petition went before the Grand Jury preferring a bill of indictment against John Willson, John Eglesum, Peter Ball and Elizabeth Slingerland for obstructing the road in question, which bill was returned into court ignored; in the month of April following attempt was made to open the road by indict. & the Grand Jury again again ignored the bill; the complainants renewed their application to the Grand Jury in July 1825 when they returned a true bill against John Eglesum, Elizabeth Slingerland and Peter Ball Esq. The matter

was submitted to a pettit jury on the 14th Oct. following & the parties were proved guilty upon this verdict the defendants were subsequently fined 5 shillings & an order was issued to the pathmaster "to lay open the allowance for road commonly called the West Line Road whereon the reserve in that line might be found with a view of abating the nuisance complained of." With reference to that part of the statement of the petitioners which relates to the meeting held on the 3^{rd} June last, I beg leave to state for His Excellency's info. that the magistrates upon that occasion did not conceive themselves authorized to interfere, the road having been opened thro' the orchard of John Wilson & the garden of Mr. Ball contrary to the provisions of the Stat. referred to by the Petitioners (50 Geo 3 cap. 1 sec. 2) As to what took place on the 17th Jany. last as I was not present myself I can only report according to the information I have rec'd from the Clk of the Peace. He states that he was specially called upon by two magistrates to summon John Wilson and Wm. M. Ball to appear on that day to shew cause why they should not be fined for obstructing the road in question; that the parties met at that occasion at the Court House & having found that the road was opened thro' an orchard and garden which had been in [use] for upwards of five and twenty years, the court came to the unanimous conclusion that the road having been opened through an orchard and garden without the consent of the owners the act of the pathmaster was illegal & that therefore the proceeding was null & void. Being aware that the first [aspersions and reflections?] contained in the petition emanates from the pen of *John Lyons* of this place, I do not think them worthy of further notice, that by comparison with a production of his which made its appearance in a paper published in this June called the *Spirit of the Times*—a copy of which I beg leave to inclose for His Excellency's perusal—the original in the hand writing of Mr. Lyons being in my possession. In conclusion I beg leave respectfully to suggest that this question which has so long agitated the public mind and which has so much trouble to the magistrates may be set at rest by His Excellency's authority, by such means as His Excellency may deem meet. Evidence of Nathaniel [Blackmer?], cooper and Peter Darby, carpenter, on the oath of Thomas Merritt: Glynn with an axe in one hand and a knife in the other threatened to murder his wife. James Black and John Smith attempted to arrest him, February 15, 1831. Plea: guilty. Sentenced to one month in gaol, and to secure sureties to keep the peace for one year.

Edward Hawkins, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 1 silver spoon (value 2/6-) the property of *Jacob Duesler*, Niagara, tailor, on March 15, 1831. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall*: Hawkins came to the house of deponent at 6 pm and asked for something to eat. Tea was set before him and the silver spoon, when he left the spoon was gone. Benoni Nickals [Nichols], Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against **Edward Defield** and **John Stewart**, constables, on March 22, 1831. Evidence taken before **Robert Grant**, March 24: Defield was employed as a constable to serve a warrant for debt (issued by Robert Grant) on the defendant. He arrested Nickals at Chippawa, who was in a wagon with two women. He wouldn't let the deponent ride in the wagon, but gave abusive language and said he'd go and do what he pleased. Could go in the wagon if he didn't go faster. The deponent went one mile, when the road was good he (Nickals) started the horses. Deponent called for him to stop, he would have made his escape unless John Stewart overtook him. Nickals struck several blows with the whip, deponent seized him by the collar. Nickals struck him a blow with his fist on the head. Deponent tied him up and brought him to Queenston with the help of Stewart. Exhibit: warrant from Robert Grant to **Chester Wadsworth** to levy upon the goods of Nickals to recover a debt of £8 in favour of **David McWethy**. Verdict: guilty. Fine £5 plus costs, and to remain in custody until paid. March 25, 1831.

Henry J. Boulton, York, July 15, 1831: Does not see anything to prevent the Quarter Sessions from trying cases for misdemeanors of physicians practicing without a licence. "It has been done more than once here."

John Beverly Robinson to *Thomas McCormick*, York, May 18, 1831: You are no longer treasurer but minutes of charges not forwarded £4.13.4.

William Clarke to *Charles Richardson*, July 16, 1831: encloses *Mr. Robinson's* Accounts of the Niagara District.

Letter from *James Muirhead* to *Edward McMahon*, Niagara, July 21, 1831. Petition of *William Forsyth* transmitted for His Excellency's information, was convicted of aggravated assault on *Michael Morgan*, and fined £5 plus imprisonment. Forsyth was convicted before a full bench. Reply from Edward McMahon: petition was laid on the table late in the session but not acted upon. Any application for remission of punishment should be made to His Excellency. [File contains a draft and good copy of the letter.]

Letter of *Edward McMahon* to *Charles Richardson*, Government House, July 17, 1831: An account of the number of emigrants required for the Niagara District.

Letter of *Henry John Boulton*, York, July 7, 1831: A poor old man, *O'Connelly*, has been with me to see if he cannot have protection regarding attempts to open a road in a half circle behind his house and premises on the lakeshore in Louth. This must injure the man very materially. He did not bring a petition and proceedings from the Quarter Sessions therefore I cannot give him an opinion. His immediate neighbours try to injure the old man for their benefit, which I hope you will aid me in trying to frustrate. I charged him nothing for my advice. A map shows how unjust

the attempt is, and how seriously he will be injured. Before a road can be made, a petition must be made to the road surveyor by 12 freeholders and he must report thereon to the Quarter Sessions. If no opposition is made, the road may be established. If opposition is made, a jury may be sworn to try the matter. Proceedings have not been had.

Letter of *Charles Richardson* to *Henry J. Boulton*, Niagara, July 11, 1831: steps have been taken, the jury has determined the matter in favour of the petitioner (*O'Connelly*) after a full hearing. Also encloses a presentment against physicians practicing with no licence. Does the Quarter Sessions have the authority to try such cases under the Statutes?

Mary Terman, July 5. Orders of *James Muirhead*, John Crooks and *Daniel McDougall*. Under sentence.

Evidence of *Mary Turman*, of Niagara, *femme covert*, taken before *Daniel McDougall*, April 27, 1831: in the afternoon of April 24th *John Fry*, Niagara, labourer, came into her house. He abused her with foul language, and he was ordered by a coloured man (an inmate of the house) to be quiet or get out. He continued the abuse and was pushed out of the house. When outside the house he pointed a pistol at the deponent and "swore by Jesus Christ he'd blow her brains out." Deponent was alarmed and went to the justices. She came home, and Fry came to her door and knocked very hard. The coloured man told Fry not to come in but Fry said he would. If the door was not opened he'd break it. He was told if he broke the door, he'd suffer for it. Fry struck the door three times with great violence, broke the lock and rushed into the house. The deponent hid, Fry took up a candle and went upstairs to search the house. The inmates forced him out. Deponent fears he will do her harm. Signed "her X mark." Evidence of *John Drain*: was present at the house, saw Fry acting badly and had a pistol, swore he'd blow her brains out. July 15, 1831.

June 3, 1831, subpoena to *Moses Skinner*, Crowland, to give evidence against *Francis Benedict* (misdemeanor) at Sessions on July 12, 1831, signed *Charles Richardson*.

June 3, 1831, subpoenas to *Linus B. Clarke*, Crowland, and *Arthur Johnson*, Crowland, served by Constable *S. Glover*, signed *Charles Richardson*.

James Cummings, Chippawa, July 11, 1831. *Mr. Weishuhn* and me has settled the warrant that I took out for him and it is my wishes that you would not return the warrant to the court as all cost is paid. Addressed to *E. Moss*.[?]

Alexander Hamilton to *Charles Richardson*, Queenston, July 13, 1831: the information of *John Pickard* concerning *Clendennan* enclosed. A warrant has been issued but no return made. Pickard's wife is in Queenston with the property, but Clendennan is not with her. She had given up the property which they had taken back with them and I thought the matter ended. The information was laid aside and entirely escaped my attention. Evidence of *John Pickard*, Niagara, taken before Alexander Hamilton at Queenston, May 16, 1830: *Walter Clendennan* of Grantham left the province with goods and chattels (a wagon, yoke of cattle and household furniture) worth £25, the property of my brother, *James Pickard*, of Niagara, who is absent from his house. Prays that a warrant might issue for Clendennan. Recognizance: John Pickard £20, surety *Gilbert Anderson* £20. Recognizance to appear taken before *George Adams*, June 11, 1831: Walter Clendenning, of Grantham, millwright, £25, sureties *Walter Dittrick*, Grantham, innkeeper and *John Hainer*, Grantham, yeoman, £12.10.0. each. [File includes draft copy of a bond, June 20, 1831.]

John Clark to Charles Richardson, July 14, 1831. It is not in my power to remain longer in town in the case of William Smith. My observation of his conduct in disturbing the peace, and instigating others to do the same, and grossly insulting me as magistrate, make me feel perfectly warranted in committing him. The parties complaining did not appear, he will be discharged by proclamation. He ought to be bound to keep the peace. The constable account for taking Smith from Grand River to Canboro' and then delivered to another constable \$7.00. John Lounsberry's account \$7.00. Letter of H[enry?] Camp to be forwarded to John Clark, St. Catharines: "I wish you would have the goodness to rite to Square Clark and say to him that Smith says when he gits clear that he will take his life I think it to be my deutey to informe square Clark of the threts made by Smith."

John Gibson (foreman): that Sarah Taylor, wife of Robert Taylor of Niagara, give evidence before the Grand Jury, July 14; Robert Burns and Johnson Clench to give evidence before the Grand Jury, July 14; William Gant, Henry Preston and Benjamin Gates be sworn to give evidence before the Grand Jury, July 12, 1831. Filed by Charles Richardson.

File 10-15, Filings.

Presentment: John Stewart, Gainsborough, constable, at the house of John Lacey, Thorold, on June 22, 1829 was in charge of prisoner James Fields, Niagara, labourer. On the commitment of William Anthony, J.P., and charged by William Johnson with the theft of £2. Stewart took £4.5.0. as his fees and restored £2 to William Johnson, and then and there wilfully suffered James Fields to escape and go at large. Signed Samuel Street, September 18, 1829. Evidence: William Johnson, a labourer on the Welland Canal, on the last day of June or early July 1829 came and made information that James Fields stole £2. A warrant was issued to John Kenneda, constable, to apprehend Fields. Fields made his escape before the warrant for commitment was made. He was pursued 2-3 miles, and Constable Stewart coming the opposite way heard the "hue and cry." He stopped him and brought him back. The prisoner was put in charge of Stewart, I made out the warrant of commitment, delivered it to Stewart and sent them away. A man, Lacy, was present at the Deep Cut. He saw Stewart and Fields. A certain sum was taken from Fields for constable fees

and a sum for me as a magistrate. Lacy swore the amount was stolen and the prisoner was allowed to escape. Happened just before the last Assizes. Asked the gaoler if he received the prisoner Fields, he said he did not. The *Attorney General* directed me on how to proceed. Warrant issued July 21, 1831. Warrant to appear for witnesses William Anthony, John Kennedy and John Lacy issued by *William Campbell* September 18, 1829. Recognizance to appear: William Anthony, John Lacy and John Kennedy £25; John Stewart £100 and sureties *Robert Dickson* and *Alexander Stewart* £50 each. Exhibits: two \$2.00 Bank Notes and one \$4.00 note.

Condition of Roads and Bridges. The road between *Rose's farm* to Stamford and the Falls has been lately worked but is in a bad state. The road has been thrown up high in the centre, is 20 feet wide from the outside of each ditch, therefore two waggons in passing with loads are in danger of slipping.

The *bridge across 4 Mile Creek* at the *Lake Road* is in a dangerous state, the timbers decayed. Repairs are needed but statute labour is insufficient. £5 needed to repair bridge.

The *bridge over 15 Mile Creek* on the *Main Road* is almost fallen down, is dangerous and needs to be rebuilt. Estimated to cost £15.

The *bridge over 20 Mile Creek* on the same road is dangerous, the timbers have decayed but the planks are good. Will cost £37.10.0. to repair.

Joseph Smith, *Henry Kerr* and *Lewis Hains* to be commissioners to pay out repair money. Stone butments would be cheapest.

Charles K. Fell, ordered to survey the road between Concessions 4 and 5 in Grantham between lots 20 and 21 and to report upon the same, July 15, 1831.

Benjamin Clench, ordered £8.10.0. for delivery of rolls to collectors, July 16, 1831.

John B. Robinson, ordered £4.13.4. for his opinions given when Attorney General on May 25, 1826 and July 13, 1829.

Joseph Smith, Henry Kerr and Lewis Hains ordered £25 for the new 20 Mile Creek Bridge and £12.10.0. for the 15 Mile Creek Bridge, July 16, 1831.

Courtland Secord, ordered £5 to repair the *4 Mile Creek Bridge* on the *Lake Road*, July 16, 1831.²¹

Charles K. Fell, ordered to survey a road on the *Grand River* in Moulton and Haldimand, running from the road at *Dunnville* to the place formerly occupied by *Christopher Lymburner* and to intersect with a road opened from *Burlington Beach* touching at *Highflyers* near the *Nelles' Settlement* and to produce maps of the same, July 16, 1831.

Louth, April 8, 1831. A dispute has arisen concerning Concession Roads. The District Surveyor says the roads should be laid out on the north side of marked stakes, the chain bearers say it should be on the south side. Some believe one and others believe another. Some cut timber on the north side of the stakes and others on the south side, some shut up the road on the north side and others on the south side. "These proceedings are the cause of a great disturbance in Louth." Concession roads are obstructed, some altogether stopped up. Ordered that Charles K. Fell, a competent surveyor, examine and report upon them. The petitioners will pay the surveyor, July 14, 1831. See George III (1818) p. 438 for the surveyor's oath, pp. 439-440 surveyors deemed as judges of land boundary matters. Signed Eber Cullver, John Clark, George Oile, James N. James W.O. Clarke, pathmaster, based upon a verdict of the jury is ordered to open a road near the orchard of *James O'Connolly*, under the supervision of *Charles K. Fell*, and to report on the same, July 15, 1831.

Ordered that no allowance for *office rent* is to be paid to any person heretofore in receipt of such allowance from the District Funds including schoolhouses. Signed *James Muirhead*, July 15, 1831.

File 10-21, Road and Bridge Reports.

Charles K. Fell, Pelham, July 11, 1831 has examined the ground for a road 3¹/₄ miles on the line between Pelham and Gainsborough from the *Canboro' Road* to the River Welland. John Stewart struck them out, they flew about the house, and some of them hit me. This was intentionally done, I received a kick. Hill cursed and swore. My husband Jacob Lodge told him to be quiet or he'd put him out. Hill said no person could put him out. Lodge took hold of him but couldn't put him out. I said I believe you came for a riot. John Stewart smote his fists together and said he'd have revenge on me for saying so, if it cost \$500 or his life. Therefore I fear he may take my life. Hill followed me to the kitchen with abusive words. I told him to go out but he wouldn't. I shoved him out, but he returned with ill language. I told him to go out or else I would scald him. He refused, and I hove some hot water on him. The next morning Hill and William Stewart came into the house with abusive words and swore no person could put them out. Verdict: not guilty, October 22, 1831.

Evidence taken before David Thompson January 23: Robert Bailey, William Moore, George Stewart and others came to the shanty of *William C. Johnson* on business. A dispute arose between Pie and Stewart over the bed and who would sleep therein. Stewart pulled his coat off, and Pie and *Lawrence Dean* laid violent hands on him. They pulled Stewart from the shanty and kicked him. Pie and Ryan then went to the shanty, laid hold of James Mitchel and dragged him out. Peace was restored. Pie took Moore's rifle and went to Doan and discharged it. He returned, said it was recharged, and had sufficient ammunition. He presented the gun, not pointed at Moore but he said no one moves until Moore delivers up some more ammunition. Peace was restored. Pie and his associates withdrew, then returned again with the gun. Ryan, Dean and others had axes, said it was better to behead them now than at another time. Witness along with Cotton Rouse and Hiram Bowlin tried to make peace. Stewart, Darrough and Mitchel escaped through the window. Moore hid under the bed. Pie went in where the others had been and not finding them pursued Darraugh and the others but did not overtake them. Recognizance: Robert Bailey £5.

John Pie [alias Pye] of Humberstone, labourer and William Ryan, Humberstone, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against William Moore, canaller, on January 21, 1832. True bill (traversed): William McClellan (foreman.) Statement of costs £1.15.0. Witnesses: William Moore, Robert Bailey. Pie charged with assault against Moore, James Derraugh, George Stewart and James Mitchell but denies the charge against Mitchell and Stewart, says he acted in self defense. Francis Passmore denies charges. Evidence taken before David Thompson, January 23: Moore went to Johnson's shanty on section 12 to see Rouse and Bailey on business. He went with others, and took a gun as he expected to meet some game. They stayed until after dark. Pie seized the gun, pointed it at deponent's breast and ordered all the ammunition or he'd blow deponent's brains out. Deponent complied. The men withdrew, then returned armed with axes, ordered a candle to be got and searched for his associates, declared their lives should be taken. Associates escaped through the window. The rioters threatened deponents life, who was hidden under the bed by Mary McKeever and a girl and Robert Bailey where he remained all night. James Derraugh: agrees with evidence, said the gun was discharged before it was pointed at Moore's breast although it was said to be recharged. James Graham: states that he saw John Pie declare if he had any one of them he would behead him instantly. George Stewart: states that they suffered a violent beating, heard Pie order witnesses head to be cut off with an axe. Robert Bailey: states witness was in error, Francis Passmore was quiet and for peace during the whole time. Warrant issued to *Constable Burgar* to apprehend Pie, Ryan and Dean, January 22, 1832. Pie, Ryan and Dean committed to gaol January 23. Recognizance: William Moore and James Derraugh £10 each, James Graham and George Stewart £5 each. John Pie and Francis Passmore £5 each.

Petition of *David Bonesteel*, Pelham. In the summer of 1829 *Mary Risenburgh*, the aged and infirm widow of a soldier in the *Canadian Fencibles*, with *Sally Risenburgh*, "a natural born Ideot, her daughter, objects of greatest compassion" came to my house. They were cast upon me for protection with no home or friend for assistance. I am in low circumstances, yet I could not turn a deaf ear. I relied upon provincial aid to help keep them. I received an order for \$1.00 per week until the close of 1830. There is no more money for this purpose. Still a miserable case, it is cruel to withhold assistance. Before the winter of 1829-30 the mother was of some assistance. In December 1829 she "paid the debt of nature" and left her daughter the object of public charity. A wretched female aged 30 years, who "exhibits the most appalling instance of unfortunate and degraded humanity...destitute of that reason which is necessary to guide mind and body." She is "enitrely childish, and frequently perverse; cleanliness is not part of her disposition; and the wife of your petitioner has a task of which delicacy might forbid a recital, but which the charity of your hon'ble body will duly estimate." I would cast her out, but no one is willing to undertake the disagreeable and costly task which they do with no remuneration. Let not the stern points of Court Rules suppress the dictates of humanity, March 22, 1832. Signed David Thompson, William Davidson, David Burgar, John Farr, Amos Bradshaw, Henry Slawmitt, Joseph C. Letter from *James Kerby* to *Charles Richardson*, *Fort Erie Mills*, February 22, 1832: we are without constables, *Henry Putman* has been appointed as one. Send me two blanks for appointments and I will fill them as soon as possible.

Charles Richardson, Niagara, to *David Thompson*, Wainfleet, March 28, 1832: I request your attendance with papers in the case of *Kinsley*. If inconvenient, I request a transmission of the papers (draft.)

Charles Richardson to *Edward McMahon*, Niagara, January 1832. Enclosed is a return list of my emoluments for the year ending December 31, 1831.

Charles Richardson to *Edward McMahon*, Niagara, February 9, 1832. Transmits a copy of the Grand Jury presentment against *John Crooks*. Not sufficient evidence to warrant his indictment, but more properly a matter for His Excellency's instructions.

Edward McMahon to *Charles Richardson*, York, Government House, April 30, 1832. Regarding *John Crooks* and the collection of *Militia fines* not paid to the proper officer. Enclosed is a report.

Attorney General's office, March 29, 1832. *Henry J. Boulton* to *Edward McMahon*, Acting Secretary. An indictment against *John Crooks* might be sustained for part of the charge in the presentment. Under 48 Geo. III ch. 1.40 fines collected are to be transmitted in 2 months to the Colonel or next senior officer in the Regiment. If the statute requires a person to do the act, and he doesn't, he can be indicted for not obeying the statute. If he hasn't collected the fines, this is not so properly indictable, subject to correction of the King's Bench. If Crooks *et. al.* (must be two) convict persons but refuse to issue a warrant for levying a fine from a corrupt motive, they may be indicted, unless they think conviction improper or from other cause. If the prosecutor thinks differently, he may apply to *King's Bench* to compel them to issue process. *Mr. Crooks* and *Mr. Kay* thinks he can keep an Dr. and Cr. of fines, costs, and so make the costs balance the fines. He is in error. Each delinquency stands on it's own footing and is distinct from other cases. Example, if a fine is collected against *Mr. Macon* 30/-, it cannot be applied to payment of costs in prosecuting *Thomas Gardener* but should be paid to the Colonel of the Regiment.

Their situation is quite hard enough and kinder language should be at all times used towards them. As for females, your public situation should induce you to treat them with respect. We have examined

the prisoners and the general complaints towards *Peter Wheeler*, gaoler. He withheld a sufficiency of fuel in cold weather though prisoners had it purchased near the gaol. He uses abusive and obscene language to the wives of prisoners who come to visit, and debarred from visiting unless in the presence of Wheeler. The food is putrid and unfit. Prisoners are in want of water. He must be compelled to empty the buckets containing the filth and excrement of prisoners. Witnesses: *Fordes Avreill, John Haun, Peter M. Ball, George W. Smith*.

Recommend that a pine floor (seasoned planks) be laid over the old, and the straw be changed. The filth buckets should be changed and cleaned twice daily, taken out in the morning and left in the sun. Each room should have two beds, a table, wash bowl and basin. Communication with friends should be allowed from ½ hour after sunrise to ½ hour before sunset. Signed *David Davis, Lewis Willson, Peter Haun, Samuel Wiggins, Martin Dell, John Lemon, Peter Dell, Henry Fitch, John Edsall, Arthur Cosby, Simcoe Chapman, Samuel Dell, Jeremiah Forrester, July 12, 1832.*

Henry Snure, Pelham, pathmaster, lodged a complaint in June 1830 before *George Keefer* and *John Clark* at a Special Sessions in Thorold near *Beaver Dams*. *John McGlashan Sr*, *John McGlashan Jr., Charles McGlashan* and *Alexander McGlashan* neglected their Statute Labour (11 days.) Filth buckets should be removed twice daily and remain in the sun. Recommend that the floor be covered with 1" boards, and the open space cleaned and filled with lime. Should order two water spouts to be made, to carry out any water in excess of that required for washing; hay should be used for beds until straw procured. Sketch of ground plan of privy. The sheriff's room should be converted to an additional debtor's room for the more respectable class of debtor, the windows secured with gratings, floors to be made of 2" planks and spiked. A room connecting the bedroom adjoining the sheriff's room should be closed up and the communication given it from the lobby of the main hall. A fence made out of 3" square pickets should be made across the lobby and extended length wise in front of the criminal cells and across the back lobby. The back door and superficial work should be removed and a window (properly grated) installed. The front door and superficial work should be removed and strong folding doors substituted with a fan light, secured by grating, which will afford ventilation. The privy should be at a distance, communicating by a secure passage, at small expense. July 13, 1832.

A road is to be established on private ground in Concession 2, north through lot 15 between Concessions 2 and 3, Humberstone. This road is not to advantage, and the original road allowance is only 10 chains distant from the proposed road. The petitioners remonstrate, statute labour on the proposed road has been done illegally by the pathmaster, January 12, 1833. The bridges here at *Snyders' Mills*, Gainsborough, over the 16 and 20 Mile Creeks are in a ruinous condition. They cannot be repaired using Statute Labour. There are two principal roads and cross roads to keep in repair. There are no inhabitants for six miles, yet meets the *Canboro' Road* at the Welland River. The only connecting road between here and Chippawa, Canboro' and the *Grand River Dam*. There is no assistance yet from the District, although from uncultivated land and the nature of the roads we need it. The bridges are old and totally decayed, will require £62.10.0. to repair them. File 13-31. Road and Bridge Reports.

Charles K. Fell, ordered to mark a road in Grantham in Concessions 4 and 5 between lots 20 and 21 on October 19, 1832. Encloses sketch (showing posts) dated *Pelham Square*, March 25, 1833. Report dated January 24, 1833: Fell was ordered in October to lay out the road, which was impossible at the time due to the high water level in the 12 Mile Creek, decided to wait until the creek was frozen. Attempted to examine the road in December but again prevented by high water. "How vain, how illusory the hopes of Mortals!" Tried again with success on March 18, set down posts. "Though almost inundated with melting snow, not Herculean but disagreeable and inconvenient." The road was advertised in two places, *Mr. Northrop, Mr. Meredith* and others were concerned. Went to the spot with pathmaster *Thomas Darling*. The road was opened. Presented my accounts, but was threatened with indictment over the accounts, over the money I had expended on the works and time spent. "Gentlemen! Time the stuff as a quaint philosopher said 'that life is made of.' The accounts are inspected by the Clerk of the Peace in order to tax it! To say more is an insult to common sense, all I ask of you is justice!" Niagara, October 20, 1833.

Charles K. Fell, has surveyed and extended the road in Niagara from *Widow Waters* to *John Wilson's* fence. *Pelham Square*, January 22, 1833.

Charles K. Fell, has surveyed a road between lots 5 and 6 in Concession 6 Gainsborough. The road is necessary and practicable with small expense. Sketch attached, dated *Pelham Square*, January 22, 1833.

Charles K. Fell, the road in Bertie between lots 2 and 3 in Concession 1 and 2, on the north side of the *Garrison line* appears necessary. Sketch attached, dated *Pelham Square*, January 22, 1833.

Map of a New Road, petitioned for by Isaac Camp through Indian Lands on the Grand River to the 3rd Concession in Rainham in the Direction of Long Point. [Note: this detailed map is coloured, on a scale of 40 chains to an inch. Shows the Grand River, Lake Erie, Canboro' Road, the Indian Line, Perry Gifford's Road and Isaac Camp's Road.]

File 13-32. Tavern and Shop Licences.

Letter from *James Black* to the Magistrates, Thorold, January 3, 1833. Was to accompany *Mr. Keefer* to court but is confined with a bad leg and *Mrs. Keefer* is supposed to be on the point of death. A licence is to be suspended until the case of *Badgley* vs. *Swayze* is heard. Badgley neglected to enter recognizance. In the matter of *McCue* vs. *McArthur*, McCue has a suitable house to accommodate the public as an inn but as he encourages gambling his licence should be suspended. *McMahon* has a bad house, is not suitable for a licence. *Mr. Spadding* sells liquor without a licence. *Mr. Claus* knows about this, I believe he is going away. *Mr. Hart* sells liquor without a licence, but is only a dram shop. Mr. Keefer and myself were witness to him selling.

Letter of *Margaret Hart* to *Mr. Black*, August 11, 183[2?] I wish to inform you of the truth. I applied for a licence last year. *Mr. Keefer* said he'd not object at court but he did because I sell liquor without a licence. If there is justice I would keep as decent a house as would need be but I am deprived of a decent living for the sake of others and they are not the better. I built the first house in this village in hopes of making a living. I cannot take it and move out of the township; nor is my house indecent, I have not over leaped the line of rectitude. I would be happy to speak to you in person and not in anger. I welcome you to come here, I wish for justice, and I won't transgress His Majesty's laws. I thought you were the man to deal justice to me.

John Talbot, kept an inn last year. Has applied for renewal of licence but was refused since there are too many inns. Prays for a licence as the others have been granted, January 25, 1833. [Rejected.]

Letter from *James Cummings* to *Charles Richardson*, Chippawa, December 26, 1832. Encloses papers for the court which I cannot attend being unwell. *Henry Hudson* has taken the house occupied by *James Secord* as an inn. Assist him to obtain a licence, if it comes in the Secord name, can it be transferred to Hudson?

Thomas Dority. Wishes to keep an inn at Niagara. He has fitted up the house where he now lives for the comfort of travellers, has a good stable. January 25, 1833. Signed *John Harris, Lewis Clement, Moliner Jr*²⁶, *Matthew Dobie, John Alma, William Duff Miller, Thomas Sewell*. [Rejected.]

Clement £20, sureties *Lewis Clement* (merchant) and *Jared Stocking* £10 each. Plea: guilty. Fined £5 plus costs £2.18.3.

Joshua Cudney, Niagara, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against Jacob Dockstader, Niagara, yeoman, on October 16, 1832. True bill: John M. Camp (foreman.) Presentment dated October 17, 1832. Subpoenas issued for Thomas Richardson, Elijah Armstrong, George Waggoner and Peter Cain October 18, 1832. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall November 17: Joshua Cudney, surety George Wagner £10 each. Evidence taken before Daniel McDougall and Ralph M. Crysler, January 9, 1833: Jacob Dockstader agrees to drop the suit. Nolle prosequi filed January 22, 1833. [Note: the outside of the indictment erroneously named the plaintiff as Joshua Cudney.]

Evidence taken before *George Adams*: the goods were found at the inns of *Thomas McMahon* and *McArthur*²⁷ in Thorold, where Forsyth sold the last two articles. Forsyth threw the wedge away on *Lundy's Lane*, October 24. He took the items because Laport owed him money. If he hadn't been drunk he wouldn't have done it. Plea: guilty. Sentenced to half-hour in the pillory.

Witnesses: Mary Turman. Indictment quashed January 23. Evidence of Mary Turman taken before *Daniel McDougall*: the shirts were taken from my garden. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall on January 4: Clarissa Koune and surety *Samuel M. Carter* £10 each.

Clarissa Lewes, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing two cotton shirts (value 5/-) the property of *Mary Turman*, Niagara, widow, on January 3, 1833. No bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: Mary Turman.

Mary Ann Martindale, Niagara, widow, *Robert Johnson*, Niagara, labourer, *George Cook*, Niagara, carpenter, *James G. Fletcher*, Niagara, carpenter. Charged with riot and assault against *Timothy Carrigan* on November 3, 1832. Witnesses: Timothy Carrigan, *John Mandefield*. Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall* on November 7: Robert Johnson and Mary Ann Martindale £20 each, sureties *John Murphy* and *John Talbot* £10 each; George Cook and James G. Fletcher £20 each, surety *John Barker* £20. Evidence of Timothy Carrigan taken on November 6: he came to Niagara with his wife and two children. About 9 pm. went to bed upstairs. In half an hour he was attacked by Martindale and the servant Robert Johnson. Fletcher dragged deponent out of bed, beat him and attempted to choak him, tied him by the wrists to the bed post. He extracted himself with the aid of his teeth. Evidence of John Mandefield: Went to Martindale's inn at Niagara. Carrigan was about to go upstairs with a lighted pipe but Martindale wouldn't let him. He put out the pipe and went upstairs. There was a cry of murder, and I said to Martindale "you have a band of ruffians in the house to murder him." He came out and went down at 1am, Martindale took the child and said go back to bed in peace. He refused to do this and went away, and laid at the side of the house for half an hour. Then went back in and to bed.

Evidence of Stephen Cleveland: There were about 20 people there between 6 and 7 pm. Three black men threatened to whip and kick McCue. One struck him, McArthur clinched and choked him. Were four card tables, playing for money. McArthur played and won. McCue was in a fight with a black man named J. Davis. McArthur did not obey the warrant. Witnesses Cornelius Bacon and James McQuinn of Thorold subpoenaed to confirm evidence. Evidence of Robert McCue taken December 5: was at Thorold and was beaten several blows about the head and body by McArthur. He instigated others there, who were gambling and drinking, to beat the deponent. Warrant to apprehend McArthur issued December 6 to **Robert Hough** or other constables. Subpoena of James Black for Samuel Cleveland and others to testify. January 19. McArthur served with a warrant December 8, 1832 (signed James Black.) Recognizance taken before James Black, January 3: Elon McArthur £10, sureties Silas St. John, yeoman and Sherman Lindsley, cooper, £5 each; Robert McCue £10.

File 13-46.

Francis Proctor, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with larceny, stealing a white worsted webbing saddle girth with two tin buckles (value 2/-) and a cotton or cotton and worsted saddle bag with two tin buckles (value 2/-) the property of James Dike, Niagara, saddler, on January 14, 1833. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: James Dike. Indictment quashed, a new indictment ordered January 23, 1833. Costs £1.2.6. Evidence of James Dike taken before Daniel McDougall: goods taken from my shop. Recognizance of James Dike £10. Recognizance of Francis Proctor £10, surety *Colley Alexander Foster*, Niagara, barrister £10. Minutes of evidence taken by *John* Crooks: Proctor came into Dike's shop on the 14th instant. The girths were in a showcase. Proctor went behind the case. The next day he taxed Proctor with stealing the two girths. He denied it, but said he knew who stole one girth. He said he would bring the girth but didn't. Proctor asked how much, he'd rather pay than have the law. On Wednesday morning he asked Proctor where is the girth? Proctor said "it's where you won't see it." The girth produced in court was stolen from the shop. Evidence of William Dennis: Proctor was in the shop and looked at the harness. He made a complaint on the work. He invited the witness to his house, saw two girths and asked Proctor where he got them? He made no reply. Proctor's wife was asked where he got them, she said he bought them from [Urson?] Harvey. Evidence of Harvey said he didn't sell Proctor any girths. Evidence of John Thomas Bateson- was sent by James Dike to Proctors' to tell him to see Dike. He heard Proctor's wife say that the money made by selling brandy was now used to pay for the girths. Proctor gave him \$5.00 to give to Dike, said he'd come in the morning.

Saw a white ox girth in Proctor's hand. *John Talbot*: the girth in court was bought at St. Catharines, they were made yesterday.

Prisoner was committed to the *Lockport gaol*, then delivered to *Mr. Kidd*. There is a considerable reward in Ireland, wishes to convey him thence, plus prays for compensation in arresting him. He swore he'd kill anyone who interfered. He shook his fist and threatened. She took up tongs in defense. He took the tongs and struck her two violent blows on the arm and one on her right temple. Signed "her X mark." Warrant to apprehend William Rees issued by R.H. Dee to constable *Arthur Shaw*. Recognizance: William Rees £10, sureties *William Wynn* and *David Thorburn* £5 each. Letter from R.H. Dee to Charles Richardson, March 25: *Robert Smart* and his son-in-law came to an amicable adjustment of their quarrel. The daughter returned to her husband. *Nolle prosequi*. Dee confined to his house by an indisposition.

"Recommended that James Secord send a report of the situation he found the records in previous to his appointment to that office."

Benjamin Anderson, Niagara gaol, prisoner. Has been confined since March last, for aiding in the escape of **John Fitzgerald**. Anderson is totally illiterate, not aware of the tenor of letters he had in his charge from Fitzgerald. He was actuated by an impulse of humanity to the prisoner in carrying letters to his friends, believes they contained only statements about his mind and health and situation. Anderson is son of an UE Loyalist and served His Majesty in the late war, was wounded at **Lundy's Lane**. His family depends upon the deponent. Prays for the mercy of your worships, to take his case into consideration, July 10, 1833. [Recommend consideration of his case, signed **James Durham**, foreman.]

In consequence of the extreme heat since yesterday, and the closeness of the rooms where the debtors are confined and "a vessel in which the demands of nature are answered" remains in the said rooms. Inconvenience if not sickness will be the result if relief is not administered. They may not be considered as complaining; have anxiety for their welfare; assiduous attention paid by the Deputy sheriff and *Mr. Kidd*. The English language fails to express our gratitude. Pray to have the doors opened earlier, 5 am to sunset, would add to the security of the health of debtors and their comfort, July 13, 1833. Thomas Gilleland, Grantham, yeoman, *William Henry Sanderson*, Grantham, blacksmith, *Jacob Hainer*, Grantham, yeoman. Charged with riot and assault, against *Gilbert Belnap*, on July 4, 1833. No bill: *James Durham*. Witnesses: Gilbert Belnap, *Luther Dyer, James Culbertson*.

Recognizance taken before *William Hamilton Merritt*, July 6: Thomas Gilleland £100, sureties Walter Dittrick and John Clendennan £50 each; Mrs. Fanny Haywood, Mrs. Aurora Dyer, E.W. Stephenson, James Little and James Culbertson, £50 each. Recognizance taken before John Clark and William Hamilton Merritt, July 6: Gilbert Belnap £20, sureties Samuel Kerr and Orin Phelps £10 each; recognizance taken before George Adams July 8: William H. Sanderson and Jacob Hainer £50 each, sureties Walter Dittrick and Cyrus Smith £25 each. Evidence of Eleazer W. Stephenson, stage proprietor, taken before George Adams, Thomas Merritt and John *Clark*. On July 4 at 2 or 3 pm was with Sanderson in the barroom at *Luther Dyer's*. Had a glass of punch. Observed to *Mr. McCarty* it was usual in the United States to have punch on the 4th. Sanderson refused, said he would have no Yankee Independence and swore he'd whip any person who would. Charles K. Clark replied he would, and there was an altercation between them. Jacob Hainer was in the barroom with Clark, there was a noise- Sanderson trying to get in the door. Smith pulled Sanderson back to prevent fighting. George Adams came in and commanded the peace and the parties left. The house was quiet until 10 pm. Deponent was in the street and saw a blaze of light near the home of James Carr, saddler, adjoining Dyer's. Two or three balls of fire of combustible matter were thrown over Carr's shop. Thomas Gilleland, constable, threw a ball on the gallery of the house of Luther Dyer, and Sanderson another, from the rear of Carr's and ascended a ladder to do the same. There was a rush of people out of the house of Walter Dittrick, they kept throwing balls into the house on the piaster or gallery. They threatened to burn the house and kill the people, assailing the house with stones. They broke a number of windows and attempted the door which was bolted. Gilleland and Sanderson tried the door. Gilleland broke a window by the side of the door. He left and went to the barroom door. Jacob Hainer said he'd kill any man who attempted to put the fire out, that they'd come to burn the house. The deponent rented the house to Dyer. Different depredations of a similar nature were committed but not so violent, this was the most violent riot that has taken place. Felt life was in danger. Evidence of Gilbert Belnap: was at Dyer's on the 4th at 10 pm. Just at the time he went in, Dyer closed and bolted the door to keep out the people rushing up. He heard a woman say the house was afire, and went upstairs to put it out. Sanderson seized him by the collar and Gilleland threatened to throw him over the gallery into the street. Sanderson objected, said to throw him downstairs. He drew deponent to the top of the stairs and pushed. If not caught by the collar he would've fallen head first. He caught the bannisters and fell on his hip and back. Tried to reason but they would not hear him. Evidence of *Christian Horton*: heard a noise on the 4th. Was told they were throwing fire bales into the house. Went upstairs and saw Mr. Little try to put out a fire bale on the gallery. Saw Belnap try to put out a fire bale in the house. Gilleland and Sanderson prevented him, saying they'd burn the house up. A scuffle. Deponent got the bale and handed it to **Richard Emley**[?], a man of colour, who took it and put it into a [--illegible--] Belnap was struck by both Gilleland and Sanderson. Was pushed down the stairs. Deponent caught him by the collar and prevented him from falling on his face. Evidence of Mrs. A. Dyer, mistress of the house, keeps a public inn. Was present on that night in the parlour between 9 and 10 pm. A ball of fire (made of cotton?) was thrown into the road but doesn't know from where. It was taken up by Gilleland and thrown upon the gallery. She went to bolt the door and people tried to force it. She ran through the barroom and dining room and begged Sanderson to put a stop to it, and prevent people from throwing fire. She caught him by the arm, he pulled away and went upstairs. Deponent stopped at the bottom of the stairs, saw Gilleland and Sanderson try to pull Belnap downstairs. She went upstairs and saw Mr. Little throw the balls back, heard someone say "kick them back and burn it." Stones were thrown at the house. Sent the women back in fear the house be burned and in fear of her life. Mrs. Havward and deponent went upstairs in the back room, only Mr. Man and Mr. Little were in the house besides the waiters in the back of the house. Deponent sent *Michael*, a man of colour, to shut the dining room door. Was struck by someone in passing the door. Evidence of Fanny Heward: rooms and boards on the 2nd story at Dyer's. Had retired to bed on the 4th, heard a noise, shouting, saw lights. Jumped up, pulled the curtain aside and saw a ball of fire under the

window on the gallery. Took a pitcher and tried to put it out fearing it would burn the house. Was frightened and dressed. Mr. Little tried to put out the fire. Went to her room to look out, and a stone as large as an orange came against the window and broke the sash. Also a ball of fire struck against the window. The stone was brought down and kept. Deponent was afraid to pass the windows since they were throwing stones. A ball of fire was kicked into deponent's room, but she put it out. Believes that if not for Mr. Little, the house would have been burned. Saw the men tussling, didn't know their names.

Joshua Green, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, the theft of two fowls (value 2/-) the property of *Benjamin Lawrence*, Niagara, yeoman, on March 31, 1833. True bill: James Durham. Witnesses: Benjamin Lawrence, *Gilbert Anderson, George P. Kinsley*. Evidence taken before Daniel McDougall March 31: fowls carried off by Peter [------] of Niagara, labourer. Prays for a search warrant. George P. Kinsley: searched the house of Peter [------] and found the fowls. Joshua Green is a lodger there. Recognizance: Peter and Charlotte [------] £10, sureties Ralfe Clench and Samuel Heron £10 each; Benjamin Lawrence and Joshua Green £10, surety James Butler £10. Verdict: guilty. Sentenced to stand in the pillory 1 hour and then be discharged, July 12, 1833.

George Kitson, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Margaret Anderson*, Stamford, widow, on May 29, 1833. Witnesses: Margaret Anderson. Letter from *Samuel Street* to *Charles Richardson*, *Falls Mills*, July 9: is not able to attend sessions, sends information and recognizance of *George Crispin* against *Barnabas Johnston*, and Margaret Anderson against George Kitson. The first parties will appear, I think it doubtful whether you will see any of the latter. Evidence of Margaret Anderson before Samuel Street, May 30: Was assaulted and beaten about the face, the mark of his blow was on deponent's cheek. Recognizance: Margaret Anderson £10, surety *John Knox* £10; George Kitson £10, surety *David Dunton* £10. *Nolle prosequi*, July 13, 1833.

William Moffatt, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against *William Hepburne*, Niagara, innkeeper, on January 7, 1833. True bill: *James Durham*. Witnesses: William and *Margaret Hepburne*. Bench warrant (misdemeanor) issued by *James Muirhead* July 12, 1833. Evidence of William Hepburne taken before James Muirhead January 14: Several persons were in the house, *Alexander Campbell*, William Moffatt and others. Had a conversation with Campbell about some papers. Was assaulted by William Moffatt, thrown to the floor. Was greatly abused to the danger of his life. Recognizance: William Hepburne £10; William Moffatt £10, sureties *William Cassaday* and *Thomas Whitten* £5 each. Verdict: guilty. Fined £25, and confined 1 month in jail or "until the fine is paid." July 11, 1833.

Joseph Mossay, Niagara, joiner. Charged with larceny, the theft of one blue frock coat (value 10/-) and yellow common vest (5/-) the property of *John Talbot*, Niagara, innkeeper, on June 27, 1833. True bill: *James Durham*. Witnesses: John Talbot, *Mary Macan, Helen Fitzgerald*. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall* June 28: coat and vest were stolen yesterday afternoon. Evidence of Mary McCann, Niagara, *femme covert*: saw prisoner come out of the house of John

Talbot with a bundle, a piece of blue cloth was hanging from it. She told Talbot what she saw and he went in pursuit. Evidence of *Martin Monaghan*: is a barkeeper at *Fitzgerald's* in Niagara. Prisoner came in yesterday and called for dinner. Had a bundle wrapped in an old snuff coloured cloth coat, the same now produced. Evidence of Nelly Fitzgerald: Prisoner came in with a bundle in a snuff coloured coat. Talbot came in and asked for the drunken man with a bundle. Deponent told him he was at the bar. The bundle was opened, and he took out the blue cloth coat and yellow vest. Evidence of Joseph Mossay: came to Niagara and got drunk. Met a man in the street who said he came from Fort Erie, looking for work. <u>He</u> had the blue coat and yellow vest and sold it to me for a half dollar to buy bread. Deponent wrapped them up in an old snuff coloured coat when he bought them. Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall*: John Talbot £10, surety *Joseph Martin Monaghan* £10; Nelly Fitzgerald £10; William McCann (for his wife) not bound. Verdict: guilty. Sentenced to stand in the pillory 1 hour and then be discharged.

Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall* April 24: Andrew Anderson £10; William Scott £10, surety *Christopher Heron* £10. Defendant discharged from recognizance, no prosecutor appearing.

Rufus Westover, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 1 "sithe" handle (value 2/-) the property of **Richard Clement**, St. Davids, yeoman, on July 3, 1833. True bill: **James Durham** (foreman.) Witnesses: Richard Clement. Evidence taken before **Alexander Hamilton**: Clement found the scythe in possession of **Andrew Ostrander** near **St. Davids**. He said he got it from Rufus Westover of Grantham. When questioned, Westover acknowledged he had exchanged them (the scythe) with Ostrander. The scythe was not his property but that of a person in his employ, but the sheath is his, value 2/6-. Westover does not deny the charge. Committed same date. Verdict: "not guilty."

Witnesses: Hugh McKenna, *John Fitz Stewart*. No bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.)

Evidence of *Lavina Ferguson*, Crowland, widow, taken before *James Cummings* on October 22, 1833. One *Robert Doan*, Crowland, innkeeper, keeps a tippling house in the neighbourhood where many have families, with gambling and drunkenness (especially on the Sabbath.) Saturday, Sunday and Monday are injurious, especially to the families of married men and mothers of young men who look for support. The complaint is for the good of the neighbourhood, having seen its' evil effects. On October 13 deponent went to search for her brother *John Hardy*. She saw many men intoxicated in the barroom including her brother who couldn't move. This was not the intent of the act for granting licences. Recognizance taken £10. Subpoena issued by Cummings to Robert Doan to appear on October 22. Served by constable *Samuel Glover*.

Warrant for arrest issued by *Daniel McDougall* on July 15, 1833. On the oath of *Francis Proctor*, Niagara: *Bernard Roddy* beat deponent on July 14. Recognizance taken £10.

Warrant for felony, *Erie County*, October 12, 1833. Issued by *S.K. Grovernor*, JP, to the *constables at Buffalo*. On the complaint of *George C. Hawthorn*, Niagara. His goods (value \$60) were stolen on October 5 by *James Little* from the house of *James Miller*. ie, a watch, vest, hat, shirts and other sundry articles. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead*, October 13, 1833. A trunk belonging to George C. Hawthorn was broke open on the 5th at the house of James Miller, Niagara, innkeeper. A hat, silk vest, shirts, bead chains &c. were stolen by James Little, baker, a boarder in the same house. Evidence of James Little: the complaint is not just.

Letter from *William Thorn*, *St. Davids*, to *Charles Richardson*, October 15, 1833. I fell in my mill 10 days ago, was much hurt and bruised and narrowly escaped with my life. A violent cough and fever set in, and am confined to bed. I can just walk a little. Prays to be excused from jury duty.

Jacob Garner to Charles Richardson, October 25, 1833: subpoenaed W.D. Miller, Henry Chapman, Joseph Clement and John Oakley.

James Muirhead, summons delivered to William Daley, now in town, in the case of David Thompson, Esq.

Bench warrant issued to the sheriff for the arrest of *Thomas Sewell*, charged with perjury, October 26, 1833.

Evidence of *Joseph Badgley*, Thorold, cabinet maker: on June 28, 1832 deponent heard Swayze say "God damn God Almighty I am not afraid of his sending the cholera to me, by Jesus Christ I hant" and many other profane utterances. Recognizance taken August 18, 1833: Joseph Badgley £20; recognizance taken October 20, 1832: John N. Swayze £20, sureties *Jacob Shaw* and *James Wylie*, Thorold, yeomen, £10 each.

Evidence of *Mary Hill* taken before *Henry Nelles*, January 19, 1833: *Benjamin Anderson* came to the house on January 18 and broke down the door. He presented a pistol at me which flashed but didn't go off. He asked for his wife, and swore he'd murder her, the deponent and all in the house or anyone who interfered. Deponent fears Anderson, he carries a pistol. Evidence of *Rachel Anderson*, taken January 19: Deponent fears her husband Benjamin on account of his beatings and threats to kill her. Evidence of *Nancy Thompson* taken January 19: Anderson came to the house where she and *Thomas Hill* reside. She was drawing a pail of water when he came up furiously and presented a pistol, said he'd kill someone before he left. Evidence of *David Thompson*: Will be at court and state the case to corroborate testimony if called on. His wife is ill and cannot attend court. Letter from Henry Nelles to *Charles Richardson*, January 21, 1833: Encloses sureties. Anderson is in gaol. The others may not attend, being in very reduced circumstances. They cannot get the means to take them to court and pay expenses when they are gone, and cannot find sureties. Will the court take their cognizances of the crime? How can I make a witness attend at the Sessions or Assizes?

Recognizance taken before *George Adams* and *Thomas Merritt*, November 9, 1832. *Daniel Torbit*, Pelham, labourer, £100. His wife *Mary Torbit* to appear at the Court of *Oyer and Terminer*, accuses *William Disher* of rape.

Recognizance taken before *James Black* and *George Keefer*, October 1833: *Charles W. Holmes* [alias *Hellems*], Crowland, lawyer, £50. Charged with a misdemeanor. Sureties *John Hellems* and *John A. Tidey*, £25 each.

George Sherwood, Clerk of the Assize, to the *Sheriff of the Niagara District*. Warrant for the arrest of *William Holmes*, Grand River, on a charge of misdemeanor. Orders of *Levius Peters Sherwood*, October 10, 1833.

Abraham Stoner, is an ordained preacher of the Menonist Church, certified by *Michael Graybiel*, October 23, 1833. (signed *James Muirhead*.)

File 15-13. Petitions.

Dwight Smith, St. Catharines, baker. *Robert Rogers*, of the United States, a total stranger, poor and destitute of clothes, want of work. Came here in late January. His mother is dead, his father alive in *Newport, Kentucky*. He did work but fell sick with small pox. I removed him from the

village and hired two people to take care of him. He died February 1, 1833. I paid for his coffin and digging his grave, £5.12.6. Signed *Robert Bessey, Eliphalet Rea, William C. Chace, E.S. Adams, Henry Mittleberger, James Fitzgerald, Hiram Leavenworth, John Mittleberger, John F. Mittleberger, David Hardie, R.A. Clarke, Gershom Wright, John Gibson, Charles Ward, W.C. Yale, John Stuart.* (Referred.)

David Thompson, Niagara. To avail himself of the benefit of the *gaol limits*, prays that so much of the limits as will suffice for his dwelling house and lot, 51 square perches (or ¹/₄ acre) be withdrawn from *John Young's*, without infringing on the privileges others enjoy. This leaves the street and merchant shops on the limits, sufficient for the petitioner's purposes, July 22, 1833. [Referred to October sessions and then for further consideration.]

Philip Anger, Bertie. Charged with assault and battery against Benjamin Chadwick, on April 6, 1833. No bill: Jacob Garner (foreman.) Witnesses: Benjamin Chadwick, James Kerby, George Hardison, John Douglas. Bench warrant issued by James Muirhead, July 11, 1833.
Recognizance taken before R.M. Crysler, April 16, 1833: Philip Anger £10, sureties Cyrenius Hall and David Baxter £5 each.

File 15-17.

Ignace Bernier, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one silver watch (value 5/-) the property of *Amable Metot*, Niagara Falls, carpenter/joiner, on August 13, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Amable Metot and *Margaret Metot* his wife. Evidence of *Ann Myers* taken before *James Cummings*, August 19: knows nothing of Aneas Bernier [sic] taking the watch, since she was in the house at the time. Evidence of *John Myers*: confirms the testimony. Evidence of Margaret Metot taken before *Alexander Hamilton* on August 13: In the morning while they were in bed, Bernier, an inmate in the house and an old acquaintance came into their room and took the watch from the bureau at the side of the bed. She got up and went to examine the drawers and missed the watch. There was no one else in the room. Explained in French to Bernier, he declares it untrue. Bernier deposited £15 bail with Alexander Hamilton, August 13. Recognizance taken before *Samuel Street* on August 23: Amable and Margaret Metot, £20. Defendant discharged by proclamation October 26, 1833.

File 15-18.

James Clement, Niagara, gentleman, *John Grier*, Niagara, merchant, *Carleton Leonard*, Niagara, gentleman. Charged with assault and battery and riot against *Eliza Smith* on September 1, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Eliza Smith, *Jacob Dockstader*, *Lucy Thompson*.

Evidence taken before James Muirhead and *R.M. Crysler* on September 5: Jacob Dockstader was aroused by persons making noise, throwing stones at the house of Elizabeth Smith. They broke her windows. He heard a person cry "murder." He met John Grier who started running and deponent said "That's a shame John" to which he made no reply. Evidence of Eliza Smith: some people assembled before her house. Clement and Grier rapped at the door and asked that it be opened. They retired from the door. *George Richardson* came up to the gate, made use of indecent language, and retired a short distance away. Leonard came up and said "now you are in our power and you shall not escape till we accomplish our designs." They withdrew for half an hour. Then 8 or 10 men assembled and threw stones. I screamed murder. Jacob Dockstader appeared and the mob dispersed. Recognizance taken before James Muirhead on September 14: Eliza Smith £10; recognizance taken before James Muirhead and R.M. Crysler on September 6: John Grier £10, C. Leonard and James Clement £10, sureties *Jared Stocking* and *John Meneilly*

£10 each. Recognizance taken before James Muirhead on September 14: George Richardson £10, sureties *William Winterbottom* and John Grier £5 each. Verdict: "not guilty," October 24, 1833.

File 15-19.

George Cook, Niagara, carpenter. Charged with assault and battery against *William Parish*, Niagara, butcher, on July 12, 1833. No bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Parish. Warrant issued by *James Muirhead* to constable *Thomas Dority* to apprehend George Cook, October 11, 1833. Evidence: Parish was kicked in the groin and his fingers were severely bit. Recognizance taken: George Cook £5, sureties Thomas Dority and *James G. Fletcher* £2.10.0. each.

File 15-20.

George Crispin, Stamford, labourer and *William Waters*, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Barnabas Johnston*, Stamford, carpenter, *Elizabeth* [------] and *Phineas Slayter*, on May 13, 1833. True bill: *James Durham* (foreman.) Witnesses: Barnabas Johnston, *Hannah Johnson*. Evidence taken before *Robert Henry Dee*, Stamford, on May 13: Johnston was beaten at his home. Recognizance taken before R.H. Dee on May 14: Barnabas Johnston £25; George Crispin and William Waters £10 each, sureties *Joseph Scobell* and *John S.* [*Setterington?*] £5 each. Verdict: "guilty," fined 1/- plus costs £13.7.8.

File 15-21.

William Duff, Stamford, merchant. Charged with assault and battery against *Joseph Rivet*, Chippawa, on August 13, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Joseph Rivet, *Samuel Hicks, Samuel Cooper, Loomis Ingalls*. Subpoenas issued by *Charles Richardson* for Hicks, Ingalls and *Charles Willson* on October 24. Evidence of Joseph Rivet taken before *James Cummings* on August 13: deponent went to the shop of William Duff at Chippawa. He told Duff that *Mrs. Willson*, a widow at *Mrs. Huffs* had been ill and was dead, and that he and Charles Willson were to make a coffin. We solicited charity from Duff, for pieces of board to make the coffin. Duff turned and gave me a violent kick in the side, feels the effect of it very seriously. Warrant issued by James Cummings to constable *Erastus Moses* to apprehend Duff. Recognizance taken August 17: William Duff and Joseph Rivet £5, surety *John Y. Nelles* £2. Notation: Mrs. Willson died the evening before, August 12, 1833. Verdict: "guilty," fined 1/- plus costs £1.17.6. October 26, 1833.

File 15-22.

Robert Fleury, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against **James Humphrey**, Queenston, innkeeper, on August 6, 1833. True bill: **Jacob Garner** (foreman.) Witnesses: James Humphrey, **Alexander Hamilton**. Evidence taken before Alexander Hamilton, August 6: deponent found **Keys Gleeson** abusing some gentleman travelers at his house in the afternoon. Told Gleeson to go home and keep the peace. He went to complain of his behaviour to Mr. Hamilton. He was met by Gleeson who struck him a violent blow on the head and kicked him, was aided by defendant. They used threatening language. Recognizance taken: James Humphrey and surety **John Brown**, Queenston, merchant, £10 each; Keys Gleeson, Queenston, sureties **Joseph Wynn** and **Chester Wadsworth**, £10 each; Robert Fleury £10, sureties Chester Wadsworth and **Richard Smith** £5 each. Nolle prosequi, October 30, 1833.

File 15-23.

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Keys Gleeson, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *James Humphrey*, Queenston, innkeeper, on August 6, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: James Humphrey, *Alexander Hamilton*. *Nolle prosequi*, October 30, 1833.

File 15-24.

John Henderson, Grantham, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Sally Miner*, Niagara, widow, on September 5, 1833. No bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Sally Miner. Sally Miner sworn before the Grand Jury October 23, evidence given before *Daniel McDougall*. Recognizance of Sally Miner £10. (Certified by *Charles Richardson*.)

File 15-25.

Thomas Hero, Niagara, labourer, coloured man. Charged with assault and battery against *Ann Douglass* on October 3, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Ann Douglass. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead*: Deponent is a servant to *John Bissell*. Defendant was at the house drinking in the evening, when deponent was assaulted by him, beaten and struck with his fists. Recognizance taken: Thomas Hero £5, sureties *Francis Proctor* and *James* [------] £2.10.0. each. Plea: "guilty," fined 2/- plus costs £1, October 24, 1833.

File 15-26.

George Huffman, Bertie, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against Benjamin Chadwick, Bertie, innkeeper, on April 6, 1833. True bill: Jacob Garner (foreman.) Witnesses: Benjamin Chadwick, James Kerby, George Hardison, John Douglas. Subpoena issued by Charles Richardson to Chadwick, July 11, 1833. Evidence taken before James Kerby on April 6: Chadwick was at the Waterloo Ferry, was struck and abused by Huffman, and with Philip Anger behaved in a very riotous manner, shook his fist, threatened and struck the deponent. Evidence of Alexander Wintermute, constable: arrested Huffman who escaped. The charge is not disposed of or discharged, warrant issued to arrest Huffman dated August 13. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall on August 14: George Huffman £10, Benjamin Chadwick and surety William Casedy £10 each. Letter from James Kerby to Charles Richardson, Fort Erie Mills, April 10, 1833: Neighbourhood is ill supported by constable *Henry Putman*, who in a careless and wanton manner allowed Huffman to get away. Huffman has put all the constables in the district at defiance, and not one of the late appointed ones are fit for duty (ie, *Robert Deming* and Henry Putman.) Huffman escaped to the 40 Mile Creek where he formerly resided. Take steps to apprehend him by the next Assizes. Constabulary is an essential service. The neighbourhood was never more shamefully abused than by Huffman and Anger. Since Anger was committed he drew his knife to stab a black man, and cut another's wrist. These two vile men behaved in a very riotous manner and ought not to be bailed. I can bring witnesses to convict them. Send me blanks for the appointment of constables. Verdict: "not guilty," October 25, 1833.

File 15-27.

Barnabas Johnston, Stamford, carpenter. Charged with assault and battery against **George Crispin**, Niagara Falls, carpenter/joiner, on May 13, 1833. True bill: James Durham (foreman.) Witnesses: George Crispin, **Ann Armstrong**. Subpoena issued for **John S. Scobill** by **Charles Richardson**, October 24. Evidence of George Crispin taken before **Samuel Street** on May 14: between 5 and 6 pm under the direction of **Joseph Scobell** he took down the partition wall in the hall of the house where they dwell. Johnston was a tenant in the house, he asked why I took down the partition? Deponent said it was by direction of John Scobell. Johnston forbid me doing more, but I said that I would regard the orders of Scobell only. Johnston swore and knocked me down, jumped on me, beat and bit me until taken off by bystanders. He discoloured the deponents eye. Pray for redress. Recognizance taken May 16: Barnabas Johnston and George Crispin £10 each; Joseph Scobell, Niagara Falls, architect, £10. Verdict: "not guilty," October 24, 1833.

File 15-28.

William Parish, Niagara, butcher. Charged with assault and battery against *John Martindale, Sr*, Louth, farmer, on September 19, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: John Martindale. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead* on October 26: deponent was at the inn of *Adam Hawley* in Niagara, he was collared and shaken and threatened by Parish, assaulted, he said he'd take my life &c. Warrant issued by James Muirhead for William Parish (assault) and for John Martindale for perjury, October 26; subpoena issued by *Charles Richardson* for *Thomas Richardson*. Recognizance taken before James Muirhead on September 20: William Parish and John Martindale £10 each surety *James Meneilly* £5. Verdict "guilty," fined 1/- plus costs, October 26, 1833.

File 15-29.

James Robinson, Stamford, gentleman. Charged with assault and battery against *Joseph Scobell*, July 10, 1833. Witnesses: Joseph Scobell. *Nolle prosequi*, October 22, 1833.

File 15-30.

Bernard Roddy, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against *Thomas Dority*, Niagara, innkeeper, on August 5, 1833. No bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Dority. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead* on August 5: deponent was across the river at the *Navy Hall ferry*. He was met on the beach when he returned by Bernard Roddy who struck me and tore my clothes. Recognizance: Bernard Roddy £10, surety *Louis Donnelly* £5.

File 15-31.

Henry Putman, Bertie, yeoman. Charged with misconduct as a constable at Bertie, July 12, 1833. True bill: Jacob Garner (foreman.) Witnesses: Alexander Wintermute, John Kidd, Daniel Whitman. Evidence taken before James Kerby on July 15: Putman was one of the constables who brought *David Clancy* before Kerby, charged by *Robert Acton* with taking \$1529.00 in bank notes and specie. Was examined. John Kidd made the warrant and delivered it to Putman and Wintermute. Putman neglected to carry Clancy to gaol. Evidence of Alexander Wintermute taken July 15: was conveying a prisoner to *Fort George*. Within two miles of the Fort the prisoner wished to speak to Acton, and said he'd give back the money and nothing more be said in the matter. Putman and Acton said they'd better let him go clean, after Acton got his money back. Putman did all in his power to let the prisoner get away. Evidence of Robert Acton: is a stranger from England, staying at Mrs. Palmer's inn on the Niagara River. He stopped for refreshment, left his purse on the barroom table and traveled some miles before he missed it. He rode back, and found the purse gone. Contained some silver Napoleon pieces, and notes from the Buffalo bank and other banks. Evidence of Smith Hardison: saw David Clancy (of Ireland) take a long green purse with a hole in the middle. Contained silver at the one end, and paper tied up at the other end and put it in his pocket. Evidence of David Clancy, July 15: he acknowledges that he took the money and gave it back to Acton. Evidence of Robert Acton, July 12: stopped at the stage to eat cherries and there he missed his purse. Returned to Palmers, a passenger named Joseph Crandle

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remarked that he saw Acton leave his purse. Evidence of David Clancy: says he didn't steal the purse, he got it from *Captain Boyes* at York to defray his travel expenses on the way to Lobo in the London District (received \$40 at Peterborough two weeks ago.) He left \$30 with his father at Peterborough. He left Palmers and returned for his knife and tobacco. He didn't drink and didn't go behind the barn. Evidence of Smith Hardison, 15 years old, son of *Mrs. Thompson* at the Ferry: he stopped at Palmers, saw the purse and a stranger put it in his pocket and leave. The stranger asked how far it was to the Ferry? Deponent recognized him at *Kerby's Mill* next day and pointed him out. Letter from *J. Boyce* at York, July 11, 1833 to *William Mayhew* at Lobo: I have sent a labouring servant, quiet and honest, needed since the harvest is at hand. Give him lodging. Refers to *Mr. Wilson, Captain Johnson* and *Colonel Bostwick*. Letter gives directions on route from Niagara to Chippawa, then take a boat to *Kettle Creek, Westminster Township* and cross the *Thames River* on a *bridge at Woodhall's Mills*. It is two miles to *Captain Matthew's* and *Mr. Mayhew*. Warrant issued to Putman and Wintermute to arrest Clancy dated July 12, 1833. Verdict: "not guilty," October 25, 1833.

File 15-32.

Francis Scott, Niagara, shoemaker. Charged with assault and battery against *Hester Eastham*, wife of *Thomas Eastham*, on October 14, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Hester Eastham, Thomas Eastham, *Robert Kay*, Niagara, shoemaker. Evidence taken of Robert Kay before *Daniel McDougall* on October 15: was at the house of Thomas Eastham, his wife was given a severe kick by defendant with his foot on her left side. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall on October 16: Francis Scott £10, surety *Lewis Donally*, innkeeper, £10. Recognizance taken on October 15: Hester Eastham £10, Robert Kay £5. Verdict: "not guilty."

File 15-33.

William Sims, Grantham, labourer, coloured man. Charged with assault and battery against *Thomas Livers*, a coloured man, on October 16, 1833. True bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Livers. Evidence taken before *John Clark* on October 15: Livers was assaulted by Sims, who inflicted wounds with a jack knife. Evidence of William Sims, October 16: he struck from provocation. Recognizance taken October 16: William Sims £50, surety *Alex McDonell* £25; Thomas Livers £20, sureties *Theo. Brundage* and *Mrs. Sanderson* £10 each. Verdict: "not guilty," October 25, 1833.

File 15-34.

Alexander Wintermute, Bertie, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against *William Pitcher*, labourer, on August 10, 1833. No bill: *Jacob Garner* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Pitcher, *John Wintermute*, *James Brown*. Evidence taken before *James Kerby*: deponent was ill used by Wintermute, he "slapt me," took me by the collar, choaked me, pushed me against a fence and hurt my arm. He threatened to whip me. Recognizance taken before Kerby on August 11: Alex Wintermute £10, sureties *Dr. Benjamin P. Hall* and *George Hardison* £5 each; William Pitcher £10, sureties *William Powell* and *William Anthony* £5 each.

File 15-35.

Peter Cain, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assaulty and battery against *William Buckly* on July 27, 1833. Witnesses: William Buckly. Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall* on July 27: William Buckly £10; recognizance taken on July 29: Peter Cain £10. *Nolle prosequi*, October 30, 1833.

File 15-36.

William Colebreath, Thorold, contractor/labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Patrick Mulhoton* on February 22, 1832. True bill: *Charles Guerney* (foreman.) Witnesses: Patrick Mulhoton, *Charles Donley*, *Patrick Flanagan*. Evidence of *Samuel Hood* taken before *William Hamilton Merritt*: James Sullivan, a labourer on the *Welland Canal*, entered the shanty of Colebreath with *James Riley* on the 13th. Stole a wheel barrow, shovel, and iron kettle (value £1.10.0.) plus blankets &c (£1.5.0.) *Michael Regan* and *John Curtin* stole various goods. Evidence of *George Kingsley*: *William Walsh*, *Daniel Lane* and others entered the shanty and stole goods, March 14, 1832. Evidence taken before *David Thompson*: Colbreath laid violent hands on Mulhoton on March 24. Evidence of Patrick Mulhoton taken before David Thompson, March 23: was at the inn of *Robert Buckner* in Crowland near the *aqueduct*. Colebreath threatened and struck me. Recognizance taken before Thompson: Patrick Mulhoton £10; William Colebreath £10, sureties *William Orderly* and Robert Buckner £5 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

File 15-37.

Thomas Eastham, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against *Francis Scott* on October 14, 1833. Evidence of Francis Scott taken before *James Muirhead* on October 22: deponent was struck on the face by the prisoner with his fists. Recognizance of Francis Scott taken October 22, £10; recognizance taken on October 23: Thomas Eastham £10, surety *Chester Wadsworth* £5. *Nolle prosequi*, October 24, 1833. Defendant to pay costs 15/6-.

File 15-38.

John Davis, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Charles William Edwards*, Niagara, mason, on December 4, 1832. Witnesses: Charles William Edwards. Evidence taken before *J. Crooks* on December 5. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

File 15-39.

John Falconer, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Abby Mandigo*, on June 26, 1832. Witnesses: Abby Mandigo. Evidence taken before *James Muirhead*, May 26: Mandigo says that Falconer came to her house, where he beat, kicked and abused her. Recognizance taken before Muirhead: Abby Mandigo £5; John Falconer £10, sureties *Samuel Heron*, printer and *Charles Falconer*, his father, £5 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

File 15-40.

Alexander Fare, Niagara, labourer, *James Gosling*, Niagara, labourer and *Stephen Gannon*, Niagara, labourer. Charged with riot, assault and battery against *Edward Fleming*, private in the 79th *Regiment*, on August 28, 1831. True bill: *Edward McBride* (foreman.) Witnesses: Edward Fleming, *Rosannah Mills*. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall*, August 30, 1831: Fleming stood in the street and was surrounded. He asked "what do you want?" and they said "what do *you* want?" Fare said "knock him down, knock him down" and he was knocked down, beat and kicked in a brutal manner. Evidence of Rosannah Mills: was present and talked with Fleming. James Gosling was the first to strike him. Recognizance taken: Edward Fleming and Rosannah Mills £10 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

Adam Fralick, Stamford, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against *Thomas Lambert*. Witnesses: Thomas Lambert. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

Adam Fralick, Stamford, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against *George Acker*. Witnesses: George Acker. Recognizance taken before *David Thompson*, March 1, 1833: Adam Fralick £40, sureties *James Skinner*, Stamford, saddler and *Peter Burgar*, Crowland, yeoman, £20 each. Defendant also charged with the theft of the horse harness of *Thomas Lambert*. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

John Green, Niagara, labourer, a coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing one cotton shirt (value 5/-) and a cotton handkerchief (1/-) the property of *Henry Rogers*, on November 23, 1831. True bill: *William McClelland* (foreman.) Witnesses: Henry Rogers. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall* on November 24: goods were stolen from the house of *Thomas Servos*. Recognizance taken before McDougall on November 28: *Silas Green, Peter Grisham* and [------] *Davis* £1.5.0. each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

William Hepburne, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against *William Moffatt* on January 7, 1833. True bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Moffatt. Evidence taken before *John Crooks* on January 8: deponent was beaten by Hepburne. Recognizance taken before *James Muirhead* on January 24: William Hepburne £10, sureties *Andrew Heron* and *Walter Elliot* £5 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 30, 1833. Recognizance of prosecution estreats.

Riverius Hooker Lee, Stamford, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against Philip Henry Weishuhn, Chippawa, on November 3, 1832. Witnesses: Philip Henry Weishuhn. Evidence of Philip H. Weishuhn taken November 8: was in the barroom of R.H. Lee at Chippawa. Lee came in with a gun which he pointed at deponent, fired, and raised the gun and struck deponent on the head and elbow. Some men took the gun away. Was attacked, struck and kicked by Mills. Evidence of R.H. Lee taken November 9: He came home from company training. Weishuhn and others scuffled or pretended to fight. Deponent ordered them off. Weishuhn said he'd not go until he was ready. We had a clinch. Evidence of *William Mills*: deponent went to the bar. Weishuhn had his coat off, quarreled with *Thomas Jennings*. He put his thumbs to Jenning's eyes. They clinched and fell. Lee said "don't make noise, be still." Weishuhn stood up, squared himself, and said "what do you have to say about it, I'm your man." Lee ordered him out, but he wouldn't go until he pleased. Lee went and got a gun. They clinched and squabbled. *Mr. Sherwood* attempted to part them. Weishuhn's son said not to part them. They got Lee down on a seat and were choaking him. Lee called for assistance. We got Weishuhn off Lee, Lee was at the bar and Weishuhn followed and kicked him. Weishuhn's son said "here, father, is a fellow-- put it to him." Lee ran upstairs, Weishuhn followed to the foot of the stairs. Deponent didn't strike or kick, only interfered in the way stated. Recognizance taken before

James Cummings, November 9: Philip H. Weishuhn £10; R.H. Lee and surety William Mills £10 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

File 15-46.

Riverius Hooker Lee, Stamford, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against *James Nary*, labourer, on August 18, 1833. Witnesses: James Nary. Warrant issued by *James Cummings*, Chippawa, to constable *Samuel Hicks* on August 18 to apprehend Lee. Evidence of James Nary: was on his way to *Gravelly Bay*, stopped at Lee's at Chippawa. He gave the teamster *Peter Scott* 1/- (York) to get some whiskey. Scott paid 1/6-, deponent said the bottle held only 3 half pints and told Lee to give us a <u>quart</u>. Lee refused and said to "hold your traveling, I'll kick you right out of doors." Deponent said "if you raise a fist to strike, I'll make you pay \$25." Lee stepped up and knocked deponent down, and hurt him very much. *Nolle prosequi*, October 26, 1833.

Isaac Leech, Willoughby, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against **John Callaghan**, Chippawa, on August 22, 1833. Evidence taken before **John Crooks** on August 22: Callaghan is in the employ of the **Welland Canal Company**. He was at the **swing bridge at Chippawa** on the line of the cut from Chippawa to **Port Robinson** on the **Deep Cut**. There was a raft of logs under the bridge, and deponent directed **Mr. Walker**, the owner, to get them out of the way so vessel navigation was not obstructed. Leech turned and began abusing me, damning him and the Canal and "old **Randalf**" would get away until he liked. Leech continued to use the most uncouth and foul language, damning him with the epithet "scoundrel." Recognizance taken on August 22: Isaac Leech and surety **Abraham Gaffin** £5 each. Nolle prosequi, October 26, 1833.

Mary McPharlain, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing 4 yards of factory cotton (value 2/-) and one white cambric frock (3/-) the property of *Margaret Millard*, Niagara, on July 20, 1833. Witnesses: Margaret Millard. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall* on July 22: a chest with a bed tick, black worsted hose, white and striped cotton hose, cambric frock, stays, gold beads, and yellow, orange and red handkerchief was stolen from on board the steam packet "*Britain*" while at *King's Wharf*. Recognizance taken: Mary McPharlain and Margaret Millard £5 each. *Nolle prosequi*, October 30, 1833.

Warrant issued by *James Cummings* to *Erastus Moses* on August 22, on the oath of *Robert Horton* to arrest Weishuhn. Evidence taken before Cummings: deponent went to *Chippawa* to *James Secord's inn* at 3 pm. He called for his dinner in the barroom. Weishuhn began to brag about wrestling and fighting, and said he could give any man beyond a stone of his weight a beating. Weishuhn asked if he would treat or gamble? They tossed, to see who should treat the company. Weishuhn lost, but wouldn't pay. Haughton went to treat a man at the bar, and Weishuhn came up and struck him a severe blow with his fist under the ear. Deponent left the room, Weishuhn followed to strike him again. Nothing new regarding war losses claims.

John Clark to *Charles Richardson*, York, January 29,1834: If *Captain Creighton* is with you, hand him the enclosed. We advocate making the *Welland Canal* a provincial property with a branch to the Niagara River. The *Chippawa Railroad bill* has not yet passed their Lordships.

File 16-7. Filings.

Joel Skinner, Humberstone, carpenter. Obstructed and assaulted **Bar. Tench** at Humberstone on the 14th instant in the exercise of his duty as a Magistrate. Evidence taken before **Crowell Wilson**: Tench endeavored to prevent a breach of the Sabbath on November 14th. At 1 pm. Tench walked on the bank of the **Welland Canal** towards **Gravelly Bay**. He observed five men shingle a frame of someone named **Smith**. Jenner a miller called and said "Have you not seen the King's Proclamation to prevent such work on the Sabbath?" Deponent said he'd stop it, crossed the

canal, and went to the frame. He recognized Joel Skinner, David Waterhouse, Robert Cram and others, and said it was improper to work on Sunday. Skinner said "it is Sunday and a damned deal better for you to be at home minding your own business." Tench said "I have a right to walk where I please." Since he saw the offence he was obliged to notice it and desired the men to come down. Three came down, but Skinner kept working and said 'Since he was to be fined, he'd work his way out,' and used abusive language. He told Tench to "go to hell" and "didn't fear him any more than any other Little Counter jumper." Tench said he'd act as a magistrate and if obstructed he'd punish Skinner. Skinner again told him to "go to hell." Tench left the frame and went to Smith's for snuff. He heard Skinner (with manifest contempt) call to the men to 'come and put out their half day.' William Pawling, innkeeper, asked if Tench won't take notice of the work? Tench returned to the frame and called on Waterhouse and Cram to come down. Skinner worked and continued his abuse. Tench ascended the ladder and made Skinner a prisoner in His Majesty's name. Skinner resisted but came down. He was going away from Tench who had him by the coat and said 'he must accompany him.' Skinner collared Tench and tried to drag him to a grocery where some persons were assembled. Skinner made most violent and threatening gestures, his hands repeatedly in the face of the deponent. Tench called on Cram to assist him and he and another man walked away without paying any attention. Skinner's son came running to assist and cried to his father "damn him, let him have it." Since deponent had no assistance he let Skinner go, who continued his abuse and said he "would not let any damned Irish rascal take him." Skinner's object was to put the law at defiance. Prays that a warrant might issue, November 26, 1833. Recognizance: B. Tench £20; Joel Skinner £50, sureties William J. Steel, Humberstone, yeoman and Thaddeus Smith £25 each.

Subpoena issued by *Charles Richardson*, dated November 28, 1833. Served by constable *David Clow* on *James Firman* on December 16, 1833 to give evidence against *Davis Prest* on the complaint of *Charles Stanton*. "It was impossible to attend on the 28th."

Evidence of *Richard Woodruff*, *St. Davids*, taken before *James Muirhead* on November 14, 1833. *William* and *Robert McGarvey*, St. Davids, coopers, as a result of the late quarrel are so cruel minded to my family that I fear bodily harm.

Letter from *James Kerby* to *Charles Richardson*, *Fort Erie Mills*, January 25, 1834. The enclosed was delivered to *William Smith* one month ago, and he promised to deliver them to you. Not done through neglect, and the poor man is now too ill to attend the Quarter Sessions. *Mr*. *Stanton* will be present to answer questions relative to the papers. I am also unable to attend, have been out of health all winter.

J.K. Smith and *William Smith*. The evidence of *Charles Stanton* at *Waterloo Ferry*, in the employ of *Mrs. Warren*. Two cows were severely cut last night with a sharp axe. An axe was found near *Bevely [Beverly?] Harris*, a man of colour, which is supposed to be the weapon. Harris or a boy in his employ, *David West*, did this atrocious crime. Should they be arrested? October 29, 1833. Evidence of David West, a lad of colour: He went home to Bevely Harris' at the ferry, went to bed at 10 pm and didn't rise until dawn. He has no knowledge of the crime. Didn't use the axe since last Saturday. He went from the house early to go across the river and bring a boy of colour over to attend a husking bee at *Old Finlay's*. Had no intent to escape as *Mr. John Hardison* strongly suspected. From the time of his knowledge of the crime he did not mention it to anyone in *Kerby's house* from 7 am until the afternoon except to Bevely Harris. Evidence of Bevely Harris: he states the same as David West. Knows nothing of the crime. When he got home last night in company with one *William* (a man of colour) he went and cut enough wood to burn that evening and to make a fire in the morning. He cut more wood in the morning. States that he cut up a quarter beef with the same axe. Was not aware that any hairs could be seen

about the axe, or anything leading to discovery. David West was to go home and stay with my wife in my absence. Had no knowledge of the lad's intent to cross the river as Mr. Hardison stated. Evidence of *John William Smith* (a man of colour) October 30, 1833: was at the house of Bevely Harris at the Ferry. Saw nothing suspicious, had no knowledge of the atrocious crime. There was no use made of the axe that night or the next day. If anyone was chopping wood, you would have heard. The fire was made in the morning, but didn't know if the family was up before him. He saw Harris' cow at the door and another near the side of the house. Evidence of Charles Stanton, Fort Erie, November 25, 1833: is a resident at the Ferry, in the employ of Mrs. Warren. He was at Black Rock Ferry, and met a lad of colour, *Samuel Bruce*, who could give information about the cows. He should be apprehended and detained to give information. Recognizance taken: Samuel Bruce £10, sureties Bevely Harris £10 and *Tillman Hilluray* £5 (all of colour.) Recognizance taken October 30: John William Smith £10, Charles Stanton £5, Bevely Harris, Bertie, labourer, £10, *George Hardison*, Bertie, Esquire, £5, *George Duncan* (a man of colour) £5, David West (a lad of colour) £10, sureties Bevely Harris £15 and George Duncan £5.

Andrew McGregor, Louth, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against Basnett Dell on January 25, 1834. Grand Jury presentment attached signed: William Buck, Haun, Richard Yokum, Archibald Thompson, Jacob Willson, Jacob Baxter, John Hardy, Andrew Learn, Johnson, Martin Buchner, Robert Doan and Beam.

File 16-8. Insane and Destitute Records.

Chauncey Beadle, St. Catharines, January 27, 1834. *Harriet Hague*, a very infirm girl, nearly deaf and blind, with a very incorrigible disposition. Lives with *Mrs. Goodell*. Have witnessed the care she takes, believes her entitled to \$1 per week as compensation.

File 16-9. Jail Records.

Peter Wheeler, has received four pairs of hand cuffs for the gaol, January 30, 1834.

Thomas Butler, *B. Tench* and *William M. Ball* appointed a committee to inspect the wood for the jail. It is of the worst possible description. The sheriff should advertise for 15 cords of good wood, subject to committee approval, January 31.

File 16-10. Orders.

Ordered that *regulation of licences* to be in open court.

Daniel McDougall, William M. Ball, Thomas Butler, John C. Ball and *Robert Melville* ordered to be a committee to superintend the gaol, February 1, 1834.

Ordered that no *tavern licence applications* rejected at the Quarter Sessions to be entertained in the same year, January 28, 1834.

Ordered that *Lewis Donelly* be paid £12.10.0. for the arrest of *John Fitzgerald* (murder) who escaped from the Niagara Gaol. £5 ordered paid to *Alexander Wintermute* for the arrest of *Rufus Westover* and *James Ensign* for the arrest of 2 others who escaped at the same time, February 1, 1834.

File 16-11. Petitions.

William Cook, Markham, Home District, yeoman. Bought 300 acres (Broken Front lots 6 & 7 Concession 8 and lot 4 (Rainham) and paid taxes up to 1831. A recent survey shows that the Broken Front lots 6 & 7 are cut off by the boundary of *Indian lands*. Lot 4 has 108 acres. Prays for a certificate from the treasurer and reimburse the amount of the difference between 300 and 108 acres, December 12, 1833. Certificate from *William Clark*, received £7.8.9. taxes from Cook, April 27, 1832. Affidavit from *S.P. Hurd*, *Surveyor General's office*, the land is cut off. November 30, 1833. Cook reimbursed £4.16.1.

Petition from *Debtors in Niagara Gaol*: Undersigned suffer from want of fuel, and cannot furnish their own. None is allowed by the District through part of the winter except a miserable gratuity of basswood occasionally given by the gaoler to ward 3. Ward 2 had no participation, which made their situation truly deplorable. Pray for good firewood to make their circumstances comfortable, January 28, 1834. Signed: *Louis Bapp, David Thompson, Lewis Odell, Thomas Whitwell, John Ororke, John Cunningham, Horace Lathrop.* Ordered that the gaoler supply 10 cords of wood and paid for out of the district funds, January 30, 1834.

David Thompson, debtor. Wishes to enjoy the benefits of the limits assigned to the gaol, suggests the house of Mr. *John Young*, merchant, an appropriate part for his house and lot for accommodation. 90 feet from the front of the building to the rear of the lot would not interrupt with the business of the merchant's shop, January 29, 1834.

File 16-13. Road and Bridge Petitions.

Petition from inhabitants of Wainfleet and Humberstone. *Marshville*, August 10, 1833. Pray for a land communication between *Fort Erie* and *Port Dover*. A road has been laid out from Fort Erie to Marshville and from *Dunnville* to Port Dover, but the part between Marshville and Dunnville has not been laid out or surveyed. Pray for a survey on the south side of the *Welland Canal Feeder* 60 feet wide. Signed: *Michael Graybiel, Samuel Graybiel, Emmanuel Winter, Jonas Minor, Guy J. Atkins, James Stone, Abraham Minor, Jacob Ott, John Neff, Sela [Silas?]*

Fort Erie Mills, Bertie, November 16, 1833. A plan for a bridge was agreed upon and a crossing way over the Creek between lots 5 and 6 in Concessions 10 and 11. Three butments were made four feet above the water level. 75 feet was covered with split oak 14 feet long. The string pieces were 1 foot square. Performed in a workmanlike manner. \$60 was laid out to the lowest bidder, \$10 at the start and the rest when the work was approved. Signed *Michael Huffman* and *William McMurray*, inspectors. Received \$60 for the *Bertie Bridge* upon completion from *James Kerby*.

Certified that *George Waggoner*, Niagara, built a *frame bridge at Four Mile Creek* on the *Swamp Road*, cleaned logs and rubbish out of the creek so the water may flow. Charge \$59 and Waggoner to be paid for his work. The work was done as soon as possible to the satisfaction of the commissioners. Niagara, November 23, 1833. Signed *Thomas Butler*, *John Alma*, *Daniel McDougall*.

John McFarland, Niagara, yeoman. In consideration of £52.10.0. has granted, assigned and released to *Charles Richardson*, *Clerk of the Peace*, his heirs and assigns in trust for the benefit of the District, all his right, title and interest, claim and estate in a public highway. The street extends from the town plot to the gaol and court, by *Peter T. Pawling's*. January 29, 1834. *C.A. Foster* has examined and found the Deed of Trust legal. *Robert Nichol* and *William Cotton* are subscribing witnesses to the indenture.

Letter from *James Cummings* to *Charles Richardson*, Chippawa, January 29, 1834. The bearer, *John Beam*, was aggrieved by a road laid out from the mouth of *Black Creek* to the town line of Bertie was taken from his land without remuneration. These are the particulars, should we give him payment? When the present road was established *Mr. Cusack*, surveyor at the time, led him to believe he'd get the road allowance adjoining in lieu thereof. The freeholders in the vicinity consented to this. He gave the land under that assurance, which was not confirmed in Sessions. Cusack found the law expired which authorized the Surveyor of Highways to deed the King's allowance in lieu of lands ceded. Since debarred from recovery of intended remuneration, if he applies by petition will he be granted payment? He is quiet and peaceable, and put good faith in the promise of the surveyor. He is on his way to Niagara, and requested me to state the particulars.

Witnesses: John Talbot. Evidence of John Talbot taken before *John Alma*, November 2: At 9 am he put a bill on the table of *McBride & Talbot's Auction Room*, a note from the *Commercial Bank of Kingston*, value 5/-. He saw Compston take it. Recognizance taken before John Alma on November 2: John Talbot £20; John Compston £20 and sureties *Peter Cain* and *Thomas Compston* £10 each.

Charged with riot and assault against *William* and *Elizabeth McGarvey* on November 11, 1833. True bill: William Buck (foreman.) Witnesses: William and Elizabeth McGarvey, John P. Hannett, Sarah McGarvey, Ann McGarvey, Robert McGarvey, Sarah Ann Marshall, William Moore. Presentment signed by William Buck, Isaac S. Hawn, Archibald Thompson, Richard Yokum, Jacob Wilson, Jacob Baxter, John Hardy, Jacob Johnson, Andrew Seburn, John Johnson, Martin Buchner, William Buck Jr, Robert Doan and Adam Beam. Letter of Dr. J. Mewburn to Charles Richardson, Danby House, Stamford, January 27, 1834: Henry Swan of St. Davids has been exceedingly ill, recovering from a severe cold. Is not well enough to attend the Quarter Sessions for fear of a relapse. Letter of James Muirhead, February 1, 1834: William McGarvey, Niagara, cooper: requires one or two other witnesses, viz, Ann Armstrong and Richard Steel in the complaint against Henry Swan. Recognizances taken: Joseph Porter £10, sureties James Miller and James Croft £5 each; George Shaw £10, sureties James Miller and *Richard Woodruff* £5 each; Dwight Croft £10, sureties James Croft and William Pointer £5 each; Isaac House £10, sureties James Croft and Richard Woodruff £5 each; Royal Secord £10, sureties James Croft and Richard Woodruff £5 each; Henry Swan £10, sureties James Croft and John Harris £5 each; John Servos £10, sureties John Servos Sr. and Richard Woodruff £5 each; Richard Woodruff £10, sureties John Servos Sr. and William Pointer £5 each. Elizabeth McGarvey bound £10 for her daughter *Sally McGarvey* to appear.

The evidence of *Sally McGarvey* taken before James Muirhead: She was at her mother's house at St. Davids on the 11th and saw the defendants throw stones into the house, endangering the lives of the family.

Letter of *James McGarvey* to *Charles Hall*. Sir, I wish to inform you into the truth of the matter which I have employed you in. I went abroad on the 11th. On my return I was told by my mother that Henry Swan and *Joseph Woodruff* were looking for my brother to quarrel with us. They said "I think you may prepare your coffins" and had with them almost all the men in the village collected at the *steam mill*. *An Indian* prepared to begin the quarrel, Swan was at Croft's shop. A man came up to get some work done, and I went from the dwelling to the shop with *Mr. Fisher*. I went home to get some materials and met the Indian. He asked me with a kindly smile "how do you do today?" I returned the compliment and said "very well." As I passed, he drew his hand and struck me in the face three or four times. A quarrel ensued between him and I. After 2 or 3 minutes, Croft, Swan and Servos came to assist him. Swan had a large pole in his hands and drew it over my brother's head and swore "by Jesus if you lift a hand I shall give it to you." Others

came to assist. George Shaw on horseback- he tied the horse to the fence and rushed into the crowd and hollered "give it to him" the others and the Indian were hollering. John Hannett [Hannatt?] came up and said 'he gave McGarvey fair play, take off his coat and handkerchief.' Swan said "no by Jesus he must fight as he is now." When the fight ceased with the Indian and me, Servos and Swan said "by Jesus you shall get it before you leave the ground." Mother cried "William and Robert run into the house, if you don't you shall not leave the ground with your lives." We ran in and the mob followed to within 2 or 3 yards of the gate leading into the house. I ran out with a bayonet and scabbard, then the men retreated down the road. I ran after them as far as mother's barren. I met with William Woodruff who said "You damned nation rascal, are you coming at me with a bayonet?" "Yes by Jesus if you come to fight I shall let out your guts and God 'dam' you I don't want to." I stopped and when he got the opportunity he lifted two stones and threw them at me. He hollered for the party and they came up with stones. Some threw stones and others didn't. John Hannett came up and demanded peace and said "I think there is enough done." Isaac House said "you have no call to command the peace here." We had to retreat into the house and they pursued us. They threw stones into the house, others hit the house and broke off boards. I ran into the room and got the fowling piece and ran to the door and snapped it two or three times at William Woodruff, levelled it at George Shaw and he went off, Shaw being one who threw stones into the house and struck me with one. This ended the quarrel. Henry Swan swore he was at the steam mill, saw the quarrel at McGarvey's and ran up. He saw J. a French man and I fighting. He saw me run after William Woodruff with a bayonet, and fire at Shaw. Went to lift a saddle and dropped it. He didn't see Shaw throw stones. Remember-- Shaw, William and Richard Woodruff and Henry Swan all threw stones just abreast of each other. He didn't see my brother do anything, just stood by me and didn't hinder me. Also when at Dr. Mewburn's heard me say "I would have been glad if I had shot George Shaw for it would have been in my own defence." This is merely what the rest of the witnesses has sworn, that I have heard for so far.

Verdicts: Henry Swan "not guilty;" William Woodruff "not guilty;" Dwight Croft, John Servos, Richard Woodruff, George Shaw, Royal Davis Secord and Isaac House all found "guilty" of assault and fined £1 each plus costs £3.2.0 and £9.0.6 for a total £12.2.6. February 1, 1834.

Pencil notes by *C.L. Hall* (prosecutor) with questions and list of witnesses: 1st witness, *Wm*. *McGarvey* sworn. At the time the stones were thrown in the house by *Mr. Woodruff* were the whole of the def's present? Have you any doubt but that the *Indian* had [----] What time in the day did this happen? Do you think that Mr. W. or any of them had sufficient provocation to break [-----]; Had not the persons assembled around the house before your son came out? Did you Dwight Croft take hold of your mother? Did not Mr. Woodruff [crossed out.] I will lay it by when I take a life as to the length of time that the riot lasted; how could any person engaged in such a row form a judgement as to its duration; if he worked at the steam mill why did he not stay there; witness heard Hammett (constable) command the peace; witness struck Indian while engaged with his [----], it was natural for him to do it. Asked William you damnable rascal are you going to stab me? What was William to think when he had been engaged I ask the nephew of Woodruff. Mrs. McGarvy, says that two of the def'ds came in the morning & asked for those fellows, she said her sons were no fellows. As to striking a woman-Miss McGarvy seeing one of the parties looking into the shop, was it not natural to suppose it was a premeditated attack. When the peace was commanded he put on his coat. Saw Woodruff throw a stone before. One of the party told him that one of the McGarveys had whipped young Wm. Woodruff, as to McGarvey coming out with a bayonet, his house surrounded by a mob in which there was his widowed mother and sisters. As soon as Woodruff rallied the rest followed, told witness he had no right to command, he would not have turned had not Woodruff have. As to McGarvey, is it [causing?] a row to resent a blow given without provocation? Is he not to strike a man who comes to his shop &

strikes. Why did we not bring forward. As to being a riotous character, that would be an excuse for the def'ds the offence is against. The Indian corroborates the testimony. He never had any quarrel with McGarvey never struck any man before then he must have been justified. He left [----] men before. Mr. Clark says that McGarvey he is quiet. John Fisher. Wm. Lutridge- damn your old soul I will take your guts out.

Defendant discharged, no prosecution appearing.

Isaac Leech, Willoughby, labourer, Amos Leech, Willoughby, labourer, William Leech, Willoughby, labourer, David Pettit, Willoughby, labourer, Charles Rozell, Willoughby, labourer. Charged with larceny, the theft of three turkeys (value 5/-) the property of *Benjamin Colerick*, Willoughby, yeoman, on December 25, 1833. No bill: William Proctor (foreman.) Witnesses: Benjamin Colerick, Charles Vader, Stamford, wheelwright and James Robison, shoemaker. Evidence of Benjamin Colerick taken before *James Cummings*, December 26: the three turkeys were stolen Wednesday morning at 5 o'clock, were brought down river in a wagon. Rozell and Robison can be taken as evidence. Evidence of Isaac Leech: came down river from *Lewis* House's in a wagon, Vader was the driver. We stopped at Rosell's Tavern. Walked with Pettit to Chippawa. Denies knowledge of the turkeys. Evidence of Amos Leech: There were four turkeys in the wagon, owned by Isaac Leech, David Pettit, Charles Rozell, Charles Vader and deponent. Vader won his turkey at Lewis House's in Willoughby. Evidence of William Leech: We got the turkeys at Lewis House's. Evidence of James Robison: Defendants came from Lewis House's with the turkeys, didn't stop until they reach Rozell's. Evidence of Joseph Jay: Was at R.H. Lee's Hotel. James Robison came down the river, stopped and took the turkeys. Evidence of Charles Vader: Went with Leech to Lewis House's in Willoughby from Chippawa in his wagon. Remained there until between 2-3 am. Was awakened in bed by hallowing. A party was raffling and playing with cards. We went for the horse and started for Chippawa, stopped at Rosell's and took the turkeys belonging to the company. Evidence of Charles Rosell: paid 2/- for a wagon to Vader's. Brought one turkey, didn't recall the others were in the wagon until they got to his house. There were 7 persons in the wagon. Evidence of David Pettit: Left House's with Leech at 1 am. We put four turkeys in the wagon. We didn't stop until we reached Rosell's. The turkeys belong to Rozell, Vader and Leech. Letter of James Cummings to Charles Richardson: C.W. Rozell was taken in the road as a passenger. As evidence the truth will come out. Story was told to constable *Robert Caswell* and James Robison, and told to security *Alexander Ogden*. Subpoena Robert Caswell and Alexander Ogden if necessary. Recognizance: William Leech, surety *Matthew Donahoe* £5 each; Isaac and Amos Leech £5 each; Charles Vader and surety Henry Bond, Stamford, blacksmith, £5 each; John Smith (grocer) and Charles W. Rosell £5 each; James Robison and surety Alexander Ogden £5 each; David Pettit and surety John Smith £5 each.

Durkee* and *William Stewart* were engaged in a quarrel, Lewis interfered. Colleton told him to leave them alone, whereupon Lewis struck deponent three times with a tin horn. Warrant to apprehend Lewis issued by Smith Griffin to constable *John Page*, November 23. Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall* on November 28: Daniel Lewis £10, sureties John Page, Grimsby, yeoman £10, *Ruffus Durkee*, Grimsby, farmer, £5.

True bill: *William Buck* (foreman.) Witnesses: Ezekiel Jones Metcalf, *Alexander Wintermute*. Evidence of E.J. Metcalf taken before *Edmund Riselay* on November 19: the buffalo skin was stolen from deponent's sleigh in the barn of *William Forsyth*, Bertie, yeoman. Searched for the robe, and the boy in the employ of William Forsyth as mail carrier. Evidence of James Price taken before *James Cummings* on November 20: Price is an apprentice to *Nelson Forsyth* and carrier of mail from Fort Erie to Niagara, was arrested by Alexander Wintermute. He was on the road between Chippawa to Fort Erie, his usual route, and he saw a horse and sleigh stand opposite to Alexander Wintermute's around 8-9 pm. The horse had a robe. Deponent was cold and took the skin, intended to return it in the morning. Had no other reason to take it. He feared a flogging and so didn't return it. Recognizance taken before James Cummings on January 28, 1834: Ezekiel Jones Metcalf £10; Nelson Forsyth, Bertie, gentleman £5. Verdict: guilty. Sentenced to 48 hours in prison, February 1, 1834.

To the Inhabitants of Crowland, Wainfleet, Pelham and Thorold near the junction of the Welland Canal and the Feeder. March 9, 1834 a jury was summoned by David Thompson and Amos Bradshaw in the absence of a coroner to hold an inquest on the body of John McIntire. Deceased was found dead in the Welland Canal on March 8. He had been violently bruised before his decease. He had entered the inn or house of *Henry Sloan*, in a sober state, at the junction of the Welland Canal and the Feeder on December 24, 1833. He called for whiskey, became drunk, noisy and quarrelsome. There were several people at the inn drinking and raffling. He quarreled with several of them, and was put out by Sloan. He was followed out by George Stuart who was angry. They were found engaged out of doors and parted by Sloan. Stuart was put into the house and the deceased was left outside. He has not been seen since, until his body was found on the 8th. Verdict: The deceased was abused at the house of Henry Sloan, turned out, started for home but fell drunk into the Canal and drowned. Sloan does not keep a peaceable, sober and quiet house which is a resort of the drunken and dissolute. By this "awful and lamentable catastrophe" and intemperate use of spirits plentifully furnished to the deceased, Sloan should be compelled to desist selling liquor. Thorold, March 18, 1834. If she was away, they'd enter at the window. James House used a chisel to open the window. Julia House went in and handed out the lard. Deponent went in to help with the pork. James House received the stolen property outside the house and closed the window. They carried the pork to Harmonius House's, "he was well pleased with the expedition." Recognizance of Eunice Price £10. Charles Davis refuses to be bound and is committed for safe keeping, March 22, 1834. Verdict: "not guilty."

Evidence of *Ruth Doane*, wife of William Pawling, innkeeper, Humberstone: at 11 pm Ott and Brooks were intoxicated. Ott was unable to walk home, Brooks said there were plenty of horses in the stable. He went out, she believes he took the horse. Evidence of David Price: Jacob Ott was at his house at 4 pm. There was a wagon at the door with the horse of *Thomas Brown* of Wainfleet. Ott was in the act of untying the horse to ride it home, not to commit a felony, he went to the stable to take another. He was intoxicated. He previously took the horse of Zavitz. Evidence of *Emanuel Winters*, Humberstone, yeoman: thinks it a "drunken frolick" to ride a horse home.

Evidence of James Gordon taken before *Robert Grant* at Queenston: Berryman swore he wanted Gordon alone, deponent is apprehensive of harm. Warrant to apprehend Berryman issued by Grant to constable *Chester Wadsworth*. Recognizance taken before Robert Grant July 4: Edgar Berryman £20, sureties *David Dunston*, Stamford, shoemaker and *John Crawford*, Stamford, yeoman, £10 each.

John Hercules DeWitt, was engaged to teach at Lemmon's school house in Willoughby, for six months, reading, writing, spelling and arithmetick. Rate of 11/- per student per quarter plus scholar's board and necessaries, October 3, 1833. Signed John Lemon, Frederick Buchner, Daniel Buchner, Jonathan Dell, Ambrose Patterson, Peter Buchner, Thomas Vincent, Jacob Burmount, Michael Lemon, John Buck. Examination held before Crowell Willson and James Cummings, June 25, 1834: DeWitt charged by Frederick Buchner with having forged the name of Buchner to the school articles, for the price of two quarter's schooling 13/9- and costs £1.9.0. total £2.2.9. On September 30 or October 1 DeWitt went to raise school money. Wished Buchner had a copy, but had no pen and ink. Went to Daniel Buchner's, Peter Buchner's, and John Eli Wright's. Peter Buchner: worked on the repair of Lyon's Creek Bridge. A dispute arose between John Lemon and Frederick Buchner regarding the school. Deponent tried to pacify them, Lemon was full of contention. Couldn't send two to school, had to stay home to take care of a baby. Lewis Buchner: on Sunday after prayer meeting a question arose regarding the signing of the

school articles. John E. Wright: was working on bridge repairs, a quarrel arose between Lemon and Buchner, said he had no right to the school, should take the child away &c. *Jesse Patterson*: went to school with the teacher. Buchner came with his brother Daniel regarding the stove. School articles drawn up for 25 scholars, said he would write new articles, especially if erasures were made. Left the articles at the building house. Daniel Buchner: wouldn't pay the school fees, being higher than he was accustomed to. There was considerable wrangling between John Lemon and Frederick Buchner. Recognizance: John H. DeWitt £25, sureties John E. Wright and Jesse Patterson £12.10.0. each. Witness Lewis Buchner £5. Frederick Buchner £50, sureties David Buchner and *Alexander McKenny* £20 each.

File 17-24. Presentment.

Grand Jurors have visited the cells and debtors rooms in the gaol. Report signed by *Barnabas Gregory* July 8, 1834:

Cell #1: *Margaret Smith* (alias "*Fralick*") confined for petty larceny and subsists on the county allowance. Is well used by the gaoler and other keepers.

#2: *David Thompson* (confined 13 months) and *Lewis Odell*, (confined 10 months.) Thompson supports himself at his own expense 7/6- per week. Odell until lately subsisted himself and at the same cost, but is now on the county allowance.

#3: *Ken Reach* and *Valentine Ward*. Have no fault with the gaolers. Change their quarters to #1. They subsist largely on their own means plus a small allowance.

#4: a sort of dungeon appropriated for debtors. *Harvey Lorenzo Wilkins* was confined here by the gaoler since he charged the gaoler with the theft of \$350 from his pocket book. Pray to ameliorate his condition, since he will be confined here until the September assizes.

Criminal cells- the prisoners give favourable reports except for want of due attendance by the gaol physician. When ill, *Dr. Telfer* said "it was a matter of indifference to him whether he did or not."

Mr. *Valentine Ward*: is unable to support himself, is totally destitute- takes oath for 5/- weekly allowance. Confined for three weeks "if he should not sooner die for want of necessary food." *H.L. Wilkins*: in nearly the same situation, brought a charge of conspiracy against the gaoler.

Takes oath for allowance. Relief should be granted, signed Barnabas Gregory July 9, 1834. *Dr. Truman Raymond* of Niagara: has maintained *Elizabeth M. Willson*, "an idiot insane person," at an expense of £30.0.6. between March 29, 1833 and July 9, 1834. Endorsed "ordered paid."

File 17-25. Gaol Records.

Protest of *Alexander Hamilton* against the sufficiency of the gaol for the security of prisoners. Several prisoners escaped through the negligence on the part of the gaoler, and the insecurity of the building. Prisoners can escape by removing pine planks from the floor, and removing part of the underpinning of the gaol. Prays to make it secure. Gaoler is liable for escaped debtors who have the liberty of the day room which is equally insecure. Protests against responsibility until gaol made secure, July 1, 1834.

Moderator: *Elder William McDermand* and *Edward Dickinson Clarke*. Delegated brothers. For Charlotteville: *George J. Ryerse*; Clinton: *Thomas Hill, Robert Skelly, Ephraim Singer*; Grantham: *John Westover, James Soper*; Oxford: *W.B. Mabee*, *Lazarus Griffin*; Townsend: *John Harris, Uriah Coiles*; Walsingham: *Michael Troyer, Henry Barret*, Dickinson. Vanloon pressed as a candidate. He preached a sermon and related his Christian experience, call to the ministry and answered questions. William McDermand preached the ordination sermon, Thomas Hill gave the charge, John Harris gave the consecrating prayer. George J. Ryerse gave the hand of fellowship. The candidate gave the concluding prayer. A second meeting held at Vanloons, McDermand preached the ordination sermon. Signed William McDermand, Edward Dickinson. Committee of 7 magistrates ordered to investigate gaol repairs to make it safe. *George Rykert*, *Crowell Willson*, *Henry Mittleberger*, *Elias Adams*, *Robert Grant*, *Jacob Keefer*, *John Ball*, July 9, 1834.

Cheque issued to *Charles Richardson* for £48.1.6, but he is ordered to present his accounts, July 10, 1834.

Gaol regulations rescinded as to prisoners having the privilege of the gaol rooms. They are ordered to have the same only between 10 and 12 o'clock and 3 and 4 o'clock. July 9, 1834.

File 17-28. Petitions.

David Palmer of Clinton to **Sir John Colborne**. Petitioner is the son of **David Palmer**, UEL, one of the earliest of settlers. His father's name was struck from the UE list, prays that his name be restored, June 20, 1833. Affidavit of **Charles Green** taken before **John O'Reilly**: knew David Palmer Sr. since the American War. He was a good subject, took up arms and joined a sergeant and two privates to retake a comrade taken by the Americans in New Jersey. Government House, July 13, 1833: referred to Inspector General for the information of the Executive Council. Palmer was a settler from New Jersey in 1788. To be reinstated on the UE List upon proof of joining the Royal Standard in the war.

Catherine Kadman of Niagara, wife of *James Conner*, to *Sir John Colborne*. Petitioner is the daughter of *John Kadman*, UEL, of Osnabruck, Eastern District, yeoman. Has no lands. Affidavit of *Thomas Servos*: he knows petitioner, she is who she claims to be. Sworn before *John Mewburn* and *William Hamilton Merritt*, July 8, 1834.

Andrew Burns: was a soldier under *Lord Cornwallis* in the Revolutionary War under *Colonel McDonnel* of the *Canadian Volunteers*. Is 86 years old, has no means of subsistence from age and infirmity except for charity. Prays for relief, July 8, 1834. [Rejected.]

Report of a Survey for a road which was made, paid for by the residents of Grantham and Thorold. The road was made without our knowledge or the request of the inhabitants near the Thorold line. On the south side of the township line no allowance for a road was intended. The gentlemen refuse to do Statute Labour, throw the road into Thorold for Statute Labour &c. Signed *Arthur McIntosh, George Marlatt, William Orr, Thomas Russell, Frederick DeCew, Daniel [Tother?], William L. Cleland, Clement Fralick, John Dennis, Samuel Hopkins, John DeCew* Sr, *Philip Young, John DeCew* Jr, *Benjamin Shenston, Thomas Angelman, Caleb Swayze, Nelson Swayze*. July 8, 1834.

Inhabitants of Grantham and Thorold request a road survey between their townships, June 20, 1834. Ball, Samuel Theal, Isaac Kelly.*

Andrew Swartz and *Abraham Grobb* of Clinton, appointed commissioners by Statute Law, on the side line from the *Main Road* to the Lake (lots 4 and 5 Concession 3.) Survey is erroneous, land marks not regularly kept up. Alterations on road, question where to lay out funds. Request a surveyor to examine and lay out and establish a permanent road, July 7, 1834. [Rejected, July 9, 1834.]

Difficulties with the road between John Marlatts due south to Concession 9 between lots 19 and 20. Laid out by Robert Nelles, 1 rod on each side of the line. Pray to authorize a surveyor to examine the line and have the pathmaster open the road. We will pay the expense. File 17-30. Road Reports.

Charles K. Fell. Has examined a road in Wainfleet between *Marshville* and *Dunnville* on the south side of the *Welland Canal Feeder*. The land thrown up from the Feeder makes a tolerable road, which might be widened to 66 feet and kept in good repair with a little labour. Dated at *Pelham Square*, July 2, 1834.

Charles K. Fell, approved all road reports. All roads are to be 66 feet unless there is a good reason to the contrary.

Charles K. Fell: Road laid out between the village of *Canboro'* and *Binbrook*, to intersect the road to Hamilton there. To cross over the *Chippawa Creek* along the line between Canboro' and the Indian lands through Caistor from the *school in Canboro'* to *Birdsall's sawmill*, but to avoid the mill pond. [Sketch attached.] Dated at Pelham Square, July 5, 1834.

Charles K. Fell: Road laid out 66 feet wide through Canboro' and Caistor, across the Chippawa Creek between lots 15 and 16, to join with the road from *Birdsall's Mill*. Dated at Pelham Square, July 5, 1834.

Charles K. Fell: Road laid out 66 feet wide between Grantham and Louth, then from *Frederick Schrams* in Louth through lands of *Joachim May*, *Isaac Wardle* and *Adam Haines* over the *15 Mile Creek* to the road allowance on the west side of the creek, then to descend the hill to the bridge, cross over it and up the hill on the opposite side to the road between lots 8 and 9 in Concession 3 in Louth. [Sketch attached.] Dated at Pelham Square, July 2, 1834.

Charles K. Fell: Road to be laid out in Clinton from the *Main Road* (Niagara to Hamilton Road) south to *Mud Creek Road*. On the east side of lot 9 in Concessions 4 to 8, south to the mountain. It is a necessary road, the difficult part south to the mountain made passable at considerable expense. Where the road deviates it should be 40 feet wide. [Sketch attached, shows *Mud Creek*, Mud Creek Road, the *road to Ball's Mill*, *Fly Road* and Main Road.] Dated at Pelham Square, March 22, 1834.

File 17-31. Tavern and Shop Licences.

Henry Sloan, Crowland, July 9, 1834: Wishes for a licence to sell spiritous liquors but his house is not in strict conformity. Prays for clemency, since he is involved in a suit with his landlord who oppresses him; if he makes additions to the house it will be another cause for a suit for possession. Had a licence in July 1833 and has paid for another for this year. If he is not allowed to sell liquor it would cause him to pay twice the amount plus loss. Was married in the last month, and can pay more attention to travellers. Does not intend to remain beyond the present year in this house, prays to be permitted to sell as usual.

File 17-32.

James Backet, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing an axe (value 2/6-) the property of *Walter Elliott*, Niagara, innkeeper, on March 1, 1834. True bill: *Barnabas Gregory* (foreman.) Witnesses: Walter Elliott, *John Leyburn*. Evidence of Walter Elliott taken before *Daniel McDougall*: axe was taken from the backyard. Evidence of John Leyburn: he bought the axe from

James Backet, paid 2/6- for it. Evidence of James Backet: he got the axe from a *Mr. Wilson* at Buffalo at Christmas, paid \$2 for it. He brought it with him to Niagara on Easter Sunday, and paid 1/- for a handle. He then went to John Leyburn and sold it for 4/6- York currency and a pint of whiskey. Evidence of *William Hepburn*: saw James Backet on the ferry, he had no axe with him. Recognizance of Walter Elliott and John Leyburn, £5 each. Verdict: guilty, ordered to stand 1 hour in the pillory and then be discharged, July 9, 1834.

John Crawford, alias John Henry, Niagara, labourer, Joshua Cudney, Niagara, yeoman and Ferris Cudney, Niagara, yeoman. Charged with riot and assault and battery against James Gant, joiner and carpenter, on May 11, 1834. True bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman), July 9, 1834. Witnesses: James Gant, Mr. Norton. Evidence of James Gant, May 20: was at Mr. Norton's between 8 and 9 pm, between the lake and the Swamp Road, where I took lodging. Had gone to bed, Crawford and Cudneys forcibly entered his room, forced me outside and into a mud hole. Recognizance of Joshua Cudney £25, sureties Lewis Connelly and George Waggoner £12.10.0. each, May 22. Recognizance of Ferris Cudney £25, sureties Alexander Benard and Joshua Cudney £12.10.0. each, June 4. Recognizance of Joseph Frizeman and George Waggoner £6.5.0. each, Joshua Cudney £12.10.0. May 22. Crawford confined in gaol, did not appear. Prosecutor traverses, nolle prosequi. Recognizance estreated, signed John Clark (chairman) January 27, 1835.

File 17-34.

John Cunningham, Humberstone, labourer, Charged with assault and battery against Margaret Garey, Humberstone, on April 28, 1834. No bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman.) Witnesses: D.C. Waterhouse, James F. Skinner, Humberstone, blacksmith. Evidence of James F. Skinner taken before **B.** Tench: was in his workshop with **Peter Kepler**, saw a passenger (a stranger) from the schooner Edward Sackets which had passed through the Welland Canal at Port Colborne, run from the shanty of Margaret Garey to the canal, hotly pursued by John Cunningham with an axe in his hand, who used violent language and gestures. He called to Cunningham to stop least he strike. The stranger called to Waterhouse for assistance. Evidence of Waterhouse, of Humberstone, carpenter: a stranger ran "bearheaded" to the canal pursued by Cunningham with an axe. Wrested the axe from Cunningham who continued his threats. Kicked Cunningham to quiet him, drove him into the house of John Lewis. Bound £20 to give evidence. Evidence of Margaret Garey: a stranger came to the house with his wife and child, asked to bake them a loaf. Peaceable conduct, the stranger mended a watch. Cunningham entered the house and asked if the watch was fixed. Stranger said "what do you want to know for?" Cunningham told him to "clear out." The man and wife left. I told them not to be afraid, the man was drunk and wouldn't hurt them. Cunningham took up a large stick and when I tried to take it he threw me on the bench. He then put down the stick, took up an axe and pursued the stranger. Bound £20 to give evidence.

James Ensign, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 101 pounds of flour in a bag (value 5/-) the property of *Isaac Howey*, on March 28, 1834. True bill: *Barnabas Gregory* (foreman.) Witnesses: *Thomas Canby, Matthew Doan, Alexander Chartier*, clerk of *William Hepburn* of Chippawa. Second writ dated July 9 included in file, with added corrections "flour with a bag" the property of "*Isaac Haven*." Subpoenas to Canby, Doan and Chartier "shall the bag of flour be produced..." Letter from *Samuel Street* to *Charles Richardson, Falls Mills*, July 9, 1834: ready with indictments to go before the Grand Jury. Court to decide if prisoner will pay

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the costs. I send the bag of flour in case of its being necessary to proceed in court. Evidence of Samuel Street of Stamford, taken before *Thomas Clark*, March 26: James Ensign was caught by Alexander Chartier at 10 pm coming out of *Clark and Streets grist mill* at Niagara Falls. He broke in through a window. Put out a bag of flour the property of Isaac Haven, value 12/-. Evidence of James Ensign: went into the mill around dusk through a lower end window next to the river. Slept in the second story. Went to the window to look out. Canby, Clark and Street came near and called "haloe" but doesn't remember if he answered. He shut the window and stood there until discovered by their lanthorn. He attempted to escape at the door, but was caught by Chartier. Had no other design except to sleep, not to steal. Knew nothing of the flour bag. Says he can write but can't now, signed "his X mark." Verdict: not guilty defendant discharged, July 9, 1834.

John Cleveland Green, Stamford, Esquire, Thomas Powell, Stamford, labourer, Simon Creeks, Stamford, labourer, George Beddingfields, Stamford, labourer. Charged with riot and assault against Duff Fife Ducat, farmer, on February 12, 1834. True bill: B.M. Pawling. Witnesses: Duff Fife Ducat, Ann Hutchison. Evidence of Ann Hutchison taken before James Robinson, Malcolm *Laing* and *John Mewburn*, February 12: at 11 o'clock the defendants alight from a wagon and go into Mr. Ducat's house where deponent is a servant. Green took Ducat's collar and Ducat's wife tried to get her husband away. She fainted. Defendants seized Ducat and dragged him out. Examined Ducat's left cheek and saw a swelling, but saw no blow struck on either side. Recognizance £10, surety Duff Fife Ducat £5. Evidence of Duff Fife Ducat, of *Stamford Cottage*: was attacked today between 11 and 12 o'clock by John Cleveland Green and the others. He was pulled out of the house, which belongs to Green, where he resided as bailiff or agent. Was struck on the cheek in the struggle. His wife Sophia Ducat came to his assistance. He was in his chamber and coming down met Green on the stoup with Powell. He asked if he sent Mr. Rorback to tender the money? Deponent answered yes, but not the full claim. Green said "I'll turn you out" and tried the latch of the door which was fastened. He knocked at the door which was opened by Sophia. He took possession of the door and said "you'll not come in." The deponent insisted to go into the sitting room and was collared by the men Green called for assistance. Recognizance £20; Andrew Rorback, harness maker and James Oswald, Stamford, innkeeper, £5 each, February 13, 1834. Evidence of Simon Crick, accused of abetting: Drove Green to the farm accompanied by Beddingfields and Powell. Didn't hear the first part of the exchange (was busy with the horses) but went to the house where Green asked if Ducat would leave the house quietly? Ducat replied, "not till you have paid or settled with me." Green tried to enter but the door was fastened inside. It was opened by the inside, Green tried to enter but Ducat rushed past him. He talked of Ducat leaving but he refused. Green took hold of Ducat, deponent went to aid Green, afraid if Ducat struck him. Sophia Ducat fainted and the servant girl was asked to get water for her. Ducat began to abuse Green, said he had a soul to save as well as Green and he had a heart but Green had none. He said he should have fought with **Dr. Mewburn**, and said to Green "you are a nice sort of fellow, your name is Green but I'll make it Black before I have done with you. You have a long purse, but I'll make it shorter." Witness: Harrison Mewburn: Beddingfields took hold of Ducat's collar at the back. In the scuffle he shifted his hand to the front of his coat and helped him get out. Mrs. Ducat got between the men and fainted. Abusive words were uttered after the scuffle. Evidence of John Cleveland Green: several times through Mr. Rorback and by letter deponent desired Ducat to quit the premises (was a monthly servant.) He went to the farm to ask if Rorback tendered the balance of the account and if he would quit. Ducat refused. Had a conversation on the stoup. Deponent entered the house, Ducat tried violent entry and deponent proceeded to eject him. Note: objected to by John Mewburn as evidence contrary to law. Recognizance: John Cleveland Green £20, sureties Dr. Robinson of the Falls £10; Thomas

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Powell, Samuel Creek and George Beddingfields £20 each. Evidence of Thomas Powell: met Ducat on the stoup, Green asked if he got Rorback's letter? He said yes, and Green asked him to quit. Ducat said not till the account balance is settled. Green said he would compel him to go. Tried to enter and the door was shut but opened from within. Green stepped in, preceded by Ducat who seated himself. A conversation with Ducat arose, he said Green was not a man, he'd make his name Black, a long purse made short, "I have a soul to save as well as you and a heart which you have not, as you would have met Dr. Mewburn when he sent you the challenge." Green laid hold of him and turned him out, and the others assisted. Mrs. Ducat fainted against the outer staircase. Green called for water and went to her assistance. Notation from *William Hamilton Merritt*, March 27, 1834: suit unready for defense, *Simon Washburn* a material witness of Toronto is absent in Europe, is expected to return before the July sessions, can't safely proceed. Bail bond dated February 12, 1834. *Nolle prosequi*; cost of witnesses £4.1.3 plus constable fees for *Chester Wadsworth*. Signed William Hamilton Merritt, July 9, 1834.

Walter Manly, Grantham, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Gretta Eastwood* on February 4, 1834. True bill: *B.M. Pawling*. Witnesses: Gretta Eastwood. Evidence taken before *Thomas Merritt* and *E.S. Adams*, February 6: *George Schram*, Grantham, labourer, went with Manly to the house of Gretta Eastwood. The daughter of Eastwood had knocked the daughter of Manly down. Asked what do you mean by abusing the children, let the children alone. Evidence of *Jacob Gilles*, Grantham, labourer: corroborated the facts. Evidence of Gretta Eastwood, widow, February 5: Manly asked 'what is the meaning of this work? Deponent said 'your own family occasioned it.' He said deponent was a "damned liar." Deponent said Manly was not to enter her house. He came in and struck deponent on the breast with his fist- deponent fell on the floor, he threatened to knock her down again. He came back at 11 pm and said he'd pull down the house, broke the windows with his fist, cut deponent's hand with glass. Windows broken by Manly and his family on previous occasions. Deponent fears injury. Recognizance: Gretta Eastwood £50; Walter Manly £25, surety *John Wright*, St. Catharines, innkeeper, £25. Verdict: guilty. Fined 1/- plus costs £2.0.10. Signed *William Hamilton Merritt* July 9, 1834.

The stinking state of the privy noted and want of the free circulation of air. More liberal allowance of fire wood needed, October 23, 1834. Signed: *John Kidd, Swayze, Jesse H. Lacey, Matthew Thomas, John Radcliff, Joseph Burgar, James Ker, Samuel Hopkins, Robert Wilkerson, William Hill* and *Walter Telfer*.

File 17A-17. Jail Records.

August 1, 1834, contract between *Robert Grant* (Queenston), *John C. Ball* (Niagara), *George Rykert* (St. Catharines), *Elias S. Adams* (St. Catharines), the Gaol Committee, and *Rufus Wright*, St. Catharines, carpenter; sureties *Robert Easton Burns* and *George Varey* (Niagara, tailor). Wright contracts to build stone walls, beams, floors and other works at the gaol before October 19, 1834, cost £81.5.0. Bond £200. The committee to complete the work if Rufus Wright fails. [File includes sketch and specifications of work.]

Letter from the *Sheriff* to *Charles Richardson*, October 22, 1834: the roof the gaol and court house is in a very bad state and leaking in many places, will much injure the building.

Thomas Watson and *John Wood* (masons, reside at *Mr. Rogers*.) Will undertake the mason work on the gaol (with the old stone) for $£33.10\frac{1}{2}.0$. July 31, 1834.

File 17A-18. Orders.

Amos Farewell, Grimsby, constable. Had two suits in *King's Bench*, one in the discharge of his duty regarding the Militia laws, and the other a non-suit. The plaintiff *William Tufford* left the country and left deponent with large court costs. Officers of the court should be protected and uphold them in the discharge of their trust as constables. Payment authorized. Order to authorize payment to Amos Farewell deferred until costs fixed. Costs £70.4.2. Signed *H. Nelles, Alexander Stewart*, March 26, 1834.

William Ball, John L. Alma, W. Adams, Elias S. Adams, Lewis Clement and Thomas Butler ordered to form a Committee of Accounts, October 21, 1834.

Charles L. Hall ordered £10 (extending assessments) for 1834.

Ordered that a jury assess damages to lands of *Mr. Decow* by the alteration of a road through his Thorold lands, October 21, 1834.

Ordered £81.5.0. paid to *Rufus Wright* for his work on the gaol, October 22, 1834.

Ordered that *Thomas Butler* and *William Ball* form a committee to contract for a new roof for the court house, October 22, 1834.

Thomas Butler, Robert Grant, George Rykert, William Ball, Elias Adams, James Cummings and Lewis Clement ordered to form a Gaol Repair Committee.

Peter Davis, pathmaster between Grantham and Thorold, ordered to open a road through lots 41 and 42 in Thorold, October 22, 1834.

Sheriff ordered to remove *Aaron Roy*, *James Burniston* and *Joseph Burniston* to the *Kingston penitentiary*, October 23, 1834.

Alexander Hamilton, handcuffs, shackles and chains required at the gaol, October 23, 1834. *Clerk of the Peace* ordered to send a copy of a presentment to the Lieutenant Governor regarding *Patrick Donelly*, October 23, 1834.

Sheriff ordered to white wash the debtor's rooms and clean the privy, October 23, 1834.

The *Clerk of the Peace* ordered to be paid £17.14.0. deducted for repairs and £8 for attendance at a *Special Assize*, October 23, 1834.

James Allen (debtor) ordered a gaol allowance for one month if not sooner liberated, October 23, 1834.

William Clarke ordered to raise £1000 to discharge the District debt, October 23, 1834.

The *Clerk of the Peace* ordered to inform the *Bank of Upper Canada* there will be no offer of a reward, October 23, 1834.

Francis Proctor ordered to be appointed crier, October 21, 1834.

Ordered £5 paid to Warren Claus, returning officer for the Town of Niagara, October 23, 1834.

File 17A-19. Petitions.

Petition for 14 weeks boarding for Francis Lynch, October 23, 1834- January 29, 1835, £2.12.6.

Benjamin Shenston, Thorold. Had 2¹/₂ acres of most valuable land (contiguous to his dwelling) taken for a road between Thorold and Grantham. Prays for compensation £12.10.0. October 23, 1834. Referred to next Sessions and the *Surveyor of Highways*, January 27, 1835.

Alexander McKie, owing to severe illness is unable to discharge duties as *crier*. Recommends *Mr. Dockstader* to perform the office this term if agreeable, October 20, 1834.

Ordered that *William Smith* be appointed *secretary of the Board of Health*, *Waterloo*, near *Fort Erie*, August 27, 1834.

Resolution transmitted to *Charles Richardson*: that the *temporary Cholera Hospital* built at *Fort Erie* in 1832 is out of repair and useless and should be sold at public auction for money to be refunded to the *District Treasury*.

Letter from *William Smith*, *Fort Erie*, Bertie, October 20, 1834. A survey was made by Messrs. *Fell* and *Clement* of the front concession of Bertie, on the lands of *W. Forsyth*, *Colonel Arthur Jones* and *Lieutenant Jones*. An old boundary line fence was thrown down, and an old road to the concession in the rear encumbered. The boundary as fixed is legal. Part of the church land was taken away at *Waterloo*. If removing the fence is illegal, Forsyth and Jones can replace the fence until another survey of the township be ordered.

Mary Dolan, aged 72 years, has no means and is an object of charity. Pray that she be placed on the pauper's list. Signed: *John Anderson* (missionary at *Fort Erie*), *W. Anthony* (JP), *Cyrenius Hall, John Douglas, James Kerby, William Smith* and *Edmund Riselay*. [Rejected.]

John Cole, Louth. Suffered a paralytic stroke, for 2 years is nearly blind and infirm, and unable to labour or maintain himself. Has no friends to apply to. Prays for assistance, October 19, 1834. [Rejected.]

Richard Forest, St. Catharines. Has supported an orphan **Frances Lynch**, 2 years old, from August 19, 1833 to the present. He received $\pounds 2.5.6\frac{1}{2}$ from the benevolent of the village, but leaves a balance due of $\pounds 7.19.3\frac{1}{2}$. The child is not endowed with proper senses. The parents had just arrived as emigrants and were carried off by the **cholera** in 1832. They were miserably poor and left it no means of support. Petitioner must labour to support his own family, prays for an allowance for the child, October 20, 1834. **Dr. F. Converse**: has known the child since birth, has always been sickly, does not talk and doesn't possess the mental powers common to a child of its' age.

Affidavit of *Dr. F.L. Converse*: the child referred to in the petition of *Richard Forest* appears to be insane since birth, October 25, 1834.

Valentine Ward, a debtor in gaol for five weeks. Has no means to support himself in gaol. Circumstances preclude the possibility of sustenance coming on the petitioner. Begs for an allowance, August 7, 1834. [Rejected October 22, 1834.]

Harvey L. Wilkins, debtor in gaol. Has been in close confinement by order of the sheriff. His health has been declining since the weather changed, it is very warm and the proximity of the "gaol necessary" is a "situation truly insufferable." Petitioner is 19 years of age, his constitution and strength are totally inadequate to the cruel treatment to which he is now doomed "and consequently dayly giveing way under his sufferings." Destruction of his constitution. Prays for the liberty of the hall with the other debtors. Affidavit of *Sheriff*: petitioner is confined on criminal charges.

Inhabitants of Bertie labour under the want of a *bridge* on the road between the Niagara River and the *Limestone Ridge* across the commonly called "*Frenchmen's Creek*" on Concession 2. £12 plus our own exertion will get the bridge across. Signed *John Anderson, James Kerby, W. Anthony, Alexander Douglas, Henry Bowen, Jonathan Thompson, Jacob Dammer, Philip Buck, A.F. Meyer, John Riselay, Edward Riselay, W. Smith, William Bowen, John Lester.* Filed October 21, 1834. Referred to committee and rejected for want of funds, October 22, 1834.

File 17A-22. Road and Bridge Reports.

Charles Fell, Pelham Square, July 7, 1834. Has reviewed the line for a road between Grantham and Thorold. The ground is generally level, needs little labour to make a good road 66 feet wide. Opposite lots 18-21 Concession 10 Grantham. [Sketch attached.] Filed October 21. Report referred. The report confirmed, but altered to not interfere with the garden on lots 41 and 42 in Thorold. £23.15.0. paid out of the District Treasury in favour of *John DeCew*.

File 17A-23.

John George Bridges, Niagara, gentleman. Charged with practicing medicine without a licence. Defendant is of wicked mind and disposition, has deceived His Majesty's subjects. Employed by liege subjects under the pretence of skill in physic surgery and midwifery, August 20, 1834. True bill: John Kidd (foreman.) Witnesses: John Wagstaff, Dr. Telfer. John George Bridges appeared in court. Indictment and matters not sufficient in law, is not bound by the law of the land to answer the same and prays the charges be dismissed and that he be dismissed. Alexander Wilkinson, attorney for the King. Says the indictment is good and sufficient for Bridges to answer. Prays for judgement. Demurrer: Ridout and Claus (nay), Smith, Butler, McDougall, Ball, Clement and Bradshaw (yea.) Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall, April 9: John George Bridges £50, sureties Johnson Clench and Ralfe Clench £25 each. Recognizance of Dr. Telfer and John Wagstaff £10 each. Evidence of Dr. Telfer, surgeon, April 7: Bridges has practiced physic without a licence for gain for one year last past. Evidence of John Wagstaff, April 9: paid £2 for his services as family physician in December last. Practiced on Ellen Wagstaff December 1-6, 1833. John George Bridges declines to say anything until the matter appears before the court.

Johnson Clench, Niagara. Charged with assault and battery against Dr. Walter Telfer, Niagara, surgeon, on August 14, 1834. Witnesses: Walter Telfer. Evidence taken before Daniel McDougall on August 16: Clench assaulted Telfer on August 14. Recognizance: Johnson Clench £10, surety Charles Fields, Niagara, labourer, £5. Fined £2.10.0. paid to William Clarke, costs £1.0.9. paid to Dr. Telfer. Defendant discharged from recognizance October 23, 1834.

John Green, Thorold, shoemaker. Charged with larceny, stealing one cotton umbrella (value 2/-) the property of *Joseph Badgley*, Thorold, innkeeper, on September 6, 1834. No bill: *John Kidd*

(foreman.) Witnesses: Joseph Badgley, *Luke Carroll*. Evidence of Badgley: the umbrella was stolen from a wagon standing under *Wyldes shed* at *St. Johns* and secreted at the house of *Daniel Brown* of Thorold where Green lives. Search warrant issued September 17. Recognizance taken before *Jacob Keefer* on September 18: John Green and Daniel S. Brown £5 each.

John Martindale, Grantham, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against David Thompson, Niagara, yeoman, on May 11, 1834. Witnesses: David Thompson. Evidence of David Thompson: was at the inn of John Graham, defendant struck him in the stomach and his clothes were torn. Recognizance taken before James Muirhead May 11: David Thompson £10; John Martindale £10, sureties Andrew Heron and Walter Elliot £5 each. Nolle prosequi, October 22, 1834.

File 17A-27.

John McKay, Queenston, labourer. Charged with obstructing the highway on September 5, 1834, by placing a dead hog in a putrid and stinking state which remained in the highway at Queenston for six hours. True bill: John Kidd (foreman.) Witnesses: Martha Wadsworth, Robert Grant. Evidence of Martha Wadsworth, wife of Chester Wadsworth, Queenston, innkeeper, taken before Robert Grant: In the afternoon of September 5, McKay (in the employ of Robert Hamilton) hauled a pig with his hoe and deposited it before the front porch on the sidewalk under the barroom window. This was to the great annoyance of the family and public. He was told to take it away and not leave it there. Recognizance taken before Robert Grant on September 6: John McKay £10, surelies Adam Brown and Barney Stanford, both of Queenston, labourers, £5 each. Plea: "guilty," fined 5/- and costs, to be locked up until paid. October 22, 1834.

File 17A-28.

Eneas John McMillan, Niagara, gentleman. Charged with assault and battery against *Thomas G. Burgess* on August 10, 1834. Witnesses: Thomas G. Burgess. Evidence taken August 19: Burgess was assaulted at the house of *Benjamin Harrington* at 9 pm. Recognizance taken before *John Alma*: Eneas John McMillan £25, sureties *Jared Stocking* and *John Grier* £12.10.0. each. McMillan fined £2.10.0. (paid to *William Clarke*) and 8/9- costs paid to plaintiff. In default of payment, sentenced to 10 days in gaol. Defendant discharged from recognizance on October 23, 1834.

John B. Lamarsh Sr., Niagara and John B. Lamarsh Jr, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing a pig (value 5/-) the property of *Casper Coris*, Niagara, yeoman on August 14, 1834. No bill: John Kidd (foreman.) Witnesses: Casper Coris, *William M. Ball, Joseph Piett* [alias Payette.] Evidence taken before John C. Ball on August 14: Joseph Payette of Niagara, labourer, saw defendants take the pig which was killed but not dressed; pig was taken into a room at Lamarsh's, found them in the act of scalding the pig. His wife said to say nothing of it. Suspects it was stolen. Evidence of Casper Coris, the pig was taken, he suspects Lamarsh. Recognizance taken: John B. Lamarsh Sr. and Jr, £10 each, sureties *William S. Servos* and *Gilbert Anderson* £5 each.

Francis J. O'Conner, Niagara, labourer, Charged with larceny, stealing a silver watch (value 15/-) the property of *Francis Medcalf*, Niagara, shoemaker, on May 7, 1834. Witnesses: Francis Medcalf. Evidence of Francis Medcalf taken before **Daniel McDougall**: the watch taken was #2051. Was at home, around 8 pm, and O'Conner asked to see the watch. He then kept it concealed and refused to give it up. Today he denied taking it. It is concealed either in the house of *Samuel Nisbit* or in the brick house of *John McNabb*. May 9, was at the rooms of *James Ramsay* in Niagara when O'Conner came in. Asked to come to the room and look at some [---------]. They went in, asked his wife to find some [-----] and she said she couldn't find them. They sat down. O'Conner asked the time, it was 8:30. He asked to see the markings on the watch, a Dublin watch #2051 made by William Barrow. He asked to see it. I gave it to his wife, she went to the back room and came back without the watch. I said to O'Conner "don't you mean to give me my watch back again?" He said "I don't have it" and pushed me out of doors. I went to Talbots, came back and the door was fast. I asked for my watch which was refused. Medcalf went home to bed. The next morning he asked for his watch again. O'Conner said he didn't know about it, "be off about your business." Between 2 and 3 O'Conner was in the room at Ramsays, Medcalf was watching by McDougall's. He heard the window raise up and saw the watch lowered down by the arm of a grown woman. He sat until a child of Ramsay brought in the watch, gave it to **Donelly** the constable. He knew the watch as his own. Had a pint of liquor. Believes he handed the watch to O'Conner. Evidence of *Susannah Westguard* (alias *Ramsay*), taken May 9: Was at the house of her stepfather, James Ramsay. Francis Medcalf came in at 7 pm, he had been drinking but could walk and talk sensibly. O'Conner came in, asked him to come and see some [barrels?] His wife opened a chest and said she couldn't find them. He asked the time and to see the watch &c. Evidence of John Way: knows Susannah Westguard (alias Ramsay). She stole butter at his shop. He wouldn't believe her on oath, May 7, 1834. Evidence of Mary Ann O'Conner, daughter of the prisoner. She saw Francis Medcalf was drunk, Mrs. Westguard's child (5 years old) brought in the watch which was found under Susannah Westguard's window. Evidence of John Talbot: he parted Medcalf and O'Conner who were fighting. He went away. Medcalf followed, he was drunk but able to walk and talk and said he was robbed of a watch at the house of O'Conner. Westguard not a reliable witness, guilty of stealing. Evidence of Francis O'Conner: did not take the watch. Recognizance taken June 9: Francis Medcalf £10; Francis J. O'Conner £10, sureties John Talbot and Francis Proctor £5 each. [Prosecutor dead, nolle prosequi ordered October 22, 1834. Costs 11/3-.]
