

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Introduction.

General Quarter Sessions of the Peace.

The General Quarter Sessions of the Peace was a court of record originally established in England as early as the reign of the "Black Prince" Edward III. "Keepers of the Peace" were first created by statute in 1327 (Act 1, Edw. III, statute 2 c. 16), and by 1350 they were required by law to hold sessions in every county four times in a year. Under legislation passed in March 1361, these laymen became known as "Justices of the Peace". The jurisdiction of this court was extended to the trying of all felonies and trespasses, although the commissions to the justices provided that in case of difficulties no judgments would be delivered except in the presence of a justice of the Court of King's Bench or Common Pleas or a judge of the assize (34 Edw. III c. 1). By convention the Sessions did not try cases any greater than simple felonies, nor did it have jurisdiction over cases of forgery and perjury; more serious crimes, capital felonies such as murder, burglary and treason could not be tried under the Sessions of the Peace but rather were reserved for the Assizes. The Justices of the Peace could try inferior cases without a jury. The court heard all cases which involved property above £10 but not exceeding £30. In Medieval England it appears that the Quarter Sessions in certain cases could exercise their power with a death penalty although the court ceased to do this during the 16th century.²

The Quarter Sessions was a court with which the Loyalists would have been familiar since it had been established in the American provinces since the 17th century. The first Quarter Sessions was held in the Province of Quebec in October 1764. The court was formally established under the Quebec Act of 1774 and confirmed by an ordinance dated March 4, 1777. Hence before the creation of Upper Canada the first Quarter Sessions for Niagara technically fell within the jurisdiction of the Montreal District.³ Legislation which repealed certain parts of the Quebec Act also confirmed other established institutions, such as the courts, upon the creation of the Province of Upper Canada in 1791.⁴

Blackstone described the scope of this Court as determining "the smaller misdemesnors against the public or commonwealth, not amounting to felony; and especially offences relating to the game, highways, alehouses, bastard children, the settlement and provision for the poor, vagrants, servants wages, apprentices, and popish recusants." If the crime was of sufficient seriousness it could be removed by writ from the Quarter Sessions to the Court of King's Bench.

The times for the sittings of this court was also determined by legislation. Under 2 Hen. V c. 4 (1413-14), it was required that the Sessions be held in every County once in every quarter during the first week after Michaelmas day (September 29th), the first week after Epiphany (January 6th), the first week after the close of Easter and in the week after the translation of Saint Thomas Becket or "Saint Thomas the Martyr" (July 7th.) Therefore three of the four court sittings fell at regularly determinate dates each and every year with the exception of Easter term which could

vary between the end of March and early May depending upon when the holiday was observed. The first Quarter Sessions in Niagara were held at Navy Hall, but moved to the Council Chamber in the 1790's. Under legislation passed in Upper Canada the Sessions were to be held at the Court House in the town of Niagara on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. These times were found to be inconvenient for the conduct of business and in March 1830 the court dates were fixed at the fourth Tuesday in January and March, the second Tuesday in July and the third Tuesday in October.⁷

Special Sessions and adjournments for the further conduct of business could be scheduled by a quorum of the magistrates. On one occasion in 1804 a Special Sessions dealing with a liquor violation was held in Grimsby, and at least one General Session of the Peace was permitted to be held in Grimsby by an act of the legislature during the summer of 1815.8

Furthermore, the court had to be held before two or more justices of the peace whose authority was granted to them by a commission of the peace as well as by statute. Justices were not to be held punishable for their actions in Sessions unless it could be proved that it was a "manifest act of oppression or willful abuse of power." The records or rolls of the Sessions were to be committed to the custody of one of the justices who was known as the *custos rotulorum* and who was the principal civil officer in the county. The Clerk of the Peace for the County normally served as the "sufficient deputy" in the place of the *custos rotulorum*.

In order to hold the Sessions it was necessary for the following parties to appear in addition to the two justices and the Clerk of the Peace: 1) the sheriff and/or his deputy 2) the coroners 3) constables 4) the gaoler 5) jurors 6) all persons to answer charges, prosecute or give evidence. Jurors were to be notified by the sheriff to appear in court based upon a precept or order made out by any two justices at least fifteen days before the court date.

The Sessions were empowered to levy fines for the punishment of crimes as well as for contempt such as non-attendance by jurors. The Sessions were also empowered to commit persons to gaol for punishment, for contemptuous behaviour in court, or for non-payment of fines. Note, however, that the Sessions did not hold a commission for general gaol delivery, nor could the magistrates sentence any person convicted of a crime to the penitentiary for a period longer than two years.

The Quarter Sessions was the main government institution responsible for local district administration down to 1841. The court heard criminal matters and breaches of the peace including assaults, misdemeanours and petit larceny. It also held jurisdiction over the following areas: the establishment of divisions for the Court of Requests, appointment of Justices of the Peace, the levy of special tax rates for local improvements, approval and funding for road and bridge repairs, maintenance of public offices such as the Court and jail, Surrogate Court and Land Registry office, assigning gaol limits, the appointment and fees for a High Constable and a local

constabulary, determining a salary for the gaoler, confirmation of the appointment or election of town and township officials, regulatation of pound keeper's fees, the maintenance of the insane, blind, deaf and indigent inhabitants of the district, regulation of the price of bread, appointment of inspectors of weights and measures, establishment of fire regulations, appointment of a market clerk, approval over by-laws for the prevention of animals running at large, payment for wolf scalps, trial of cases involving the seizure of contraband goods, approval of tavern, shop and still licences, the granting of certificates which permitted the solemnization of marriage by Non-Conformist clergy, and the granting of certificates in the case of the death of a subscribing witness to a deed or other document in order that the document could be registered. During the late 1790's the magistrates in Quarter Sessions could hear evidence of Loyalty and recommend names to be enrolled on the UEL list, and after 1806 the court issued affidavits of identity or parentage for land petitions. It was noted by Riddell that the powers of the Quarter Sessions in England were more circumscribed, limited mainly to matters involving highways and bridges, poor laws, the care of illegitimate children, servants and the regulation of wages. The powers extended to the Quarter Sessions in Upper and Lower Canada "had no precedent in England." ¹⁰

The first major legislative change to the Quarter Sessions occurred in 1841 when the chairman of the Sessions also served as District Court judge. In 1868-69 the quarterly sittings of the court was changed to a semi-annual sitting and the name of the court itself was changed to the Court of General Sessions of the Peace. In 1909 the authority of the court was extended to "try all criminal offences except homicide" as well as crimes listed under Section 583 of the Criminal Code of Canada. The court could also hear appeals for summary convictions (*Statutes of Ontario* 1909 c. 30.) In 1933 some of the powers of the court were transferred to the County Courts, and in 1984 the remaining powers of the General Sessions of the Peace became integrated within the District Courts of Ontario.

For a summation of the general proceedings of the Sessions see Appendix "A," taken from W.C. Keele's *The Provincial Justice or Magistrate's Manual* (1851.)

According to Carnochan, the first gaol in Niagara was built in 1795 "on a spot known as Graham's Hotel, the Black Swan, opposite the Rectory and Masonic Hall." It is said that as many as 300 prisoners were confined within its walls, charged with disloyalty, in 1812. The building was set ablaze by hot shot from Fort Niagara on the day of the Battle of Queenston Heights and totally destroyed. Tenders were advertised for the new Court House, which later became famous as Miss Rye's "Western Home," in the *Niagara Spectator* in May 1816. Construction on this new building commenced under contractor Josiah Cushman and the structure was completed in 1817. It served as the District gaol until it was replaced by the St. Catharines jail built on Niagara Street in 1864.

NOTE: This publication was designed to serve strictly as a guide and index to the original records and is intended primarily for historical and genealogical research purposes. The records have not

been transcribed *verbatim*, and due to the overall length of this publication some details have necessarily been omitted. For this reason, and also due to possible errors in the interpretation of the 19th century script, it is recommended that researchers consult the actual documents.

These records comprise part of the RG22-372 series, Lincoln County Court, General Quarter Sessions of the Peace Records, held by the Archives of Ontario. Researchers must submit a stacks request in person in the main reading room at the Archives of Ontario, or through a telephone request, including the box and year. Thus, for example, if a researcher wishes to see the Criminal Calendar of Prisoners confined in the Niagara jail in July 1829--a document which was filed during the October sessions of that year--a request would be submitted for RG22-372 box 4, Lincoln County Court General Sessions of the Peace, October 1829.

These records are no longer stored on-site at the Archives of Ontario at 77 Grenville Street, Toronto. Any request for these records should be submitted by researchers at least one day prior to their intended visit to the Archives.

The index for this volume does not refer to page numbers, but rather to the actual file in which the name or subject matter is found. For example, the first reference to Ralfe Clench in this book is in the October sessions for 1835 in file 21-23.

Samuel Wiggins (Wainfleet.) February 17. One skin destroyed December 18, 1834, certified by **Amos Bradshaw**. Endorsed "Amount received from **Jeremiah Forrester**, collector."

Signed John Willson, James Cull and Benjamin Thorne. The road through the tannery yard is not now required for the public, but payment is withheld until the same is required for the benefit of the public, January 27, 1835.

Charles Gaylord, charged with assault and battery against *John Ryan*, October 27, 1834. Evidence of John Ryan, October 28: was struck down and abused by Gaylord at the house of *Ralph Truax*. Fined 5/- plus £1.2.3. costs, paid to *John Gilleland* and received by *John H. Clendennen*

Henry Clement Fralick, Thorold, labourer. Charged with striking and assaulting *Henry Hellems*, Thorold, on December 31, 1834. Fined 5/- plus £1.7.5. costs, January 2, 1835.

Henry Adley, Thorold, innkeeper. Charged with attempts to choke, kick and assault *John Ryan*, Thorold, on December 15, 1834. Fined 1/- plus 13/- costs, December 22, 1834.

William Coulter, Thorold, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Caleb Ingols* and *John Huntly*, Thorold, on October 31, 1834. Fined 20/- plus 23/9- costs, November 4, 1834.

Adam Fralick, Stamford, yeoman. Charged with assault against *John Rouse*, bailiff at the *Court of Requests*. Convicted before magistrate *Malcolm Laing*, Stamford, November 24, 1834. Fined £3 (paid to *William Clarke*) and 11/3- costs (paid to John Rouse.)

File 18-13. Convictions (J. Mewburn, JP, Stamford.)¹³

John Riley. Charged with larceny, stealing the horse of Patrick O'Donohue, Brantford, saddler, September 24, 1834. Evidence of John Riley: he met O'Donohue near the tavern, asked to see the horse in pasture. Left the horse, went to the distillery and asked for *Mr. Lennox*. Wanted to trade his horse for O'Donohue's horse. They went to the field and traded horses, agreed to a trade. Rode the horse quietly, went back to Lennox's with the halter. Complainant came in, said he'd be damned if he would not be cheated. He examined and went away with the horse. Evidence of Hiram Forsyth, mechanic. Was near the distillery, horses traded. He saw a completely raving mad man, who said he'd not be cheated. Evidence of **Joseph Brooks** (mason.) The horse trade was made at the mill door. He saw the complainant ride Riley's horse. They made a trade. He later came back, he said the horse had a snotty nose and wouldn't take it. Evidence of Patrick O'Donohue, Brantford, saddler. Is a native of Ireland. Was at the *Whirlpool Tayern* at noon. He met Mr. Roarback and asked to trade horses but Roarback had none to trade but "this man did." He said to wait until he had his drink, and would then show him the horse "but don't let master know." They traded horses, said to run through the woods and he'd meet him but to say nothing to the distiller. Black horse, worth \$15 and "\$5 to boot." Wished to try the horse. Defendant took the saddle, bridle and harness of the horse and put it on his own. Rode the horses to the distillery, met a man who said "are you trading?" Found the horse to be ailing, running at the nose and short of wind. The defendant was at the distillery, ran down a short road through the bush, came out with a halter in his hand. Said he wouldn't trade, swore he'd get knocked down if he didn't stand by it. The person who took the horse was named John, lives at the Whirlpool Hotel. Evidence of James Butler, miller at Oswald's Mill. Saw O'Donohue on a sorrel horse, then on a black one. He said "you've changed colour." O'Donohue said yes, he'd traded for John Riley's black horse. Evidence of Robert Gilchrist, blacksmith. Riley had a horse, he owned half and Thomas Oswald the other half. Riley sold the horse, but didn't know if the horse was glandered. Verdict: each party endeavoured to cheat the other. Complainant and defendant each to pay cost of witnesses &c. If the horse is glandered he is advised to return it and take back his own.

Edgar Berryman, charged with assault against Elijah Evitts, Stamford, mason on November 30, 1834. Evidence of Elijah Evitts taken December 1: at 1 or 2 o'clock he passed by *Mr. Russell's* chapel with an axe on his shoulder. Edgar Berryman, barefooted, came up and caught the axe, threatened to take his life by splitting his skull down. He struck at plaintiff twice, who avoided the blows by stepping back. Evidence of Edgar Berryman: plaintiff came to his house and told him about John McMicking. Was dizzy. Plaintiff was running away with the axe, I pursued him to the chapel. I asked him why he stole the axe from my house? 'Didn't my son pay you for it? If right, I will split your skull.' Evidence of William Berryman, taken December 2: Doesn't know the nature of an oath, sometimes reads the New Testament but never goes to church. If he tells a lie, he knows he will die and go to Hell but good boys go to Heaven. Said Evitts gave him an axe last winter, they gave him a quart of whiskey and his mother some money, also 1/- and three quarts of whiskey since. Evitts asked for whiskey again, and said he might keep the axe. 1/- each time to pay. He was always drunk in his father's house. Thinks the axe is worth 12/- York Cy. Offered \$1.00 for the axe which he refused. Evidence of *Andrew Murphy*: Evitts brought the axe to his house, he offered to buy it and was refused, said it cost 20/-. Evidence of Elijah Evitts: William Berryman had the axe 1 or 2 days last February. I received a quart of whiskey for the use of the axe. He doesn't remember being offered \$1.00 for the axe. Evidence of *Hiram Van*[--------]. He knows William Berryman, lived with him as an apprentice for 5 or 6 weeks. Doesn't know him to commit a dishonest act. Verdict: case involves two of the most drunken reprobates in the township. Berryman neglects his family and sets an evil example, never goes to a place of worship nor his family. William Berryman has a good character, though under 14 years of age, and so an oath could not be administered. Evitts was paid for the sale or loan of the axe with whiskey drunk and should have taken the axe back again. Berryman delivered the axe, offered 4/-York Cv. which was refused. The parties ordered to pay the costs between them as a small punishment for breaking the Sabbath.

Thomas Newton, Stamford, butcher. Charged with assault against Mary Offord. Evidence of Mary Offord, wife of William Offord, Stamford, storekeeper, taken December 30, 1834: Went to the shop of *Thomas Newton*, butcher, about 2 pm to purchase a heart. A dispute arose, said it was paid for by *Mr. Fido*. Newton said "damn you, clear out" and took the heart away from the little boy. She had not money to pay. Newton said "damn you, I will thrash you if you don't clear off." When she was on the street, he took a shovel full of beasts blood and straw from the floor and threw it on her three times, covered her from head to foot. She went away, but used no saucy language. Evidence of *John Hawkins*: He saw Newton throw on her outside the shop. Dispute arose over a beast's heart which he refused the boy since he had no money. The mother came back and took the heart and said "I'll pay you by and by." Newton refused, said he'd had enough. He flew into a passion, words followed about Mr. Fido. He told her to clear out, she refused until she pleased. She stepped to the door, and he said if she didn't clear out he'd throw blood. He threw three shovels full. She didn't use violent language. Evidence of *Robert Baker*: lodges at Offereds. Was witness to the events. The clothes were produced, a small quantity of blood was upon the apron, sleeve and cap. Not any great quantity. Evidence of *Thomas Newton*: Called a liar but Mary Offord lied about Mr. Fido. He desired her to go out of the way which she refused to do, and he threw dirt towards her. He has no other ill will towards her. Verdict: the assault was trifling, the clothes were spotted here and there with marks of blood and water. Baker proved the complainant refused to clear out. Newton cleaned the slaughter house at the time. The complainant is known in the village as a great abuser of all parties. The defendant to pay the costs and soap for washing the clothes. The complainant is advised to keep silence.

William Defield, Queenston. Charged with assault against *Edward Humphries*, Queenston, labourer, on November 28, 1834. Evidence of Edward Humphries taken at Queenston, November 29: deponent was at *Wynn's Tavern* at 7 pm. with *James* [*Roly*?] to see if Wynn would settle for

work done. William Defield was present, and asked the deponent to pay a loss [wager] on the weight of some hog which he lost. He answered 'why [when] he had paid would he do the same?' Defield threatened deponent and threw him out of doors, collared and pushed him out the bar room to the door, off the steps and onto the road. The defendant went away, the deponent went back to the bar. He was not drunk, nor perfectly sober. He had a few glasses of beer in the day. Evidence of James Roly: There was a dispute when Defield asked Humphries to pay his treat which was refused. Evidence of *William Beaven* [alias *Beven*], cyder merchant. Heard Defield say to "hold your tongue, or I will show you out." Evidence of *William Rose*, barkeeper: Heard men talking about a bet on hogs. Defield said Humphries owed him two treats. Humphries said Defield owed him the same. Humphries said "I'll pay for mine first and you second." Defield said "say no more about it." Evidence of *William Botsford*, Oxford, London District. Heard Humphries say to Defield "you lost the bet on the hogs." Defield said "be quiet, or I will put you out of doors" &c. Verdict: there was no riot or disorderly conduct, except for some oaths and bad language. William Defield ordered to pay costs \$3.00 and a fine \$4.00, \$4.00 to be used on the roads. Memorandum of fines: *Thomas Newton* \$2.00, William Defield \$4.00, *Ann Leech* \$5.00.

Evidence of *Andrew Pearce*, engineer, steam boat *United Kingdom*, taken November 29, 1834: deponent was due a note of £9 from George Portan's clerk for wages due. He presented a note, Portan violently tore it from his hand and it fell to the floor and he put the remainder in his pocket. Deponent picked up a piece, Portan said the note was of no use, that Mr. Hamilton wouldn't pay, there was a mistake of \$2.00, and drew another. Deponent tried to catch the old one of him. He has received \$14 since, and gave a note to *Mr. Cudney* for 14/6- drawn upon Portan. George Portan gave an order on Robert Hamilton, which he refused with oaths to pay. Warrant issued against Portan, who is bound over £50 to appear, sureties William Wynn and Chester Wadsworth of Oueenston, £25 each. George Portan lives or boards in Niagara Town, he is purser of the "United Kingdom." Case is a felony rather than a trespass. Pearce is bound to appear, but has no sureties. He works with Dr. Cross on the salt works at St. Catharines. The defendant (Portan) acknowledges taking the note. His impression was that it gave a higher amount than R. Hamilton would allow. He expressed regret at his rashness and impropriety. He paid money to the complainant two or three times, and gave an order on Mr. Hamilton for £9 but deducted the sums paid and three weeks board for complainant's son at a half dollar per week. Paid cash £2.4.6., board 7/6- per week, total £2.12.0. Balance due Pearce from the £9 note equals £6.8.0. Verdict: Mr. Portan to pay the fees of the magistrate and constable, and to be discharged when the sum [balance due to Pearce?] is paid. Nolle prosequi ordered, the defendant discharged by proclamation January 29, 1835.

File 18-14. Correspondence.

Letter from *Smith Griffin* to *Charles Richardson*, *Smithville*, December 27, 1834. Encloses list of *Commissioners for the 8th Division*. In my hurry with other business it was overlooked. I can supply you with a barrel of hams and good beef.

Letter from *Charles Richardson* to *John Clark*, House of Assembly, January 17, 1835. I will be absent from the Quarter Sessions due to so much business of importance in the house. Appoint my deputy, *Mr. Hall*, in my place.

Letter from *John Alma* to *Charles Hall*, January 21, 1835. *Captain Weston* called regarding a man committed for enticing soldiers of the *15th Regiment* to desert. The Magistrates refused to try him, as a matter for the Assizes. The chief evidence (private *Enoch Evans*) will certainly leave in May when the detachment is relieved. Can the matter be brought forward, or order sent to another country? The next Assizes will be held January 28th.

Should have gone before the Grand Jury, recognizance of prosecutors ordered estreated, January 29, 1835.

Evidence of *James Farman*, Waterloo, Bertie, innkeeper. On October 29, 1834 *Charles L. Fowler* and *James D. Liscom* were in the bar. Fowler asked for two glasses of liquor, offered a \$10 *Bank of Upper Canada* note to be changed, which I could not. Fowler and Liscom sat by the fire, and asked for cards which I did not have. Liscom went out, I said the brandy was not paid for. He said Fowler would pay. Fowler was much intoxicated, and I searched his pockets. I took £4.11.3. but the \$10 note was not there. Believed that Liscom took it.

Malcolm Laing to *Chester Wadsworth*, constable, Queenston. Upon the oath of *William Wyller*, Niagara, gentleman: that *Hannah Wright*, alias *Quackenbush*, Queenston, passed a forged \$5 note (*Boston North Bank*) in the store of *Mr. Guild* on November 5. She denied it. Warrant to apprehend Wright, dated December 9, 1834.

John Alma to Chester Wadsworth, constable. Upon the oath of Clarke Gamble: that Freeman Hochkiss, Axy Hochkiss, Lucinda Hawkins, Daniel B. Servos (et. al.) were employed in forging and uttering forged notes of the Bank of Upper Canada. Plates and forged notes in their possession. Warrant to apprehend them and bring them to me to answer the charges, December 5, 1834.

Robert Grant to **Chester Wadsworth**, constable. Upon the oath of **Robert Laird**, Thorold, grocer. That a bundle of goods- calicoes, dimitty shawls, caps and Scotch bonnets were stolen from his wagon on November 22, 1834 and secreted in the store house of **Adam Brown (Front Street, Queenston)** occupied by **Mark Bishopbrick**, **George Kirkland** and **Daniel Baker**. Alexander Nickerson, paid £3 to remunerate him for taking care of a person in the employ of **Mr. Street**, whose leg was broken by a wagon load running over him. Has been in Nickerson's house 41 days, signed **Henry Griffin** (foreman), January 29, 1835.

Recommended that a road be laid out and kept in repair in Bertie and Humberstone (the division line). See the 3rd section of the Act regarding Public Highways, signed *Henry Griffin* (foreman), January 29, 1835.

Gaol was visited, much might be done for the prisoners at little extra cost and won't interfere with justice. There are no beds for most debtors and criminals, who sleep on the floor. Harsh treatment and a waste of bedding. Recommend that iron bedsteads be procured. Must prevent the collection of filth and vermin. Criminal cells are poorly ventilated. Necessary from the number sleeping in each cell, 4, 6 &c. The prisoners have no complaints of the gaolers' treatment, only the ill arrangement of the building and the want of a change of bedding. *Mr. Wheeler* says it can't be done for want of blankets. Sound clothing ordered for some nearly naked prisoners. A barbarous law to imprison men for debt. Signed *Henry Griffin*, *Orson Phelps*, *William W. Raincock*, *Samuel Moore*, *Adam Brown*, *Walter Willson*, *John Stewart*, *Peter Cain*, *William C. Chase*, *Peter Drummond*, *John Balfour*, *Wynn*, *Charles Anderson*.

Bertie, December 1, 1834. At a special sessions held at *Waterloo* on November 27, before *William Smith*, *Alexander Douglas* and *James Kerby*. The pathmasters are ordered to open a road between *Captain John Baxter's* and *Samuel Sherk's* on the line between Bertie and Humberstone.

Messrs. *Christie*, *Wood* and *Darling* ordered to be commissioners to expend £15 on the bridge and road in Grantham (Lot 21 Concession 1) in *Mr. Ball's* report, January 28, 1835.

The *Clerk of the Peace* ordered to represent to the Executive of the delay and evasion of justice when the forfeiture of recognizance ordered is not carried into effect by officers, January 29, 1835.

The *Gaol Committee* empowered to contract for a new gaol roof, January 29, 1835.

The order to empower the *sheriff* to furnish the gaol with necessaries is rescinded, and to be put into the hands of the *Gaol Committee*, January 29, 1835.

Report of *Gaol Committee*, signed by *Thomas Butler*, January 28, 1835: cells are clean and comfortable, debtors have no complaints. Some prisoners complain of an insufficiency of food. Fuel (wood) purchased is of an inferior quality, thrown carelessly about the yard.

£50 ordered to be retained in the hands of the Treasurer for committee accounts.

The report of the Grand Jury on the state of the gaol referred to the *Gaol Committee*, January 29, 1835.

Property held by *Daniel McDougall* in a suit against *Henry P. Turner* (charge, larceny) to be delivered to *Jacob Kenniff*, prosecutor. No bill found, the property acknowledged to be that of Mr. Kenniff, January 28, 1835.

Recommended *Harrison Thompson*, kept an inn in the house of *William Anthony*. He only kept it a short time, the house is kept by Anthony himself and is no better than that of Wintermute. Recommends that their licences not be renewed.

Bertie on the Niagara River, December 26, 1834. The house of *Alexander Wintermute* is a very disorderly and indecent grog shop. "Not containing any comfortable accommodations for travellers, either for man or beast, and has been a haunt for drunkards and tipplers of the neighbourhood, whose families are left to suffer." There is no necessity for this inn, Wintermute is intemperate and abusive. *Mr. Anthony*, called a "grocery," he is equally intemperate but not so abusive. Letter from *William Anthony* to *Daniel McDougall*, Bertie, January 25, 1835. *Alexander Wintermute* has been complained of by petition of keeping a disorderly inn. I reside a quarter mile away and frequently pass his inn. I don't see any disorderly conduct. He has gone to great expense to build a commodious house and sheds. Some names on the petition were on that recommending him. Pray look into this business.

Jane Goodfellow, Niagara, widow. Has had a licence for a tavern in Niagara for two years. Has a commodious house some distance from the town. Has laid out large sums to repair the house, build sheds for horses. Has kept it clean, so no fault may be found. Has good and wholesome provisions. Some persons came near and made a noise which she put a stop to, but was never disorderly. Is a poor widow with a large family. Prays for a licence for one year. If refused it will ruin her prospects, poverty will stare them in the face, January 23, 1835. Recommended by A.W. Secord, Daniel Secord, Robert Rist, Jared Stocking, Walter Willson, Matthew Dobie, Walter Elliott, Bernard Roddy, John Meneilly, Johnson Clench, Benjamin [Campbell]¹⁷, Daniel Cook, George Upper, Alexander Rogers, John Campbell, Peter Cockel, Dalexeander Benard. Adam Brown, Queenston, yeoman. Charged with keeping a nuisance, January 27, 1835. Presentment attached signed by *Henry Griffin*. Witnesses: *Robert Hamilton*. Brown permits a mare to run at large, which has a bad and infectious disorder. He sets a bad example. Costs 15/-.

John Brown, Stamford, labourer (a man of colour). Charged with larceny, stealing a \$5.00 Bank of Upper Canada or Commercial Bank note (value £1.5.0.) the property of Horace Reed, Stamford, labourer, on July 14, 1834. Witnesses: Horace Reed. Evidence of Horace Reed taken before William Duff, July 14. Evidence of John Brown: defendant says he did not steal the note. The money he spent was from work, was paid 3/9- by Mr. Cummings, and gave the clerk \$1.00 to change. Spent 6/9- on drink, has 1/8- change. Committed to gaol July 15, 1834. Evidence of John H. Oakley: saw John Brown with money. He gave \$1.00 to take 3/9- from it, thinks he had more bills in his hand. Couldn't change the bill, the prisoner said not to mind and he paid in silver instead. The prisoner was sober. He paid 7½d later from the \$1.00 bill. Witness went and got the change, said he had more than one bill in his hand. Evidence of Ransom Hooper: the prisoner gave him \$1.00 to change to pay for liquor worth 1/-. He doesn't recall other bills in his hand. Recognizance taken: Horace Reed £5, surety Samuel Hicks £2.10.0. John H. Oakley and Ransom

Hooper £2.10.0. each. Recognizance of defendant, prosecution and sureties estreat, January 29, 1835.

Elizabeth Campbell, Niagara, femme covert. Charged with larceny, stealing an umbrella and other goods (value 5/-) the property of Mary Greenless, Niagara, femme covert, on April 22, 1834. Witness: Mary Greenless. Evidence of Mary Greenless taken before Daniel McDougall, April 29: also had 2/6- cash stolen (two of our dollars, the Bank of Upper Canada, and a United States silver half-dollar) from the house of Mary Smiley at Niagara by defendant. Alexander Campbell of Niagara, labourer, did receive the umbrella and money knowing it to be stolen. Evidence of Mary Smiley: found the bills and gave them to Campbell to give to Greenless. Doesn't know if she gave them to her or not. The umbrella was in her house, and taken by Campbell. Evidence of Eliza Campbell: received \$6.00 from Mary Smiley. Her husband took \$2.00 for a window broken by Greenless, \$4.00 was laid on the table. Greenless took it, and the umbrella was taken in confusion. Evidence of Alexander Campbell: received \$2.00 and gave it back to my wife. Recognizance taken: Mary Greenless, Eliza and Alexander Campbell £20, Mary Smiley £10. All recognizance estreats.

File 18-32.

John Cole, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing an axe (value 5/-) the property of Joseph Wynn, Queenston, on January 9, 1835. Witnesses: William Defield, John Richard [Clarady?] a boy of colour. Warrant to apprehend John Cole issued by Robert Grant, Queenston, to constable William Wadsworth on the oath of William Defield, gentleman, January 9, 1835. The axe was taken from the yard of Joseph Wynn. Evidence of John Richard Clarady: is in the employ of Joseph Wynn. Between sunrise and 8 am he was at the house of Joseph Southward of Queenston. Cole, a stranger, came in with an axe which he knew to belong to Wynn from the mark on the helve. He told Defield, they found the axe at Southwards. The man left, said he'd go down the river to see if he could get across. Clarady went to Mr. Eastham's to look for the man, and Mr. Defields went to Mr. Humphries where he found him. Evidence of William Defield, gentleman, Queenston: Lives with the family of Joseph Wynn, and is in charge of business when Wynn is gone. Clarady came in when I was at breakfast and said a stranger had stolen an axe. He said he I came we could catch him and bring him back. We went out and found the axe but the man was gone. Mr. Southward said he'd gone to the ferry to see when he could cross as the ice was running. We found him at Mr. Humphries' grocery and told him he must come to Mr. Grant's. Asked him when he got the axe? No immediate answer, then said he took it from the yard in order to earn a few shillings for food. He said he knew he was wrong to take it, and fell on his knees, said he has a wife and five children. Said if he was let go, he would never do it again. Recognizance £10 to appear. Evidence of John Cole: took an axe to get enough to earn shillings for food and get across the river. He was intent on returning it. He asked an old gentleman nearby where he could get an axe, he said he supposed from Wynn's yard. Evidence of *Edward Defield*: was in Wynn's yard at the woodpile at sunrise. He went for a hickory stick to make a roller for a sleigh. A stranger, John Cole, came up and asked where Mr. Humphries lived? I showed him the house, but nothing was said about the axe. Recognizance £10 to appear. Defendant arraigned, plea: "guilty." Sentenced to one month in gaol.

James Dunn, Grantham, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Mrs. Dunn* his wife, on January 10, 1835. True bill: *Henry Griffin* (foreman.) Witnesses: *Kenneth Reach*. Grand Jury presentment attached. Bench warrant to issue. Recognizance estreats, April 12, 1835.

File 18-34.

James Farman, Bertie, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against John Fox, Bertie, fisherman, on November 26, 1834. Witnesses: John Fox. Letter of William Smith to Charles Richardson, Waterloo, Fort Erie, January 19, 1835: the bearer, Mr. Farman, goes to Niagara to retain counsel for his father in an assault case. John Fox much wishes to settle. Copies were given of the complaint and recognizance and notes of the testimony. No malice prepense or felonious intention aforethought, although James Kerby is in the opinion that it is. I would be glad to have a line if the matter can be arranged without litigation. I will be in Niagara with the witnesses next Monday. Liscom's case, in gaol for stealing \$10 of Mr. Fowler, has left the country. There is only circumstantial evidence. Letter of *Charles Hall* to *William Smith*, January 22, 1835. Your letter to me by Mr. Farman, for consultation on the nature of the charge. It is an aggravated assault, and an attempt to commit a felony. It rests with the justices whether it be referred to the Sessions for prosecution by indictment. The Statute gives justices discretionary power. There was an assault and lifting an axe in a menacing manner. A blow was made but it didn't hit plaintiff, but a witness can prove to the contrary that an axe was not used at all. Mr. Kerby thought it could not be tried, as it was a felony. Evidence of John Fox taken before William Smith November 26: Farman struck a blow at me with an axe, seized hold of me and struck me a blow with his fist. Recognizance taken, John Fox, £20, sureties Alexander Adams, John MacRae, Alexander Spence and John Somerville £20 each. Warrant issued by William Smith to apprehend James Farman, Recognizance taken November 27: James Farman £20; parties allowed to settle on payment of costs and discharged.

File 18-35.

Henry Greenfield alias Sylvester Greenfield, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery by *Ellen Peterson*, wife of *David Peterson*, Stamford, on November 7, 1834. Witnesses: Ellen Peterson, Salome Oswald, Peter Middaugh. Evidence of Ellen Peterson taken before John **Mewburn** and **John Lemon**: at sunset on November 7 she saw a man in the orchard eating an apple. The deponent went out to milk and he went to sit on a stone close to the house where two children were, ie, her sister's child aged 8 and her own child aged 6 years. They screamed and she ran to them. The prisoner got up and ran across the field to the road. The eldest child said he was going to kill her. Evidence of Salome, wife of *Thomas Oswald*, distiller. She was at Peterson's and saw the prisoner in the orchard. She was afraid of him from his expression. The prisoner was loitering about, 2 yards from the door. Mrs. Peterson went out and the children and the door was left partly open. The deponent closed the door. Both children screamed. Deponent went out and saw the prisoner brutally and indecently behaving toward the elder child, biting the child in her private parts. She pulled the child away, the prisoner still holding on with his teeth. She endeavoured to beat him off, until Mr. Peterson, who was ill in bed, arose from his bed on which the prisoner left hold of the child. He rose from the floor on which he was laid and walked away. Examined the child and found marks upon her. Witness called fore help. Evidence of Henry Greenfield: prisoner refused to give any account of himself and seldom answers any question put to him. His face is pale, his tongue white, his pulse full and quick---symptoms of derangement. Signed J. Mewburn. Evidence of Peter Middaugh, Stamford, farmer: he was at his mother's house near Peterson's. He heard screams and cries. He ran up and saw the prisoner run across the brook. He seized a club from the fence and struck the prisoner who had a small dirk in his hand. He clinched the prisoner and held him until Mr. Peterson came down and tied the prisoner with a [---- -----.] Evidence of *John Barnes*, son of *Cornelius Barnes*, of Stamford. He was driving a wagon about sunset, and saw Peter Middaugh take the prisoner who wanted to get into my wagon. Evidence of a child, *Henny Butcher*, an eight year old daughter of *Henry Butcher*, of Stamford, very timid and shy. Was not called upon to give testimony but was visited afterwards. An intimate examination produced so much agitation and alarm that it was judged unnecessary to proceed further. The father bound to appear. Recognizance taken: *James Oswald*, innkeeper, *Thomas Oswald*, *Peter Middaugh* £10 each. Defendant discharged by proclamation. Recognizance of prosecutor and witness estreats.

Leonard Hicks, Niagara, labourer, a man of colour. Charged with keeping a disorderly house. Keeps a disorderly house on lot 284 in the town of Niagara and harbours women of ill fame, disturbs the peace of the neighbourhood and the public peace, October 23, 1834. Grand Jury presentment signed by John Kidd, Swayze, Jesse Lacey, Matthew Thomas, James Ker, Robert Wilkerson, Jacob Vanderburgh, Dr. Walter Telfer, Samuel Hopkins, Hill, Joseph Burgar, John Radcliffe. True bill: Henry Griffin (foreman.) Witness: William Duff Miller. Letter from Thomas Butler: due to the short notice of the prosecution, Hicks is unable to procure witnesses before tomorrow. One, William Lee, resides in the country and he cannot safely proceed without the witness. If allowed, we will subpoena the witness immediately for tomorrow. Verdict: "guilty." Recognizance: Hicks £50 and to find two sureties of £10 each for good behavior for one year. Sentenced to one month close confinement.

William Riley, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing 2 pieces of silver coin, value 1/- and ½d, the property of *Josiah Brown*, on November 13, 1834. No bill: *Henry Griffin* (foreman.) Witnesses: Josiah Brown, *Joseph Pickard*. Discharged January 28, 1835.

Charles Santee, Grantham, labourer (coloured man.) Charged with larceny, stealing 2 fowls (value 1/-) the property of John Adams, St. Catharines, tinman, on January 13, 1835. True bill: Henry Griffin (foreman.) Witnesses: John Adams. Evidence of John Adams taken before E.S. Adams on January 14: the fowls are secreted in the house of Charles Santee, in St. Catharines. Evidence of James Henderson, January 15: at midnight Santee came home with blood on his pantaloons. He and his family were picking fowls when deponent came home from work. He lodges at the house of Santee. Doesn't know if the fowls belonged to Adams. Evidence of Mary Adams, wife of John Adams: Went to the stable and found the heads of farm fowls, and one dead fowl, behind the stable door. The fowls produced here before the JP's and found in the house of Santee were the property of John Adams. Recognizance taken: James Henderson £10. Verdict: "not guilty," January 29, 1835.

John Dovle, Grantham, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against Mary Dovle, on November 28, 1834. True bill: Henry Griffin (foreman.) Witnesses: Kenneth Reach, Cornelius Merry. Recognizance taken before Henry Mittleberger November 28: Kenneth Reach, St. Catharines, yeoman, Cornelius Merry, St. Catharines, yeoman, £10 each. Evidence of Cornelius Merry (alias "Merrick.") John Doyle was in the field at 9 am., about 20 rods distant, and was holding a woman by the hand and urging her along. They crossed a fence. He struck her with a club or stick with nails. James Scott came to the house and Kenneth Reach. They went to the house to assist the woman, who was crying out as if being beaten. There was no other man in the house but Doyle. He had a broad axe in his hand which they drew from him. Doyle said "he'd be the death of the woman." When they went to the house she didn't appear to have a wound on her forehead, but was bleeding profusely when they entered the house. To prevent an effusion of blood and arrest the fracas, they sent for constable *Moses E. Jones*. Evidence of Kenneth Reach: he was in the fields at 9 am on November 28th. About 15 rods away, saw Doyle beat his wife with a club on the shoulders and hips. He struck her with his fist, and dragged her to James Scott's house. They entered the house and shut the door. Reach and Scott followed to rescue her. They wrestled a broad axe away from Reach, who threatened to use it. His wife was bleeding profusely about the head. He said he'd "be the death of the woman." Exhibited a stick with nails-Doyle struck her with it. Witnesses discharged from recognizance March 25, 1835.

Philip Kelly, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, the theft of four wagon boxes (value 5/-) the property of **John Davids**, on March 2, 1835. True bill: **John Russel** (foreman.) Witnesses: John Davids, **John Godfrey**, **John Graham**. Recognizance: John Davids, John Godfrey and John Graham £5 each. Evidence of John Davids taken before **Daniel McDougall**: eight wagon boxes (value 5/-) stolen from his blacksmith shop in Niagara within two days. Evidence of John Godfrey: is a blacksmith in the shop of John Davids. The four boxes produced are the property of

Davids. Evidence of John Graham: the four boxes in the custody of Philip Kelly were offered for sale to the deponent. Evidence of Philip Kelly: the boxes were brought from *Palmira* in New York State. He told Davids that sooner than have any [trouble?] I would give them to him. Plea: guilty. Sentenced to 10 days in prison and then to be discharged.

Evidence of Henson before W. Smith: deponent was on horseback to deliver a message for his employer, Edmund Riselay. Pitcher came up with a stick and struck his horse over the head, and himself on the arm and side. Recognizance before W. Smith, Bertie, March 9: William Pitcher £20, surety Alexander Wintermute £10 (refused.) Warrant issued by W. Smith, March 9, to constable William Clarke or to any constable to apprehend Pitcher. Verdict: not guilty, costs paid by the District.

Witnesses: Dr. Porter. Recognizance taken before **Daniel McDougall** August 29: Thomas Sewell and **Henry Sewell** £20 each, Dr. Porter £20. Evidence of Dr. Porter taken before Daniel McDougall. Sewell arraigned, plea "not guilty." Traversed. Verdict: "guilty." Fine £5 plus costs and to give surety to keep the peace. To remain in custody until paid. Bill of costs: £6.10.0. **Richard Howard** and **John Harris** charge 1/- each as witnesses. **Alexander Hamilton**- received statement of costs and fines from **Charles Richardson** May 5, 1835.

Philip Henry Weishuhn, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against **William Leach**, Stamford, labourer, on January 15, 1835. True bill: **Henry Griffin** (foreman.) Witnesses: William Leach. Evidence of William Leach taken before **William Duff** on January 15: deponent went to **R.H. Lees** to see about a log chain, spoke with **Samuel Hicks** when Weishuhn came up and began to abuse him, struck him with his fist in the face and twice thereafter. He turned to go out the door and Weishuhn clinched him and threw him down, tried to gouge him, caught him by the hair. Weishuhn denies the charge. Evidence of **John Thomas**: lives in Yarmouth. Talked with Weishuhn when Leach came up and struck at Weishuhn three times. Weishuhn did not strike Leach. Saw them clinched. A blacksmith came up to fight Weishuhn and he left the room. Question: "did you see him spit at him?" Answer "no." Evidence of **John H. Dewit**: was at dinner in the barroom at Lees. Weishuhn said to Leach that he did not have anything to say to him. Leach said to Weishuhn that "he [Wesishuhn] was a damb old reprobate but he [Leach] was a gentleman" and that he never passed counterfeit money nor stole horses. Weishuhn said to Leach to "get up and explain" and that "he could take his hide off." They came to blows, clothing was

torn, Leach went out the door and came back with two or more men, one was his brother *Amos Leach*, and said "that was the man" and pointed at Weishuhn. They struck him, Weishuhn retreated to the fire, desired the company in the room to take notice. Amos Leach said to Wesihuhn "not to meddle with the boy for if he did, he was the man that was able to whip him." William Leach came up and struck three times, the men clinched. Amos Leach and others parted them. Evidence of *Stephen Poppel*, lives in New York State: corroborates testimony. Evidence of *Alfred Talbot*: Leach called his brother from the shop (he was on the stoop.) Recognizance: William Leach £20; Philip Henry Weishuhn £20, surety *John Clark Davis* £10 and witness John H. Dewit £5. Traversed, verdict "not guilty." Costs paid by the District.

Joseph Archer, constable and Corporal Hugh Byrne, of the 15th Regiment of Foot maketh oath before John Alma: that four females, Sarah Carter, Mary McFarlane, Mrs. Eliza Page and Ellen Dennis have acted in the most indecent and profligate manner in the neighbourhood of the barracks at Fort George. Conceives the women to be of the most abandoned character and in every manner calculated to not only destroy the morals of His Majesty's soldiers but also to individuals. Pray to have them taken into custody, May 12, 1835.

Evidence taken before *James Robinson* on May 16, 1835: [------] *Lewis* on May 15 did aid and abet the escape of *James McMann* [*McMain*?] from the Niagara Gaol. Committed to gaol to take trial. Constable not paid. Costs £1.3.9. Prosecution charged to the District. Evidence of *Peter B. Darby* of [*Craydon*?] Lewis of *Lundy's Lane* in this District did aid and abet James McMain to escape. Lewis arrested and bailed, sureties *Vert Vanwick* of Stamford £10 and *Charles Anderson*, £10.

Evidence taken before *James Kerby*, June 15, 1835: *Robert F. Jones*, Humberstone, farmer. Was employed by *George Rykert* in June 1830 as a chain bearer in order to ascertain the line between Humberstone and Bertie, 1 chain in width. Order issued in the Quarter Sessions. Was read to *George Zavitz*, a farmer in Bertie near the line. He obstructed the line by placing a fence in the centre line of the road at the *Garrison* corner. It encroaches to 9 feet at the *Swamp Bridge*, turns the course of the road into *James Kennedy's* land 14 or 15 feet, and was digging a ditch on his land. Zavitz's barn also stands in the highway, prays that it be removed and the road opened on its' proper allowance. Recognizance taken before James Kerby and *Alexander Douglas*: George Zavitz £20, sureties *Frederick Rose* and *Richard Graham* each £10. Affidavit of *Thomas Burns*, St. Catharines, gentleman: Rykert is absent, has been for several days and hasn't yet returned home, July 16, 1835. Affidavit of James Kennedy, Bertie, yeoman: George Rykert is a necessary witness in the matter of Zavitz, trial cannot proceed safely without him. Do not wish to delay the trial. Mr. Kerby has received a serious injury, July 16, 1835. Endorsed by *Charles Richardson*, July 16: in the case of Zavitz obstructing the highway between Humberstone and Bertie, trial is put off to the next Sessions.

Recognizance taken before *Henry Mittleberger*, April 7, 1835: *John Flannaghan*, St. Catharines, labourer, £30, sureties *Patrick Flannaghan* and *John Mills* £15 each; Patrick Flannaghan £10, sureties *John O'Donnell*, St. Catharines and *James Fitzgerald*, St. Catharines, merchant, £5 each. Evidence of John O'Donnell: on April 6 at 8 pm, deponent missed the key to the cellar under the shop of his employer James Fitzgerald, merchant. He fastened the inner door with nails. He heard a noise, found John Flannaghan in the act of unlocking the door, the key was in his pocket, with a view of stealing from the cellar.

Evidence taken before *E.S. Adams* on March 19, 1835, of *Charles W. Gesso*, St. Catharines, saddler. On March 17 near the sign post of *Walter Dittrick*, two persons unknown did strike *Charles McCartney* and knock him down. *Oliver Wadsworth* struck him two or three times with a stick and his fist. He prevented him from striking, said Wadsworth went to *Luther Dyers*.

Evidence taken before *John Mewburn*, June 23, 1835: *Ezra Durham*, Stamford, brewer. Deponent and *George Jeffers* were in partnership as brewers but have separated for various causes. On May 25 at 2 pm Jeffers assaulted the deponent, called him a cheat and liar and struck him with his fist on the side of his face, caught him by the arm and threatened if he caught him he'd whip him. Deponent heard Jeffers rise from his bed in the night and swear he would "by his maker burn the building down before he left it." Deponent is in fear of his life. Has a certificate of

good character, but believes it to be a forgery. Evidence of *Lewis Richards* (a man of colour); he was grinding malt on May 25. Jeffers demanded who gave him the authority to grind malt and forbid him to grind further. Durham came in and bid him quit the premises, and forbid him to come into the brewery. He went to go out and Jeffers seized him and tried to put him out of doors. He was in a violent rage and would have done Durham injury if he could. Jeffers threatened to shoot Durham if he did not leave. Didn't think he was intoxicated. Letter from John Mewburn, Darby House, Stamford, to Charles Richardson, June 24: forwards deposition of Jeffers assault on Durham, plus a charge of forgery on a certificate (which induced Durham to take Jeffers into partnership.) They are bound over to appear. Have subpoenaed Abraham Ward, Richard Woodruff and William Woodruff. Letter of character from Abraham Ward, St. Davids, August 24, 1833: Jeffers lived with me as brewer and maltster for 9 months, is a sober and honest man, attentive in business. A good brewer and maltster, and left me at his request. The wages due to him were paid. Witnesses: William and Richard Woodruff. Recognizance taken before John Mewburn, June 24: George Jeffers, brewer at Muddy Run, £25; sureties John McLaughlin and **Dominick McHugh**, tavernkeeper at the Falls, £12.10.0, each. Evidence of George Jeffers: in December 1834 Durham agreed to put in \$200 and a team of horses and a wagon into a brewery concern. He didn't do this, but hired a team from *Ira Cook* for \$54, paid from the profits of the brewery, plus \$35 which he owed him before. Paid \$100 to *Marcone Cook* and other money to Thomas Pugh for a team, also to Adam Frelack at the Lane. Deponent called upon grocers and tayern keepers for money due, and they declared they paid him. Jeffers rented a brewery and two rooms in his own name from *Mr. Bulax*, owes \$100 in rent. Durham took the locks, gave no account, collected money and kept it. He acknowledges the charge of pushing Durham out, but denies the threat to shoot him "shooting is too good for such a robber." He denies the threat to burn the house, he dreamed two nights of a hole over the door and fire which he put out by a pail of water. Durham stole a thermometer from his room, but brought it back on being threatened with a warrant. He acknowledges ordering him out, but didn't strike him. Durham took barley from *Colonel DeLatre* and put it in his father's barn and sold it again. Sworn evidence of *Mr*. Bulock [alias Bulax or Bulck.] He is the owner of Muddy Run Brewery. He rented it to Jeffers. He spoke to Durham about the rent. "Have witness drawn to avoid dispute." Jeffers bound to keep the peace, and to pay costs. Prosecution discharged from recognizance.

Recognizance taken before *W. Mylne*, July 17, 1835: *William Orderly* bound £80. *Patrick Bray* to appear. Defendant discharged from recognizance, cost charged to District.

Presentment, true bill. John Duggan and Thomas Duggan, guilty of keeping a disorderly house in the Town of Niagara. Evidence presented by Francis Proctor, Bernard Roddy and W.B. Winterbottom. Signed by George Keefer (foreman), Cornelius Read, Gershom Wright, Elim Powers, John Welstead, James Butler, Frederick Huddleston, William McCredie, Richard Havens, Abraham Secord and Benjamin W. Pawling.

Henry Seger, Crowland, yeoman. A patent deed for a lot in Crowland is in Toronto. He can't safely proceed to the investigation of opposition to the opening of a new road in Crowland along *Lyon's Creek* unless the patent is procured. It is in the possession of the *Surveyor General* for information in another matter. Prays to have the same procured for the Quarter Sessions. Doesn't apply for postponing the matter, only to have it firmly inquired into, July 17, 1835.

Evidence taken before *E.S. Adams* and *B. Tench*, June 25, 1835: *George Vallance*, St. Catharines, labourer. Was in the employ of *Henry N. Bates*, brewer. On June 24 at 6 pm, he was directed to purchase some boards, given a \$50 bill, and instructed to bring back the change. Paid to *John M. Runnels* [alias *Reynolds*], St. Catharines, sawyer. No order for payment made yet, he believes Mr. Runnels has the note and fraudulently detains the same. Evidence of Henry N. Bates:

the \$50 *Bank of Upper Canada* note was the only one in his possession. He gave it to George Vallance to buy 200 feet of lathing and bring back the change, would have used the change to pay a debt now due. He didn't get back the note, believes that Runnels has it. Evidence of *Truman Pollack*: saw Vallance give Runnels a note, a \$1.00 bill. Went home, Bates came to the house and demanded the change. Runnels denied receiving more than \$1.00 from Vallance and another from a shoemaker. He pulled out his pocket book, and had \$1.00 and another note in his book. Recognizance taken: George Vallance £12.10.0; John M. Runnels £25; sureties *Anson Smith* and *B.F. Reynolds* £12.10.0 each; Henry N. Bates, £12.10.0. [Endorsed "ordered cause not proceeded in "]

Recognizance taken before *W. Anthony*, June 28, 1835: *William C. Clark* of Bertie £20, sureties *Benjamin P. Hall* and *Harry Singleton* £10 each, Bench warrant and bail bond dated July 17. Defendant William Clark discharged from recognizance July 17, costs charged to the District.

File 20-13. Assize Filings.

Stephen Cutler, Stamford, servant/labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a pocket book the property of Haggai Cook, Stamford, farmer, on May 13, 1835. Evidence taken before James Robinson on May 14: Cook missed his pocket book on April 27, 1835. Contained 9/3½-, and valuable papers. On May 13 he heard that the prisoner broke into Mr. Marsten's store. He was suspected and on examination admitted taking the pocket book and its contents. Cutler remanded to gaol to stand trial. Constable is unpaid. Costs £1.3.9. To stand over to the assizes. Letter from James Buchanan Macaulay to the Sheriff, May 14, 1835: James and Joseph Burniston were convicted of Grand Larceny, and sentenced to five years in the Penitentiary. Their sentences to be remitted if they quit Upper Canada for 14 years, on or before May 24, 1835. They are to be discharged from custody, and suffer them to go at large provided they be detained in gaol by reason of said conviction only. Letter from Alexander Hamilton: Joseph Burniston escaped from the steam boat on passage from Kingston, and James Burniston was put across the Niagara River. (Certified by A. McLeod.)

Letter from *James Buchanan Macaulay* to the *Sheriff*: *Aaron Roy*, convicted of horse stealing, was sentenced to five years in the *Penitentiary*. His sentence to be remitted provided he vacates the province for 14 years on or before May 24, 1835. He is to be discharged from custody, and suffer him to go at large provided he be detained in gaol by reason of said conviction only. Letter from *Alexander Hamilton*: prisoner was transported across on the Niagara ferry. (Certified by *A. McLeod*.)

Richard Forest, St. Catharines. Has supported **Frances Linch**, insane and destitute, from March 26 to July 16, 1835. Allowed 7/6- for 12 weeks (total £6.) Bill from Richard Forest submitted for £4.17.6. Certified by **George Keefer Jr.** July 15, 1835.

Margaret Harris and *Jane Harris*, insane and helpless women in Caistor. Pray for £6.5.0. for support and maintenance for 3 months. Certified by *Henry Griffin*, January 29, 1835. Petition for pension from Margaret Harris, unable to attend, authorizes *John Smith* to draw it, January 19. Deferred until next Sessions.

John Smith, Caistor, labourer. Has supported **Jane Harris** (insane and destitute) aged 40 years, and **Margaret Harris** (blind and unable to support herself) aged 45 years. Smith has a wife and family. Prays to be allowed 3/9- each from last sessions to the present and the same for the next. £4.17.6. for 13 weeks, signed **George Keefer** July 17, 1835.

Gaol examined and found to be in good order for comfort and security. Every attention is paid by the gaoler for the comfortable situation of the prisoners, cleanliness of apartments and the

quantity and quality of food. Cells to be whitewashed due to the approach of the sickly season, signed *George Keefer*, July 17, 1835.

Thomas Angleman, Niagara, labourer. Has supported **John Follick**, an insane and destitute child, aged 9 years. Petitioner has a family and aged and infirm parents. Prays to be allowed 5/- for 13 weeks (£3.5.0.) and the same for next Sessions, July 17, 1835. Signed **George Keefer**, **J.H. Ball**, **Robert Hay Bruce**, **Cornelius Read**, **Jerome Clarke**, **William McCredie**, **Andrew Thompson**, **John Wallis**, **Peter Keefer**, **Gershom Wright**, **Elim Power**, **Ozias Buchner**, **Richard Havens**.

Petition of *Thomas Angleman*, Thorold, shoemaker. Has aged and feeble parents and has taken care of a son of their daughter, an idiot, for several years past. The mother is dead and the father's whereabouts are not known. He is willing to support his parents, but as a mechanic depends upon daily labour and has his own family to support. Is therefore unwilling to accept the burden of all three, prays for assistance. Signed *Philip Young*, *William McClellan*, *John DeCew Sr*, *John DeCew Jr*, *Caleb Swayze*, *Kenny Shepard*, *Robert King*, *Henry Maguire*, *Peter Davis*, *Samuel Street*, *Adam Brown* and *Jofb McCaul*.

Ellen Fitzgerald (alias Eleanor Fitzgerald) the wife of John Fitzgerald, Niagara. Her husband returned from Toronto, imprisoned for a supposed murder. He beats and abuses me in a shameful way. Have not had one day's peace of him, seven days last he beat and abused me out of all character as a wife. He beat and kicked me, held one of my hands in the fire until severely burned, choaked me and undertook to cut my throat with a razor taken out of his hat. He took compassion on the prayers of a little son of mine and desisted from his horrid purpose. I have applied to the magistrates to bind him to keep the peace (fruitless) and he threatened to take my life if he gets the opportunity. Petitioner prays for Sir Peregrine Maitland to command the magistrates to attend to this subject and save my life. Since living here 14 [or 17?] years until acquainted with him I was always happy and contented. May 24, 1835. Signed Dr. Telfer, Dr. Porter, Francis Proctor, Ann Grayson, Mary Ann Cudney, Mary Hughs, Ellen Powers,

Elizabeth T. Carly, Con and Ellen Hagerty, John Ryan, Bernard Roddy. Jacob Dockstader was called by Mrs. Fitzgerald to apply for the magistrates to come and take her affidavit, she not being able to leave her bed. Thomas Butler took the affidavit, R.M. Crysler being too busy and Daniel McDougall and John Alma wouldn't interfere. Alma later said he'd attend, but has done nothing yet, May 28, 1835. Information sent to Colonel Rowan, Toronto. Government House, June 3: referred to the magistrates for observations for the information of the Lieutenant-Governor.

Thomas Butler, is willing to act as collector for the Town and Township of Niagara and give security, July 8, 1835.

Truman Raymond, has lived in town for 11 years. Has never been given an appointment of trust or emolument. The post of **gaol surgeon** is vacant, prays for the appointment. It was conferred on senior medical practitioners except in the last appointment. Petitioner was a volunteer in the late war, served as garrison physician and surgeon. Has a large family and limited pecuniary supplies, July 14, 1835. [Endorsed: cannot be entertained, **Dr. Porter** has been appointed.]

Richard Abbot, *John Doyle* and *Robert Grame*, prisoners for debt have no means of support. Pray for relief, July 17, 1835.

Lewis Donnelly, has acted as constable for three years, faithful and active discharge of his duties. The *High Constable* has been removed, no £10 salary. Willing to perform the office with no remuneration. [Appointed.]

John Duggan, the sentence for which I have been incarcerated in a dungeon is unjust, I have been condemned unheard. If given timely notice I could have procured witnesses, to prove that I sold without a licence was under an idea from his (**Fitzgerald's**) own statement that the licence was not taken out. I have been wronged three fold: 1) by rendering my house useless 2) I have been deprived of my licence 3) I have been imprisoned without a hearing. Prays for a hearing, [Referred to the Lieutenant-Governor.]

John Y. Law, of the Gore District. Was pathmaster on the East and West Line, ordered to open the road allowance whenever a reservation was found. Complied with orders, but three prosecutions were put against me. I have had considerable expense and trouble to defend myself at King's Bench. Pray to take my case into consideration and remunerate me from the District funds, July 17, 1835. [Approved.]

Moot, W. Stringer, S. Birdsall, J. Miller, N. Camp. Scale 40 chains: 1 inch.]

George A. Ball, July 4, 1835. A requisition by the freeholders of Bertie and Humberstone for a road. He has laid the road on a line from the north boundary of the township to Lake Erie, 33 feet on each side of the centre line. The allowance was pointed out by respectable men, a stake was found 50 links east of the townline by a small white ash tree cut down, the butt end in possession of James Kennedy of Bertie. It appears to be marked as the corner. Difficult to ascertain the lines, in some instances none were left.

Charles Fell, *Pelham Square*, July 11, 1835. The freeholders of Dunn petitioned for a road near *Jonas Furry's*. Route 1 mile and 24 chains opened on good ground, 66 feet wide. [Sketch attached, shows the Grand River, old and proposed road, lot owners named *Croaker*, *H*.

John Clark, Stamford. Charged with larceny, stealing two silver pieces (1/3-) and three others (1/10½-) the property of William Jackson, Stamford, tavern-keeper, on June 28, 1835. True bill: George Keefer. Witnesses: William Jackson, Hiram Forsyth, Thomas Coulson. Letter from John Mewburn to Charles Richardson, Stamford, Danby House, June 29: has enclosed the depositions. "I will attend, God willing, to be your interpreter, for I am ashamed to say, they will require one." Do you try cases of shooting with intent to kill at the sessions or must they go to the assizes? Evidence of William Jackson taken before John Mewburn: on June 28 a young man, a stranger, came into my house asking for lodging. He laid long, and it being rainy remained in, was in the bar room alone. I left the money, was out of doors for two or three minutes. There was \$1-2 change in the till. I returned for change for a person at the door, and saw only 6d and coppers left. I asked if my wife took it? She said yes, before dinner but returned it. I asked the prisoner if anyone had been there, but he didn't know. Thomas Holland came in and I asked

what was to be done? The prisoner denied the charge and called him a liar. He was challenged by Holland to show the money. He showed 1d in silver but also had quarter dollars in his hand which he attempted to put in his purse. They were dropped on the floor in the presence of *Mr. Forsyth*, one shilling piece with a small hole on the edge. Evidence of *Hiram Forsyth*: saw the prisoner pull his hand out his pocket and dropped three shilling pieces over the end of the bench on the floor. Saw Mr. Carter pick up the pieces. Evidence of John Clark: is from Hampshire, England and is newly out. He had 50¢ in silver, had sold a pair of boots for a half dollar. Knew nothing further of the 1/6 York and three coppers. Evidence of William Jackson: followed the prisoner out the door. Stopped at the back of the stable for a necessary purpose. Returned and passed by the edge of a hole or shallow pit, near the house and fence. Deponent bought boots and paid a half dollar. There was no money on him when he came except for 6d (York currency) which he used to pay for cyder. The silver was his, beat out thin with an irregular edge and cropped on both sides. It remained nearly a month in his till, not offering it to anyone. Evidence of *Thomas* Coulson, Stamford, joiner: saw the prisoner come past the hole or pit. Went to examine it this morning and found a piece of silver coin of remarkable shape, beat out irregular with the edges cropped. Called Jackson and Forsyth to come and take it up. Evidence of *Hiram Forsyth*: was called by Coulson to come and see the money he found in the hole. Picked it up, gave it to Mr. Jackson. Found another 8d (York currency) near the fence. Prisoner knows nothing of the money. Recognizance: William Jackson £10, Thomas Coulson and Hiram Forsyth £5 each. [Prisoner pleads "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol.]

Hall, July 9: John Beaver (Indian), William Jacob (Indian), Henry VanEvery (Indian), Charles Martin of the Grand River. Subpoenas issued by Charles Richardson at the request of Charles L. Hall, July 9: Benjamin Miller, Alvin Draper, Reuben Sparling and John Swan (surgeon) of the Grand River. Letter from Warner Nelles to Charles Richardson, Nelles Settlement, Grand River, July 7, 1835. Evidence is enclosed. This is a brutal and cold blooded attack from an old quarrel. There were many others, but we could only get to six. If I can assist,

please say so. "Assaults are of every day occurrence in this part of the country, and unless some severe examples are made we shall find it difficult to have the peace kept at all here." See that the constable is paid. I hope I won't have to attend the Sessions being not in good health. The evidence is taken down in confusion by the people, not so correct, but it was impossible to do better. Keep in view that McGuire is a tavern keeper. Affidavit of Richard McGuire before Charles Richardson, July 16: Daniel McCannon, Jacob Nerely, William Smith and Michael Campbell are necessary and material witnesses. All are at the Grand River and impossible to procure their attendance at so great a distance. This only happened a few days ago, there is not time to procure their attendance. Evidence of **John Swan** taken before Warner Nelles, July 7: on the 5th was called to attend to Edward Armstrong at Indiana, who was wounded in a scuffle. Wounds included his left parietal bone; a wound nearly parallel to the sagittal suture, 2-3 inches and penetrated to the scull; a 2nd wound behind it in a transverse direction, 1½" and penetrated to the scull; a 3rd on the head across the frontal bone 1" long. A long but not deep wound across the scapula; two small wounds on each arm, on the right arm above the elbow joint and on the left arm below the elbow joint, inflicted by a sharp, pointed instrument. There were marks of external violence on several parts of the body. His pulse was regular and respiration free. Evidence of James Blaney: he was at the home of John [Mc-----?], called by [Steel?] to see the row at McGuire's tayern. Saw Collins and Armstrong who were quarreling. After he saw McGuire take a towel at the bar and wipe Armstrong's face. Didn't see McGuire take part. Evidence of *Jesse* Warden: was near McGuire's, heard a holler as if there was a quarrel. Persons arrived with axe helves, and started beating Armstrong. McGuire called out to "quit" that Armstrong "got enough." Evidence of *John Beaver*, Indian. Was at the tavern. Armstrong came in, followed by 5 or 6 men with axe helves and they began to beat Armstrong with them. Armstrong was lifted up, McGuire wiped his face. Armstrong came in and said if the men came out one by one, 'he'd show them he means the law.' McGuire took an axe helve and gave it to one of the party and said to help himself or go out, then fell upon Armstrong. Evidence of William Jacob, Indian: saw a quarrel at McGuire's with axe helves. Armstrong was beat until he could hardly walk and blood flowing freely. Evidence of *Henry Hainer*, Indian. Was present at McGuire's. Evidence of *Henry* VanEvery, Indian: was present at McGuire's, saw McGuire hand out six axe helves to the men beating Armstrong. They fell upon Armstrong until the blood flowed. Evidence of *Charles Martin*. Evidence of *Jessie Warden*: heard a holler, saw men strike Armstrong (one was Leaden.) Armstrong was against a log. He got up and asked for water, went into the bar. He said he was a man. He was struck by several, and tried to get away his face "all over with blood." Evidence of James Blaney, Indiana: Collins and Armstrong were wiping themselves, said they'd fought, and went into the bar. Armstrong offered to fight Collins, who said to "keep back, he didn't want to fight" and held up his hands. Armstrong struck him twice in the face. Deponent took hold of the parties. Leaden struck Armstrong with an axe helve. Donovan and Campbell struck at Armstrong, who got up and walked away. Evidence of **John Beaver**: saw Collins, Leaden and Campbell armed with helves, struck and kicked Armstrong. Leaden was the most vicious of the three. The blood was flowing from Armstrong, who defended himself with his fists and got away. Interrupted by William Cook, Evidence of *William Jacob*: Campbell and Leaden were beating Armstrong with an axe helve on the head twenty times, the blood flowing. McKenna took a helve and gave it to Collins who beat Armstrong with it. Armstrong washed his face. Evidence of Henry VanEvery: corroborates the testimony of the other witnesses, said they were interrupted by Cook. Evidence of *John Murphy*, labourer: was in the room when he saw the quarrel. Saw the men run after and beat Armstrong with sticks until he was knocked down. Was beat unmercifully by the men who struck frequently at Armstrong. Evidence of **Zekiel Young**: had some liquor at McGuire's. Was given a helve. McKenna had a piece of plank. Evidence of **Benjamin Miller**: saw men beat Armstrong &c. Evidence of *Alvin Draper*: saw five or six strike Armstrong. Corroborates the testimony of the others. Evidence of *Thomas McFadden*: he came to the tavern with Armstrong and Reuben Sparling. They called for a pint of whiskey, then left and went to the

shanty. Went back to the tavern and saw two men fighting, deponent interfered. McKenna said deponent struck the combatant, and Leaden and Collins struck the witness. Sparling ran for Armstrong and said "no man should beat him while he was to the fore." Collins seized Armstrong, and the men ran at him with helves and sticks and crushed him to the door. They had him down and were beating him. Armstrong called to deponent "where are you?" Armstrong fled for his life. Evidence of *Reuben Sparling*: did not hear Armstrong give offence. He was severely wounded and bled. Went to the tavern and Armstrong followed. They were attacked again. Were furnished with helves at the tavern. Verdict: Michael Campbell, Hugh McKenna, Peter Leaden and Cornelius Donovan "guilty" and fined £5 each. To remain in custody until paid, but not longer than three months. Costs £42.2.5½. Richard McGuire discharged from recognizance, and recognizance of prosecution estreats July 15, 1835.

James County, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one scythe and snath (value 5/-) the property of Adam Brown, Queenston, farmer, on July 6, 1835. True bill: George Keefer (foreman.) Witnesses: Adam Brown, William Defield. Evidence taken before Robert Grant on July 7: two grass scythes and snaths (value 17/-) were stolen from the waggon house by two coloured men, Isaac Hall and James County, who were discharged from his (Brown's) service. William Defield set off towards Fort Erie to apprehend them, July 7, 1835. Evidence of William Defield: went in the direction of Waterloo, but found no information. Went back to Black Creek, found two coloured men with scythes on the road up the creek, I followed them and overtook them six or seven miles above in the rear of Fort Erie with the scythes. Evidence of Isaac Hall and James County: took the scythes and snath on July 5. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol.

John G. Dickenson, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing two halters (value 2/-), two horse blankets (value 2/-) the property of John Maglaughlin, Niagara Falls, tavern keeper, on January 5, 1835. No bill: George Keefer. Witnesses: John Maglaughlin, Patrick Macourt and John Caughill. Letter from James Robinson, May 7: William S. Dickinson of Williamsville, USA, convicted of taking the halters and blankets from the barn of John Maglaughlin. Have committed him to gaol pending trial. Constable's costs unpaid. Evidence of John M. Cahill, City of the Falls, taken before J. Robinson: he and John Maglaughlin bought the horses harness, halters and carriage from Martin Smith on January 5, and saw Smith and Dickinson take away the halters and blankets and two [-------] value £1. Evidence of John Maglaughlin: Dickinson is now at the Falls, May 6. Evidence of Patrick McCourt, Niagara Falls: was present at the time of the purchase, saw the goods stolen. Recognizance taken: Adam Crysler and Nelson of Niagara Falls £10.

File 20-28.

Alexander Batee Fleming, Haldimand, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a United States half dollar (value 2/6-), one Spanish quarter dollar (value 1/3-) the property of Francis Lameau, Dunnville, innkeeper, on July 3, 1835. True bill: George Keefer (foreman.) Witnesses: Francis Lameau, Thomas Brown, John McDonald, John P. Hyack, William Mylne. The evidence of Francis Lameau taken before W. Mylne: Alexander B. Fleming took the money from a drawer. Evidence of Thomas Brown: He had the key to the barroom. Fleming came in and asked for a glass of bitters. He paid for it with a half dollar and I gave him change except for 6d. I then went to the kitchen and locked the door to the bar, but left the prisoner in the room. I missed the key to

the drawer of the bar, left it in, and the money was gone. There was no one in the room except the prisoner. I went in pursuit and found him concealed behind some shingles. I charged him and he gave up the half-dollar. He denied taking any more, but then gave up the quarter dollar. Evidence of John McDonald: found prisoner behind the shingles. John P. Hyack and *Ronald McDonald* also present. Prisoner ordered to be conveyed to gaol and take trial, July 3. Recognizance taken July 8: Francis Lameau £20. Witnesses summoned: Thomas Brown, John McDonald, John P. Hyack. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol.

Isaac Hall, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a scythe and snath (value 5/-) the property of *Adam Brown* on July 6, 1835. True bill: *George Keefer* (foreman.) Witnesses: Adam Brown, *William Defield*. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol.

File 20-30.

Isaac [Isaiah] Starkie, Stamford, Niagara Falls, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against James Hanley, Moulton, on June 24, 1835. Witnesses: James Hanley, Henry Robinson. Evidence taken before J. Robinson: Starkie turned Hanly out of his house and kicked him. Evidence of Henry Robinson, is a waiter for Mr. Starkie of Drummondville. Was at the Spiral Stairs House and saw Hanley in the act of tying his horse to a tree, appeared to be in much liquor. He did not hear what passed, did not see Starkie strike him. Evidence of Isaac Starkie: requested Hanley who was intoxicated to make no noise in the house since there was respectable company in the room. Said he hadn't seen the Falls, wanted to see them in perfection. I desired him to walk to the spiral stairs where he might see the Falls. On his return he wished to go to an inner room, but I would not allow it. On resisting, I put him out and gave him a kick. Evidence of James Hanley: came to see the Falls, and went to the Spiral Stairs House. I was ordered out by Starkie. Recognizance: Isaac Starkie and William Keating of the Falls, £10 each. Committed to gaol for trial; defendant discharged from recognizance, recognizance of prosecutor estreats, July 17, 1835. Costs £1.8.0.

John Henderson, Grantham, labourer, Henry Craig, Grantham, labourer. Charged with kidnaping and assault against Elizabeth Stanford, the infant daughter of William and Dorcas Stanford, on July 12, 1835. True bill: George Keefer (foreman.) Witnesses: William and Dorcas Stanford, B. Tench, Sarah Robison, Theophilus Brundage, Edward Walker, Isaac Leach, Peter Middaugh, John Phipps. Subpoena issued by Charles Richardson for Brundage, Walker, Leech and Joseph Quincy. Letter from Tench to Charles Richardson, July 14: I don't wish to frame an indictment against Henry Craig until tomorrow, I anticipate additional information, inculpate one Meddoch at St. Davids. Sent Donelly after him with a warrant. After examination, he will need to be added to the indictment. Verdict: John Henderson "not guilty," Henry Craig "guilty." Sentenced to 12 months in gaol and to stand four times in the pillory for one hour at each of the first days of the Quarter Sessions.

Chester Kinsley, Bertie, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one mill iron (value 1/-) the property of *Robert Alexander* on March 21, 1835. True bill: *George Keefer* (foreman.) Witnesses: Robert Alexander, *William Smith*, *John Prothoras*. Evidence of Robert Alexander taken before William Smith on March 21: bands and gudgeons of mill iron stolen from chopping

mill. Deponent suspects that John Prothoras, blacksmith, has them. Search warrant issued March 21. Recognizance taken before William Smith April 18: John Prothoras, Bertie, £10; recognizance taken July 14: Robert Alexander £20. Verdict: "guilty" sentenced to stand in the pillory 1 hour.

He was beaten, believes with intent to murder, has severe cuts across his head from a stick picked up in the road. Would have been murdered by Riley had he not made his escape. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to three months in gaol.

Archibald C. Morse, of the schooner "Madora" of Oswego, New York. Cut to pieces a raft of saw logs at the **Deep Cut** on the **Welland Canal**, the property of **David A. Bayham** of Thorold, on June 13, 1835. Fined £5 plus costs £3.1.0. Before magistrate **David Thompson**, June 25, 1835.

Charles Hall, Clerk of the Peace, to *Lieutenant Colonel Rowan*, August 10, 1835. Encloses the petition of *Peter Leaden* and *Cornelius Donevan* with observations of the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions for the information of the Lieutenant Governor.

Letter from the *Clerk of the Peace* to *Lieutenant Colonel Rowan*, encloses a list of magistrates and coroners, September 28, 1835.

Petition from the Inhabitants of Niagara to *Sir John Colborne*, September 1835. We disapprove of the proposal to withdraw troops from Niagara, one of the oldest and most exposed towns, and disposal of the *Military Reserve*, which has proved beneficial to the poor. The troops must be kept here, it diffuses a martial spirit in the District and inspires a love of British valour and devotedness to British interests. It reminds us that we are well protected subjects of the most powerful empire on earth. We dread fear of the invader. The inhabitants are ready to defend the province with the troops. The gaol (near a foreign country) is "annually filled with a host of criminals" and requires defending. Guards for the gaol are necessary, otherwise offenders might have made their escape and been a nuisance to the community. If this is out of your power, please transmit it to the Home Government.

Letter from *Henry Nelles* to *Charles Richardson*, Grimsby, October 12, 1835: I have sent you information and the recognizance on *Jesse*, a man committed for theft at *Beamsville*. I request that you return the information and recognizance on *Henry Ryan*, who assaulted and beat his wife, and *Susan Vanatta's* information on *John Curran* of Clinton. The parties have made it up and settled. *Do not* lay the papers before the court.

Letter to *Sir John Colborne*, October 14, 1835: There have been two murders in Niagara since the last assize. One in the town, four men were committed by the coroner and two witnesses for want of bail. The second murder was in St. Catharines, two men were committed by the coroner,

plus one man for grand larceny. One prisoner returned from banishment before the end of his term. It is an anormous expense to the District to keep them until next year, the funds of the District being inadequate to bear it. There is necessity to again assemble the court of Oyer and Terminer, since the commission hasn't expired for six months from the date June 28. We would not perform duty to the public if we did not call this matter to the attention to Your Excellency.

Grand Jury presentment, October 15, 1835. Evidence of *Archibald Craig*, *Jonas Gilkison*, *Fanny Braily* and *James Akins*: the road allowance between lots 20 and 21 Concession 7 Crowland are obstructed by *John* and *Beriah Hodgkinson*, who have raised a dam and inundated and prevented the use of the road through *Daniel Robins* property.

Evidence of *Parmer Buckbee*, [alias *Palmer Buckbee*] Pelham, yeoman, taken before *B. Tench* and *John McGlashan* on January 5, 1836: deponent saw *Charley Thomas*, and aged man of Pelham, stand at his fence with no hat or mittens on a very cold night on March 1, 1835, his hands frozen. He was drinking at the tavern of *Jacob Hendershot* in Pelham. The tavern is not decent or orderly, to the annoyance and disturbance of the neighbourhood. Recognizance taken August 5, 1835: £10.

File 21-17. Presentment.

Grand Jurors have examined the gaol. The cells and apartments are clean and orderly, the prisoners without exception are "thankful to their keeper for his kind behaviour and treatment to them." A hardship is no fuel provision for the winter. *Mr. Wheeler* keeps a partial and gratuitous supply of fuel, but some must be ordered for the benefit of indigent debtors. *John Henderson* (a coloured man) was locked up until he could find bail for his future good behaviour, and so may remain for 12 months at great expense to the district. Has been incarcerated now for 7 weeks. Pray to have the matter investigated, to limit his time or release him immediately. October 15, 1835.

Grand Jury presentment. *Truman Ray*mond has supported an insane woman, *Elizabeth M. Wilson*, plus supplied her board, clothing, lodging and washing, £6. Includes a list of clothing. Endorsed: allowed board but not the clothing.

Length 2 miles and 30 chains, 66 feet wide. Built on good ground. A great obstacle is the marsh (2 chains.) Mr. Craig agreed to bridge this at his own expense, rather than fail having a road. Evidence of Joel Eaton: he sold the coat but said it was his property. Evidence of Bartimeus Colburn: was in the barroom on the 17th. When Eaton left, the jacket was gone. Deponent followed him and overtook him this morning, he had on the deponent's jacket. Plea: "guilty," confined in gaol 15 days and to stand in the pillory for one hour, October 15, 1835. Spencer Daniel, Pelham, carpenter. Charged with larceny, stealing one plane (carpenter's jointer) value 5/-, the property of *Eber Rice*, Pelham, innkeeper, on August 15, 1835. True bill: *James Fitzgerald* (foreman.) Witnesses: Eber Rice. Verdict: "not guilty," October 15, 1835. Evidence of Eber Rice taken before *James Cummings*, September 18: the plane was taken from my grist mill in Pelham. Letter from *David Thompson* to *Charles Richardson*, Wainfleet, October 6, 1835: encloses four convictions which must be transmitted to you by the *Summary Punishment Act* (section 19.) with bail bonds and recognizances. Recognizance taken September 19: Spencer Daniel £5, sureties *Lewis Willson*, Thorold, yeoman and *Dilly Coleman*, Thorold, innkeeper, £2.10.0. each. Eber Rice £5, surety *Thomas Smith* £2.10.0. Daniels brought a warrant of James Cummings before David Thompson. Verdict: "not guilty," October 15, 1835.

James Martin, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against Frederick Brackenridge [alias Brackbridge], Lundy's Lane, shoemaker, on June 13, 1835. Witnesses: Frederick Brackenridge. Evidence of Frederick Brackenridge taken before James Robinson, June 13: He was followed on the way home by James Martin, was struck, knocked down and kicked. Evidence of Alexander Douglas: saw Brackenridge run away from Martin, he was afraid of being beaten. Evidence of Martha Brown: saw Brackenridge run away on Lundy's Lane between 4 and 5 pm. Saw Martin kick Brackenridge. Recognizance taken: James Martin £10, sureties Samuel Ackindale and William [Pin?], both of Lundy's Lane, £10 each. Nolle prosequi, October 16, 1835. (Certified John Clement Ball.) Costs £1.5.6. Letter from James Robinson to Charles Richardson, Falls, July 14: settled by the parties, "you will therefore please not to enter it."

File 21-28.

James Nevils, Thorold, yeoman. Charged with obstructing the highway, July 14, 1835. True bill: George Keefer (foreman.) Witnesses: James Meddaugh, Harmonius Vanalstine. Evidence: Nevils obstructed the side line, he put a rail fence across it for more than 12 hours, which obstructed His Majesty's liege subjects, horses and carriages. Grand Jury presentment attached, statute labour has been performed on the road for more than 20 years, July 14, 1835. Affidavit of James Nevils taken before Charles Richardson, July 17: Peter Misener, John Silverthorn and William Vanderburgh are necessary and material witnesses. Cannot safely proceed without them, but do not wish to delay the case. Can procure them for the next Sessions. Case traversed to next Sessions. Verdict: "guilty," October 14, 1835. Fined 1/- plus costs. (Certified by John Clement Ball.)

File 21-29.

William Rielly, Niagara Falls, employee of *Thomas Wheaton*. [indictment left blank.] Witnesses: Thomas Wheaton. Evidence of Thomas Wheaton, taken before *James Robinson* on April 29: Rielly stole wearing apparel and shaving apparatus from the house of Wheaton in Stamford on April 28. Prays that he be committed to gaol. Evidence of *Catherine Wheaton*, *City of the Falls*: on April 28 deponent heard a noise in the bedchamber. She found Rielly lying on the bed with two bundles of wearing apparel. She asked what he did with them, and he said "They're mine." He said he would allow them to examine them. When the broken trunk of *Henry Thomas* was found and examined he gave up the bundles. Also a bundle of clothes of *John Hampshore* and William Rielly's pantaloons. Deponent sent for *Edward Walker* to arrest Rielly, and detain him until the constable was sent for. Evidence of *John Caragon*: is in the employ of *John [Maglan?]*, of Niagara Falls, innkeeper. Rielly offered to sell me the pantaloons. I had no money, and said to

keep them until my employer pays me, but he declined doing so. *Nolle proseui* ordered, October 16, 1835. Costs £1.5.0. (certified by *John Clement Ball*.)

Thomas Roberts, Grantham, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing silk socks (value 1/-), two linen shirts (5/-), white silk handkerchief (2/-), shirt collar and cravat (5/-) the property of John Elliot, St. Catharines, coloured man, on July 15, 1835. Witnesses: John Elliot, John Hart, Catherine Hart. Evidence taken before E.S. Adams on July 21: John Elliot came from Buffalo on the 15th with John May. Arrived at Walter Dittrick's inn at 9 pm. Roberts took charge of the horses. Deponent left his clothing tied up in a handkerchief in the wagon, and Roberts took them. Evidence of John Hart, St. Catharines, innkeeper: Roberts came and sold some pantaloons for 3/9-. I paid 2/6- cash, the remainder of the sum was owed. Evidence of Catherine Hart: she purchased some silk half hose for 1/3-. Evidence of Jane McGill: she was offered the silk half hose by Roberts, but she did not wish to purchase them. Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams, July 22: John Elliot, £12.10.0., sureties Walter Dittrick, St. Catharines, innkeeper and Robert Gray, St. Catharines, tailor, £12.10.0. each. Recognizance of John and Catherine Hart, £7.10.0. each. Roberts discharged from recognizance, and recognizance of prosecution estreats, October 16, 1835. "Witnesses discharged from recognizance" October 16. (Certified by John Clement Ball.)

Adam Crysler, Falls. Charged with assault and battery against *George Hutchins* at the *Pavilion Hotel* on October 8, 1835. Crysler threatened to do Hutchins harm. Phelps, testimony that he brought a prostitute from Buffalo and harboured them in his inn. Is indicted for gambling and keeping a bawdy house, which is a breach of tavern regulations. Attend to this, he escaped once already. Was tried one or two sessions ago. The whole settlement of respectable farmers complain. In the case of *Hendershot* vs. *McGlashan*, I don't know much of it, parties bound to prosecute. You can scarcely make out this attempt at writing, I have been confined to bed nearly one month. Evidence of *James Conger*, Pelham, carpenter and joiner, January 5, 1836: he knows *Eber Rice*, innkeeper, Pelham. More than once he raffles for bridles, whips, money and liquor. He is generally peaceable. Kept an alley for playing at skittles or 9 pins. Females of bad fame from Buffalo were at his house, and Rice knew them to be improper. Recognizance to appear £10, taken January 6, 1836. Evidence of **David McAlpin**, Pelham, yeoman, January 5, 1836: there is improper noise and quarrelling at Rice's. He plays at raffling, dice and coppers, playing cards at the mill near his tavern. Bets for money, bridles, whips, one lost worth \$5.00. Has an alley for 9 pins. Three girls brought from Buffalo, they are not decent

and run about by day and night. Recognizance to appear £25. Evidence of *George E. Phelps*, Pelham, yeoman, January 6, 1836: there is raffling for money, knives and handkerchiefs. Rice played himself. Young women were brought there by Rice knowing they were prostitutes. Recognizance to appear £10. Grand Jury finds cause for complaint, January 13, 1836.

Jacob Hendershot, Pelham, innkeeper. Charged with keeping a disorderly house. Evidence of Charles Thomas, Pelham, yeoman, taken before Tench and McGlashan, January 5, 1836: There is drunkenness at Hendershot's. He once got a sheep as payment for liquor, and allowed the person to drink out the amount of the sheep. On January 1, 1836 he saw raffling for coppers. Recognizance to appear £10. Warrant issued to constables to arrest Jacob Hendershot, January 5, 1836. Petition attached: We are acquainted with Jacob Hendershot. His house is well kept, there is no improper conduct. Public houses are necessary for travelers, January 8, 1836. Signed: William Wiers, George Cosby, John Cosby, John L. Clouse, Joseph Fretz, John Moore, Abraham Hall, Peter Snyder, [-----] Snyder, [-----] Cline, Henry Johnson, Henry Disher, Freeman Brady, Robert Waddel, Abraham Hendershot, William Lampman, John Moote, Daniel Moore, Patrick Mury, Peter Bradt, Lewis Collins, [Lorin?] Anger, John McCarthy, John Smith.

Thomas Burns, St. Catharines, gentleman, attorney for the cause. Served a summons on **Mrs. Rolland Macdonald**, January 21, 1836. Before **Edward Clarke Campbell**. **Joseph Alley Clarke** and **Richard Atkinson Clarke** vs. **James H. Sears**. To show why the defendant should not be discharged from the custody of the sheriff for non-payment of weekly allowance. (**Thomas Butler**.)

J.J. Lefferty, moves for a committee to examine the accounts and expenditures of the District from April 1829 to April 1836, dated January 12, 1836.

Evidence of John Murray taken on October 4 before James Robinson: On September 8, 1835 he heard the bell of the steam boat "United States" and ran down at Queenston Heights. He supposed his family had embarked for Rochester. He was at the ferry at dusk but couldn't find the ferryman. There was a horse in a horseboat and a small boat made very fast. It was very warm and he took off his coat and threw it into the small boat. He went up to two houses and found the ferrymen at tea/supper. They said they would ferry me across when they had their tea. The first man came up and said I had insulted him. He abused me, called me a "scoundrel" and laid hold of me, dragged me out of the boat. I denied the insult but could not pacify him. The others in the boat said they were staying at a hotel in *Lewiston*. I said I would not trust myself on the river with him. I succeeded to join my party just before the steamboat left the wharf. No grounds for the insult, he said he was as good a man as me, and said "By God, I should get out of his boat!" The other ferryman says I had threatened to take the boat- I have no authority to do so.

Charles Freeman, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and choking *Mary Jupiter*, alias *Mary Fountain*, on March 31, 1836. Fined £1.5.0. plus 11/3- costs at Niagara, April 1, 1836. David William Smith (attorney), February 12, 1836. **Mary Manly**, wife of **William Manly**, Grantham, labourer. He has taken security to keep the peace. They were married 20 years ago. Often in the course of their marriage he has in a barbarous and inhuman manner abused and ill treated her, and threatened to take her life. On February 10th he threatened to kill her, tore her clothes, threw her out of doors and dragged her by the hair. She is afraid of murder if she returns home.

Letter of *J.H. Mackenzie* to *Charles Richardson*, York, April 12, 1836: Letter was delivered by James Fearman, the principal witness in the larceny charge against Thomas Tobin. I could not get to Niagara today, but will be there Thursday. Evidence of *Murdo John Mackenzie* son of J. Mackenzie, merchant, taken before *Warner Nelles*, at York, Grand River, February 25, 1836: on February 24th pine lumber was stolen out of a partly finished dwelling house in the village. Search warrant issued for Thomas Tobin, carpenter, York. Evidence of James Fearman, York, Grand River, carpenter: Deponent is employed by *James H. Mackenzie* to make a bean for keeping flour in a partly completely dwelling of Mr. Mackenzie. He cut up the boards and left them in the house on February 24th, five or six boards were six feet long. They were gone on February 25th except for three. Can identify the two pieces. Evidence of Thomas Tobin taken February 25: has nothing to say. Recognizance taken of James Fearman, £20, Murdo John Mackenzie £25. Letter from J. Mackenzie to Charles Richardson, York, Grand River, February 29, 1836: Evidence is sent per *Thomas Helmer*, constable. Petty larceny is extensive here, something decisive should be done. The evidence is clear here. In the case of [Frederick?] Wyndecker vs. Johnstone Kerr for taking \$50 from Wyndecker's bar. The day he was to have gone to Niagara, although in the custody of the constable, he cleared off and hasn't been heard of. He was on horseback when taken at [William?] Orderly's Tavern at Dunnville. Have since sent for the horse while the decision of the court is awaited, but Orderly refuses to give it up. What force can be used to compel him to give up the horse? Does Kerr's flight constitute him a felon? Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall: Thomas Tobin £20, sureties Lewis Clement and Daniel McDougall, Niagara, £10 each. Nolle prosequi ordered, recognizance of prosecutor estreats April 14, 1836. Defendant discharged.

File 23-10. Assize Filings.

Grand Jury visited the gaol. Found expressions of satisfaction by the prisoners regarding the personal deportment of the gaoler, supply of rations and cleanliness except by *Aaron Seely* and *Thomas B. Bartlett.* These prisoners are confined under the undue rigor of close confinement. Five or six quarts of spirituous liquor taken to the gaol daily, consumed by prisoners and inebriety is produced. Those who won't drink are ill-treated by their fellow prisoners. Disquietude and

disruption ensues and conspiracies are formed that have resulted in placing the complainants in close confinement. The complaints are a fair subject for enquiry. The *Gaol Committee* should be enlisted on their behalf with a view to a strict eye for the security of inmates, April 14, 1836.

Richard Forrest, to be allowed 5/- per week for Francis Lynch (insane.) April 12, 1836.

File 23-12. Jail Records.

Dr. Porter, surgeon. There are several cases of illness in the gaol, none serious except one debtor, ill since March 1st. He required daily care but is now recovering. Cleanliness: there should be an additional allowance for bedding, washing should be continued. There is an annoyance from the criminal side of the prison caused by noise, which is especially annoying to the sick. This is "an evident intention to annoy." Should take measures to suppress such a cruel annoyance. April 12, 1836.

I have engaged an extra servant, therefore prays for an annual amount equal to an extra servant. [Petition ordered to lie over, referred to the **Gaol Committee**.]

Dorothy Williams, wife of **Robert Williams**, Queenston, charged with assault and battery against *Humphrey John Tench*, Queenston, and retaining a small pig (value 2/6-) belonging to Tench on July 4, 1836. Evidence taken before **John Mewburn**: plaintiff had a small pig on the land of Robert Williams, my next neighbour. I sent a man for the pig and he was refused to take it away unless 1/3- was paid for its' keep. Plaintiff went for the pig and was assaulted, struck with a stick, pelted with stones and seized by the shirt, defendant used violent language and drove me off. Refused to give me the pig unless I paid 1/3-. Evidence of *Edmund Tench*, son of the plaintiff: went with his father to the barn. The Williams boy threw stones at the pigs. When we asked for the pig, they threw stones at us. Evidence of *Arthur Cooper*: Witness lives with Tench. He went for the pig, knew it by its' marks. Defendant refused to deliver the pig unless 1/3- was paid for its' keep. This morning, the pig was dying in the road. She said they would kill the pig. Evidence of George Clark: went with a summons to the house of Robert Williams. Wife was in bed and refused to be seen, wouldn't come out. Gave the summons to her son, he took it in to her. Dorothy Williams not appearing and conviction of £1.6.3 demanded by plaintiff. Verdict: Williams fined 2/6- for the value of the pig and 13/9- costs, total fines 16/3- with the constables and paid to Tench. Stamford, July 5, 1836.

Stamford, February 20, 1836. *Ezra Durham* charged with assault and battery against *William Porter*, at *Drummondville*, on February 15th. Fine 5/- costs only.

Letter from *Glenelg*, *Downing Street*, to *Sir Francis Bond Head*, March 2, 1836: A petition from the inhabitants of Niagara and the *Western District*, contained in a dispatch from *Sir John Colborne*, requested that the troops at Niagara and *Amherstburg* not be withdrawn. These are frontier positions, there is necessity for a force to defend them. *Lord Hill-* no purposes of an exclusively military nature are required to maintain the posts. The enforcement of laws and the maintenance of public peace is not in the hands of the military but civil authorities. This ought to be found in an efficient local police.

Letter from *J. Joseph* to *John Clark*, *Government House*, Toronto, April 29, 1836: The presentment of the Grand Jury on the residence of a Judge of the Niagara District court to be referred for observation, a report enclosed and *Ridout's* report. An associate Judge to be resident in the Town

Report of *George Ridout* to *J. Joseph*, Toronto, April 23, 1836. Regarding his non-residence as a judge. He was appointed judge by *Sir Peregrine Maitland* nine years ago, knew the situation. Policy was to select a barrister not practicing in such District and unconnected with legal transactions in the District, therefore was thought to be more impartial. Example, *Jonas Jones* of Midland and Bathurst Districts, but is a barrister in *Johnstown*. *David Jones* is in Johnstown (serves as judge for the Eastern District) and *George Jarvis* in the Eastern District serves as judge for Ottawa. *Donald Bethune* (in Newcastle) is a judge in Prince Edward. When the *Absconding Debtors Act* was passed, it was necessary to have an associate judge, *Thomas Butler* (a retired barrister.) Ignorance of the Grand Jury does not equal the trouble to appeal to His Excellency. Will acquiesce if the system is changed.

Letter from *J. Joseph*, Government House, Toronto, to the Niagara District Quarter Sessions, April 29, 1836. Magistrates may solemnize marriages under 33 Geo. III ch. 5 but are prohibited to do so when five Church of England ministers are resident in the District. There are now five in the Niagara District. This is for the information and guidance of the magistrates.

Letter from *J. Joseph* to *Charles Richardson*, *Government House*, Toronto, July 9, 1836: a memorial from the inhabitants, in November last, to the late Lieutenant Governor with a request that the troops at Niagara not be withdrawn. Reply enclosed.

Letter from *William Ferris* to *Charles Richardson*, St. Catharines, July 12, 1836. *Samuel Dolson* is confined in bed from sickness and so is unable to attend court as a juror.

Letter from *James Thompson* to *Charles Richardson*. Swear *David Thomson*, *Richard Howard* and *James Frazer* (Sr. and Jr.) to give evidence.

Evidence taken before *James Hector Mackenzie*, J.P., *Nelles Settlement*, Grand River, Haldimand, January 29, 1836. *Frederick Wyndicker*, *Cayuga*, tavernkeeper. *Johnston Kerr* of the Grand River Tract came into the bar-room. Deponent took the pocket book of *James Phillips*

(containing \$50 and papers) into safe keeping. Phillips being intoxicated. The money was reckoned by deponent and deposited in the bar. Deponent left room and entered the bar on his return and found the money robbed. Kerr left in a hurried manner and didn't pay his bill of fare, or for the keep and feed of his horse. He and Phillips were the only ones in the bar. Warrant issued to constable *Thomas Helmer* to apprehend Kerr and search for the missing property. Evidence of Frederick Wyndicker, taken February 1, 1836: Phillips was drunk, Kerr gave him a push and he fell. He said "Why do you keep such a man lying around?" A book fell from his pocket which was deposited in the till. Kerr left, papers were scattered. The book was there but money (Bank of Upper Canada) was taken. Found a shawl in the bar belonging to the felon. Caleb Turner and others came in, saw the book and said "why do you keep your pocket book in such a state?" and picked it up. Kerr was pursued, we heard he stopped at [Swick's?] tavern at Cayuga, and then at Helmer's at Indiana. He treated William Nelles and Christopher Young to liquor. The deponent then went to the magistrates. Kerr's house was searched, his wife said he left at 4 o'clock for the 40 Mile Creek. Went home to prepare for the search, witnesses said he was at *Port Dover* and another said he was at *Neell's Tavern* at Rainham. Decided to go to Dunnville, and we overtook him on the bridge there. He was searched, found two matches, three dice, one 5 franc piece, two half-dollars, two quarter-dollars, two counterfeit pieces, one English shilling, two York shillings, 6d (English) and 6d (York.) Kerr was cross-examined: Was anything lost found on me? No. I didn't call for anything to drink, except what I was treated to. Had three glasses of liquor and the horse was given hay. Evidence of **Sherwood Avery**: Wyndicker and Kerr counted the money in the bar, there was more than \$40. Kerr walked out with the wallet in his pocket. Chatted with Wyndicker for 20 minutes about racing. A child came in and called Wyndicker to dinner. He left Kerr, deponent and Phillips in the bar. Deponent went out to harness the horse and met Caleb Turner going to the tavern. About 10 minutes had elapsed. He said to Kerr that Wyndicker was foolish regarding horses. Witness was cross-examined: did you see the pocket book before you saw it in the possession of Wyndicker? No. Evidence of Jacob Simms: the prisoner came to his house between 7 and 8 pm, stayed until between 10 and 11 pm, said he was going to the 40 Mile Creek for pork. Evidence of **Joseph Young**: knows nothing of the shawl. Evidence of *George Frederick Windaker*, son of Frederick: Avery, his father's teamster, went down to the river after dinner. Kerr brought his horse to the door and desired the deponent to hold the door. Witness cross-examined: Did you help mend the fire? Yes. Got dry fuel for the fire and left Kerr in the bar. Evidence of Caleb Turner: Came into the bar and went to drink. He stooped down, and said something was lost.

Black**, July 11: Deponent was at the house of Emanuel Hoover where Affee Brooks stole his silver watch. Examination of Affee Brooks: Did you take the watch? Knows nothing of it. Did you see Beach at Hoovers? Yes. Did you see the safety chain on the watch? No. Did Beach call for drinks? Beach said he had no money, but wanted to eat and drink. Did Hoover give him any? No. Did Beach ask Hoover if he could lie down? No. Did you see Beach on the bed? Yes. Was there any conversation between you? No. Examination of Beach by prosecution: I came down and left my hat on the table with a handkerchief inside. I washed myself and looked for the handkerchief which was gone. I asked where it was. Brooks said "you must have left it upstairs." I found it in the hat. I asked if she was mistress of the house or where she was? She said she (Mrs. Hoover) was sick in bed. Examination of Brooks by Magistrates: Did he ask for liquor? Yes. His reply? Told him that Mr. Hoover did not trust him. Did he get any liquor? Yes, after Mr. Simon came in, who gave him two glasses. Mr. Simon paid for it, and I gave him two on his own account. Did you go out with Mr. Simon? Yes. Did you snatch his watch from his pocket? No. Evidence of Emanuel Hoover: Beach came to the house between 10 and 11 for a drink but had no money nor credit. He said he always got something. I said "you must do as you did before." He said "I must have one." I gave him a drink. He took his watch out to compare his time with mine. He asked to lie down and went up. He came back down at 5 pm. A girl was sent to come in. Beach and Brooks quarreled over the watch. I asked her, she said she didn't take it and he must prove it. Two men searched him and couldn't find the watch. He hadn't left the house before. Deponent's wife is confined to bed with young children. She and Brooks were the only other people in the house. I offered to let him search the house, but declined. He pointed at Brooks and said "that is the woman who has got my watch." Recognizance taken at *Port Colborne* July 11: Emanuel Hoover and Michael Beach £20 each. Defendant discharged by proclamation, July 15, 1836.

Caleb Ingols, Thorold, carpenter, Phillip Potter, Thorold, labourer and Ansel Ward, Thorold, carpenter. Charged with riot, assault and battery against *Thomas McMahon*, Thorold, innkeeper and *Joanah Donovan*, alias *Judy Donovan*, widow, housekeeper, on July 3, 1836. True bill: James Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas McMahon, Joanah Donovan. Evidence of Thomas McMahon taken before J. Keefer, July 4: defendants came to the tavern at dark, and asked for liquor. They were whispering, suspicious behavior, I suspected mischief. I told the housekeeper Judy Donovan not to let them have more liquor. Deponent was unwell, fatigued from a trip, and went to bed. Defendants and *Patrick Garrahan*, shoemaker, became turbulent and demanded liquor. When refused, they broke into the bar and took bottles of brandy and spilled part of it on the floor. Donovan was alarmed and retreated to my room, and endeavoured to fasten the door. It was forced by the men, who abused the deponent. Potter threatened to take my life. Ingols and the others tried to use indecent freedoms with Donovan, and declared she "should be at their service." They used indecent and obscene language. Ingols, Potter and Ward denied the charges. Evidence of Judy Donovan: She requested that they leave and they went out. She turned the key of the front door and retired into the room where McMahon was. They rapped at the door and she refused them admittance. They raised the window sash and came in and made for the room where the deponent was. She tried to keep the door latch down, but Patrick Garrahan forced the door off its' hinges. They came in the room and demanded more liquor which she refused. They insisted they'd break the bar, and McMahon said they might as well do that as to break down the door. They climbed over and into the bar, and then went to drink in the street. The deponent came down with a candle, they came in through the window again, and commenced a loud noise in the bar, cried "hurrah for Jackson and damn the King of England." McMahon got out of bed to search for assistance. Deponent was at the door looking for McMahon, when Potter pushed her into the street. She tried to come in but Ingols took one hand and foot and pushed and kicked her out the door and dragged her to the middle of the street. He threw her violently to the ground. Deponent shouted to a person on the street but they went away mocking her cries. McMahon returned after 12 pm. The men came in again and Ingols asked if she could get two Irishmen to stand before him in her place, that he was a double-breasted Yankee and would give \$5 to spill a drop of Irish papist blood. Potter said to McMahon "you once raised a club to me and put me out of your house, and by the Holy Jesus I will take your life." He went to the bar to drink and McMahon got out. The deponent fled. They returned with help between 2 and 3 am and put the defendants out. Cross examination by Ansel Ward: he came to McMahon first and asked for lodging which was consented to. Deponent did not see Ward go into the bar, Ward was altogether the most reasonable and moderate of the four men. Recognizance taken July 4: Thomas McMahon £10 and Judy Donovan £5; Ansel Ward £10 and Charles N. Henderson £5; recognizance taken July 6: Caleb Ingols £20, surety **John Huntley**, Thorold, innkeeper, £20. Verdict: Caleb Ingols and Ansel Ward "guilty," Ingols fined £5 plus costs and sentenced to three months in gaol, Ward fined £2 plus costs.

St. John, June 1, 1836: Head of the hog examined, the ear on the left side has scars, from the bite of a dog or from hogs fighting. There is no difference in size, the one on the left droops a little more than the one on the right. No other marks present. Evidence of William Orderly, taken before William Mylne on May 31: McCrerie and Foster stole my hog off the street and killed it. McCrerie apprehended by warrant. Evidence of *Robert Goldie*, Dunnville, storekeeper: Last fall a bitch and two other dogs attacked Orderly's hogs, the dogs had hold of one by the ear. The one ear hung down on it's eye and the other stood up. It passed his store yesterday toward's *Watt's* house with other hogs, they repassed in the evening but one hog was missing. Evidence of *James Symes*: Orderly said he lost a hog with a droopy ear. I went to McCrerie's and examined the head. Evidence of *Charles Anger*: same evidence. Evidence of *Peter Walker*: McCrerie had the hog, but I didn't see it killed. Evidence of Hiram Watt: Sold McCrerie a hog in the fall, would know it alive but not when dead, had no peculiar mark on it. Evidence of **Stephen Brown**: McCrerie's hog had an ear hang down a small piece more than the other. Did not see the one in question until it was dead. Recognizance taken before William Mylne June 3: William Orderly £50, sureties George Dealy and James Symes £25 each; recognizance taken June 6; Joseph McCrerie £50, sureties *Richard Clarke* and *Mr.* McMillan £25 each. Endorsed: Issue to be decided by the Quarter Sessions. Orderly and McCrerie to be bound, evidence and bonds delivered to the Charles Richardson. Verdict: "not guilty."

I recovered a fine of £5 from *George Huffman* for willingly disturbing an assembly of people met for religious worship, paid to the path master for the division. *James Kennedy* and *Henry Zavitz* attend and will hand in a counter-petition to *George A. Ball*, for a survey of the *Garrison line*. *Richard Graham's* name was not on the petition of January 26, 1835, but now takes an active part by the testimony of *John Bowen* and Henry Zavitz. The Garrison Line, a straight line, is a very important boundary to be ascertained. Hitherto it involved a great deal of vexation, trouble and law suits from inaccurate surveys and conflicting interests. Unable to determine the line accurately on the original surveys. Commission to decide the position of the north side of the line.

Township of Bertie. A bridge on the Concession line between Concessions 10 and 11, crossing a large branch of *Black Creek* below the Lime Stone Ridge is impassible. It was never a finished bridge, as Statute Labour was inadequate to keep both road and bridge in repair. The road is a direct and shorter way to the principal market village of Chippawa without it requires a circuitous route to *Waterloo Ferry*. October 4, 1836. The crown of one was fine and the other coarse. Did Maria Cornish bring back the bonnets? Witness said no. Miss Reach told witness to go to Miss Dexter's and ask if a bonnet was brought to her shop? Miss Dexter said a mulatto girl brought one to be done up. Richard Lee: Went to Miss Dexter's. *James Cornish*, the husband of Maria, asked if his wife Maria brought a bonnet to the shop? She said yes, Maria Cornish said no. Asked witness to see a bonnet and take it to Miss Reach and return it Miss Dexter said tell Miss Reach to come tomorrow and she should see it. Miss Dexter: Says a coloured woman brought a bonnet to be fixed between 10 and 11 am, but it was not the prisoner. Catharine Van Riper: No reason to believe a bonnet was taken from Miss Reach. Sophia Swick: Took bonnet to Miss Dexter to be chased. Ann Dexter: is positive the bonnet is the same one brought by Mrs. Swick. Jane Mead: Bonnet is the same one as at Miss Dexters. Eliza Dexter: nipped up the bonnet in my sister's shop, is the same one now produced.

Rex vs. Samuel Hathaway Farnsworth. Samuel Hathaway Farnsworth of Grantham, yeoman (defendant), charge: assault with intent to carnally know a child, August 25, 1836. Recognizance taken before *E.S. Adams* and *Henry Mittleberger:* Samuel H. Farnsworth, of St. Catharines, £200; Hiram Moore (yeoman) and John Bassett (gentleman) of St. Catharines, £100 each, September 19, 1836. True bill: Timothy Hixon (foreman.) Witnesses: James Sears and Harriet Dougherty Sears. John H. Sears, painter, St. Catharines, recognizance £100, taken before E.S. Adams and Henry Mittleberger, September 19, 1836. List of witnesses, October 15, 1836: James H. Sears, Harriet D. Sears, Ann Sears, Elizabeth [Talieux?], Alanson Hott, Dr. William Ferris, Dr. F.P. Converse, William Bate, James Foley, William G. Mosely, Nelson Sanderson, Orvin Potter, Dr. C. Beadle, John Sheldon. Signed William H. Merritt. Grand Jury presentment: verdict "guilty." Fined £25 plus costs and 3 months in gaol. Costs £53.14.0. Evidence of Dr. Converse: On the 14th Dr. Ferris and I examined Harriet D. Sears (8 years old). An unusual enlargement of the parts, I did not before examine a living female of her age. Unusual to have the membrane stretched and discharge present. Unsure what it was. She went with defendant to his premises. He put her on a board, stood up, and was as high as his head. He pulled up her clothes and wet her. Also in the kitchen, he put down his breeches and pulled up her clothes and wet her. Impossible to have any intercourse without hurting her considerably. Natural to infer from the removal of the hymen that irritation might occasion a discharge, violence used. Instances of females born without a hymen are but rare. Discharge of any gleet, or evidence of "ciphalis or gonnerea?" Girl answered questions but not on her own accord, was bashful on the subject. September 19, 1836. James H. Sears of St. Catharines: Was surprised that Harriet was home on the 15th or 16th of August, as she lived with defendant for one year. Called at defendants to ask the cause? No one was there. Deponent knocked. Harriet was 7 years old in July. Naturally diffident. Related the same story several times. Defendant had access to her, placed her in different positions to accomplish his purpose. Nothing to do with others. Brought home her clothes except a few articles. State of her shift when pulled off, something unnatural appeared to her mother. Applied to Dr. Beadle and Converse to examine her. Magistrates ordered them to examine her, information given to George Rykert and Henry Mittleberger. September 15, 1836 Samuel H. Farnsworth: attempted to violate his daughter four weeks ago. Directed her to turn away the cow in the barn and while there came in, shut the door, put her on a board, lifted her clothes up and attempted to violate her. Did so as far as he could, then and there did ravish and carnally know her. September 16, 1836. Ann Sears: Harriet is a child by Farnsworth's former wife. Came home with clean clothes. Threw them in the cradle. He pulled up her clothes, pulled down his breeches &c. Did it once on the barn floor, her standing and defendant knelt on his knees to accomplish the same purpose. Mrs. Farnsworth questioned her on coming from the barn why she was so long and threatened to whip her and hang her with rope if she didn't tell the cause. Mrs. F. ordered her to go to *Mrs. Higgins*, get breakfast. Then came home. Last winter he promised her candy. When asked why she didn't inform, she said she dared not. Nothing to do with other persons. No complaints against the child.. Harriet Sears: Defendant put her on a board in manger where horses eat hay. Spit on his fingers and put spit between her legs, and other times in the barn and kitchen. Put her near the window and sat in chair, pulled down his breeches and spit on his hand and rubbed it between her legs. Mrs. Farnsworth asked what took so long. After breakfast was called for by *Mrs.Kemble* to get her clothes. Went home, told the affair to her stepmother. September 19, 1836. Sarah Higgins: Went by the Sears home. Asked if she knew why the child was home? Various reasons, she is a lying child and stubborn. Mary Ann Kemble at home, told Harriet to get her clothes between 10 and 11 am. When questioned, she persisted in her stories. September 17, 1836. Dr. C. Beadle. Evidence concerning Mr. Farnsworth's health, says he hasn't had cephilus. He is in bad health, and there was a discharge of gleet. Gonorhea and cephilis are different from

gleet. Farnsworth's physician hasn't examined his parts but took Farnsworth's word for the state of his parts. If he has gonorrhea or cephilis, he would have apprized witness as his physician. Cephilis is communicated by contact. Samuel H. Farnsworth: Several necessary witnesses and unnecessary ones. Have demanded a day beyond the time he attended except Dr. Ferris. Some not called or examined. To swell expenses against him. Signed *Lewis Clement*, January 14, 1837. Statement objected to as overcharged. C.Beadle: Dr Converse, L. Cross, William Ferris and myself examined Harriet Sears. Discharge from irritation of her parts, hymen wanting, unusual discharge at her age. Violence used. September 19. Dr Ferris: No laceration to her parts. Did not appear a healthy state due to the discharge. Parts swollen. Occasioned by gonorrhea by communication. September 17. Eliza Yates, of St. Catharines. Knew Harriet Sears more than a year. She is a storyteller. Boards at the defendants. She told that she was to wash in basin, found it was not so, it was frozen over. Came to Higgins at 7 or 8 am for breakfast, at 10 or 11 am Miss Kemble called to get her shift and go to her father's. Sears said some wretch ruined his child. She wouldn't place confidence in the child because she'd lie, and wouldn't own up even if whipped. Advised to often send child home since child is in the habit of lying. September 17. Sarah (Sally) Cleveland, wife of John Cleveland. Some boys were back of Belnap's fence with Harriet (or so says her son William.) She went there and saw James Foley in an act of carnal knowledge with Harriet. There were several boys. *Mr. Bate's* boys saw her, asked son *Charles* if he saw anything, James McGill was once with her 3 or 4 weeks ago. She spoke with defendant once in the spring about some honey, but nothing until now when Mrs. Vandecar spoke of the affair. September 17. Maria Townsend. Spent two or three days at John Lewis' house. Mrs. Godfrey Waud and witness had a talk, a word about the case. She asked her, she wondered what little girl it was whom report had attracted this case to. Harriet hung down her head on a chair while this conversation occurred, and from circumstances she was induced to ask the girl if she knew who it was and she replied it was her. She related the circumstances. Clothes were stained a good deal. Was sore, her back pains her, couldn't sit at all. Nelson Sanderson of St. Catharines, shoemaker: statement of services performed. Brought defendant to examination before His Majesty, and at Niagara on trial. Fee £4.6.0. Costs £26.8.0. October 26, 1836. Signed George Rykert.

Rex vs. Washington. William Washington, of Stamford, labourer, coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing a pair of boots belonging to George Coventry of Chippawa, value 5/, September 26. Witnesses: George Coventry, Samuel Cooper, Joseph Wright, Jesse Hickman. True bill: T. Hixson (foreman.) Verdict: "guilty," October 12. Sentenced to 39 lashes on the bare back, at 12 pm on October 13, 1836. Signed Daniel McDougall. Witnesses: William Duff: boots taken on September 28 from the shop of Jesse Hickman, barber, Chippawa, and concealed at the house of William Washington. He was lurking about the shop. Committed to gaol for felony September 29th. Joseph Wright: Doesn't recollect boots or slippers. Did see the prisoner. Came past Hickman's and put up a sign and picture in the window. Hickman said the boots were stolen in the night from the shop through the window. William Washington appeared before William Duff on the complaint of Thaddeus Conklin, constable, re: theft from the shop of Jesse Hickman,

barber, on September 29. He says the boots were bought, paid \$1.00 and cleaned his shop for them. Hickman got them from a man and wanted to soften them. He bought them at sunset and had them on when he went to supper at *Brundage's*. Altered the boots because they hurt his feet. George Coventry: the boots are the same as those taken from Hickman's. *Samuel Cooper*, cook at Brundage's: Washington came in and asked for supper. Bartender told him to get supper. When he came in he had on a very light pair of shoes much worn. Went to Hickman's at 8 pm. Saw the same boots there. Hickman came to me next morning and asked if he'd seen George Coventry's boots which were stolen.

McMullen was intoxicated, and persisted to do damage to it. Evidence of *Samuel Soper*, February 6: was at Wright's at 7 pm, McMullen was there, tore my coat (value £3.) Fined damages and costs £3.10.0. Laid over to April Sessions.

Letter from *B. Tench* to *Luther Boardman*: *Thomas McChesney* of *Port Colborne* (Humberstone) tavern keeper, on December 23, 1836 assisted and abetted to spoil, burn and destroy the great coat of *Henry Douthill*, Humberstone, clothier (value £4.) Recognizance taken before *John Alma* on December 28: Thomas McChesney £10, sureties *Abraham Schooley* and *Benjamin Cutler* £5 each. Fined £4.10.0. plus £2.11.3. costs, arrested and put into gaol until paid. [Confirmed that defendant paid 5/- plus costs, January 12, 1837.)

Letter from *Daniel McDougall* to *William Morris*, Toronto, December 22, 1836. At the Grand River, the people at the *Nelles Settlement* complain of the *Court of Requests* being held at *Dunnville*, 30 miles distant. Can a new division be established? Mentioned this to *Mr. Rykert*. Bring up the matter at the Sessions. Letter from *William Morris* to *Daniel McDougall*, Toronto, December 23, 1836: I talked with the Chief Justice over the *Court of Requests Act*. Mr. Macaulay said the Magistrates in the Midland District referred to the Attorney General, who said that a division may be made any time by the Magistrates at Quarter Sessions.

Her house in town was set on fire and burned on December 5, suspects Charles Melony. December 7: the house was let to Charles Melony from March 15 until two months ago. He refused to pay the rent, my husband distrained his goods for a writ by Warren Claus. The prisoner kept the key, and was angry with my husband. Evidence of Susan Roberts: saw some man walk away, low in stature, with light coloured clothes and cap. Evidence of Alexander Anderson: the prisoner said Drain treated him like a rascal, and that he would have his revenge. Evidence of Alexander Scointon: heard the prisoner say he would have his revenge. Evidence of Charles Melony: he didn't give up the key since his wife lost it. He was at home when the Drain house was burned, was not outside the house until people gathered to put out the fire. He doesn't recall saying what Alexander Anderson said that he said. Warrant issued, arrested by Lewis Donnally but allowed to escape. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall, Thomas Butler and Lewis Clement: Mary Ann Drain, Alexander Anderson and Alexander Scointon, £20 each.

Warrant issued by *George Keefer* to *Charles Henderson* on September 12, 1836 to apprehend *Jesse Brown*, on the complaint/oath of *Miner Stillwell*: blue pantaloons were stolen at *Cleveland's Inn* on September 11, believes Jesse Brown (a coloured man) left the house and stole them. *John Harper* allowed to execute the warrant in Toronto, September 17, 1836.

Recognizance taken before *Samuel Street* of *Drayton Halcombe*, Crowland, yeoman £50, sureties *R. Hooker Lee*, Chippawa, gentleman and *John McLaughlin*, Humberstone, farmer, £25 each. To answer to a misdemeanor, November 7, 1836.

Evidence taken before *James Cummings*, December 6, 1836. *Edward Bryant*, Chippawa, labourer, was summoned to attend court at *Drummondville* by the *Commissioner of Highways* on October 15 for neglect of duty. *Henry Clark*, mason, asked if he would order on *Adam Fralick* for money. He said yes, he had a note to pay \$22.50 or \$22.75 to bearer. He met Fralick on the highway near *Mr. Slater's Inn* at Drummondville. He gave him the order, Fralick put it in his pocket, and said he had no cash but would come down the next week and pay it. Henry Clark brought suit against Fralick for \$22 and costs. A judge ruled in favour of Fralick, Clark ordered to pay costs. Bryant never got paid for the order, and Henry Clark was defrauded of it. Evidence of *Adam Fralick* of Stamford before *William Duff* and *James Cummings*: the said order was

presented in the barroom of *Ezra Durham*, and paid it to *Edward Bryant* in bank notes. Among others \$1, Bryant returned the change in odd cents. He gave Bryant \$23, Bryant gave back 25 cents. Evidence of *Alfred Talbot*: He said that Clark was angry over the order, and Fralick said "I don't reckon Clark is mad, we will settle that matter" and laughed and walked away. Recognizance taken: Edward Bryant and Henry Clark £10 each, *Patrick Cavanah* £7.10.0. and Adam Fralick £25. *Riverius Hooker Lee* and *James Secord (Collector of Customs)* £15 each.

Letter from Alex Scobie to Daniel McDougall, York, December 30, 1836: affidavit of Helmer's conduct given to the post office courier. Evidence taken before Warner Nelles on December 30: Allan Stewart Macdonald, courier, Hamilton to *Dunnville*. On November 24 my horse was detained by Helmer as security for the tavern bill. The sum owed was small, not as much as he charged, 10/3-. Unable to proceed. The horse was released when paid by the Assistant Deputy Postmaster. Helmer used abusive language, partly intoxicated. He is rough and disrespectful to people in the house, and people "are in a beastly state of intoxication" at his bar. Evidence of Alexander Scobie, Assistant Postmaster at York: Macdonald wrote to me about his horse. Helmer continued to keep the horse. He called Macdonald a "drunken puppy" and "not fit to carry the mail." Letter to *Charles Berczy*, Toronto, from Scobie at York (Grand River,) November 25: Helmer is without hay and oats, and is often unable to supply victuals. There are frequent annoyances of this sort &c. Letter from Charles Berczy, Toronto, to Helmer, November 29, 1836: You are subject to some punishment. I don't wish to appear as complainant, I consider it my duty to forward this letter to you.

Alexander McKay, paid £1.17.6. fees at the Sessions.

Thomas Smith: has a new and commodious house at Pelham. The residence is well suited for travelers. An inn is much wanted here. It is near where *Eber Rice* kept his house for 14 years, and is an improvement on the former establishment. Certificate of good character, signed: *Amos Bradshaw*, *Robert Brooks*, *Samuel White*, *William A. Watson*, *Alvin Draper*, *Samuel Darling*, *Elijah F. Warren*, *John Price*, *Matthew Seburn*. [Rejected.]

John Priest, Thorold, carpenter, bond £10. Sureties **Peter Keefer**, Thorold, merchant and **Nicholas Smith**, Thorold, wheelwright, £5 each. Prays for licence to keep a house at the stand lately occupied by **Daniel S. Brown**, Thorold, January 2, 1837.

His wife used similar expressions and worse. I turned and went out, and a sailor made a blow at my face but missed. I closed the door and met two more with their hats off, who made blows. To save my life I ran to Mr. Donally's, the two men close at my heels. I slipt, and the two men fell on me and beat me. I believe their intent was to kill, which they would have done except for the appearance of Lewis Donally. William Moffatt was the instigator of the whole affair. I loaned the hammer to a poor person working on his premises who ran away. On hearing this, I went to his shop to get the hammer back. Is Moffatt worthy of a licence? January 5, 1837.

Are the *exempt monies* to be collected by the collector of rates and put into the hands of the Commissioners to be expended on the roads? I allude to the exempts of last year which have not as yet been collected. Our township is in debt for a bridge over *Stoney Creek*, they will be very acceptable now to discharge the said debt and others likewise.

Subpoena issued for Ralfe Clynch, George Read, John Gleeson, John Ryan, Thomas Bissell, John Robbins, Eli Jones (coloured man, fiddler) and Levi Hicks. Indictment: whoring, drunkenness, gambling, fiddling and dancing engaged in at her house. Secord, Hienan and Thorold bound £30 to appear, signed Daniel McDougall. Verdict: "guilty." Sentenced to two weeks in gaol, January 14, 1837.

Charged with riot and assault against *Henry Hendershot*, October 28, 1836. True bill: *John Lemon* (foreman). Witnesses: *Peter Cain*, *Mr. H. Langden*. Evidence of Peter Cain, taken before *Daniel McDougall* on October 29: he saw the defendants with *Holcroft Clench* and *Thomas Nugent* at 11 pm armed with clubs, demand entrance to the inn to beat Henderson and *John C. Hainer*. Deponent desired them to go away, they swore not, that they had come prepared to beat Henderson and Hainer. Lewis Donnelly drew his club to strike Henderson. Evidence of H. Langden: the statement of Cain is true except he didn't see Donnelly draw his club, having left before this happened. Recognizance: H. Langden £20; recognizances taken before Daniel McDougall, November 2: Halcroft Clench £20, sureties *Ralph Clench* and Johnson Clench £10 each; William Lawe £20, sureties Ralfe Clench and Lewis Donnelly £10 each; William Fulton £20, sureties Lewis Donnelly and *John Milton* £10 each; Lewis Donnelly £20, surety *Bernard Roddy* £20; Johnson Clench £20, surety Ralfe Clench £20; recognizance taken December 4: Thomas and Francis Nugent £20, surety R. Clench (post master) £10. Verdict: "not guilty," January 14, 1837.

William Harrison, Louth, labourer and Margaret Harrison, his wife. Charged with larceny, stealing one broad axe (value 1/-), one adze (1/-), one saw (1/-), one framing square (1/-), one 2" chisel (1/-) and compasses (1/-) the property of **Thomas Patterson**, Louth, on December 16, 1836. True bill: John Lemon (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Patterson. Letter from Nathan Pawling to Charles Richardson, Port Dalhousie, December 19, 1836: encloses deposition (unable to produce evidence as yet in their favour.) Evidence of Thomas Patterson taken before Nathan Pawling, December 19: Came home from *Thomas Read's* at Port Dalhousie in October 1832. Carried his tools on his back, had business on another road. He went off the road, and put his tools by the side of a log, being safe there. The next day he searched and his tools were gone. He observed the tools in possession of *George E. Read*, December 16, 1836. Read said he bought the adze from William Harrison. Said he would go and borrow the saw, to see if belonged to the deponent. Evidence of George E. Read of Louth: in the summer of 1834 Margaret Harrison sold him the adze and broad axe. He took the adze, and came back for the axe and she said she sold it to a man named **Bush** for \$2. Read paid \$2 for the adze. He was at work on a building at Port Dalhousie on December 16, when Patterson claimed the adze as his own. He went to the house of William Harrison on December 17 and borrowed a saw. Evidence of *Peter Bowman*, Louth, December 19: the adze was that of Thomas Patterson. The chisel was made by the same man with the same mark. Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams, December 20: William and Margaret Harrison of Louth £100, sureties **Johnson Orr** (Port Dalhousie) and **Henry Chapman** (St. Catharines, constable) £50 each. Verdict: "not guilty."

Christian Hurst [alias Christal Hurst] Bertie, yeoman. Charged with larceny, stealing one iron screw wrench (value 5/-) the property of Thomas Micklejohn on January 5, 1837. True bill: John Lemon (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Micklejohn, William [Gray?] and Daniel Sullivan. Evidence of Thomas Micklejohn taken before William Duff at Chippawa on January 6: a screw wrench (value 12/6-) was taken from the engine house of John Kirkpatrick at Chippawa. It was concealed in an out house or mill of the defendant. He was at the premises before the wrench was missed. He had articles of iron in a bag in the steam mill attached to the engine house, and he refused to shift them to another bag when requested to do so by the miller. He said he had other bags and would go and get one. He went to a dark corner and shifted the irons. The wrench produced is his property. Evidence of Christian Hurst, January 7: he went to the mill at Chippawa on the 5th with a black man. He stopped in his house at night and left grist there. He

doesn't know if he slept in the house that night. He made a fire in the kitchen the next morning. He lives on the premises, is hired by the year. Has a wife and two children. Didn't see the wrench, doesn't know how it came to be there. Perhaps the black man took it. Recognizance: Christian Hurst £20, sureties *James Cummings* and *Avery Gould* £10 each; Thomas Micklejohn £10. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol, January 12, 1837.

When asked to pay, Finlay took the flour and said he could burst another barrel of flour and scatter it on the floor and destroy more goods in 5 minutes than the deponent could think of. Deponent fears further mischief, since Finlay said he'd have the flour by force or otherwise. Deponent asked him out of the shop, defendant refused and took up an axe to strike the deponent. Finlay called *Edward Emery* to assist him.

Letter from *Warner Nelles* and *J.H. Mackenzie* to *Charles Richardson*, York, April 8, 1837: will send the convictions of *Latham vs. Hicks*. Will be brought to the Sessions. Evidence of *James Latham*, Indian, Grand River, taken January 16, 1837: in December 1836 he missed a sorrel mare with a white face, white mark on its' back, 4 years old. On January 16 he saw the mare in the possession of *John Hicks* of Cayuga. He requested the return of the mare which was refused. It was feloniously taken. Evidence of John Hicks taken on January 17: he says he is not guilty. Examined several witnesses but further investigation is necessary. More witnesses called in February. The mare did belong to the informant, and adjudge it to Laitham. Parties dismissed by order of the court, April 12, 1837.

File 27-19. Presentment.

Gaol examined. Considering its crowded state, which is almost without precedent, the wards and cells reflect a credit on the sheriff, keeper and subalterns. Better attention is paid to the health of the prisoners. It is an inconvenience to the gaoler to furnish straw for the beds, there being no outhouse to keep a quantity of it. Recommended that a temporary building be erected in the yard for straw. April 13, 1837.

Petition of *Larkin Farrish*, Niagara, aged 87 years. Is infirm and unable to contribute towards his support. He has no property and is without friends. He served His Majesty in the American Revolution as a soldier in the *Prince of Wales Regiment of Foot*, and in the late war in the *Ist Regiment of Lincoln Militia*. Prays for support for his few remaining days, April 11, 1837. Certificate attached states that Farrish is "an old, worn out soldier, Served in two wars with the United States, is destitute, aged 87 years." *Elen* [------], an old infirm widow, lives with *Charlotte Neveaux* in Niagara, is kept on private charity. Prays to arrange for her maintenance, April 11, 1837. [Petitions filed.]

William Anthony, Bertie, Esquire. Charged with assault and battery against *William F. Collins*, on July 29, 1836. Witnesses: William F. Collins. Evidence taken before *William Smith*: defendant gave me a severe blow on the stomach. Recognizance: William F. Collins and William Anthony £20 each. No further proceedings, not having attended to prosecute.

File 28-2.

Samuel Besson, Thorold, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a bag of wheat (value 5/-) the property of Duncan McFarland, on February 8, 1837. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Duncan McFarland, Alexander Hogg, Michael Hunt, Lucy Rogers. Evidence of Alexander Hogg, Thorold, labourer, taken before Jacob Keefer on February 9: deponent manages the farm of Duncan McFarland at Port Robinson. A bag of wheat (2 bushels) was concealed under straw in the barn. It was taken from the granary. The bag was marked with coal and I saw it on the back of Samuel Besson. Went to the mill at Allanburg and found the bag in the sleigh of Calvin Cooke, who said the wheat was from a barrel belonging to Samuel Besson. Evidence of Calvin Cooke, February 10: has nothing to say. Evidence of Samuel Besson: has nothing to say. Evidence of Michael Hunt, constable, Port Robinson: found a marked bag of wheat at the Allanburg mill. Evidence of Alexander Hogg: identified the same bag of wheat. Evidence of Lucy Rogers, Port Robinson, widow: she borrowed a horse, went to get wheat (lent to her) between 7 and 8 pm. She brought the bag of wheat and added about a peck from her own barrel, then sent her son Calvin Cooke to the mill with it. Recognizance taken: Michael Hunt, Alexander Hogg and Lucy Rogers £5 each. Verdict: "not guilty," April 13, 1837.

Samuel Brown, Grantham, labourer, coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing 80 lbs. of beef (value 25/-) the property of **James Monaghan**, St. Catharines, cooper, on January 16, 1837. True bill: **David Thompson** (foreman.) Witnesses: James Monaghan, **Hannah Conn**. Evidence of James Monaghan: Brown went to the cellar and took the beef, value £1.5.0. Evidence of Hannah Conn, St. Catharines: she caught Brown with the beef about dark. She told him to stop, he dropped the beef and ran. Recognizance taken before **E.S. Adams**, January 16: James Monaghan and Hannah Conn £12.10.0. each. Verdict: "guilty," April 12, 1837.

Nelson Campbell, Grantham, labourer, Albert Monro, Grantham, labourer and Ralph Decoray, Grantham, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 12 fowls (value 20/-) the property of Bridgewater Meredith, on March 1, 1837. Witnesses: Bridgewater Meredith, Cadwallader G. Pelton, Louisa Stanley. Evidence of Meredith taken before E.S. Adams on March 1: on February 28 some fowls or poultry (value 20/-) was taken from his barn, were in the house of Ralph Decoray. Deponent went with Chapman and found the fowls. Evidence of Louisa Stanley, wife of Henry Stanley: Campbell bought seven fowls from a man in the country, and five were at his house. Evidence of Cadwallader G. Pelton, St. Catharines, gentleman: was out late, 12 or 1 o'clock on February 28. Came out the hall door, and Campbell threw down a bundle of substance- appeared soft- he considered it something come by dishonestly at that time of night.

Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams on March 1: Ralph Decoray, £12.10.0, sureties *Thomas Henegan* and *John Hinnan*, St. Catharines, yeomen, £6.5.0. each. Verdict: "guilty," April 12, 1837.

File 28-5.

William Cliff, Grantham, tailor. Charged with larceny, stealing a watch (value 40/-), two bank bills (50/-), drawers (2/-) and pantaloons (10/-) the property of **John Hanay** (alias **Heaney**), Grantham, yeoman, on April 11, 1837. True bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: John Hanay, Dr. Mewburn, David Palmer, Patrick McMahon (tavernkeeper at the Falls.) Evidence taken before J. Mewburn: William Cliff, a stranger, came to stop with him. Had no means except \$5. He went to Thorold at the 10 Mile Creek and was loaned \$10 by *Charley Mann*. (Two \$5 bills, Queenston and Montreal.) Cliff was left in the house mending his clothes which were torn and soiled with mud. Hanay went to the neighbours and his wife went to the barn to milk. Cliff left the house suddenly, and the goods were found taken. The watch was under a pillow, a key and three pieces of money attached and two bills. Followed him to Queenston, Lewiston and the Falls. Then went with McMahon to Manchester in the United States where he was found. Obtained a magistrates warrant. The watch and trousers were found at *Biggars*, a tailor at **Lundy's Lane.** Went there and the goods were given up immediately. Had exchanged a watch and other things with Biggar. Evidence of Patrick McMahon: advised the prisoner to give up the rest of the money, \$2, to Hanay. Evidence of William Cliff: refused to answer questions. Evidence of David Palmer, Drummondville, tailor: the prisoner came into his shop with cloth, and wished it made into pantaloons. He was in a hurry, but I made them. A man on the other side of the river was to give him £100. The pantaloons were large, big enough for two. Said he got these items from a man at 10 Mile Creek. I saw a watch, asked if he would trade it, he said yes. Also traded for some vests. He came to my house at noon, his clothes muddy, but he didn't seem fatigued. Recognizance taken before Dr. Mewburn, April 8: John Hanay, Patrick McMahon and David Palmer, Drummondville, tailor, £20 each. Plea: "guilty."

File 28-6.

William Davidson, Thorold, labourer. Charged with obstructing an assaulting a constable, Robert Holditch, on March 30, 1837. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Robert Holditch, John Callaghan, Michael Hunt, William Hill, William Bell, Claudius Arnold, George Jordan, Duncan McFarland. Plea: "not guilty," changed to "guilty." Fined 10/- plus costs, April 14, 1837.

File 28-7.

William Davidson, Thorold, labourer. Charged with assault and obstructing a magistrate, Duncan McFarland. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Robert Holditch [alias Hallyday], John Callaghan, Michael Hunt, William Hill, William Bell, Claudius Arnold, George Jordan, Duncan McFarland. Presentment attached dated April 12. Verdict: "guilty," fined 30/- plus costs £7.13.9. April 14, 1837. [Statement of costs refer to one Isaac Spinks.]

File 28-8.

John Fuller, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing two pieces of wood (value 1/-) the property of *William Ensign*, Niagara, labourer, on February 18, 1837. No bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Ensign, *Francis Drake*. Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall* on February 20: William Ensign saw Fuller take one large and three small pieces of

fire wood. Evidence of *Otis Ensign*, Niagara, innkeeper: saw the fire wood stolen. Evidence of Francis Drake: saw prisoner take the wood. Evidence of John Fuller: deponent took the wood, his mother said that *Walter Elliott* said I might take it. Recognizance taken: Otis Ensign, William Ensign and Francis Drake £10 each.

File 28-9.

John Gordon, Thorold, labourer. Charged with assaulting a constable, Michael Hunt, on November 3, 1836. True bill: John F. Law (foreman.) Witnesses: Michael Hunt, Richard Campbell, John Callaghan. Evidence taken before Duncan McFarland on November 4: Hunt was in the house of Gordon, who concealed and procured the escape of Joseph Boyd at Port Robinson. Evidence of John Gordon: said he is not guilty. Boyd boarded at his house but left on the 3rd. His wife was away, and said not to let anyone go up with a light and was afraid of the house taking fire. He told them to go up without a light. Removed a barrel from under the window as it was in his way. "I know nothing of Joseph Boyd the dirty blackguard." Evidence of Richard Campbell: went with Hunt to arrest Boyd. Gordon said "no constable or authority would interfere to take Boyd in his house." He aided in the escape by putting a barrel under the window &c. Evidence of Obediah Vanderburgh: Gordon would not allow anyone upstairs, they would get into a squabble with Boyd, feared setting the house on fire. Recognizance taken: John Gordon £10, sureties William Hill and Peter Law of Thorold £5 each.

File 28-10.

Henry Hager, Clinton, labourer and Lot Sherry (alias Shelly), Clinton, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing pork (value 5/-) the property of John Bastedo on November 28, 1836. True bill: John F. Law (foreman.) Witnesses: John Bastedo. Evidence taken before Robert Nelles on November 30: Bastedo entered the cellar and discovered pork being carried off by his servant and women. One blew out the candle, the other made off with himself. Recognizance taken before R. & H. Nelles: Lot Sherry, Henry Hager and Ezra Harkness £20 each.

File 28-11.

James Haines, Niagara, labourer. Charged with passing counterfeit money on January 23, 1837. Letter from *Charles Richardson*: *Jacob Keefer* will have the counterfeit money produced at trial, United States silver coins (half dollars) which were tendered to *Robert Crawford*. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Robert Crawford, William Crawford, Chester Wadsworth, William Pritchard, John Hawn, John Wannymaker. Evidence taken before R. Grant and Jacob Keefer, January 23: James Haines of Queenston, labourer, had 15 counterfeits. "They have sworn to a good many lies, that he never told the boy he would bet one dollar or five, and says that there has been enough said." Evidence of John Wannimaker, Queenston, carpenter: was at **Rykert's Tayern**, Haines paid Robert Crawford with a half dollar and to take out 6d (York currency) which he lost tossing coppers. Saw it was counterfeit, and Haines had others in his trousers pockets. Saw him searched by Chester Wadsworth and saw them taken out. Evidence of John Hawn: picked up 14 pieces off the floor near Haines between the bench and chest. Evidence of William Pritchard, Niagara, yeoman: confirms this testimony. Evidence of Chester Wadsworth: found 14 counterfeit pieces on him in Rykert's barroom. Evidence of John Hawn: he was to take charge of Haines when Wadsworth went for a warrant. They were in Rykert's barroom, he seemed uneasy and wanted to go away. He sat on a bench, leaned on a chest. Shortly after 14 pieces were found and a small crucible. Evidence of Robert Crawford, minor son of William Crawford, stone mason: was at *Conrad Rykert's* tavern in Queenston tossing coppers. Haines came in and offered \$6 for \$6 and to toss for it. I couldn't take so large a bet, but would

toss for \$2. Tossed for 6d (York cy) and won it. Was paid 6 coppers by Haines. He then took a handful of silver half dollars out of his pocket. Deponent won a second 6d, and was given a United States half dollar. Believes it was false from his actions and behaviour. Recognizance: John Wannimaker, William Pritchard, Chester Wadsworth, John Hawn, William Crawford for his son Robert Crawford £10 each. Verdict: "guilty." Sentenced to stand in the pillory for one hour, April 15, 1837.

File 28-12.

Christian Hurst, Willoughby, yeoman. Charged with larceny, stealing one harness (value 40/-), bridle (5/-), traces, collar and back band, the property of *Henry Miller*, Willoughby, yeoman, a Menonist, in July 1836. True bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Henry Miller, *Erastus Moses, Jacob Miller*. Evidence taken before *James Cummings*: goods were taken from Miller's stable. Letter of Cummings dated February 2, 1837: has heard of many petty larcenies of Christian Hurst. He and Erastus Moses searched under warrant on February 1, for the property of *Avery Gould* and *Amos Leech*. Found the goods in the stable, smoke house, loft and on horses drawing wood. Recognizance taken before *William Duff* and James Cummings on February 15: Christian Hurst £10, sureties *Ezra Bailey* and *Francis Sawyer Leech* £5 each.

File 28-13.

Christian Hurst, Willoughby, yeoman. Charged with larceny, stealing one harness (value 25/-), double lines and spring clasps (5/-), the property of Jacob Miller, Jr, Willoughby, yeoman, on February 1, 1837. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Henry Miller, Erastus Moses, Jacob Miller. Evidence of Jacob Miller taken before James Cummings on February 2: the goods were taken from the stable, were found when searching with the constable. Mrs. Hurst said "I understand you lost some harness," and told deponent where it was. I didn't recognize it at first, it had been altered. The clasps were cut off, and another set had been sewed on. Recognizance taken before William Duff and James Cummings on February 15: Christian Hurst £10, sureties Ezra Bailey and Francis Sawyer Leech £5 each.

File 28-14.

Christian Hurst, Willoughby, yeoman. Charged with larceny, stealing irons, the property of Amos Leech and Avery Gould, Chippawa, blacksmiths, on September 25, 1836. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Amos Leech, Avery Gould, and Erastus Moses. Evidence of Leech and Gould taken February 1: a large bar of iron for a wagon tire was taken in September, and 11 new horse shoes and a bar of iron, a screw plate, tap and dyes were taken in October. Evidence of Christian Hurst: the iron in the outhouse was bought from James Burfet (alias Barfet) a coloured man at John C. Davis' in Chippawa last fall. He paid 3/- (York Cy) for a whip which he had given in the charge of Burfet and not returned. The harness: last September or October he was returning in a wagon with *Samuel Bierson*, a coloured man, about dark when they overtook a man carrying a harness. They asked him to ride in the wagon. Asked him where he got the harness, he said he sold his horses at *Lundy's Lane* but the purchaser wouldn't give him anything worth the harness so he carried them. Deponent asked him what he wanted for the harness and he said \$7 or \$8. I offered him \$6\\delta_4, and paid for the harness with the exception of the lines. The clasps were put on another set. Evidence of James Barfet, coloured man: Witness is a hostler for J.C. Davis. Prisoner left his whip with me. Paid Davis 3/- (York Cy) but never paid Hurst. Did not give him the iron. The iron was bent on one end, was ordered to take it from the bar to the granary. Couldn't be found later, was stolen. Evidence of James Macklem: borrowed an iron from Leech, was turned in a peculiar way for drawing a [box?] out of a pump. It is the

same one he returned to Leech. Recognizance taken before *William Duff* and James Cummings on February 15: Christian Hurst £10, sureties *Ezra Bailey* and *Francis Sawyer Leech* £5 each.

File 28-15.

Harriet Hyte, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing a bead reticule and tin box (value £1) the property of *Frances Lewis*, on February 15, 1837. True bill: *John F. Law* (foreman.) Witnesses: Frances Lewis, *Eliza Davis*. Verdict: "not guilty," April 11, 1837.

File 28-16.

Robert Kay, Niagara, shoemaker. Charged with obstructing bailiff John Clark on April 8, 1837. True bill: *David Thompson* (foreman.) Witnesses: *Alex McLeod*, John Clark, *Duncan McNab*. Subpoenas issued for *Thomas Whitten*, *J.H. Ma*[-----], *William H. Smith*. Recognizance of Alex McLeod taken before *Charles Richardson* on April 14, 1837 £100. Evidence of Alex McLeod taken before *Daniel McDougall* and *Thomas Butler*, April 10: an execution (writ of capias) was issued against Kay by Jared Stocking and John Grier for a debt of £52.10.2. (dated February 18, 1837) and costs of £2.9.10½. Went to Kay on April 8^{th} to levy against his goods and chattels. The debt was now only £10, he had given one inventory and wouldn't allow another. He said he'd shoot anyone who tried to take his goods. He went to another room, brought out a blunderbuss, loaded with powder and shot. He pointed it at Clark, opened the pan, the priming dropped out; he drew the trigger and snapped, but it didn't go off. I tried to arrest him, and Kay took a large knife and said he'd stab, rushed at the deponents and made several attempts to stab. Evidence of John Clark: went to have Kay sign a bond, the goods were forthcoming to satisfy the bond. Prisoner said he'd shoot &c. Tried to stab us with a large knife. Evidence of Duncan McNab: confirms testimony. Evidence of Thomas Whitten: was present at Kay's regarding the bond. Evidence of *Henry Long*: saw prisoner with a large knife. Evidence of Robert Kay: Clark behaved rudely to my family on April 7th. I resisted because they were going to take our beds. There is property enough to pay the debt and not take the beds.

File 28-17.

Peter Lawrence, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 17 horse shoes (value £1.1.3) the property of Matthew Dobie on February 9, 1837. No bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Matthew Dobie, John McCullough, Lawry Kemp, Robert Miller, Jacob Cushman. Evidence of John McCullough, Niagara, blacksmith: the shoes belonged to Dobie. Evidence of Matthew Dobie: the shoes are now in the shop of Robert Miller and J. Cushman at the Four Mile Creek. Prays for a search warrant. Evidence of Lawry Kemp: he was in Swarts' shop, saw Lawrence there and a dumb man, Mr. Dobie's journeyman, with two shoes in his hand. He gave them to Lawrence, but didn't see Lawrence give anything for them. Evidence of Robert Miller and J. Cushman: Lawrence acknowledges he sold them 17 shoes. Evidence of Peter Lawrence: he sold 14 horse shoes to Miller and Cushman for 7/6- and three more, for a total of 17 shoes. He bought the shoes from David Carr, who works for Matthew Dobie. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall February 10: Peter Lawrence £20, sureties Peter H. Swarts, Niagara, hatter, and John Burn, Niagara, shoemaker, £10 each. Defendant discharged, acknowledges he sold the horse shoes.

File 28-18.

James Lounsberry, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 13 bushels of potatoes (value 40/-) the property of *Christopher Lymburner*, on February 22, 1837. No bill: *David Thompson*

(foreman.) Witnesses: Christopher Lymburner, *William* [------], *John Mellick*, *Jay John Lymburner*, *Cyrus Benedict*. Recognizance taken: Christopher Lymburner £25, Cyrus Benedict, Jay John Lymburner, John Mellick £10 each. Evidence taken before *William Mylne*, *Lothian Cottage*, February 22: James Lounsberry and John Mellick broke open the potato hole of deponent and stole all 13 bushels. Said he talked with Lounsberry last November, had not enough potatoes to stand all the winter. Defendant said he didn't give a damn, had sold them to Christopher Lymburner. Evidence of John Mellick: had a bargain, bought all the potatoes in the hole, 13 bushels.

Evidence of *Mary Ann* Robinson: she left her boxes at Nicquet's, which were opened and articles were taken. Evidence of *George Hamilton*: articles were taken from the trunk. Evidence of *Slade Robinson*, MD. Left home to go to the Chippawa Church, the man George Verral was sober, but drunk when he came home. Asked him where he was, he said over the road at Nugents [sic] drinking &c. Recognizance taken: Robert Woods £20; Marcus Beeler, Thomas Pickens £10; surety Charles Nicquet £5. Robert Wood's bail bond taken before Dr. Mewburn, £10 (\$40) March 1837. Recognizance taken before J. Black, February 3, 1837: Mary Hamilton, wife of William Hamilton and George Hamilton of Humberstone, labourer, £5 each; recognizance taken before Malcolm Laing, November 5, 1836: Charles Nicquet £20, surety Theo. Brundage, Stamford, innkeeper, £10. Recognizance taken January 13, 1837: Charles Nicquet £20, surety John [Stark?] £10.

Letter from **P**[eter] **Spawn**, Ancaster: it is time that he, Tailor and Gage appear at the Quarter Sessions. Can prove and identify Wintermute and Smith. Wheat traced to three different barns in the vicinity, from marks on the bags. Send a subpoena in care of *Erastus Derby*,

constable at *Beamsville*. Cannot attend the Sessions, since he must go to Toronto to receive my war losses. Recognizance taken: Alfred Buss and Peter Buckbee £15 each, surety *James T. Simmerman*, Clinton, farmer, £15; Verdict: "guilty," April 12, 1837.

A race was held on the road between St. Catharines and Queenston on April 22nd between 2 and 4 pm. between Dexter's horse "Limber Jeremy" and a brown horse of Kimball's. Another race was held on April 25th at 2 pm between Dolson's and *John Sopers*. He saw a "rollette" table "a species of gaming machine" at Dolson's and saw *Milton Reynolds* playing on it in the bar room. It is owned by *Cornelius Johnson*. He saw *Levi Gilles*, John Dolson and Cornelius Johnson playing quirts in the garden last Sunday. Bad characters assembled at the inn. He heard Kimball threaten to "skin" any man who complained. Recognizance taken: David L. Dexter, St. Catharines, baker, £50, sureties *James Boles*, St. Catharines, yeoman and *William McCandlish*, St. Catharines, [foreman?], £25 each, John Jefferson Kimball £50, sureties W.H. Sanderson, St. Catharines, blacksmith and *William May*, Grantham, yeoman, £25 each.

Evidence taken before *J. Mewburn*, April 13, 1837. *John Carter*, a boy in the employ of *John Murray*, of the Falls, feloniously carried away two coats, a vest, hat and trousers on April 10th. *Colonel Delatre* made the committal, but constable *Charles Nugent* allowed the prisoner to escape.

Evidence taken before *H. Nelles* on June 10, 1837. *Adam Conkle Jr*, Clinton, yeoman, altered a receipt of *Thomas Walker*. Recognizance taken: Adam Conkle Jr. and surety *John Hawn*, Clinton, yeoman, £50 each. Defendant discharged from recognizance, July 14, 1837. Signed *Charles Richardson*.

Recognizance taken before *Tench* and *H. Mittleberger*, July 6, 1837: *Patrick Nugent*, St. Catharines, innkeeper and *William Henry Sanderson*, St. Catharines, blacksmith, £50 each.

Warrant issued by *Humphrey John Tench* to constable *John Steele* of Niagara, to apprehend [-------] on the complaint of *John* [*Birttruk*?] July 9, 1837.

A *Pharo Table* (a gambling table) was kept in a licenced tavern called the *Pavilion House* by *William Stewart*. The house is kept by Messrs. *William Dickson* and *William Chamberlain*, gaming goes on with their cognizance. Evidence taken before *Tench* and *Mewburn* July 14, 1837: *Joseph Morrison*, late Lieutenant in the service of *Her Majesty the Queen of Spain*, but now of Stamford, is a stranger here. Was on his way to Quebec on June 11th and boarded at the Pavilion Hotel for a fortnight. Saw the Pharo Table there. Several people lost money there. He lost \$300 to Stewart. True bill of presentment, signed by *Dennis Woolverton* (foreman.) Bench warrant to issue July 14, 1837.

Writ of *fieri facias* to the Sheriff. To levy against the goods and chattels of the parties. If they have no goods, chattels or tenements, then take them and confine them in gaol "to abide the judgement of the Court of Quarter Sessions." To remain there until the debt is satisfied unless they give sufficient security for their appearance.

File 29-14. Presentment.

Gaol was examined, the privy has no door, has a very nauseous, disagreeable, unhealthy smell. Must be remedied. The prisoner's food is insufficient, recommended to add half a pound of bread to the daily allowance. A large corner room on the debtor's side could be made safe for the reception of prisoners, July 14, 1837.

Dr. Porter, prays for the support of a helpless crippled coloured man named **George Martin**, 10/per week. Also £8 for his account for disbursements for support. [Rejected, no power to order payment.]

File 29-15. Jail Records.

Letter from *Dr. Porter* to the *Gaol Committee*, July 13, 1837. A letter was given to me yesterday. I have frequently alluded to complaint. The complaints of the debtors are not groundless. July 12th in the gaol you will observe stench arising and flooding the whole building from the privy. This is prejudicial to the health of all the debtors.

William Telfer, Dunnville, carpenter. Is a prisoner in gaol, upon a writ of capias ad respondendum. James Moss, plaintiff. Telfer arrested by Henry Campbell, Dunnville, yeoman. He is not a legally appointed constable. Order issued by Richard A. Clarke, commissioner in King's Bench. Oneas John McMillan said to Campbell that he had no authority to arrest Telfer, not being a constable. Has since been confined. Taken before Lorenzo D. Raymond, July 15, 1837. Upon hearing the attornies, the order for arrest set aside. Telfer discharged out of custody on the motion of Alexander Stewart. Signed Thomas Butler, July 19, 1837.

File 29-16. Non-Conformist Applications.

Rev. Samuel Rose, Stamford, ordained as a Wesleyan Methodist preacher. Evidence presented before **William Adams**, July 12, 1837. Certificate granted and oath of allegiance ordered to be taken, signed **Charles Richardson** and **Thomas Butler**.

File 29-17. Orders.

The presentment against *Robert E. Burns* ordered to be communicated by the Clerk of the Peace to the Lieutenant Governor.

Clerk of the Peace ordered that the property seized under the warrant of *James H. McKenzie* on the complaint of *Thomas Bryant* against *Curtis* under a petty trespass case be given up to Curtis. The case was appealed, Bryant not having appeared. July 14, 1837.

Recognizance and bail of *Sarah Cleveland* ordered to be respited until the next Sessions.

Donald McDonald ordered to be **High Constable** until next April at the usual fees, July 11, 1837.

Treasurer ordered to borrow £100 on the credit of the Niagara District for the maintenance of the gaol prisoners, July 11, 1837.

The *Gaol Committee* ordered to take the necessary steps to obtain £100 for the maintenance of prisoners.

File 29-18.

Peter Wheeler, was placed on the assessment roll of the Town and Township of Niagara. Was charged Statute Labour for a lot in town. Wheeler doesn't own the lot, is not liable for the assessment and desires to be relieved therefrom, July 12, 1837.

Signed Samuel Street, James Cummings, William Hepburne, Henry [Bone?], Isaac Durham, James Macklem, Joseph Miriam, James Secord. Fee paid £7.10.0, licence granted July 11, 1837.

Petition from *Samuel Street*, *P. Delatre* and *John Alma* to *Captain John Jordan*, Niagara Falls, April 28, 1837: *George McLaughlin* has rented a house at the Falls for an inn. Taken the house kept by *Dominique McEwe* at the City of the Falls. Since there is no authority for Sessions until July, he wants approbation until then. Fee paid £7.10.0, licence granted.

Robert Tune, Thorold, baker. Prays for licence to sell ale, beer and cider. House and sign "R. Tune's bakery." Recognizance taken before **George Keefer** and **Jacob Keefer**, May 24, 1837: Robert Tune and **William Carter**, Canborough, yeoman, £10 each.

File 29-23.

Charles Bell, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one gold watch (value 250/-) the property of Mary Law, on May 13, 1837. True bill: Dennis Woolverton (foreman.) Witnesses: Mary Law, Nicholas Furey, David Dunton. Evidence of Nicholas Furey taken before J. Mewburn on May 13: Deponent went on horseback after Bell, overtook him on a stone fence on the Queenston Road. Charged with the theft, he denied it. He was taken to Mr. Grant, then to Stamford to Dr. Mewburn. The prisoner said to turn back, the watch was hidden in the stone wall. The deponent promised the prisoner if he confessed where it was, he should be forgiven.

The watch was found in the wall. Evidence of Charles Bell: acknowledges that he took the watch. Evidence of Mary Law, wife of *James Law*, Stamford. Nicholas Fury hired a man conditionally for one month. Went with the family to *Queenston*. Deponent left her watch on a nail near the window, pulled the blind down. She spoke to Bell in the garden. The watch was not there on her return. The parlour and kitchen were shut, but the bedroom door was open. The watch was not found. She gave the alarm. Value of the watch £20. Recognizance taken: Nicholas Furey and Mary Law £20, surety *James Gordon* £20. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to two years hard labour in the penitentiary, July 13, 1837.

File 29-24.

George Boice and Johnson Fuller, Niagara, labourers. Charged with larceny, stealing 18 bank notes of 5/- each, and one note (10/-) the property of **John Armstrong**, Niagara, yeoman, on September 20, 1836. True bill: *Dennis Woolverton* (foreman.) Witnesses: John Armstrong, Thomas Humphrey, Samuel Proctor, Anna Humphries. Evidence of John Armstrong taken before **Daniel McDougall** on February 16, 1837: deponent was at the inn of Thomas Humphrey, had seven \$1.00 bills and \$13 (a \$2 bill and eleven \$1 notes) all of the Bank of Upper Canada. Deponent was intoxicated and was carried me to bed. When I woke up, the money was missing. Evidence of Anna Humphries, wife of Thomas: Armstrong was taken to bed. Fuller returned first and then Boice. Boice got up again and was seen trying one of Armstrong's boots on. She said to leave Armstrong to himself and go downstairs. They left and Armstrong and Boice came back again, was accused of taking his pocket book. Dropped some quarter dollars and a bank note. She didn't observe the others go upstairs. Evidence of Samuel Proctor, labourer: Boice and Proctor came to his father's inn. When asked by his mother how he stole the old man's money, he said he didn't but Fuller did. He gave me \$5.00 of it. Said he was present when the plan was conceived and could go to the stable and put his hand on the pocket book. Boyce declared if prosecuted he'd swear against Fuller. Evidence of Boice and Fuller: they were drunk all day, and know nothing of the robbery. Assisted Armstrong to bed. Evidence of Johnson Fuller: he saw the pocket book in Boyce's possession but doesn't know how much money was in it. Before they parted Boice purchased a pipe for the deponent, paid 1/3- for it. Recognizance taken April 15, 1837: Johnson Fuller, sureties *Otis Enign*, Niagara, innkeeper and *John P. Hannett*, Niagara, innkeeper, £10 each. Recognizance taken March 20, 1837: Thomas Humphries, Queenston, innkeeper, Samuel Proctor, Niagara, labourer and John Armstrong £20 each. Verdict: "not guilty," July 14, 1837.

File 29-25.

Adam Conkle and Alexander Tufford, Clinton, labourers. Charged with larceny, stealing 400 bushels of wheat (value £150) the property of Thomas Walker, on April 29, 1837. No bill: Dennis Woolverton (foreman.) Witnesses: John S. Walker, Isaac Wismer, John Bestedo, John H. Kilborne, John Hamilton, Harmon House, Thomas Walker, Timothy Hixon. Evidence of John S. Walker taken before R. Nelles: the wheat was stolen from his father's storehouse on the lakeshore. Recognizance taken before H. Nelles, May 3, 1837: Thomas Walker and John S. Walker, Clinton, yeomen, £50 each. Recognizance taken before Robert and William Nelles: Adam Conkle and Alex Tufford £50 each.

File 29-26.

John F. Diffenbacher, Thorold, grocer and Robert T. Hughson, Thorold, pedlar. Charged with conspiracy to cheat and defraud Martin Overholt, Pelham, of £40 on April 3, 1837. True bill: David Thompson (foreman.) Witnesses: Martin Overholt, George Hill, John Hill, John Lyons. Diffenbacher sold a deed of Bargain and Sale for lot 10 in the Cross Range of Willoughby to

Hughson for £200 but had no title to it. Evidence of Martin Overholt, taken before **Daniel McDougall** on April 8th: On November 10th past and April 3rd defendants conspired to defraud, sold part lot 10 Cross Range Willoughby, value £35. Evidence of Robert Thompson Hughson of Allanburgh, taken before **Duncan McFarland** on April 10th: he is not guilty, he bought land from Diffenbacher. He took the deed and lent him \$150. He sold his house in *Allanburgh* to *John G*. Stockley and let him a horse wagon. He didn't know Overholt had the land until one month ago, George Hill said he had the deed. Sent *Ira Stinson* with the deed down to the *Register Office*. When Diffenbacher made the deed he'd been paid by Overholt. Has no claim. Did a great deal of business for Diffenbacher and took the land as part settlement. Didn't know he was going to leave the province. Evidence of George Hill: Diffenbacher and Hughson came to my house. They asked if Overholt was there, deponent said no. They wished for me to draw a deed in favour of Overholt as they wanted to get money from him. Deponent met the prisoner in February, he wished me to examine the Register at Niagara and see if any part was sold off. Wanted a deed for property. Couldn't do it until Overholt's land was taken up since it would lay Diffenbacher indicted for a criminal offence. Acknowledged that Overholt had a claim. Diffenbacher was to pay the amount due to Overholt before the deed was executed. Recognizance taken: George Hill £20. Recognizance taken before *Charles Richardson* on April 14th: Martin Overholt £20, sureties Zephaniah Horton, Thorold, yeoman, Henry Ryan, Gainsborough, yeoman and John Hill. Recognizance taken before Charles Richardson on April 14th: Robert T. Hughson £100, sureties Zephaniah Horton and Henry Ryan £50 each. Warrant issued by **Duncan McFarland** to constable *Michael Hunt* to apprehend Diffenbacher and Hughson, April 10, 1837. Affidavit sworn before Charles Richardson, April 14th: Hughson, of Pelham, peddler, is unable to procure witnesses to defend himself, and cannot safely proceed. Verdict: Hughson "not guilty." 38

Lewis Donally, Niagara, innkeeper. Charged with assault and battery against John Russell on June 15, 1837. True bill: Dennis Woolveton (foreman.) Witnesses: John Russell, William Clarke, John Alma, Alex McLeod, A. Gilkinson. Verdict: "guilty," fined 5/- plus costs.

File 29-28.

Joseph Enos, Saltfleet and Grimsby, labourer and transient. Charged with larceny, stealing one coat and kid gloves (value 60/-) the property of Silas Crysler, Grimsby, carpenter, on July 9, 1837. No bill: Dennis Woolverton (foreman.) Witnesses: Silas Crysler, Diana Crysler. Recognizance taken before R. Nelles and H. Nelles, July 10: Silas Crysler £20, surety Samuel S. Moore, £20. Warrant of Hugh Wilson, Saltfleet to James Glover or other constables in Saltfleet to apprehend Joseph Enos. Search warrant, believes the goods are concealed in the house of [Laten?] Sweet of Saltfleet. Letter of High Willson to R. Nelles, Saltfleet, July 10: I send you

Henry Hainer, Haldimand, labourer. Charged with horse stealing, one mare and colt (value £7.10.0.) the property of Caty George, on May 16, 1837. True bill: Dennis Woolverton (foreman.) Witnesses: Caty George, Wilson Fish, Moses J. Peck, William Cook (interpreter.) Evidence taken before David Thompson on May 20, on the oath of Caty George and Wilson Fish, Cayugas: Hainer was drunk and didn't know what he was doing. Deponents had disposed of the mare and colt to Moses J. Peck, Cayuga, innkeeper. Evidence of Moses J. Peck: he purchased the mare and colt for a gun and some money. Recognizance: Caty George £10, Wilson Fish and Moses J. Peck £5 each to appear. Prisoner committed to gaol for July sessions. Verdict: "not guilty," July 12, 1837.

File 29-30.

John Charles Hainer, Grantham, yeoman. Charged with false pretences on June 15, 1837. True bill: Dennis Woolverton (foreman.) Witnesses: Mary McDade, Lucius Kimball, B. Buchan, George Draper, Cyrus Smith. Hainer pretended to procure a note of £1.10.0. for saw logs sold to Cyrus Smith, but defrauded him of £350. Evidence of Mary McDade, Grantham, innkeeper, taken before *E.S. Adams* and *Henry Mittleberger*, June 28th: Hainer came to the inn and asked Cyrus Smith for a note for 15 saw logs at 3/-, or £1.8.1½. It was during the *races at Niagara*. The note was signed at the bar, she looked at it but didn't recall the amount. Hainer told Smith the note was signed and written by Mr. Kimball. Evidence of George Draper, distiller, Grantham: saw Hainer with a note for £350. Had a \$5 note before, and said if Smith didn't pay he'd sue or make him pay. Evidence of *Lucius C. Kimball*, St. Catharines, grocer, taken June 27th: Hainer came to the shop of *Robert Gray* and asked him to draw a note of £350. He said Smith would sign it. Said it was an uncommon note, and was making trade with Smith. Evidence of Beacher Benham. Grantham, distiller, taken June 28th: Hainer was in the distillery and asked if deponent had seen Smith? He came soon after. He asked what to do with the £350 note which was wrong, he hadn't read it before signing it. Note intended to cover saw logs for \$5. Advised Hainer that he was better to give up the note or "you'll find yourself in trouble." Hainer refused unless Smith paid for it. Doesn't recall the date. Smith said he gave no note to Hainer lately. Hainer said "that was the way he got out of paying his notes." Evidence of Cyrus Smith, Grantham, carpenter: he agreed with Hainer for logs, to be sawn at the *mill* at *Lock 4* on the *Welland Canal*. Rate of $1/10\frac{1}{2}$ - per log. On June 14th Hainer was at McDade's inn and asked for a note for 15 logs. On June 15th he signed a note for £350, believed it to be for saw logs £1.10.0. Hainer fraudulently got the note. They have had no other dealings except for the saw logs. Verdict: "not guilty," July 14, 1837.

File 29-31.

Alvin Hill, Crowland, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing butter, salt, two bushels of potatoes, two shirts, and a basket with 12 lbs. of flax (value 8/-) from the mill house of *Thomas Dell* on May 27, 1837. True bill: *Dennis Woolverton* (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Dell, *James Dell, James Cummings, E.B. Wells*. Search warrant issued by James Cummings to constable James Dell, June 5, 1837, goods believed secreted to the house of *Mrs. Chambers* on *Navy Island*. Warrant to apprehend Hill. Evidence of *Henry Miller*, Willoughby, taken on June 6th: on May 29 deponent had wool, fleece and sheets stolen, value 40/-. He got a basket of flax &c from Wells who owed him money, \$14½. Deponent took the items and they squared off. They were later sold at 1/- York. Evidence of *Wells Leonard*: deponent resides on Navy Island. The prisoner

came to his house with wool shirts and sheets and asked if he might leave them. Sold copper ware, tubs and a churn also some flax. He said he couldn't get money for work and had to take such things. Evidence of *Erie Bennett Wells*: deponent met the prisoner at *Dunnville*. Decided to move to Chippawa for labouring and coopering. He worked for Mr. Secord and dressed staves for the prisoner. He brought goods- potatoes &c- said they were from Wells Leonard on the island and other goods from a widow woman. Came home one night with a basket, his wife exclaimed that she wondered "in the name of God where he got it?" He had a felt bag and a square basket which contained flax. He brought home pork and a beef tongue, had been smuggling at Tonawanda. Suspected him, and came to lodge information. Barney Dell said he'd been tracking him, and would have him taken care of. Evidence of Mary Ann Wells: corroborates the testimony of her husband. Evidence of James Dell: a basket with flax was found on Navy Island. Evidence of Thomas Dell, June 28th: the basket and flax were his property. Evidence of Henry Miller, Willoughby, yeoman, a Menonist: wool was stolen from his barn, also flannel and sheets. He heard of the larceny and went to James Dell to search for his goods and found it on Navy Island. Evidence of Vanransler Hill, son of the prisoner; he traveled with his father on the line of the Feeder Canal at Dunnville to the clay banks at the lakeshore. Had tubs, pails and a churn there, also cloth taken from a peddler at Canborough. They broke the lock on his chest and took the cloth. Concealed goods in a hollow tree west of Dunnville. Also some linen cloth, 60-100 yards, taken from Mr. St. John (merchant at Dunnville) and hidden in the woods at Mr. Davis'. They went to **Port Robinson** and then to **Chippawa**. He was with his father when he took the flax, potatoes and butter. Was beaten and kicked for refusing to go with him. He was with his father when they took the bundle at Miller's barn. Brought goods to a canoe and then took them to Navy Island. Recognizance taken June 28th: Thomas Dell and Henry Miller £5 each. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to 6 months in the penitentiary, July 13, 1837.

My wife fastened the door to keep the men out, had been drinking heavily in the street. Becker broke the door. He made noise and threatened. Gillam, Alonzo Merriman both had clubs. Beck and Merriman put a ladder to the windows and broke the windows with a club. They struck my wife on the arm with a club. They tried to pull her out of the window, and tore her clothes. Merriman came in and threatened us and abused my wife. None of them struck me but used abusive language. My wife was hurt in her arm and hands, the window was broken. The party continued about the house until 4am. I ordered them to depart, Becker is a constable. Directed to keep the peace, Liquor was brought from the tavern in a tin kettle. They made noise and rioted the entire time. Recognizance taken before Elias S. Adams and Henry Mittleberger July 6, 1837: William and Sarah Culp, £50; recognizance taken before E.S. John McDonald appeals his conviction of the 4th, verdict in favour of *Turner* and *Slaght*. Says he is not guilty of the offence, cut timber at Dunn. Appealed before *William Mylne*, September 6, 1837. Letter of *Warner Nelles* to *David Thompson*, *Nelles Settlement*, Indiana, September 5: John McDonald said he had no witnesses and therefore was not ready. I would not sit on the case when I heard that. *Mr. Mellen* tried the case, brought in costs, gave an execution which was levied on his horse. I did not stay for the trial. *Caleb Benedict* statement of court costs £1.9.0. Recognizance taken before David Thompson, September 6: John McDonald £10, sureties *John Young*, Nelles Settlement, yeoman and *Robert Patterson*, Indiana, £10 each. Decision: without entering into who has the right to clearance, Turner and Slaght were entitled to remove cut timber and clear up the land, but not to cut more until the question of right is decided.

Johnston Green, labourer, Ira Green, minor son of Henry Green, Thomas Anderson, minor son of Charles Anderson, and William Biggar, labourer. On October 20, 1837 the defendants broke open the door and enetered and stormed the house of John Higby at Lundy's Lane. Fined 5/each. Evidence of Eunice Higsby, Lundy's Lane and Joshua Wright taken October 23: Ira Green, Thomas Anderson and William Biggar broke the door of Amos Wright on October 20th and destroyed his buckwheat, strewing it about the fence and trees. Each fined 17/6- for the buckwheat and £2.17.0. costs, £1 each to the use of the highway. Verdict appealed before J.J. Lefferty, October 26, 1837.

Robert Casewell, Chippawa. Charged with assault and battery against **James Mumford**. Fined £1.5.0. plus £1.7.6. costs before **J. Mewburn**, August 11, 1837. Recognizance taken August 14: Robert Caswell £20, sureties **John C. Davis** and **Henry Clark** £10 each. Verdict appealed before **William Duff**.

The note is #1228, dated November 3, 1836 and signed by W. Colburn (President) and Luther R. Sims (agent.) Evidence of John Miller: he saw Fite get the bill at Widow Nelles. Warrant issued to constable Milligan by David Thompson, Indiana, September 6, 1837. Recognizance taken: Christian Fite £10 to appear, and John Miller 100/- to appear. Burns is unable to read writing, Jones told him he was only signing a note for £3.15.0. Grand Jury presentment attached, July 12, 1837. Bench warrant issued, matter set over to the next Assizes.

William McIntyre, St. Davids, labourer. Charged with riot and obstructing a deputy. Evidence of Henry Long, Niagara, clerk to the Deputy Sheriff, before Thomas Butler and Daniel McDougall: On September 15, about 80 or 90 coloured people assembled in a riotous manner near the court house to obstruct the deputy in delivering Solomon Moseby to the Kentucky authorities, authorized to receive him by order of the Lieutenant Governor. When the Riot Act was read they did not leave for more than an hour. They were armed with clubs. Evidence of Robert Waddell: saw the prisoner between the Court House and Hammitt's, 15 minutes after Moseby made his escape. Evidence of William McIntyre, Niagara, labourer: He came to the Court House 1 or 2 days before the riot. He didn't hear the Riot Act. He was standing quiet when McLeod struck him with a dirk. He went to Hammitt's Tavern and got his cheek dressed. He came to town and did not return to the gaol until the next day. Ordered to be bailed September 27, 1837. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall, September 27: William McIntyre and surety Ralph M. Crysler, Esquire, £25 each.

Erection of a House of Industry. As a receptacle for the idle and worthless, cast upon our shores, refuse from the Poor Houses from the mother and other countries. They are induced to come here, where they would be more amply provided more. We cannot recommend a House of Industry here. 1) we doubt a policy of holding out inducements to idle and profligate of becoming paupers, all of whom are able to labour and can earn subsistence if they have the will to labour. This may be a necessity in a more densely populated country. 2) By adopting the act, it would entail lasting evil on the District, and increase taxes in proportion to the present liabilities and cause much dissatisfaction. May be doubled or trebled with the poor house. Not five tax paying persons would consent to be burdened with the expense of a poor house. It would be wiser to prevent the problem before rather than remedy it when it is in existence. We protest the industrious classes supporting the idle and worthless. We are not opposed to make provisions for the aged, infirm, orphans or lunatics. November 8, 1837.

Evidence taken before *James Cummings*, January 26, 1838: *Alexander Cameron*, seaman/mariner, was on board the schooner **Rose** at **Chippawa**. The crew was ordered not to let strangers on board. William Corby came on board January 25th. Deponent ordered him off, was vexed and went away. He came back with William Moffatt, took hold of deponent and struck him with their fists two or three times. They threw deponent overboard and tore his clothes to pieces. The crew came to his assistance and took Moffatt and Corby to the guard house. Evidence of Andrew Wood: corroborates the testimony. Saw Moffatt come on board twice, Corby said "Damn it, give it to him." Evidence of *Thomas Lapenotiere*: was placed in command by *Captain Drew*. Heard a noise in the forward hole, came on deck and asked what the noise was? He went below and found two men not of the vessel scuffling with Cameron. Corby said it was not his fault, that Cameron commenced it. Cameron said if he didn't leave, the sentry would put him off the wharf. On leaving, he said if Cameron came ashore "he would give him a damned good licking." Cameron wished to follow but the deponent prevented him. He went below, heard a noise and came back on deck. Cameron, Moffatt and Corby were fighting together. Deponent said "I thought I ordered you ashore, now go off the wharf immediately." Moffatt abused the deponent, called him "a damned young whelp," and "a young son of a bitch." Moffatt was tipsy. He said to Moffatt it was no business of his, and he must leave the wharf. Moffatt jumped on the schooner and went after Cameron. Deponent went to Captain Drew and on their return found the men in the guard house. Evidence of *William Light*, midshipman on board: corroborates the testimony. Said Moffatt struck the first blows. He assisted to take Cameron out of the creek. He and **Dr. Hawkins** helped to take the men to the guard house. Recognizance to appeal taken before *Henry Nelles*, January 27, 1838: William Moffatt, William Corby, Niagara, sureties William Henry Smith, Niagara, livery stable keeper and Robert McBroom, Niagara, mariner, £50 each. Moffatt and Corby appeal conviction of assault and battery and trespass case.

Recognizance taken before *J. Keefer*, November 18: *David Beacham*, Thorold, labourer, £10, sureties *Joseph Middaugh*, Thorold, yeoman and *John Hoover*, Thorold, yeoman, £5. Bound to keep the peace toward *Isaac Ostrander*.

Evidence taken before *E.S. Adams*, November 25, 1837. On November 22nd *Jacob Martin* (coloured man) took the axe of *Walter Dittrick*, St. Catharines, innkeeper, value 10/-. Martin confessed, said he sold it to *Samuel Dolson* for 3/9-.

Letter from *David Thompson* to *Charles Richardson*, *Fort Erie Garrison*, January 6, 1837/8: Encloses some papers. Since I [examined?] the constable, have learned that he is of respectable parentage.

Dorman Cooper, Walpole, yeoman. On December 6, 1837 a two year old steer (value £6) was stolen from his barnyard by *William Clark* of Walpole. Warrant issued on December 8th to William Dockstader to apprehend Clark. Evidence of William Clark taken December 11th: confessed to the theft. He drove the steer home 4 or 5 miles, and killed it. His wife *Matilda* assisted in skinning it. His wife didn't know it was stolen. They took the hide to *Nathan* McComb's barn, and disposed of the beef to Mr. Eastman, Mr. Duncan, Mr. Wilke, his motherin-law Martha McComb, Mr. Adams and Mrs. Dean. One month ago he stole and shot Mr. **Pott's** heifer. It was also hidden at McCombs. McCombs was absent, but his sons Nathan, William and Chester were at home. Chester helped in killing it, but didn't know it was stolen. The beef was eaten by us. He was induced to steal by *Charles Green*, who said I could easily support my family this way. William McCombs assisted in stealing from Coopers, and Chester assisted in stealing from Potts. The Potts farm is on Nanticoke Creek in Walpole. Prisoner was committed to gaol by Special Constable John McGie. Recognizance: Dorman Cooper £10. Warrant issued to McGee to apprehend William Clark dated December 12, 1837. Evidence of Chester McCombs: assisted William Clark take one steer from Jacob Potts on October 17, 1837. He helped to kill the steer, and hide it in the barn. He presumed Clark bought it. Recognizance of Chester McCombs and Nathan McCombs Sr., Walpole, yeoman, £10 each. Nathan McCombs

and his wife *Martha McCombs* bound £5 each to present evidence. *William Dockstader* and *William McCombs* sick and unfit to be moved.

Evidence of John McGee of Indiana, taken December 15, 1837. Was to take a prisoner to Niagara. Put up at the inn of Jacob Bowman at Gainsborough. Three men entered at 10 pm on December 13th and ordered me to let the prisoner go. They went away, then 15 to 20 came to rescue the prisoner by force. I went to bed at 2am with two lads, and had 9/- in my pocket which was stolen. Warrant issued to arrest Jacob Bowman and his two boys, also John Fergie clerk to Luke Cavers. Evidence of Catherine Bowman wife of Jacob Bowman. McGee came into the inn on December 13th and called for two glasses of whiskey and supper for himself and his prisoner, also a mug of hot sling and hot stuff (half whiskey). Jacob Depoty, George Bois [alias Boice] and John McPherson came in and asked for the release of the prisoner. They came back, Henry Groff, Abraham Baker, Robert Merriman and James Ross were present. Evidence of Anna Ecker: was present and saw the above named men. Evidence of John Peck: was present and saw the men including Baker, Groff and **Joseph** [Stratten?] McGee had been drinking but was not drunk. Evidence of Joseph Stratten: was present. The constable said the prisoner was gone. Evidence of *James Ross*: was not present, came there the next day. Evidence of *Hiram Cronkhite*: he saw the constable and prisoner. The constable had been drinking but was not drunk. He saw George Humphrey, William Smith and others there. Doesn't know how the prisoner got off. Evidence of *Thomas Collins*: was present. Saw several men there, Jacob Depoty and others. Evidence of *John Fairgie* [alias *Fergie*?]: was present, saw the constable. Knows nothing of his character. Evidence of Jacob Bowman: says that Henry Groff and Abraham Becker [alias Baker] saw the prisoner run off the road. Recognizance taken: Abraham Becker £10, sureties William Swick and John Lacey £5 each; Jacob Bowman £10, sureties William Swick and John Lacey £5 each; Henry Groff, £10, sureties William Swick and John Lacey £5 each; John McPherson £10, sureties William Swick and Luke Cavers £5 each; Jacob Depoty £10, sureties William Heaslip and John Lacey £5 each; George Boice £10, sureties William Heaslip and John Lacey £5 each; Catherine Bowman (paid by Jacob Bowman) and Anna Ecker £5 each; McGee committed to gaol in the custody of William Swick for allowing a prisoner to escape.

Evidence of *John Fergison*, Hamilton, peddler, taken before *David Thompson* on December 20, 1837. Was at Indiana on December 18th at the house of *William Orderly*. He was assaulted by *Dennis Keely*, snapped his pistol and ordered *John O'Neal* to shoot me. Evidence of *Francis Daly*, Hamilton, peddler: was present, Fergison's testimony is true. Evidence of *William Burk*, Canborough: heard Keely say he wished the pistol had gone off and through Fergison's head. Evidence of Dennis Keely: has a license to peddle. Evidence of *John Farr*: heard the statement made about the gun going off. Evidence of *Oliver Burnham* and *Ambrose Johnson*: corroborate the testimony. Evidence of *James Darrough*: was present part of the time. He was put in custody in the guard room. Evidence of *John Wood*. Evidence of *William Orderly*: knows the plaintiff, a "suspicious character." Knows nothing of abuse. Evidence of John O'Neil: he doesn't know how the plaintiff came to be taken in custody. Heard the defendant say to shoot him. Recognizance taken: Dennis Keely £20, sureties *David Price* and *George Mylnes* £10 each; John Fergison £10, Francis Daly, William Burk and John Farr £2.10.0. each.

Letter from *B. Tench* to *Jacob Keefer*, Port Colborne, January 29, 1838. Sends evidence from four witnesses in a case of conspiracy, robbery, riot and aggravated assault. If guilty they should be severely punished, £5 for each assault. Evidence of *Obadiah Vanderburg* taken before B. Tench, Thorold, January 27th: at 2 o'clock he saw *Jacob Hendershot*, *Jacob Bowman*, *Philo Powers* and others beat *Winslow Beech*. Bowman told his (Vanderburg's) wife that if he did not come downstairs they'd burn the house and break her head with a pitcher. Vanderburg paid \$5 to Powers to save her life. Evidence of *Sarah Ann Vanderburg*: corroborates the testimony.

Evidence of *Winslow Beech*: on January 22nd he was hawling wood for Obadiah Vanderburg. innkeeper at Thorold. Hendershot and Bowman came up and demanded the team, showed a letter and pretended it was a warrant. They grasped the reins, Powers struck deponent with a club and knocked him off the sleigh. Vanderburg came out and said to leave him alone and went into the house. Hendershot and Bowman followed him and cried "let us pound him to death!" Vanderburg returned with a gun but didn't present it at anyone. He told them to let the deponent alone, who was on the ground being beaten, or he'd shoot. The men laid hold of Vanderburg, Hendershot had a butcher knife in his hand. The deponent and Vanderburg escaped into the house. Vanderburg went upstairs armed with an axe. He came down when he was compelled to pay \$5. Evidence of Mary Bacon: was present and confirmed everything. Evidence of Jacob Hendershot, Pelham, yeoman, charged with assault and conspiracy to gain money, taken before Jacob Keefer on January 29th: on the 22nd he met Vanderburg's team being driven by Beech. He bargained for a ride to *Drummond Hill*, but Beech refused. Powers said they had the right to press for the team. Beech assaulted Powers. He denies the assault in Vanderburg's house. Evidence of Philo Powers: he did not assault Beech. He saw Vanderburg with a gun, and sprang at him and said "shoot and be d[amn']d."⁴⁹ Vanderburg fell, changed hands and hit me with the butt end of his gun. Vanderburg went into the house, said he was sorry he'd hurt him, and wished to settle up for \$5.00. Evidence of *George A. Bowman*- went to Obadiah Vanderburg's to get Power's cap. He told the landlady if they didn't get the cap, they'd decant enough to pay for the cap. She gave them the cap. Deponent denies that he threatened Vanderburgh. Recognizance taken January 29, 1838: Jacob Hendershot of Pelham, yeoman, £10, sureties John Bowman, Pelham, yeoman and Daniel Moore, Gainsborough, yeoman, £5 each; Philo Powers, Pelham, yeoman, £10, sureties John Bowman and Daniel Moore £5 each; George A. Bowman, Pelham, yeoman, £10, sureties John Bowman and Daniel Moore £5 each; Obadiah Vanderburg and Winslow Beech, Thorold, labourer £10 each, sureties Anthony Upper, Thorold, yeoman, and Peter Weaver, Thorold, labourer, £10 each.

Letter from *Ogden Creighton*, Chippawa, to *Lt. Col. Nelles*, 4th *Lincoln Militia*, February 18, 1838: *Andrew Randall*, 40 Mile Creek, is under escort. Was taken up on desertion from your Regiment (*Captain Nixon's* company) in the late Rebellion. Whilst guarding at *Queenston*, he crossed the river to New York without a pass and remained a week away. I leave it in your hands as Commanding Officer and magistrate. Recognizance taken before *Henry Nelles*, February 22: Andrew Randall, Grimsby, yeoman, sureties *James Randall* and *Byard McCurdy* of Grimsby, yeoman, £40 each. Recognizance of *Captain Robert Nixon* (4th Lincolns) £40.

Evidence taken before *William Mylne*: *George Myres* and *John Richmond* forced open the store of *James Thompson*. Thompson was alarmed at 2 am by a knocking at the door, as if someone was breaking in. Deponent hallowed "whose there?" The more he called, the louder the noise. He got out of bed and tried to open the front door of the store but could not, as it was partly forced open. He looked through the opening and saw *Henry Montague* on the street, going to *Mr. St. John's* house. He called to him to open the door, and asked if he shoved at the door. Montague said no, but saw two men at the door and was certain they was around the house. He called to Mr. St. John and *Mr. Thomas*. They pressed the door open and saw something behind a barrel- it was the prisoner with an axe under him. Evidence of Henry Montague: was at the house of *Andrew Thomson* at 12:10 pm. Heard someone walking on the street, ie, stepped onto a platform in front of James Thompson's store door. Meant to force the door, heard it crash. Heard a cry out "whose there?" Saw the prisoners go around the store. Deponent said he had a gun and would go and try to find them. Asked if he would sleep with him, he said yes but call on Mr. St. John and Mr. Thompson. They saw movement behind a barrel. Mr. Thomson came out without his shoes, told

him to put them on. Tied John Richmond up, took him to *Robert Campbell* who wouldn't take charge of him, then we took him to Thompson's store. H. Campbell was sent for who took charge. John Richmond was apprehended on March 10, 1838 stealing a cross-cut saw. He was drunk when brought in. Had concealed the saw under a hay stack. Recognizance taken: Henry Montague and George Myres £20 each. *W. Barr*, examined the witnesses in the case of John Richmond, now a prisoner in Niagara gaol. He finds nothing to warrant his detention, and recommends his discharge, March 15, 1838. John Richmond discharged March 16, 1838.

Simeon H. Goss, MD. Was at the house of **Barton Farr** to attend a man and his family who lie sick there. They ought not to leave the house, March 12, 1838. **Peter Swick**, Canboro', summoned to attend court. His child is badly burned and very ill, wishes to be excused.

Evidence taken before *James Cummings*, Chippawa, March 12, 1838. *Abraham Morell* was on guard on the 11th at the Square opposite the inn of Philo Smith. He went to the bar and bought four glasses. There were several intoxicated men, and saw some of his own company at Smith's who were not on duty. They got liquor at the bar, paid one-quarter dollar for his liquor, both whiskey and beer. Evidence of *William Young*: he purchased three glasses of beer, others got whiskey. Evidence of *Silas Jennings*. Was at Smiths. Was treated to three glasses of whiskey. Paid four coppers for one glass, the other two on trust. [Notation in pencil: *Alfred Cook*, no license.]

Philo S. Smith, Chippawa, innkeeper. Summons on March 13th to answer charges of a complaint that he keeps a tippling house and sells liquor on the Sabbath, and keeps Her Majesty's troops intoxicated that day. Bring witnesses March 12th. Discharge ordered March 14, 1838.

File 31-9. Presentment.

"An Act to Authorize the Erection and Provide for the Maintenance of Houses of Industry in the Several Districts" March 4, 1837. The site for such an institution is imperiously called for. There have been numerous applications in the Sessions, April 14, 1838.

Phoebe Goodell, St. Catharines. \$2.00 weekly to keep an insane person, March 13, 1838.

Dr. Raymond, Niagara. 7/5- weekly to keep an insane person, March 13, 1838.

Dr. Mewburn: the **bridge on Queenston Road** near **Sergeant Curry** is unsafe and dangerous. Prays for the immediate erection of a safe bridge, March 13, 1838.

There are a large number of *deaf and dumb and insane persons* in this district, more than in the other districts. Lincoln County has 20 deaf and 33 insane persons, and Haldimand has 7 who are deaf and dumb. They are supported out of the District funds. The expense to support a *lunatic asylum* would be little more than the sums paid by several Districts for support. The benefits of such an institution would counterbalance a little more expense. Under proper treatment, inmates might be restored to a degree of reason and allow them to "act their part in civilized society." An insane person has been in gaol for 7 years, "an amelioration of his calamity has taken place" but "under proper treatment he may have exercised reasonable faculties." Pray that a statement of the sums expended here annually on the insane be made and transmitted to the Lieutenant-Governor for his consideration. We hope that another session of the Legislature doesn't pass without provision being made for this humane object, March 14, 1838. [file also contains a draft copy of this document.]

Isaac Thomas, Drummondville. \$2.50 weekly to keep an insane person, £13.8.9. March 14, 1838.

Martin Buckman, Gainsborough. \$1.50 weekly to keep an insane woman, March 15, 1838.

Catherine Frank, Gainsborough. \$1.50 weekly to keep an insane child, March 14, 1838.

John Smith, Caistor. \$2.50 weekly to keep an insane and blind person, March 14, 1838.

Thomas Angleman, Thorold. \$1.50 weekly to keep an insane boy, March 15, 1838.

The unsatisfactory mode of business for the Quarter Sessions is felt by many who have miles to come to attend. After 2 days, they have not had sufficient business to occupy their attention for more than a half hour. March 14, 1838.

Have inspected the gaol. Found to be in good repair, no complaints from the prisoners. The strict confinement of the debtors is severe. Space is walled on the outside of the gaol to enable them to have the benefit of fresh air. March 15, 1838.

The Queen vs. Mark Kennedy, larceny. Jury sworn: Matthew Smith, Henry White, Andrew Gregory, Henry Smith, Henry Sensebaugh, David Merritt, Moses Merritt, Alex Nelson, Oliver Fulton, William Stringer, Andrew Burns, John Moore. Witnesses sworn: Simon Welsh, Mark Kennedy. Verdict: guilty.

John Moore-petition read for licence to keep an inn. Granted, fee paid 5/-.

Order of Court passed for £104.3.4. salary of *Clerk of the Peace*.

Check issued to *Joseph Evans* (constable) for £4.

The Queen vs. *Mark Kennedy*, larceny. Sentenced to 24 hours imprisonment in the Gaol of the District.

Court adjourned for an hour.

Court opened. *Elizabeth Campbell* discharged from her recognizance. The recognizances of *Charles W. Edwards* and *William C. Stoneman* estreated after being called 3 times.

The Queen vs. **Bernard Riley**, larceny. Discharged for want of evidence.

Jacob Martin discharged by proclamation.

Malcolm Laing, Esq, sworn to go before G. Jury. Grand Jury came in with true bill against *George Hamilton*-larceny. Prisoner arraigned on indictment. Pleads guilty, sentenced to 2 weeks solitary confinement in Niagara Gaol.

Letter from *James Clarke* to *Captain McDougall*, 1st FL Infantry, Chippawa, March 12, 1838. Sorry he cannot call. A man of your company, Mathew, took an axe from the hospital, to be returned to Drummondville. *Matthew* [*Hawing*?] of Louth has applied for a tavern licence. Should be refused although he rents a house from me. He is unfit, a foreigner from Buffalo who came here last fall and is not entitled to much consideration.

Letter from *Edmund Riselay*, *Waterloo Ferry*, March 12, 1838. *C & I. Stanton* (shopkeepers) and *J.W. Lewis* (innkeeper) apply for a licence to continue to sell. In consequence of the unhappy disturbance they could not procure others. Grant them a licence for one year.

Letter from *Thomas Bryant* to *Daniel McDougall*, Caledonia, Grand River, January 15, 1838: I put my name on a petition two weeks ago to recommend *Samuel B. King* as a tavern keeper in Seneca. Since none are to be granted licences but subjects of undoubted Loyalty, but King is a foreigner not to be trusted. He has now taken the oath. It is not right to allow such men to have the opportunity of having the means put into their hands in any way to "indgure' the prosperity of our province. *Jacob Turner*, same place, an American. Gives the best security for his good behaviour. A large party from the Lower Province and the United States were getting out oak lumber. They assembled at King's and not at the houses of Her Majesty's subjects. This doesn't look right. The foreman won't allow the men to go where they will. If they talk of going to

Bryant's Tavern, "the foreman tells them not to go to the damn'd Tory's house." I wish my licence be granted as usual. Excuse my hasty scrawl.

George Watson Black, Rainham, yeoman. Charged with threatening James Adams, Rainham, on February 16, 1838. True bill: William Barr (foreman.) Witnesses: James Adams, Domenic McDougherty. Evidence taken before Edward Evans on February 20: Black threatened to rip Adams open and take his life, threatened him with an axe and said he'd put a ball through his forehead. Recognizance taken before R.M. Crysler March 6: George W. Black £20, sureties George A. Ball and Peter Ball £10 each. Verdict: "not guilty," March 14, 1838.

File 31-15.

Elizabeth Campbell, Niagara, femme covert, wife of Alexander Campbell. Charged with larceny, stealing 100 rails (value £1.10.0.) the property of Daniel McDougall, on January 12, 1838. Witnesses: Arthur O'Neil, Charles W. Edwards, William Stoneman, Henry Strothers, Lena Strothers. Evidence of Daniel McDougall taken before R.M. Crysler on January 15: Alexander Campbell, mason, William Campbell, labourer and Eliza Campbell stole the rails. Evidence of Lena Strothers: saw William Campbell attempt to pull up the fence rails of Daniel McDougall. She called out that he go away, or she would go and tell Mr. McDougall. He left the fence. Evidence of Arthur O'Neil: he went to Alexander Campbell's house, asked if they knew anything about the rails, since Campbell was in the habit of taking them. They said there were none there. Yet deponent saw some on the fire and others on the floor and under the bed. Recognizance taken before R.M. Crysler, January 19: Eliza Campbell £10, sureties Charles Edwards and William C. Stoneman £10 each. Defendants discharged March 16, 1838.

George Hamilton, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a blanket, coats, jacket, cloth coat, vest, telescope, linen shirt, red pocket book, \$10 note of the Farmer's Joint Stock Bank Co. (Toronto), \$2 note of the Commercial Bank (Kingston), two \$5 notes of the Bank of *Upper Canada*, counterpanes, carpets, linen sheet, tumbler, and trowsers (value £20) the property of Adam Crysler, on January 22, 1838. True bill: William Barr (foreman.) Witnesses: Malcolm Laing, Adam Crysler. Evidence taken before Ogden Creighton, January 15: William Charles Gwynne, Toronto: Cloak was taken while at Cryslers on January 8th. John Hillyard Cameron, Toronto: John Hector's telescope was taken, January 10th. Isaac Buchanan, Toronto: Coat was taken on January 8th. *John Hector*, Toronto: telescope was taken on January 10th. *Grant Powell*, Toronto: Jacket and pocket book were taken on January 10th. *William Billingham*, Toronto: Pantaloons were taken. J.H. Cameron, Toronto: a brace of pistols, value £10, taken. Evidence taken before Malcolm Laing, January 23: George and William Hamilton were in the employ of Adam Crysler until January 22nd. They were overtaken at Port Robinson, and are in the custody of Constable Coleman. Warrant issued by Mr. McFarland. They were brought back to the Falls, had a bundle with the goods of the Queen's Rangers. The bundle with the deponents goods is at Mr. Killmans. Evidence of Adam Crysler, January 23: George Hamilton, William Hamilton and Mary Ann Robinson Hamilton are accessories. The goods of Crysler and the Queen's Rangers were taken at Lundy's Lane. Receipt for property worth £8 given to Crysler by Malcolm Laing. Evidence of George Hamilton, Stamford, domestic servant, January 23: freely confessed to the theft. Witness: John Killman, Hamilton's father is not implicated in the theft. Information taken by Duncan McFarland, Port Robinson, January 22: the goods of Adam Crysler returned to him by constable Dilly Coleman, Information of Dilly Coleman, innkeeper, Port Robinson: goods were

stolen from Adam Crysler at the Pavilion House at the Falls. Suspects William Hamilton, alias W.H. Hughs, and George Hamilton, alias G.H. Hughs. Warrant issued to constables Dilly Coleman or William McCan to apprehend Hamilton. Recognizance: Adam Crysler, £100. Plea of George Hamilton: "guilty," sentenced to two weeks solitary confinement, March 16, 1838.

John Johnson, Niagara, labourer (coloured man.) Charged with larceny, stealing 12 fowls (value 6/-) the property of *George Lawrence*, Niagara, farmer, on February 6, 1838. True bill: *William Barr* (foreman.) Witnesses: George Lawrence, *John Upper*, *George Cain*. Evidence of George Lawrence taken before *John Alma*, February 7: the fowls were taken from the barn between the swamp and the lake. Evidence of John Johnson: he didn't steal the fowls, his wife *Maria Johnson* bought some of them from a man in a sleigh, and two others he bought from a man in the street. Doesn't know the man's name. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two years hard labour in the penitentiary. Writ of *mittimus* issued March 16th for John Johnson and *Peter Wilkins*, addressed to the Keeper of the Penitentiary.

Mark Kennedy, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 40 rails (value 12/6-) the property of *Daniel McDougall* on January 25, 1838. True bill: *William Barr* (foreman.) Witnesses: Daniel McDougall, *Simon Welsh*, *Patrick Finn*. Evidence of Daniel McDougall taken before *Thomas Butler*: rails were stolen. Evidence of Simon Welsh, Niagara, labourer: saw Kennedy take the rails. Evidence of Mark Kennedy: denies the charge. Recognizance taken: Mark Kennedy £10; recognizance of Patrick Finn taken before *Ralph M. Crysler*, February 6: £5. Verdict: "guilty," Kennedy sentenced to 24 hours in gaol, March 16, 1838.

File 31-19.

Bernard Riley, Niagara, private soldier. Charged with larceny, stealing two earthen dishes (value 5/-) the property of *John Ussher*, on February 6, 1838. Witnesses: *Edgeworth Ussher*, *Margaret* O'Hare, John Dobie [alias Dobbie], Eliza Smith of Chippawa. Evidence of Eliza Smith taken before *Malcolm Laing* on February 12: the side dish on the table was sold to her by Riley for 1/3-. Evidence of John Dobie, yeoman. Two boys and one woman quarreled on the road above Chippawa regarding dishes. Riley was one. He saw two dishes which he took from them, breaking some others. Riley said he took them from John Ussher's barn. He took them to Edgeworth Ussher's house, then went up the river to John Ussher's followed by Riley. Called for help, 3 men and 1 woman came out to demand their property back. They threatened me, but I told them it was left at Edgeworth Ussher's. The dish is one in question. Evidence of Bernard Riley, taken before Malcolm Laing and Daniel McDougall: he was with William Hewson towards the island. They overtook *Mrs. Finley* and *Mrs. Watling*, and went to John Ussher's barn. They found *Edmund Dennet* and *John Watling* there. Four men came from the road to the barn. They told John Watling not to go to the house as "the old man was watching." The women said they'd go to the house if the men would watch. They went and returned with the crockery in their aprons. Evidence of Margaret O'Hare: she was at Edgeworth Ussher's house. James Riley and Bernard Riley came and demanded the dishes, said they were left by a man who took them from them. Mrs. Ussher refused, and was intimidated by violent language and behaviour by James Riley. They took hold of her roughly and told her to deliver up the dishes. Evidence of Edgeworth Ussher: he returned to his house on February 7th, had been absent. His wife said that property was taken on the 6th by Bernard and James Riley of Hamilton in the Gore District, now privates in the 1st Regiment of Frontier Light Infantry. They took two dishes (value 5/-.) Recognizance:

Edgeworth Ussher, Margaret O'Hare and John Dobie £10 each. Verdict: defendants discharged for want of evidence.

John Ryan, Chippawa, labourer, Richard Smith, Grantham, labourer and John Taylor, Niagara, yeoman. Charged with riot against Philo S. Smith at Chippawa on February 6, 1838. True bill: William Barr (foreman.) Witnesses: Philo S. Smith, Henry Clark and James Fitzgerald. Recognizance taken before William M. Ball and R. Melville on February 19: John Ryan, a private in the 1st Lincoln Light Infantry £20, sureties Peter Wheeler (gaoler) and Jonathan Lovell (yeoman) £10 each. Notices given at the same time to the parties. Verdict: "not guilty," March 16, 1838.

Peter Wilkins, Bridgewater (Stamford), labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 12 yards of light gray factory woolen cloth (value £3.15.0.) and 40 yards of light gray satinette (value £12.10.0.) the property of *Samuel Street*, Stamford, on October 28, 1837. True bill: *William Barr* (foreman.) Witnesses: Malcolm McDonald, Jacob Cronkhite, Kenneth Robertson [alias Robinson.] Evidence of Samuel Street taken before William Duff, November 7: Cloth was stolen from deponent's shop at the Falls Mills. Prisoner's brother Stephen Wilkins aided and abetted in the theft. Evidence of Peter Wilkins, taken November 9: Had the light grey cloth over the river, bought it on the way to the ferry from a stranger in the presence of his brother. Paid \$6.00 for it. Said it had 20 yards, but it only had 12 yards. I didn't think it dear at \$6.00. Hoped for a bargain. The stranger was drunk and laid out all night. Heard from *Frederick* [*Goukin*?] that cloth was stolen from Mr. Street, but it was a different colour. Borrowed \$3.00 from my brother to pay the stranger, a \$1.00 Bank of Upper Canada note and \$2.00 Bank of Michigan. Mr. Robinson questioned the bills. **Ransford Knapp** was searching for cloth, prisoner sold part to Mr. Cronkhite for \$10. Evidence of Kenneth Robinson: he is a clerk at Mr. Streets. The cloth stolen was lying on the counter. The shop could be entered unperceived by those in the office. He was writing in the office between 7 and 8 and heard a noise. The door was open and a piece of cloth was on the floor, dropped by the thieves. He told Mr. Street and Knapp. He saw a stick near the door but the night was very dark and he couldn't see a man on the street. The prisoner was apprehensive Mr. Robinson would arrest him for debt and stayed out of his way. Evidence of *Mr. Gustavus* Shepherd, Pekin, Niagara County, New York: Jacob Cronkhite had gray cloth, sold to him by Peter Wilkins. He paid part in cash and the rest in chickens, and moving furniture from *Lewiston* &c. Wilkins asked Cronkhite to keep the cloth out of sight a few days, there may have been a mistake made on the duties on cloth. He would see the Custom House official at the Falls and put the duty to rights. He suspected something was wrong and didn't want any trouble. Wilkins also tried to sell cloth to *Malcolm McDonald* of Pekin, New York. Evidence of Jacob Cronkhite: He knows the prisoner, was in the village of Pekin and rented a house. He said he'd like some cloth, the prisoner said that he and his brother would go to Canada for cloth on October 28, in exchange for a horse he sold. The cloth was in a trunk, and would come in a railroad car from *Manchester*. He bought 9 yards for \$10, part in cash, the rest in barter (chickens) and teaming &c. The prisoner later came to the witness and said the collector was after the cloth. He thought it strange that a collector would be after cloth so late. Prisoner said his credit was good in Canada, but had signed notes that put him in difficulties. He wanted to get his family over to gain a residence. He told me to hold the cloth and he would have it righted. Evidence of **Kenneth Robinson**: he was told on November 5th by *Charles Carney* of Pekin that the prisoner had expected cloth from the Falls. Evidence of *John Sheldenburg*, ferryman below the Falls: Wilkins crossed the river with one *Latshaw* (a carpenter). Had a trunk and axe, appeared uneasy about the collector. He said he

wished he'd left the damn'd axe at home. He didn't walk to Manchester with Latshaw. Deponent asked what he did with an axe with so short a handle? Wilkins said "used it in his own business." The cloth was part of the same from S. Street's store. Evidence of *Malcolm McDonald*, Pekin, New York: He knows the prisoner. He came to sell him some cloth from Canada. Helped him with his trunk from the *Manchester Railroad*. If I wished to buy, I would give him credit on Mr. Shepherd's books. Deponent did not like the colour, it was too light, and prisoner said he could get some dark grey satinette. Evidence of *Sarah Conklin*, wife of *Jonathan Conklin*, at *Bridgewater*: the prisoner is her son-in-law. She had nothing to do with the prisoner, he came with his brother Stephen. Stephen slept in the shop with *Lanty Conklin*. The trunk was a small hair covered one with a lock. She doesn't know the contents of the trunk, but he said it had cloth in it. Evidence of *Mary Conklin*, daughter of Jonathan Conklin: she knows nothing of the cloth in the house, prisoner didn't have a walking stick. Recognizance taken November 10, 1837: Jacob Cronkhite and Malcolm McDonald £10 each, Kenneth Robinson and Samuel Street £20 each. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two years hard labour in the penitentiary, March 16, 1838.

Gave her a receipt for \$95. Bills from the Kirtland Safety Security Bank. 50 Evidence of William H. Sanderson, St. Catharines, blacksmith. Received \$275 from Sarah Cleveland on the 5th on account of a debt. Notes from the Kirtland Safety Security Bank. Was to return 14/- change. Got the bills from one *Larnard*, a brother-in-law of her husband, in Ohio. Gave her a receipt in full. Evidence of *Michael Bradley*, peddler: he got \$20 from Sarah Cleveland today between 8 and 9 am, of the Kirtland Bank for a \$16 debt (4.4.0.) I gave her 4 yards of silk to make up the \$20. Deponent offered the bill to *Hope McNiven* and he refused it for goods. I called on her and got the 4 yards of silk back. Sarah Cleveland said the money was got from the bank by her husband's brother-in-law. \$420, had \$80 in her possession. Recognizance taken July 7, 1837 before **Tench** and **E.S. Adams**: Sally Cleveland £50, sureties Seth Keith and Beacher Benham £25 each. Sarah Cleveland discharged from recognizance on November 7, 1837. [File includes \$20 Kirtland Safety Security Bank note as an exhibit.]

Evidence taken before *Daniel McDougall* on November 6, 1837: on the complaint of *Oliver* [*Busjan*?], Niagara, labourer. He had his pocketbook taken on November 5th at Niagara, contained two \$5 notes and two \$3 notes, value 4. Taken by one [*Semose*?] defendant. On examination of the witness, the defendant was discharged. Constable *Bernard Roddy* entitled to a 5/- fee.

Letter from *John J. Lefferty*, *Lundy's Lane*, June 12, 1838: *Benjamin Chadwick* is indisposed, it is imprudent for him to leave home and attend to Grand Jury duty.

Recognizance taken before *Malcolm Laing*, June 12, 1838: *John Oliver*, Queenston, £10, surety *Patrick Connors* (tailor) £10; *Sergeant Thomas Robinson*, *I*st *Frontier Light Infantry*, £10. Oliver to keep the peace towards Sergeant Robinson for 12 months.

John Fluelling, charged with assault and preventing *Erastus Derby*, bailiff of the *Court of Requests* (Division 7) from performing his duty on May 10, 1837. Derby was prevented from

Articles to establish the short-lived Kirtland Safety Security Bank (or Kirtland Safety Society) were drawn up in Ohio by Mormon leader Joseph Smith in November 1836. The bank printed its' own notes in 1837 but since it was never formally chartered it operated as a "joint stock company" only. Some of the notes were altered with the addition of the phrase "Anti-Bank." This institution failed later in the year 1837.

taking a horse, levied upon by execution, and was deceived by taking an instrument of writing from Fluelling. Before *Henry Nelles*, Grimsby. [verso endorsed £10.10.10.]

File 32-7. Presentment.

Did not consider it proper to carry the statute regarding the *House of Industry* into effect. Have inspected the gaol, entire satisfaction for cleanliness, order and regularity. *Robert Cram* has been confined 5 months on charges and has not yet been brought to trial. We recommend his case to the consideration of the court, June 13, 1838.

File 32-8. Orders.

Leonard Misener, collector of rates in Wainfleet for 1837. Received payments but between then the **Agricultural Bank** failed. Left me with notes for £2.5.0. The treasurer refused to receive them. Due to the distance (32 miles) and such commotion as then existed, the province in a disaffected state, many thinking they'd get clear of paying their taxes until they could support a Republican government. Didn't receive any bills after notice of the bank failure, June 11, 1838. Evidence taken before **George Keefer**, June 12, 1838. Bills total \$9. Order that Misener be allowed to receive £2.5.0. and charge it to the District. [Bills attached to petition, \$4 (20/-), two \$2 (10/-) and \$1 (5/-).]

Money was appropriated for particular roads in the District by the Legislature, but not expended, ordered for the general use of roads, June 12, 1838.

The first money received into the Treasury ordered to be used to take up a £50 note by *Thomas Butler*, endorsed by *Thomas Merritt* and *Alexander Hamilton* for the *Commercial Bank of Niagara*, June 13, 1838.

Ordered that the *Sheriff* furnish an account of the expenses of prisoners taken from the court house to the *penitentiary*, June 13, 1838.

Ordered £10 to the gaoler for washing for the prisoners, June 13, 1838.

Clerk of the Peace ordered not to enter a charge for Menonists, Quakers or Tunkers in the rolls for 1838 for Militia Training exemptions. Requires an additional tax and different application of proceeds, June 12, 1838.

Several Sums of Money appropriated by an Act of the Provincial Legislature for Roads, March 4, 1837. Hill and flat of St. Catharines, *Welland Canal office*, on the road and bridge across the canal £10 (*Henry Mittleberger* and *Jacob Hainer*, commissioners); Lots 16 and 17 Grantham, *John Clendennan* to *Jacob Hansler* on the Mountain, £12.10.0. (*Converse* and *Hansler*); bridge over the *10 Mile Creek* on the *Queenston Road* £5 (*Jeremiah Durham* and *Seth Keith*); *Swamp Road* from *Stoney Ridge* to the townline between Grantham and Niagara £11.5.0 (*George Havens* and *Joseph Vanderlip*); the flat and bridge at 10 Mile Creek on the *Lake Road* £5 (*Abraham Secord* and *Thomas Gilleland*); Concessions 9 and 10 Grantham from *Thomas Ker* to the township line between Grantham and Niagara, £5 (*John Lampman* and *John Ker*); *Hainer's corner* to *Dickson's farm* on the *Mill Road* £7.10.0. (*Jacob Hainer* and *William C. Chace*); Amount expended before 15/10-.

Henry Ousterhout, discharged from Grand Jury (ignored the bill) June 14, 1838.

Money voted by the Legislature for roads in Stamford paid to Mr. [*Hugoe*?] and *James Thompson*, commissioners. Used on culverts and water courses on the lower concessions below Stamford, June 14, 1838.

The *Clerk of the Peace* to transmit papers regarding *Robert Cram* to the *Attorney General*, June 13, 1838.

Clerk of the Peace, names of those remaining uncollected by the collectors in 1837 ordered annexed to the rolls for 1838, dated June 12, 1838.

William Clarke, ordered to enter into security and find two sureties for £1000 each, June 14, 1838.

£25 ordered to be expended on the *Black Swamp Road*, and on the *Queenston Hill*. Commissioners *Adam Brown*, Queenston; *Lewis Clement*, *William Woodruff* and *William Servos* on the Swamp Road, June 14, 1838.

Andrew Thompson, Benjamin Hoover and G.W. Black appointed commissioners on the road from Dunnville to George W. Black's creek in Rainham. Received £250 on the road. Had work done for £91.19.2., received £62.10.0. from William Clarke, leaving a balance due of £29.2.2. The Treasurer has had the funds since last fall, pray that he pay over the amount to pay the contractors plus the balance of £250 and appoint commissioners to expend the same. June 11, 1838. Order paid June 14, 1838.

Approved by David Thompson. Fee of 21/- paid. Licence granted June 13, 1838.

Thomas Brown, Moulton. Prays for licence. Recommended by Joseph Montague, David [Price], John [McWatty?], John Graybiel, John Aiken, William Mylne, Macdonald Lockhart, Thomas Walker, George Jemison, William [Sidely?], William [Munery?], John Ames [or Amos?], Robert Lattimore, Duncan McFarland. Licence granted June 12, 1838.

John Wood, Humberstone. Has the house formerly kept by Aaron Doan, prays for a licence, May 15, 1838. Signed J. Black, B. Tench, James Johnston, H. Johnson, J. Merritt, [------], Thaddeus Smith, Hiram Slate, William Schooley, William Walker, James Haggan, Kenneth Reid, John M.F. Wilson, Henry G. Thompson, Gregory G. [Toot?], George H. John Wright, moves from the *8 Mile Creek* to St. Catharines. He desires to continue his inn at the old stand in St. Catharines. Application approved to open the house before the next Sessions when he can obtain his licence, May 2, 1838. Signed by *E.S. Adams*, *George Rykert* and *Henry Mittleberger*, June 13, 1838.

Isaac Overholt, Grimsby. Has a house in *Smithville* for an inn, June 13, 1838. Is an honest and sober man, signed *J.H. Lacey* and *Francis Waddell*. Licence granted.

Thomas Moxey, **Lundy's Lane**. Came from England six years ago, had a licence in **Brockville**. Came here and obtained a transfer of licence from **James Fido**, left his stand and got a house at Lundy's Lane called the "**Temperance House**," June 5, 1838. Prays for a licence, June 5, 1838. Recommended by **P. Delatre**, **John J. Lefferty**, **Samuel Falcobridge** and **Joseph Woodruff**. Licence granted June 12, 1838.

Alexander Winslow, Thorold, prays for a licence, April 2, 1838. Recommended by *George Keefer* and *Jacob Keefer*. Licence granted June 12, 1838.

Richard Kennedy, Niagara. Kept an inn last year on the *Queenston Road*, prays for a licence, May 30, 1838. Signed *Charles Richardson*, *William Clarke*, *Jared Stocking*, *Andrew Heron*. Licence granted, June 13, 1838.

Ira Stimpson has a commodious house in Thorold at Allanburgh. Is well suited to an inn, an inn is much wanted here. Recommended by John Galt Stockly, William Wright, Robert Hughson, Duncan McFarland, Ephraim Stennburgh, Jacob Upper. Licence granted June 12, 1838.

Abraham Beam, Willoughby. Has the stand formerly occupied by *James Cassady*. Prays for a licence, May 1, 1838. Recommended by *James Cummings* and *Charles Fell*. Licence granted June 12, 1838.

File 32-13.

John Allen and John Milton Reynolds, Grantham, labourers. Charged with false pretences against Henry Ranfuss [alias Rindfuss] on November 15, 1837. True bill: John McMicking (foreman.) Witnesses: Henry Ranfuss. Defendants bought 50 lbs. of beef, paid with a \$2.00 "St. Lawrence Bank and Lumber Company" note, and a 5/- note. The \$2 note was of no value. Evidence of **Solomon Soper**: knows nothing. Evidence of the wife of **Benjamin Welsh**: two beef quarters were brought to the Reynolds house the night after the purchase. Evidence of **Solomon** E. Secord: Came with John Allen to St. Catharines. Agreed to take some beef to Keith's at Ten Mile Creek. Arrived at Reynold's Inn, men appeared to disagree. Allen offered to pledge a watch until he paid the money. Ranfuss handed it back and said he'd get money without going further and wouldn't go to Keiths. Sold the beef to another man who drove away in a wagon. Doesn't know if all the beef was put in the wagon. Allen offered to pay for the Dutchman's dinner, and might go later with his beef. Daniel Secord to get one quarter, saw Secord, Allen and the Dutchman weigh one quarter of the beef, calculation \$7. The Dutchman was in a great passion, threw a half dollar on the ground. A stranger asked Allen for his wagon to drive 2 or 3 miles. Allen consented and he drove off. Said Secord could have one quarter on the same terms. Saw the wagon at Keith's door. Doesn't know if the beef was in it, or who got the beef from the stranger. If Reynolds was a party to the bargain, he would have liked some but had no money. Evidence of John Allen: came to the village on business. Mr. Keith of 10 Mile Creek gave me \$1.00 to buy some beef. Met a Dutchman at *Dittrick's Inn*. He declined selling unless it was the whole beef. Allen offered \$24 for it and another \$1 if he'd carry it to Keith's, and pay when they got there. He got a person (Suttle) to translate. Ranfuss said to take it. They went in the wagon. Stopped at Reynold's for dinner. Ranfuss was in a passion, wouldn't go any further, said he'd not have the beef unless it was paid for there. He sold it to another man who took it away in a wagon. He, Allen and Secord came to St. Catharines in Clark's wagon, who had gone to *Hamilton* and left Allen in charge of his wagon. A stranger asked to use the wagon. Later found it at Keith's door. Secord was there. Had previously been to Allanburgh at *Eber Rice's*. *Cornelius Dolson* went along. They didn't buy any beef from Randfuss. Paid \$1 and it was returned to him. Doesn't know who got the beef. Seth Keith advises him not to sign the examination. Evidence of Eliza **Dolson**: didn't see money paid. Allen, Secord and **Peter Bigford** stopped at Reynold's. Bigford drove off with the beef. Evidence of Henry Ranfus, Canborough, farmer, November 17: sold the beef to John Allen and drove to John Dolson's. Got \$1 of the St. Lawrence Bank and \$2 of the Kirtland Bank of Ohio, \$1 of the Bank of Montreal, \$1 of the Bank of Buffalo. Passed the bills to me knowing them to be spurious. Sold 663 lbs. of beef at \$4 per cwt. to Allen at Dittrick's Inn. Secord was present. Deponent doesn't understand English well, went to Mittleberger's Mill and

told *Philip Gerold* a man wanted to buy the beef. Offered \$24 for 600 lbs. and \$1 for 63 lbs. Accepted \$25 and to take it to his house. Got to Reynold's and Allen pointed in the direction of some pine trees and said "that's my house." Secord wanted to buy some of the beef. He gave me money, I counted it and asked if the money was good. Allen said it was, I had no other paper money. Allen put the beef in his own wagon. I started home. At the Narrows on the Welland River, Bowman told me the money was bad. Witness cross-examined: there was no other bargain after Allen. Second got a hind quarter for \$5.50. Another man counted the money with Allen. They counted the money twice. We cut off a piece, and dined there on it. Evidence of *Henry* Suttle: was at Dittrick's, translated the bargain. \$24 plus another \$1 to carry the beef to Keith's inn. Evidence of Ellen Goodfellow: was in the house of Milton Reynolds when the beef was brought into a back room by Bigford. Some was cooked at Reynold's. She went to her sister's room between 7 and 8 pm. Allen and Reynolds went to put the beef in Reynold's cellar. They said they went for "wood," she wondered what took them so long. A stranger there who had a blue jacket. Evidence of *Thomas E. Hovt*. Grantham. November 21: lives 4 miles from St. Catharines. Knows nothing of the beef. The horse and wagon of Allen is in his barn. Allen lives on *Thomas Darling's* farm, has a family, came here last September. Is engaged with people in the United States about a threshing machine. Evidence of Daniel Secord: Reynolds, Allen and the stranger went into another room, remained there for some time "consulting." Came out with bills in their hands. Evidence of **Seth Keith**: bought 160 lbs. of beef at 22/-. Had more beef and paid \$5 for a quarter. The beef was put into his cellar. It was not Allen's team, driven by a stranger said to be a carpenter or joiner. Evidence of *Milton Reynolds*: Bigford weighed the beef. He has been employed repairing my barn. He was going to sell a horse in *Hamilton* or *Toronto*. Recognizance taken before *Daniel McDougall* on August 31st: John Allen £20, sureties *Theo*. Brundage, Grantham, yeoman and Alexander Price, Grantham, yeoman, £10 each. Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams on June 11: John Allen £25, sureties John Milton Reynolds, Grantham and John Cleveland, St. Catharines, yeoman, £12.10.0. each. Recognizance taken before Tench and Adams on November 21: Daniel Secord, Grantham, £25. Recognizance taken on November 21: John Allen £50, sureties *Copeland Stinson* and Seth Keith £25 each. Recognizance taken before Tench, Adams and Rykert on November 21: Henry Rindfuss £25. Recognizance taken on November 21: Milton Reynolds, Grantham, £50, sureties Seth Keith, Grantham, innkeeper and Anson Smith, St. Catharines, sash maker, £25 each. Verdict: "not guilty," defendants discharged June 16, 1838.

File 32-14.

James Carnes, Niagara, shoemaker and Christian Carnes, Niagara, femme covert. Charged with assault and battery against John Yeo on June 12, 1838. True bill: John McMicking (foreman.) Witnesses: John Yeo, William Edwards. Grand Jury presentment: Yeo was assaulted on the highway. Verdict: "guilty," fined 10/- plus ordered to find security for good behaviour for six months.

File 32-15.

Keyes Gleeson, Bertie, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against John Collum, Bertie, private in the Queen's Niagara Fencibles, on May 18, 1838. Witnesses: John Collum. Evidence taken before Edmund Riselay: Collum was in the barrack's room, Captain Tench's Company, Fort Erie. Gleeson began to quarrel with James Black, but deponent did not interfere and went up to bed. Gleeson was at the top of the stairs and gave me a blow to the forehead, rendered deponent insensible. Evidence of John Walton: was in the barracks room. Stewart came up, Gleeson and his wife were in bed. Stewart said "you're never in the way when wanted." Gleeson came downstairs and spoke to Black. Private Wood said "if you come down again to disturb us, if

you want to fight, you'll have plenty of it." Gleeson went upstairs and took deponent's gun, Stewart also had one. His object was to strike whoever came upstairs. He struck someone, and I heard *John Thompson* say "Collum is almost killed." Gleeson said if any other person came up he'd strike them. Evidence of *Isaac Finley*: an examination was ordered, the Captain of the Guard to assist. The prisoner was taken to Captain Tench's barracks at Fort Erie. Evidence of **Sergeant Thomas Hunter**, Sergeant of the Guard on the 18th: Collum was knocked insensible, apparently dead. Tench ordered the prisoner to surrender, he couldn't be answerable for his life as the men were so exasperated, they were loading their muskets and fixing their bayonets. Isaac Finley mounted the stairs and got a blow which cut him in the head. Tench ordered the women down least they be shot. Gleeson surrendered but didn't regret it. Evidence of Corporal William Cooper: he was asleep when the quarrel started. Gleeson was at the top of the stairs. He saw Stewart and another ascend the stairs when a blow was struck and they fell. Gleeson said "There is one down, let them come on now." Two more blows were struck, one broke the gun. Heard the men prepare to fire through the floor. Gleeson tried to escape out the window. He was not afraid and cried to the guard "fire and be damned." Evidence of James Black: was at the barracks. The dispute was over a bed tick, Gleeson fought with Stewart. Stewart woke Gleeson who came down and was asked where Black is. He was accused of having more than he had a right to. Gleeson swore "by Holy Jesus he would take the witnesses life in a holy minute!" He took us by the throat, life of Woods and the deponent threatened by the prisoner. Did not see the blows given. Recognizance taken before **Thomas Butler** on June 9th: **John Fitz Stewart** and **George P. Kinsley** £10 each; William Stewart and Keys Gleeson £20 each. Defendants Stewart and Gleeson both discharged from recognizance, no prosecutor appearing, June 16, 1838.

File 32-16.

George Lucas, Niagara, yeoman, Bernard Riley, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 20 gallons of wine (value 100/-) the property of James Holmes and John Speirs on May 28, 1838. No bill found against *Henry Osterhout*, true bill found against *Lucas* and *Riley*. Witnesses: William Wynn, George Martin, Martin Hewson, Captain Palmer, Esther Eastham, Andrew Wedge. Grand Jury presentment attached: William Wynn went to the store, found wine taken from the casks. Believes it was taken by defendants. Evidence of William Wynn taken before *Charles Richardson* on June 13th: Found the warehouse forcibly entered. The casks of Macdonnell, Holmes & Co. were taped or bored. 20 gallons of wine gone. Robbery committed by Lucas, Riley and Osterhout, 1st Frontier Light Infantry on duty at Queenston. They were seen with the wine, gave it to other men on guard. The storehouse of *John Macdonell* (deceased) James Holmes and John Speirs was broken into on May 26th. Evidence of Bernard Reily: is a private in Captain Palmer's Company. Was advised not to incriminate himself. Between 10 and 11 on May 26th Lucas and Osterhout came into the guard room with two canteens with red wine. (Lucas was a prisoner in the guard house and Osterhout was on guard.) Wine was given to everyone including Sergeant George Martin. Evidence of George Lucas: he found the canteen with the wine in the guard room. He handed it around and went to bed. Evidence of Henry Osterhout: is in *Captain Gregory's Company*. Was on guard when the wine was offered in the guard room. Questions to the witness: by whom was the wine offered? Was it red or white? Who was the Sergeant? Were there other men present? Deponent was sober, all the men present were sober. Not a word was said about where the wine came from. He sipped some, and put the canteen on the bed. Evidence of *Alfred Gunn*: is a private in Captain Palmer's Company. He was on guard when the wine was handed around. All the men were sober. Doesn't know where the wine came from. Evidence of George Martin: is a private in Captain Palmer's Company. Sergeant of the Guard on the 26th at 9:30 saw Lucas with wine in his canteen. Was circulated among the men. The wine was in a bottle in Bernard Reily's jacket. Did not report it. Doesn't know where it came from. Did not note the absence of the men after dark. Thought the wine was purchased.

Lucas said he found the canteen. Was sober and didn't sleep. None of the men was absolutely drunk. Evidence of *Lieutenant Craig*: visited the guard room at 10 pm. All the guard was steady and alert at their posts. Evidence of Martin Hewson: is a private in Captain Palmer's Company. Was on guard and slightly intoxicated but not unfit for duty. Went to bed. He was awakened by acting Sergeant Martin when his turn came. He was stationed on the wharf. A tall and a short man and women wished to cross the river. He refused them without authority. They returned with Martin, and was told to allow them to cross. One was the ferryman. They crossed over and the tall man returned. When relieved he took a glass of grog and went to rest. Saw no wine. Evidence of *Moses Quick*: is a private in the 1st Frontier Light Infantry. Officer Mr. Craig visited at 10 pm. Later wine was offered and accepted in a canteen. Questions to witness, was it red or white, where did it come from? Was relieved at 10 pm, was sober. Evidence of Esther Eastham: Lucas came and asked for a *gimlet* for *Sergeant Argea*. He returned it in 2 or 3 days. Evidence of Sergeant Argea: was never commissioned to borrow a gimlet. The gimlet was produced, corresponded to the holes in the casks. Verdict: "not guilty," June 15, 1838.

File 32-17.

Isaac Leech, Chippawa, lumberer. Charged with trespass against *John Bender*, Stamford, brewer in August 1837. Leech cut Bender's trees in Gainsborough, ordered trees cut in error. Fined £5 plus 15/- costs, August 13, 1837.

Catherine Wheatman and [-----] *Brooker*, both coloured. Charged with assault and battery against *William Lingle*, Stamford, (coloured man), on September 8, 1837. Defendants wounded plaintiff in the face. Fined £1.10.0. costs, September 10, 1837.

Patrick O'Conner, St. Davids, labourer. Charged with trespass against *Bridget Cogan*, Queenston, on September 26, 1836. Witnesses: *James Henry*, Queenston, labourer. O'Conner broke the window and attempted to enter Cogan's house. O'Conner acknowledges trespass. Fined £1.10.6. costs, August 27, 1837.

William Cassewell, Chippawa. Charged with assault and battery against *David Gallaway* of *Allenburg* (coloured man), on July 26, 1837. Gallaway was at the Races, was assaulted by Cassewell at the *Pavilion House*. Cassewell fined 10/- plus £1.3.9. costs, August 4, 1837.

William Cassewell, Chippawa, sailor. Charged with assault and battery against *Marshall Berryman* of the *Pavilion Hotel* (coloured man) on July 4, 1837. Berryman was assaulted with a club. Witnesses: *George Ross*, Chippawa. Fined 10/- paid to Berryman, £1.5.0. penalty and £1.11.9. costs, total fine £3.6.9. July 4, 1837.

John Shannon, *Hugh Hodgkiss* and *Robert Wood*, Clifton, labourers. Charged with trespass against *Widow Clarke*, Stamford, on January 28, 1838. Defendants cut down and carried off firewood from Widow Clarke's land. Witnesses: *John Price*, Clifton. Fined 6/6- penalty and 15/6- costs, total fine £1.18.6. January 29, 1838.

Jesse Meadow. Charged with larceny, stealing cord wood the property of *George Cook*, St. Davids, (coloured man), in November 1837. Cook bought some cord wood from *John Smith* which Meadow hauled away. Fined 15/- penalty plus £1.6.3. costs, total fine £2.1.3, November 13, 1837. Defendant gave notice of appeal, gave sureties. Neither costs nor penalty paid, December 6, 1837.

Robert Clarke of the Militia (coloured man) and **Robert Weals**. Charged with larceny against **Cornelius Foster**, Clifton, on April 19, 1838. Defendants shot and carried away a hog the property of Cornelius Foster. Men agreed to pay the value of the hog and costs. Clarke also to pay £2.10.0. (\$10) to **Captain Runchey's Company** at the suggestion of **Col. Delatre** for the purpose of preventing many depredations committed by the coloured men of his Company. Was committed to the **Guard House**, released and cleared out without paying his fine, April 21, 1838.

Thomas Lewes, St. Davids. Charged with assault and battery against [-----] **Kael**, St. Davids, on February 14, 1838. The men quarreled and Kael was beaten in **John P. Hannett's** barroom in St. Davids. Lewes was justified on the conduct of Kael. Kael to pay 16/3- costs and committed to gaol for 10 days, March 19, 1838.⁵²

File 32-26. Presentment.

Walter Thomas Prescott, Dunnville. Has been in gaol at the suit of Cyrus Smith and the late Horatio Nelson Camp, deceased. Has been confined 11 months, made a full statement to Camp in February 1837 and satisfied a debt of £18.15.0. in full for which he is confined. Prescott agreed to receive lumber (not paid.) Camp went to Niagara to relieve special bail. Prescott's occupation is Captain of the schooner "Cordelia." Camp neglected to relieve the bail. Was sent, proceeded and written up in Precott's absence on the lake and a writ of capias a satisfaciendum was issued. Has since remained in gaol, with no hope except the interposition of the King's Bench or other authority. Direct that a presentment be transmitted to the proper officer and also forwarded to the Lieutenant Governor, September 13, 1838. Signed Jacob I. Ball, Charles Richardson. Affidavit of Walter Thomas Prescott, Niagara, yeoman. Is a close prisoner in gaol, on capias. He is unable to procure bail, is not worth £5. The demand of the plaintiff is unjust, case of James Sheldon vs. Walter Thomas Prescott. Refuses payment for that reason, August 11, 1838. Signed by William Duff Miller. [Draft copy included in file, signed by Richardson.]

File 32-27. Orders.

All boats in the vicinity of Niagara Town to be brought into the harbour of the *Niagara Harbour and Dock Company* at sunset, with a strong iron chain at the bow and padlocked to fasten the boat. They are in charge of a non-commissioned officer appointed by the Commanding Officer until sunrise. No boats are to land on the river below *Queenston* or on the Lakeshore below *2 Mile Creek* except at the *Navy Hall Ferry* or the Dock Company's wharf. No boat is to land except at the *Ferries* at *the Falls*, *Chippawa* or *Waterloo*. The Ferries here and at Queenston are subject to similar restrictions as at Niagara. Signed *Thomas Butler*, September 11, 1838. [file also contains a draft copy.]

Memorandum of the appointment of a District Treasurer, September 11, 1838. Motion to suspend the current treasurer for 6 months. 15 votes in favour, 4 against. Mr. Laing appointed treasurer, John Radcliffe and David Thorburn, sureties.

File 32-29.

Ann Allan, Niagara, femme covert. Charged with larceny, stealing two bank notes (50/- each) and three notes (20/- each) and gold earrings (value 5/-) the property of Francis Proctor on August 19, 1838. True bill: Jacob Ball (foreman.) Witnesses: Francis Proctor, Arabella Proctor, Samuel Proctor, Maria Johnson. John Allan, Niagara, physician, received the goods knowing them to be stolen. Verdict: "not guilty," September 12, 1838.

File 32-30.

John Allen, Niagara, physician. Charged with assaulting constable Samuel Proctor on August 19, 1838. No bill: J.I. Ball (foreman.) Witnesses: Francis Proctor, Arabella Proctor, Samuel Proctor, Maria Johnson. John Allan. Evidence of Francis Proctor taken before Thomas Butler and John Alma on August 20th: Ann Allen came to my bedroom where money was locked in a

chest. The keys were on the table in a hat, she closed the door there for a half hour and went to the house of *Martin Kearns* afterwards. My sister-in-law *Maria Johnson* found the keys on the table under an iron chain which was suspicious, lost £10. We called Ann Allen and told her of a serious loss. She asked what money was lost? Two \$10 bills of the Bank of Upper Canada, two \$4 bills, seven Mexican dollars and some loose silver. Ann Allen said she had no silver, and refused to be searched. She endeavoured to hide her purse, and put it under her. It was seized and found to contain the money. While in a scuffle John Allen entered and took up the other bills which fell on the floor. He seized Samuel Proctor by the throat, took his pocket book and other bills, and tried to escape through the window. Evidence of Maria Johnson taken August 20th: searched for the keys with *Annabelle Proctor*, wife of Francis Proctor. They were found on the table under a dog chain. Annabelle counted the money in the chest and found some gone. Annabelle and *Mary Jane Proctor* searched, but Ann Allen refused and tried to hide her purse. We took her by the hand and exclaimed "here Frank, there is silver in this." Heard Ann Allen deny she had any silver. Evidence of Ann Allen taken August 21st: went to Francis Proctor's and returned to Martin Kearns. Two hours later Mrs. Proctor called me out and desired for me to go to her house, said she had lost some money. She required me to strip which I refused, I had no money or silver. Evidence of John Allen taken August 21st before *Thomas Butler*, *Daniel* McDougall, James Lockhart, John Alma and Lewis Clement: Was at Martin Kearns with his wife, waiting for a team. Mrs. Proctor called my wife out. Followed her to Mrs. Proctor's bedroom and found them stripping my wife. Wrested a pocket book from her hand which contained \$130 (my own money) which I recovered from Samuel Proctor when I seized him by the arm. Evidence of Samuel Proctor taken August 21st: was called upon by my father Francis Proctor on August 20th to act as a constable and arrest Ann Allen who stole £10. My father handed me notes and silver that he took from her. The pocket book he handed to me was taken from me by John Allen, who assaulted me in my duty as a constable. Evidence of *Alexander* Allen taken on August 21st: my father received £50 from the Bank of Upper Canada in June, less a discount of 90 days on the bills. He gave it to Ann Allen, \$59 in silver chiefly Mexican plus \$32 from *McCullock in specie* and other small sums, plus a number of \$10 bills. Evidence of Annabelle Proctor taken on August 21st: Mr. And Mrs. Allen slept here. On leaving Mrs. Allen said she only had \$1.25 which she wished to keep to buy a frock for her child. She came on Sunday for a drink, didn't like what she got at Martin Kearn's. Wouldn't give her drink on account of remaining at Martin Kearn's. Ann Allen went into the dining room, and then into the bedroom where she fell in intoxication. I looked for the chest keys to put money in and take change out. I asked my husband for the keys, he said they were under a hat on the table but were found under a dog chain. The money was missing. We desired Ann Allen to strip as the money was lost. She refused. On Francis Proctor being about to leave deponent exclaimed "here Frank, she is hiding some silver under her." Samuel Proctor took her into custody. Dr. Allen followed and seized Samuel Proctor and threw him down. Some bills fell from her purse. Dr. Allen took it up and put it into his pocket book with other notes. He tried to go out the window. A cotton spool and gold earrings which were in the chest were found on the floor. Recognizance taken before Daniel McDougall: John Allen, St. Catharines, surgeon, £40, sureties Patrick Nugent, St. Catharines, innkeeper and *Copeland Stinson*, St. Catharines, innkeeper £20 each, for the appearance of Ann Allen.

File 32-31.

John Blair, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault against Jeremiah Sullivan on September 5, 1838. Witnesses: Jeremiah Sullivan, Thomas Woods, Dr. Mewburn, James Reid, Chester Wadsworth, Laughton MacKay. Evidence taken before H.J. Tench, Queenston, September 5th: Blair took up a stone to strike Sullivan. Sullivan pushed him off and Blair stabbed him. Stabbed with intent to maim, with a knife in his right hand, in the left side of Sullivan's back. Deponent

was picked up by MacKay in the presence of Woods in a bloody state. Evidence of Thomas Woods: saw the scuffle, picked up the knife. Verdict: "not guilty," September 14, 1838.

William Kirby, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against *Andrew Finley*, Niagara, on September 10, 1838. True bill: *J.J. Ball* (foreman.) Witnesses: Andrew Finley. Grand Jury presentment attached. Verdict: "guilty," fined 5/- plus costs, September 13, 1838.

File 32-33.

Thomas Servos, Niagara, yeoman. Charged with assault and battery against Richard Thompson on July 9, 1838. True bill: J.I. Ball (foreman.) Witnesses: Richard Thompson, William Woodruff, Eliza Thompson, Isaac Hoziel, David Moody, Evidence of Richard Thompson of St. Davids, shoemaker: an effigy was hung up of a man with a wooden leg, hung up by a rope around its neck. People had gathered to see it. Fearing assault, I left and locked my door. On my return John Hannett came with a club and tried to break the door. Servos called "damn him he's here, I will shoot him!" He leveled his gun and cocked it in sight of me. John P. Hannett called out "Oh, don't shoot, Daddy!" and a man ran up and prevented him. Believes Servos would have shot him, fears for his life. Cornelius Hurt was the man who ran after Thompson. Recognizance taken before J. Mewburn, Stamford: Richard Thompson £10; William Woodruff £10; D. Moodie and William Woodruff £10 each; Isaac Hostiell [alias Hoziel] and William Woodruff £10 each; Elizabeth Thompson by James Thompson and William Woodruff £10; William Woodruff and Thomas Servos £10 each; Thomas Servos and William Woodruff £20 each. Evidence of Andrew Carnochan: was at St. Davids and saw Servos with a gun followed by John Hannett with a club. He said "damn you shoot" and coming up to *Jory's house* said "damn you come out, you are a set of damned rebels altogether." Evidence of Isaac Hoziel: Hannett said "shoot the first man you care to and I will back you out of it." Evidence of James Field, labourer and farmer: he saw the effigy and met with Hannett with a club. I asked if he knew of it, he swung his club and said he'd knock the brains out of any man who had anything to do with it and pointed at Richard Thompson. He said "yonder goes the damned rebel." Servos said he'd shoot "by God I'll shoot him." Hannett and another said not to shoot. Servos dropped the gun. Servos and his son-in-law backed off for the rebels to come out, but said he'd shoot the first to come out. He saw Hannett quaver the club over Thompson's head and use blackguard language. Twelve or fifteen men armed with clubs tried to force Thompson's door. Hannett said "I have a good mind to smash the windows." The men came out, the biggest part from Hannett's. Evidence of David Moody: Servos took out a butcher knife and gun. The men said "Damn you shoot we have plenty of powder and balls in the house." Servos cried "Turn out you damned rebels." Men came out of Hannett's and Servos said "come on boys" and followed him quick. Evidence of *Mary Dixon*: saw the effigy hung up and John Hannett go and take it down. He threw it in the mill race, but the boys got it out and played with it. Hannett quavered the wooden leg of the effigy and swore violently, accused *Luther Dunn* of making the leg. He went up after Thompson, with sticks in hand. He came up from below William Woodruff's house. Servos said "you live in Thompson's house" and would knock her on the head. She fears for her life. Evidence of Eliza Thompson: she lives in St. Davids. Saw men with clubs, sticks and a gun. Her brother Robert Thompson was on the road. She asked him to come in, he said he did nothing and would go home. She saw a gun pointed. James Field joined in. Other men were armed with clubs, others had large stones which they threw after Thompson who ran for his life. Hannett swore he'd kill any man, woman or child who took Thompson's part. Deponent begged Hannett to take the law. He took me by the shoulder and dashed the cap off my head, I was much alarmed. Evidence of William Wintermute: Lives in St. Davids. He lodged at Mr. Clements last evening. He was awakened by a noise in the

street. He saw 7 or 8 men in the street with sticks go to Hannett's from Thompsons. Hannett was swinging a club. Another swung a club and said "here's a sprig of shillala." Evidence of William Woodruff: he heard for a call to shoot. The "place full of rebels." He urged the men to go up to get his countrymen away. Servos was under excitement since July 2nd saying the "rebels were coming over" and he would be on the look-out. The men on the road were generally quiet and well-behaved. Verdict: "guilty," fined 10/- plus costs, September 13, 1838.

Mary Thornton, Niagara, *femme covert*. Charged with assault and battery against *Mary Ann Neale* on June 14, 1838. True bill: *John McMicking* (foreman.) Witnesses: Mary Ann Neale. Grand Jury presentment attached. Verdict: "guilty," fined 5/- plus costs, September 12, 1838.

Gordon McCoy Willson, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one black cloth coat (value 60/-) the property of George Graham, Niagara, carpenter, on August 25, 1838. True bill: J.J. Ball (foreman.) Witnesses: George Graham, Ed Ricely, James Cooley. Evidence of Gordon McCoy Willson taken before E. Riselay on August 29: he took the coat out of the house of John Graham, innkeeper, cost £3, but denies the theft. Recognizance taken August 30 before Riselay and William Smith: George Graham £10. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to one year at hard labour in the penitentiary, September 14, 1838.

Grand Jury have examined the gaol. It is in a proper state of cleanliness and is comfortable for the prisoners. Melancholy situation of insane persons. The wardens are the foremost applicants for a pittance for their support. The salutary and paramount duty of restoring them to health and to their calling is lost sight of. Should prepare an application to both houses for the necessity of a speedy erection of a *provincial asylum* in a central and *healthy* location, December 12, 1838.

Petitioners are true and loyal to *Her Majesty Queen Victoria* and ready and willing at all times to defend with their lives Her Majesty, the Glorious Constitution under which they live and the law of the land. Numerous individuals have obtained tavern licences from your worships, "who are decidedly enemies and in many instances traitors to our country" and although possessed of property don't take the oath of allegiance. We hope your worships will not lose sight of the interest your petitioners take in the welfare of their country, by granting licences to any such individuals hereafter unless he or they should take and subscribe the oath of allegiance. Your petitioners further beg leave to assure your worships that they are sensible of the mischief, treason and rebellion produced, resulting from nightly meetings at such houses and beg your worships will not ever licence such houses, the inmates of which are suspected of treasonable practice or any unlawful proceedings towards our Government. This petition has been presented to a number of the Loyalists in the vicinity, but one was all, are afraid to sign it, in consequence of fear the rebellious and traitors alluded to in the petition are so numerous, that should it come to their knowledge who really did sign it, revenge in the shape of arson or murder would follow. Your worships are thus made acquainted with the state in which Loyal Subjects are placed in this neighbourhood. Should your worships require any evidence to corroborate or testify to the contents herein, please to summon the heads of families in any direction from the **Stone Bridge** on 10 Mile Creek such as Cavers, Price, Read, McIntosh, Barber, Macan, Stull, Goring and sons, Jones &c &c.

John Whyte, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and battery Thomas Haydon, private, 43rd **Regiment**, on November 17, 1838. No bill: **James Fitzgerald** (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Haydon, *Thomas Clayton*. Letter from *Samuel Street* to *Charles Richardson*, Niagara Falls/ Chippawa, November 28, 1838: Encloses information against Whyte for assault on a sentry of the 43rd Regiment with attempt to wrest his firelock, also encloses his recognizance to appear. Evidence of Thomas Haydon taken before Samuel Street on November 19, 1838: Haydon is a private in *Captain William Egerton's Company*, 43rd Regiment, Niagara Falls. Was on sentry duty on the 17th at 7:30 pm, between the south gable end of the *Ontario House* and *Colin* **Skinners.** Prisoner was under military confinement on authority of the Commanding Officer. Heard his name since but doesn't now recall it. Prisoner came up from the trees between two buildings and asked the way to the village- deponent supposes he meant **Drummondville**- where the post office is. Deponent gave him directions. The prisoner retired a little to the east, and asked deponent if his piece was loaded. Deponent answered yes. He grasped at the center of the barrel, deponent asked what he meant by that, but he made no reply. Deponent made him a prisoner, and called to the next sentry to send the Corporal of the Guard. Deponent related the circumstances to him. Corporal took him into custody to the guard room. The prisoner laid out so much strength to wrest the gun, and would have succeeded but for deponent's strong grasp. Evidence of John Whyte. Deponent is an Englishman, born on the *Isle of Wight* in Hampshire, 30 years of age on May 1st. Came to America 2 years ago on May 16th. Landed at Quebec, is a labourer. Went to Hamilton and worked in the harvest for a Dutch farmer, Mr. Fisher, for one month. Then worked for a brickmaker, Mr. Blackwill. Then worked on the Macadamized Road to Dundas. At the time of the Rebellion he came to Fort Erie to enlist under Captain Samuel Ussher, and served in Colonel Kirby's Regiment for 7 months and three days. Was discharged, then worked for 4 months quarrying stone for the Macadamized Road at St. Davids. Then went to Queenston, and stayed at a farmer's house, south of the *Half Way Tavern* on the *River Road*. Came to Fralick's after dark, then left Fralick's but doesn't recall molesting the sentry at the Ontario House. He doesn't recall anything between Fralick's and the time he was in the guard house, as he was in liquor. Evidence of Thomas Heydon: the prisoner was in liquor. Evidence of Thomas Clayton: is a Corporal in *Captain Tryon's Company*, 43rd Regiment. He was called to assist with the prisoner, who called himself John Williams, said he didn't know there was any harm in what he'd done. The prisoner only used the name "Williams" while working in the stone quarry. Made up a complaint, and the prisoner said his correct name was Whyte. Sworn at the **Bath House**. Prisoner was escorted to the privy next morning, and asked for a glass of whiskey as his head was aching. Evidence of *Sergeant Edward Brady*, taken November 19: Is in Captain Egerton's Company. Heard a guard tell the prisoner in jest that he'd be hung or shot. The prisoner answered that "the Queen would lose a good subject." Letter from John White addressed to "Cornel" Samuel Street, "Niagra, November the 29th, 1838: Mr. Cornel Street I take this opertunit of wrighting these few lines concerning my confinement in Niagra goal about being so foolish as for to want for to look at the sentrys firelock as I had no harm in my mind but being rather tipty I thought now harm for to make a litel freedom with my cuntrymen which I am sorry for now & ass fare as I can understand you are the only one that I can call on for Relieff. I served my queen last winter feathfuly & if it pleses you Honer for to loock into my cace I would be for ever

oblidged to you & there is 2 hundred men awanting for this fort emedently & would be glad for to volenter my sirves in to those corps or any other that pleased your honer For if I was out this I might be of some servis but I am if none---so Curnel Street if you think you can do me any servis I hope you will send me a answer ass I do feel very unesy in mind. Your honer Sir iff it pleses your your honer if you can send me answer & get me now if [you] can do any thing for me or not. No more at present but remaines your fathful subject till Death." Endorsed on verso "answered same day." Recognizance taken November 28: Thomas Haydon £10, Thomas Clayton £10.

Letter from *B. Tench* to *Thomas Butler*, *Hamilton Barracks*, December 28, 1838. The bearer, *Armstrong Hutchinson*, has a tavern licence for St. Catharines for 1838. He expects opposition to receiving it since he kept a rendezvous this winter for recruits. If this is the only objection it should have no effect with the bench. In all large towns such houses are tolerated and recruiting couldn't be carried out without them. No orderly house would harbour the class of persons that frequent a rendezvous. Hutchinson is most active in recruiting for several Regiments, and deserves much credit. He is loyal. It would be hard if he should suffer. Examine whether the opposition is from personal motives or not. Unfair if tavern keepers suffer from such a cause.

Letter from *William Duff* to *Thomas Butler*, *Fort Erie*, March 11, 1839. *Robert Gray* was confined for one month on contempt of court. He is not in his right mind. No objections to releasing him on paying the expense of transit. Act as you think fit. I believe he is well known in Niagara.

Letter from *Robert Berrie* to *Charles Richardson*, *Hamilton*, November 28, 1838. Please return a deed to me from *Thomas Butler* to *Johnson Butler* which I sent you last summer to get proved at the Quarter Sessions.

Letter from *Robert Berrie* to *Charles Richardson*, July 7, 1838. Have enclosed two deeds, which I require to be registered to complete title for my client in *East Flamborough*. One is from *Thomas Butler* to *Johnson Butler*, witnessed by Messrs. *Clark* and *Stewart* (both dead), then another from *Johnson Butler* to one *Donaldson*. Witnessed by your late father-in-law and another whose name I cannot make out. Pray to have them proved in Quarter Sessions as the witnesses are dead so I can have them registered. Evidence of *Adam Fralick*, *Lundy's Lane*, tavernkeeper, taken before *J. Mewburn* on December 4, 1838: a coloured man called *Jones* called at my house at 5 pm on December 3rd. He was insolent, said he'd smack him. I refused him drink. He came back with two men on horseback, darkies. I bolted the door and went out the back way. Heard a noise and the door burst in. *Mr. Morrison* came, and said they were intending to "kick up." Jones stepped up and asked for a drink, I said he'd had enough. He said he'd had no more since, but would like something. I told

him he'd have nothing that night. Jones doubled up his fist, takes a dirk out from his breeches pocket. Deponent shoved him off and took up an axe in the corner, and said if he didn't leave he'd "hack his head." *Peter Husted*, working with me stood by the door, seized hold of one and ran them out the door. He was stabbed severely on the left arm by one or both, each had a dirk. I got Husted in and held the door, the men swearing they'd have his life. Swore he'd have the deponent's life before he died. The men knocked him down several times outside. Evidence of Peter Husted, labourer, taken before Mewburn and **Delatre** on December 6th: He was working with Fralick in the backyard at 5:30 pm. Heard a call: "For God's sake come in, here are 3 or 4 niggers drunk and they want to do me injury." There was awful swearing. I went in. Sims (Sergeant in the *Coloured Company*.) Was cleaning *W. Smyth's* well and was drying himself at the stove. I said "what do you want, what ails you?" and he said "Damn you, it's none of your business." I told him it was his duty to keep the peace. Sims said "By Jesus, we don't care for you [more] than we do for Fralick." I pushed him to the door, and was stabbed, cut in the arm. I took an axe helve from Fralick. One of Fralick's sons came up to help. One put his hand into his bosom and drew something out. J. Husted stooped to put his boots on and saw blood running down his brother Peter's arm. Evidence of *William Sims*: he went in for a drink and was refused. There was a fight, he was struck with axe helves. He had no knife. Evidence of William *Pilkington*: saw the men refused liquor and had a fight. Saw Husted's arm run with blood. Evidence of *Robert* [-----] saw the men refused liquor &c. Recognizance taken before J. Mewburn: William Sims, coloured man, Sergeant £50, sureties Major Webber, Coloured Corps at Chippawa and Captain Mark Dyot, Coloured Corps, £25 each. Adam Fralick and Peter Husted £25 to appear. Charge: assault with intent to kill.

James W. Smith, Canborough, constable. Behaved in a disorderly and improper manner on January 7, 1839. Shewing himself incapable and unworthy of holding the situation of an officer of the peace. Signed by the Grand Jury. Ordered: that James W. Smith be discontinued as a constable.

File 33A-14.

The farm house in Pelham of *Malcolm Laing* was fired by an *incendiary* on March 6th. We view the increase in crime with alarm. Offer a reward for the discovery, and exercise the utmost vigilance in investigating this matter, March 1839.

Gaol examined. A woman named *Chittely* is confined with no commitment or cause on the books. Is a breach of the laws. Wish to convey no imputation of evil intention, but the parties were situate by most humane motives. Such irregularities go against the peace of Our Lady the Oueen her Crown and dignity.

There is the necessity for the erection of a *House of Industry*, March 15, 1839.

The situation of the *District Town* in a remote corner and under the cannons of a foreign power is inconvenient. Should be removed to a more central location, and on this account we cannot recommend the expenditure of more public money on a new *Register* and *record office*.

The *bridges between Niagara and Queenston* are in a bad state, and the hill at Queenston is in a dangerous state. The bridges in many parts of the District are in a bad state, March 15, 1839.

The *law of imprisonment for debt* is a disgrace, insufficient to protect the interests of the creditor, and is destructive and oppressive to the debtor. Injurious to the interest of the community. A

proper *bankrupt law* should be introduced, a more effectual securing and equitable distributing of the property of bankrupts.

The criminal prisoners are extremely well treated by *Peter* and *Ephraim Wheeler*. We are aware that we are indulged with all privileges that our keeper can grant us and make our circumstances comfortable. The undersigned voluntarily make this statement, it was not requested. Signed *L.L. Brooks*, *William H. Graham*, *Patrick Dowling*, *Benjamin Coker*, *George Ecker*, *Richard Bailey*, *Allen William Williams*, *John Kelso*, *Alexander Morrison*, *J.L. Church*.

Gaol has been examined. The cells are in good order and well kept. The prisoners are satisfied and their testimonial was given to us. The size of the gaol is inadequate to the number of people confined. There is no classification, petty criminals and first time offenders are confined with the most atrocious criminals. Accused with the convicted, all occupy a room separated from the debtors by only a rail. An outrage! A contaminating effect, the gaol is a nursery, not a preventative for crime. The raving are confined with the others, "their roarings and howlings adding to the other horrors endured by the prisoners." Many are found to be innocent or debtors. Four or seven are often in one close cell. There is a want of ventilation and necessaries, a most noxious and abominable effluvia is produced which is injurious to health. In warm weather it is impossible to contemplate their situation without shuddering. Astonishment that many presentments over the years have not been attended to. The state of the gaol is disgraceful to the District and to civilized people. Destructive to health and morals. The yard could be enclosed at small expense, for fresh air and exercise. The necessaries must be better ventilated. Gaol suits of clothes be provided and baths. The two necessaries to be made secure, to eliminate the need to lock up the debtor's cells at night. Admission to be between 10 am and noon, and 1 to 6 pm; give free access to all visitors to the debtors, and be in close and constant attendance (instead of all day visitation.)

The aforementioned having supported insane and helpless persons who are in destitute circumstances are entitled to the aftermentioned sums in compensation. Non-payment is an intolerable grievance, for the extremely poor and quite unable to lay out of their money the long time required to do so. Many are one year in arrears. Eg, *Phoebe Goodell*, St. Catharines, widow. Is considerably advanced in life and infirm, has a family to maintain. Is in arrears £30 for keeping an insane girl. She has experienced great privation, especially in winter. She was compelled to sell orders under value for necessaries at such price as may be asked. We are aware of the deficiency of District revenues and funds and regret that the Magistrates cannot remedy it. Take steps for an additional assessment to defray the arrears and meet the current expenses. Exercise strict surveillance over the treatment of "different insane persons in their respective neighbourhoods:"

Patterson* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Mudie. Evidence taken before *Edward Evans* on January 3rd: a parcel of handkerchiefs was taken, in the possession of Brooks, in the house of *William McKuan*. Verdict: "not guilty," March 13, 1839.

Thomas Compston, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against **Ann Huton** on March 1, 1839. True bill: **John J. Patterson** (foreman.) Witnesses: Ann Huton. Presentment attached. Verdict: "guilty," fined £1 plus £1.10.0. costs, March 14, 1839.

File 33A-24.

Henry Croft, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing two bank notes (5/- each) the property of the Hon. Charles Richard West, Lieutenant in the 43rd Regiment, on December 25, 1838. Witnesses: Charles R. West, Ogden Creighton. Evidence of Charles R. West taken before Ogden Creighton, December 26th: West boards at the Pavilion Hotel, Drummondville, kept by Adam Crysler. Examined a small writing case where he put thirteen \$4 notes of the Bank of Upper Canada, and found two missing. His servant, Henry Croft, took them. Deponent found them in the pocket of Croft's pea jacket. On being charged he acknowledged the fact. One note is #1879, dated May 2, 1836 and the other is #6758 (undated.) Croft committed December 26, 1838.

File 33A-25.

George Ecker and Benjamin Ecker, Moulton, labourers. Charged with larceny, stealing one ox (value 125/-) the property of *George H. Storm*, Caistor, lumberer, on January 27 or 28, 1839. Witnesses: George H. Storm. Letter from Samuel Birdsall to William Duff Miller, Canboro', February 16, 1839: papers in the case are enclosed. If they are in error I will take measures to have them changed. Your advice by the bearer Mr. Fitch will be thankfully received. Warrant issued by Birdsall to the constable at Canboro' to apprehend George and Benjamin Ecker, and to the keeper of the gaol to convey them to gaol, Moulton, January 27, 1839. Costs £8.15.0, February 7, 1839. Evidence of *Betsy Departie*: she knows that the men, Benjamin, George and Jake Ecker had a hand in it. They brought the remains of the ox to our house. Part was under the cupboard at George Ecker's house. The skin was hidden under a brush heap, or a tree top fell on to it, and never to be found. Abram Ecker had no hand in it. The fat of the kidney was in one piece when brought to our house. Evidence of George H. Storm, taken before Samuel Birdsall on February 7th: the prisoners stole, killed and butchered my ox and stole the "carcase." On the premises of Abram Ecker there were signs of animal being slaughtered, a beef creature. In an oak top, forward of an old vacant house, destitute of a roof and floor, in back of George Acres fields, near the *Cranberry Marsh*, one-quarter mile from his dwelling. The tallow and neck stock were in the tree top, the entrails burned in the house, and blood as if butchered shortly before. There were tracks of a sleigh previous to the last snow, coming to and going from the house to George Ecker's door. Also a trail of straw of oats. Value \$35 or £8.15.0. Evidence of *Thaddeus Folmsbee*: deponent went to the old house and found blood and entrails since the last solid snow. Fire was used to destroy the entrails. He followed the tracks to the oak tree top, and found entrails and tallow. The snow was tread down solid as the dogs frequented the place. It was remains of a neat beef creature. Followed the sleigh tracks to George Ackers and found a sleigh there which fit the tracks exactly. They said they drew staves from the old house to cover a building but were drawn before the snow. Found straw in the old building and the same straw at George Eckers. Went to Departie's to search for the ox, and they said they had no beef except what they bought from Mr. Humphrey. They objected to a search of the bureau, said they only had dried apples in it. They produced a key, and said the beef was brought by Benjamin Ecker and secreted there. They had no hand in it. There was 93½ pounds of beef. Benjamin Ecker said he and Departie shot the ox and butchered it, took it to Departie's. They cut a hole in the ice and put the head in it, hid part in the barn, and put part under the tree. Departie wished that Abram Ecker would help in killing the ox, but he said it would not answer. He got fresh beef from Departie's, believes it was from the ox, about 5 lbs. Evidence of Benjamin Ecker: on February 6th was with Jacob Departie and John Brown looking for raccoon tracks. They came across some timber, cut it and fetched it home. They saw an ox, Jake wanted me to help kill it. I would not help, nor Abram. We wouldn't help kill another man's ox and went off home. We came to a little bridge and Departie called me back. I went and helped him to kill it, took the meat to his house and put part in a barrel, churn and desk. I helped chop logs for him, and he said he put some meat away. He said the ox belonged to some fellow below "the Narrows." I owed him, he said if I did not help him to get the meat home as he was out of meat he would sue me and take my horses. The ox was very poor, 5 or 6 years old. My brother put the hide in his barn, part put under the ice. I don't know if he did, but he was to put the head under the ice, right in the Chippawa Creek in the deepest part in the middle before his door. The ox was butchered in the old house by the marsh, 1½ miles from Jake Departies. Is ½ mile from Abram's, the house is on 50 acres bought from *Mr*. [*Boulton*?] agin the marsh by a little pond at the head of *Black Creek*. The entrails and everything was burned at the old house, guts and fat. We took the kidney tallow home. Butchered at 12 pm on a Sunday night. Evidence of George Ecker: doesn't know anything about killing an ox. I suspected Captain Storm until Jake Depotie came after me to take the guts out of an ox at the old house. It was skinned and got ready to take the guts out by the stars, between 11 and 12 pm, Sunday night. They left a little meat as they went past my house on February 7th. Recognizance taken February 7th: Betsy Departie, Wainfleet, £20, surety *John Boyer*, Wainfleet, yeoman £20; George H. Storm £25; *Harvey Buck*, Caistor, lumberman, £10; Harvey Buck and *Thaddeus Folmsbee*, Canboro', £20 each.

File 33A-26.

Robert Housley, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing two bank notes (5/- each) the property of **Collin Skinner** on February 20, 1838. True bill: **J.J. Patterson** (foreman.) Witnesses: Collin Skinner, **William Meecham**, **Michael Brown**, **Ogden Creighton**. Letter from **Henry Paget**, Lieutenant and Adjutant of the **43**rd **Regiment**, to **Charles Richardson**, **Drummondville**, May 4, 1839: What are the circumstances behind Private Housley's detention in the Niagara Gaol? He was committed on February 8th on a charge of theft, was acquitted and arrested for some other offence. You will oblige by acquainting me with the facts. Verdict: "not guilty."

File 33A-27.

Alexander Shackleford, Willoughby, labourer (coloured man.) Charged with assault and battery against John Slaughton, Willoughby, labourer, mulatto, on December 26, 1838. No bill: J. Patterson (foreman.) Witnesses: John Slaughton, William Williams, Mary McFarland, Barbary **Parker.** Letter from **Samuel Street** to **Charles Richardson**, Chippawa, Niagara Falls, March 9, 1839. Encloses the information of John Slaughton and Alex Shackleford. I cannot attend the Sessions, am confined to bed. **Dr. Mewburn** assisted with the information. He is likely to be there and can give his testimony. Letter from *John Bogardus* to Samuel Street, January 21, 1839. Offers to be surety for Shackleford. Evidence taken before Samuel Street on December 28th: Shackleford lives on the Niagara River opposite *Navy Island*. He made a violent assault, bit the plaintiff's little finger off on the left hand at the first joint. Evidence of *Barbarry Parker*, married woman. The deponent, Shackleford's wife **Sarah Ann**, William Williams and Mary McFarland all sat up in Shackleford's house. Slaughton was in bed at 8 pm. Shackleford was near him in a chair. Slaughton said "you'd better go to bed." Shackleford said he was imposing on him. Slaughton denied it. They had a conversation saying "he did" and "he did not" impose. Slaughton got up and gave Shackleford a push with anger but didn't strike him. Shackleford closed in on Slaughton who cried out not to bite off his finger. Shackleford did not regard this and bit his finger off between the 1st and 2nd joints. Slaughton made an effort to get away but couldn't. Shackleford ran off and Slaughton ran after him. Slaughton came back but we didn't see Shackleford until he came back the next morning. Slaughton was there, Shackleford was with a club. He threatened but did not strike. Both remained in the house all day. There was no further quarrel. Witness cross-examined by Shackleford: he was asked twice to go to bed. Said if it was not satisfactory, he'd move round to William William's. Slaughton chased Shackleford out with a gun when his finger was bit off. What was the commencement of the dispute? Who was laying with Slaughton at the time? Mary McFarland was to his back, and Shackleford to his face.

Slaughton did not strike before Shackleford bit his finer. He was struck after but before he got out of the house. Evidence of William Williams: Slaughton asked Shackleford to go to bed. Shackleford said "what are you afraid of?" He got up off the bench and sat on a chair next to Slaughton. Slaughton jumped up, Shackleford said he imposed. They struck twice and clinched. Prisoner bit off Slaughton's finger. He got out and ran up the road, Slaughton ran after him. He came back and put on his shoes, got his gun and ran out after him. Evidence of **Wells Leonard**, innkeeper opposite Navy Island, taken January 10, 1839: Shackleford came to his house after all but the cattle girl had gone to bed, between 9 and 10 pm. He was let in by the girl. Leonard got up. Shackleford was in his stocking feet and bare headed. Said he was afraid of Slaughton, feared he'd come after him. He declined going to bed, but sat up all night in the kitchen. The next morning deponent went to his house. He found Slaughton, his wife and two white women, Barbarry Parker and Mary McFarland, William Williams and *Thomas Jefferson*. Slaughton had a candle stick in his hand as a weapon, took the gun and said he'd shoot the man who bit off his finger. Leonard persuaded him against it. Shackleford was behind Leonard and telling Slaughton to shoot. Shackleford got a big stick to defend himself, this all happened near the door. He went in, and left Shackleford and Slaughton disputing. Evidence of Mary McFarland taken January 11th: she is a married woman. She was in the house, in bed behind Slaughton. Shackleford's wife was in front. Slaughton told Shackleford to take his wife and go to bed. He got up, and Slaughton gave Shackleford a shove. After he bit Slaughton's finger, Shackleford ran out. Williams picked the finger from off the floor and gave it to Mary McFarland who buried [or burned?] it. Deponent saw no blows struck. Saw the gun, was afraid Slaughton would shoot Shackleford. The next morning Shackleford came back with a club. Evidence of Alex Shackleford taken January 10, 1839: at the last Quarter Sessions at Niagara was very cold weather. He is William Smith's labourer, in the employ of Captain Edgworth Ussher. A three year old colt came down the road from Ussher's. Shackleford tried to drive it back when he heard someone come up the road but didn't know who it was. Later at the stables he heard Slaughton's voice at his door. He was making up a fire in the house, and took care of the horse. He found the door fast, and called for it to be opened. Slaughton refused. He went to the window and found Slaughton and his wife in bed. He went to Leonard's Tayern and stayed all night, and left his wife and Slaughton together. The next morning he reproached Slaughton for having his wife with no fire. He didn't know Slaughton had a loaded gun. Three or four days later they met on the road, and said he didn't want to fuss about their differences. If Slaughton paid half the value of the property they held as joint owners, he would retire and say nothing and leave Slaughton and his wife together. Slaughton declined, said he'd prefer to make another trial and work and live together as before. Shackleford was away for two weeks before this at William Lee's. Slaughton and his wife lived together. The last controversy happened after they'd been together three or four weeks. Recognizance taken January 11th: John Slaughton £20; recognizance taken January 14th: William Williams, Stamford, labourer, mulatto, £10; recognizance taken January 21st: Alex Shackleford £25, surety John Bogardus, Chippawa, £25.

The magistrates, however anxious, have no control since the *Sheriff* arranges everything connected with the gaol. Secure your best endeavors to remedy the evils complained of.

Grand Jury has examined the gaol. The cells are in good order and well kept. The prisoners are satisfied by the treatment of *Mr. Wheeler* and have signed a testimonial. The size of the gaol is inadequate, is a nursery to crime. Seven to ten prisoners are confined in a cell, necessaries need ventilation. Yard should be enclosed for exercise &c.

Letter from *James Black* to *Charles Richardson*, *Port Colborne*, June 5, 1839. *Emanuel*. *Hoover* refused to convey prisoners to Niagara and to relinquish the office of constable. *Luther Boardman* refusing, I recommend *Levi Cornwall* be appointed constable in stead of Hoover and *William White* (*Petersburg*) in stead of Boardman. Notices sent to Mr. Black June 11, 1839.

Letter from *Major Richard P. Webb* (*Coloured Company*) to *Charles Richardson*, *Port Colborne*, May 25, 1839. Constable *Boardman* had a warrant issued to him by *James Black* for a felony prisoner. He refused unless his expenses were paid before hand. I applied to Black to enforce the duty of the constable, but this power did not rest with him. I am under necessity to have a Sergeant of my Corps sworn as a Special Constable for that purpose. The prisoner is a soldier of the Corps under my command. Otherwise the prisoner might have been set at liberty. I recommend that such a person be dismissed.

Letter from *Charles Richardson* to *Major Webb*, May 26, 1839. The case will be laid before the Quarter Sessions on June 11th. I have no hesitation to state that it is an indictable offence, which won't be lost sight of.

Petition of *Robert Dickson*, *John Claus* and *Lewis Clement* as the *Market Reservation trustees* to the House of Assembly, Niagara, March 8, 1839. Trustees are desirous to have a bill passed. "If matters remain as they are on the Market Square, the trustees after this will be exonerated from blame." Sent another petition to the council and a courtesy copy to you. We have no reluctance to present it. Please speak to Messrs. *Thorburn*, *Woodruff*, *Rykert* and *McMicking* if you present it yourself or send a letter and the petition to Mr. Thorburn.

Letter from Samuel Birdsall to *Charles Richardson*, Canborough, June 10, 1839: I enclose this with *James Smith*, constable, who has business with the courts. It is inconvenient to have *Mr. Canby's* concern during his confinement, he is still confined to bed. The case is excusable. Cochran's committal is from want of sureties. It is proper to take his wife's recognizance and securities for her appearance.

Produced an agreement for lands on the Grand River from *Ferris* and others to the defendant, but not a deed. (A. McMillan, commissioner.) Affidavit of *Richard Miller*, Niagara, gentleman: on February 16th James Fitzgerald was called upon by the defendant to call on Edward Clark Campbell to settle the debt. He produced a deed for land to settle the debt, but couldn't give an answer until Campbell returned from Toronto. (Signed by William Duff Miller, March 21, 1839.) Affidavit of Peter Wheeler, Niagara, gaoler: a weekly allowance of 5/- was not paid to the defendant, nor to the turnkey or myself on behalf of Croker (signed by W.B. Winterbottom, March 19, 1839.) John Croker, Cayuga, gentleman, is in close confinement in gaol, 5/- allowance remains unpaid, signed by Winterbottom on March 19, 1839. Johnson Clench, clerk Niagara District Court, read the affidavit of the prisoner, confined on capias ad satis, ordered that the plaintiff on the 3rd Mondav after notice, and every subsequent Monday, pay the defendant a weekly allowance of 5/- on the motion of Mr. Hall, counsel for the defendant, March 1, 1839. Charles Lethum Hall, Niagara, attorney for Croker. Served *Erastus Raymond*, clerk to *Charles Richardson* (attorney for the plaintiff) with a true copy of the order, March 2, 1839. Notice served on *Richard Miller*, clerk to Edward Clarke Campbell, with a true copy of the order.

John L. Alma vs. John Croker: plaintiffs attorney or agent is to attend me at my chambers, Queen Street, on Thursday next at noon, to show cause why Croker should not be discharged from the Sheriff's custody for non-payment of his allowance, March 20, 1839. Charles L. Hall served Erastus Beardsley Raymond, clerk to Charles Richardson, with a copy of the summons, March 2, 1839.

Answers to Interrogatories put to Croker, a debtor. An order for a weekly allowance. In the matter of **Sheldon** vs. Croker, taken before **William Duff Miller** on March 18, 1839:

Mary Graham, Bertie, coloured woman. Charged with larceny, stealing a willow basket (value 2/-), a muslin dress (5/-), petticoat (3/-), two aprons (2/-), and flannel petticoat (3/-) the property of *Charles Stanton*, Bertie, merchant, on May 28, 1839. True bill: *Robert Griffith* (foreman.) Witnesses: Charles Stanton, *Lewis Palmer*. Evidence taken before *William Smith*, Bertie, May 29th: ladies dresses, night gown &c. were stolen. Recognizance taken: Charles Stanton and Lewis Palmer (Special Constable) each £10. Plea: "guilty." Sentenced to one year hard labour in the penitentiary. Letter from *Charles Richardson* to *Kenneth Cameron*, Niagara, June 12, 1839: Enclosed is a commitment order for Mary Graham to the Keeper of the Provincial Penitentiary.

Frederick Meade, Stamford, labourer and Richard Marker, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing four pieces of silver (value 5/-) the property of James McGarry, on April 20, 1839. True bill: Robert Griffiths (foreman.) Witnesses: James and Lydia McGarry. Letter from P. Delatre to Charles Richardson, Drummondville, June 4, 1839: encloses evidence against Meade, a private in the 43rd Regiment. James McGarry bound over to prosecute. Evidence of Lydia McGarry, wife of James McGarry, Stamford, innkeeper, taken before P. Delatre on May 21st: Defendants came to the barroom of their inn near the Falls. Meade forced the lock to the bar. She came down and found him in the bar with the box in his band- money from the sale of liquors- he put down the box. He held one hand closed and I asked him what he had in it. He opened hishand and gave her the money. She heard money rattling in the box when Meade took it out. She sent for her husband who was in the bar. Marker was seated when she came in, and didn't observe him doing anything. The prisoners have no questions. Evidence of James McGarry: he was in the barn when sent for. He was told the door was forced and my wife handed me the money that he took. No further questions. The prisoners declined to say anything. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two months in gaol, one month in solitary confinement.

Jeremiah Sterratt, Stamford, labourer, George Carland, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing three blankets (value 15/-) the property of Austin Morse, Drummondville, upholsterer, on May 2, 1839. Witnesses: Austin Morse, Sergeant John McKeon of the 43rd Regiment. Evidence of Austin Morse taken before Delatre on May 4th: deponent searched the barracks with Sergeant McKeon and found the blankets. Evidence of John McKeon: we searched the soldiers beds and found the blankets. Evidence of George Carland: between 8 and 9 pm deponent went to the privy. He found a bundle tied up and brought it into the barracks. He put two blankets on Sterratt's bed and one on his own. Sterratt didn't know of them, the next morning he "desired him to leave them where he found them." Evidence of Jeremiah Sterratt: was on the picquet line on May 2nd. In his absence the blankets were put on his bed. He knew nothing of them, and desired Carland to return them. Evidence of Mary Ann Bigmore, wife of a soldier in

the 43rd Regiment: she went to the orchard at the rear of the barracks in Drummondville to bring in her clothes. She saw Sterratt drop something near the privy. She was ashamed to be looking, and went to the line where her clothes were hanging. She came back and saw two men. Sterratt had a large bundle, and had wrapped his jacket around the bundle with the sleeves hanging out. Witnessed questioned by Sterratt: did you see me come into the barracks? Answer, no. You was standing outside the privy. Question: was I standing there when you went for your clothes? Answer, yes.

George Williams, Stamford, labourer, coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing 14 hens (value 7/-), a cock and turkey hen (value 2/6-) the property of William Pew, Sr, Stamford, yeoman, on April 4, 1839. Witnesses: William Pew, John Quentin private in the 43rd Regiment. Evidence of William Pew taken before Delatre on May 16th: my hens &c were taken in Drummondville on April 8th. I looked over the fence into Lord William Hill's yard and saw the fowls. Evidence of John Quentin taken before J.J. Lefferty and Delatre: deponent is Regimental servant to Lord William Hill. He gave a turkey hen and cock back to Pew. He bought them from George Williams, a coloured man, for \$1 in early April. Prisoner had no questions. Evidence of William Ingram, private in the 43rd Regiment: He saw Quentin purchase the fowls from the prisoner. The prisoner questioned: are you sure I'm the one? Answer: yes. Evidence of George Williams: denies the sale of the fowls to Quentin. Recognizance taken before Jacob Keefer on May 17th: George Williams £10 to appear.

Thomas Carlisle, on August 27, 1839 **George Hill** ran his team through the village and nearly killed him and a child of **Mr. Clarke**. Fined £1.5.0. on September 9, 1839. [Rear endorsed £9.13.10½ and £7.15.0, total £17.18.10½.]

Adam Fralick, Stamford. Charged with assault and battery against *John* [*Pentland*?], Stamford, on July 28, 1839. Fralick struck deponent and knocked him down. Fined £3.8.9. on August 1, 1839.

File 35-12.

Patrick McMahon, Niagara Falls, innkeeper. Charged with assault against Patrick Hogan, of Captain Trion's Company #3, 43rd Regiment, Niagara Falls on July 17, 1839. Evidence taken before Samuel Street at Stamford on July 19, 1839: Hogan asked deponent for a glass of brandy and was refused. Deponent said Hogan could keep his money and McMahon would keep his liquor. McMahon said "he'd rather give poison to a bloody soldier" and reached over the bar and struck me on the cheek with his fist. Deponent retired out the door, McMahon followed and struck me over the head with a stick. It made a hole in the top of my cap and knocked it off. I stooped to pick it up, and he struck me on the forehead over the left eye. It left a mark and drew blood. McMahon retired to his own doorway. Evidence of Corporal Edward Argent, of Captain *Mundy's Company #5, 43rd Regiment*: on July 17th at 7 pm he was sentry at the Commissariat's door. He shouted to McMahon "not to kill the man." Evidence of Corporal Charles Sheppard, in Captain Trion's Company #3 of the 43rd Regiment: he was on Commissary Guard. He heard a shout. He came up with the guard to prevent mischief, there was a gathering of soldiers before McMahon's door. Hogan was bleeding so that I hardly knew him. I admonished McMahon, who had a weapon in his hand- a stick with a buck horn on the head of it. McMahon shook it at me and said "he would serve him the same, that if it were a sword he would run it through Hogan" and the deponent. He retired to the Guard Room. Evidence of Patrick McMahon taken July 20th: said he would "rather give a glass of poison to a bloody Red Coat." He was in his senses but was in liquor and therefore refused Hogan. McMahon summoned for July 20th at 4 pm, summons given to Sergeant Isaac Hare of Captain Trion's Company. Evidence of Thomas Scudmore, Goderich, gunmaker: he heard words between Hogan and McMahon. Hogan said McMahon was "a liar" and McMahon insisted that Hogan should get out of his bar. Evidence of *Richard Steele*, Niagara Falls, shoemaker: he was in his workshop on the east side of the street opposite McMahon's. He heard McMahon tell someone 4 or 5 times to get out. He saw Hogan come out and the door shut. Hogan went to the front window which was open and talked to someone inside. He then went to the front door which was half open and talked. The door was shut and Hogan went back to the open window. McMahon put his head out the window and "bid him begone for a blackguard from the place." Hogan went to Leeper's house, then back to the platform before McMahon's. McMahon propped the door open and told Hogan to be off. McMahon struck him with a white fancy stick with a horn on it's head. Hogan went to the back of Crysler's old barn but returned to McMahon's and said "he would fix him off in the morning for this." He came close to McMahon's platform and McMahon raised his stick and ordered him off and struck again. He saw Hogan hang his head and wipe his forehead as if bleeding. He often saw McMahon refuse drink to drunken people. Evidence of *Edward McGuire*: Hogan went to the back of Cryslers and said to McMahon "You damned rascal! Have you your stick yet?" McMahon held it

up and said he had. He told McMahon to drop it and come out and "he would put the polish on him." Hogan came to the stoop and said he'd make him drop the stick, and damned him for a rebel. McMahon struck him. Hogan picked up his hat and went away, then came back and said "he would destroy him and his place." The Corporal came up and told him to make less noise. They got Hogan off, walked as if going to the barracks. He came back with 3 or 4 men, wanted to know what was the matter. He said he'd tell when the officers came back. Hogan called McMahon a rebel before he was struck, and was bleeding after McMahon struck him. Letter from *Samuel Street* to *Charles Richardson*, Niagara Falls, Chippawa, July 23rd: encloses papers in the proceedings. Verdict: McMahon convicted of assault and battery on Hogan. Fined £1.5.0. plus costs 12/6-, total fine £1.17.6 on July 20th. Fine paid, 12/6- paid to the use of Stamford roads.

Charles Edie [alias Eadie] vs. James Hamilton. Defendant has dogged, maimed, beat and kicked the hogs of the plaintiff. Fined £3.10.0. damages on August 23, 1839. Hamilton denies damages to that extent. He admits the fences insufficient. He dogged six hogs, and beat others with a club. Dogged two hogs in the woods. Wishes he'd killed them to save his crop, August 29, 1839. Evidence of *John Allan* taken before *David Thompson*: Hamilton admits two hogs were injured by his dogs. Wishes he'd killed them, one a breeding sow heavy in pig. Ill treatment, he struck the pigs. Doesn't know the extent of the damages. Evidence of William Dashwood: confirms testimony. Evidence of *James McGowan* of Dunn: saw one *Waterhouse* and [-----], defendant admits dogging the hogs. Evidence of Robert Croft taken August 31st; defendant admitted dogging the hogs. Evidence of Samuel Colwel: knows nothing. Indiana, Haldimand, August 31st. James Hamilton of Cayuga convicted of trespass on Edie's hogs. Fined £3.10.0, damages and £2.18.0, costs, Conviction annulled by jury September 12, 1839, Recognizance to appeal taken before Edward Evans, August 31st: James Hamilton, Cayuga, yeoman, £10, sureties John Holmes, Dunn, yeoman and John W. Evans, Rainham, yeoman, £5 each. Letter from Charles Edie to James Hamilton, *Hayfield*, August 17th: "Two of my hogs which you so shamefully abused are in such a state that I think it probable they may not survive. I shall let you have a chance to come and see them and purchase them at fair value. If not, I will take such measure as the laws admit to cover the value. PS: I will be at home tomorrow if you have any wish to see me." August 31st, notice given by Hamilton of intent to appeal "as the Magistrates did not give me a fair trial, would not allow me to defend myself." Entered into recognizance with two sureties.

I had intended to go down but am confined to my house by illness. I was directed by my doctor not to venture down. Prays for the indulgence of the court until I am able to attend safely. Certificate can be obtained if necessary. I wrote to *Macdonald* with a request that he explain the matter to the court. [Ordered to stand over to the next Sessions.]

Petition of *George Martin*, September 10, 1839. His feet were badly frozen, it was necessary to amputate one leg, the other was left in a state to reduce him to walk on his knees. He is incapable to support himself, and depends on charity. "Looking through the vista of the approaching fall and winter, unless by the merciful interposition of divine providence, has no prospect but to die miserably in the streets." He is a British subject and has resided most of his life in this District. Prays for an allowance, and induce some person to take him under shelter, September 10, 1839. [Rejected, September 12th.]

Malachi Cater, Cayuga, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a saddle and two bridles (value 1.15.0.) the property of John L. DeCow, Cayuga, yeoman, on June 14, 1839. No bill: Christopher McAlpin (foreman.) Witnesses: John DeCow, John Crysler, Hiram Griffin, Philip Wilson. Evidence of John DeCow taken before David Thompson at Indiana on June 14th: in September or October 1838 someone stole a saddle and bridles from my barn. I suspected Malachi and Joshua Cater. Warrant to apprehend Malachi and Joshua Cater issued to constable John Byrnes and a subpoena for Matthew Conat. Evidence of Malachi Cater taken June 17th: he

denies the charge. Evidence of John Byrnes: he arrested Joshua Cater who made his escape. Evidence of John DeCow: Malachi Cater was seen near my barn on the night the saddle was taken. Evidence of Matthew Conat: Malachi and Joshua Cater told me a secret, they stole the property and also the saddle of *Archibald Blair*. They intended to steal two horses and run off to the United States. The goods were hidden, and they wished deponent to join them. DeCow, Conat and others found the hidden saddles and bridles. *Orson* [alias *Anson*] *Smith*, Philip Wilson and *Hiram Ferris* subpoenaed to give evidence. Malachi Cater committed to gaol for want of bail. Prisoner bailed July 25th. Recognizance taken: John DeCow £10, Matthew Conat £5, John Crysler and Hiram Griffin £4 each.

James Darick, Bertie, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one shirt the property of *Abel Land* on August 30, 1839. True bill: *Christopher McAlpin* (foreman.) Witnesses: Abel Land, *Jane Palmerton*. Grand Jury presentment attached, dated September 11th. Recognizance taken before *William Smith* on August 30th: Abel Land £10. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol, September 11, 1839.

Charles Green, Niagara, labourer and *William Green*, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing bank notes (value 20/-, 5/-, \$3 or 15/-, \$1 or 5/-, \$5 or 25/- and two others \$3 each or 15/-) the property of *James Anderson* on August 31, 1839. True bill: *Christopher McAlpin* (foreman.) Witnesses: James Anderson, *Lewis Donnelly*. Evidence of James Anderson: Charles Green knew of it and received, harboured and maintained the notes. Warrant to apprehend Charles Green issued by *Charles Richardson* on September 11, 1839. Verdict: "not guilty."

Charles Green, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing bank notes the property of *James Anderson* on August 21, 1839. True bill: *Christopher McAlpin* (foreman.) Witnesses: *Lewis Donnelly*, James Anderson, *John Meneilly*, *Amos Perrin*. [Grand Jury presentment attached, dates the crime on August 31st.]

File 35-27.

William Green, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing bank notes the property of *James Anderson* on August 31, 1839. True bill: *Christopher McAlpin* (foreman.) Witnesses: *Lewis Donnelly*, James Anderson, *John Meneilly*, *Amos Perrin*. Evidence of John Meneilly Jr. taken before *Thomas Butler* on September 4th: he was at Lewis Donnelly's inn on August 27th. Charles Green and his son William Green went out of the house. Saw a man lying asleep, supposed he was intoxicated. There were no lights in the room, and no other persons in the room except Green and his son. Evidence of Lewis Donnelly, innkeeper, taken before *Lewis Clement* and *John Alma* on August 31st: a lodger at his house declared that \$23 was taken out of his pocket on August 27th. A boy named William Green took his money. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to 18 months hard labour in the penitentiary, September 11, 1839.

George Hanson, Willoughby, labourer, coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing 5 yards of cloth (value 20/-) the property of *James Macklem* and *James McGlashan* on August 9, 1839.

True bill: Christopher McAlpin (foreman.) Witnesses: Edward Colls, James Macklem, James Cummings. Letter from James Cummings to Charles Richardson, Chippawa, August 12, 1839: Sends information against George Hanson. Recognizance of Edward Colls and William Nicholson, clerks at Macklems are sufficient to prove facts. "Hard times these. Crops shrunk, no cash. What is to become of our country? Her Majesty the Queen had better employ us all as soldiers and then we should be sure of rations at all events." Letter of James Cummings to Charles Richardson, Chippawa, August 20, 1839: Hanson has been bailed out of gaol. Paid my fees and those of the constable. Referred him to **Dr. Macklem**, I have no further claim for fees. Letter of James Macklem to Charles Richardson, Chippawa, August 20th: was bailed by *Jesse* **Ketchum** of Toronto, gentleman, who gives him an excellent character. I am anxious to have the proceedings quashed. There is no other offence against the law. Is well known to Mr. Ketchum. We are not disposed to prosecute "as it appears to have been done by some infatuation of the moment." Should the matter be arranged to stop the prosecution, it will be necessary to have the papers returned. Letter from Jesse Ketchum to Charles Richardson, Toronto, October 31, 1839: I received your letter regarding Hanson. I thought it was settled with *Mr. Markland* so he would not appear to give evidence. If he did not I suppose there would be no bill found against him and if no bill was found the recognizance would be free of course as he was held to answer charges preferred against him. If I have been mistaken or misled or both I hope the Magistrates will be so good as to let it lie over to the next court and give me a chance to see him. Recognizance of Jesse Ketchum taken October 1839. Recognizance taken before *Thomas Butler* on August 16th: George Hanson, Niagara, labourer, 20, surety Jesse Ketchum, Niagara⁵⁵, Esquire, 20. Paid fees to Bernard Roddy 2/6-. Writ of Charles Richardson, December 13, 1839: to levy on the goods and chattels of Jesse Ketchum, if the debt can't be levied to take Ketchum and keep him in custody in your District Gaol until he gives security for his appearance or satisfies the debt £20. Evidence of Edward Colls taken before James Cummings, August 10th: on August 9th at 9 pm, Hanson came into the shop and enquired after cloths. He had just come and said he was going to **Buffalo** the next day. He didn't appear very particular over the price or quality. He bought it for a coat, pantaloons and vests. I was suspicious. Sum was £5.9.0, tied the cloth up in a bundle. He asked for silk neck handkerchiefs. I turned to a drawer and heard footsteps and he had decamped. I called *Mr. McGlashan* and *Nicholson* and gave chase. Returned in one hour with the prisoner and the bundle. Evidence of *William Nicholson*: Crossed the bridge and gave a description to the sentry in order to stop Hanson. We went to the river with John McCormick as far as Hudson's **Tavern** (1½ miles) and asked after the prisoner. We turned to come home and saw the prisoner about 50 yards away. We brought him back to Chippawa with the bundle under his roundabout jacket. He let the bundle fall or it came out when he was apprehended. Evidence of George Hanson: has resided at Toronto and Buffalo. He crossed under the Falls on August 8th. He took shelter in a hay shed. He came to Chippawa the next evening and went to Macklem's store. He bought 5 yards of cloth (\$20) which was tied up. He went off without paying. Recognizance taken: Edward Colls and William Nicholson £10 each. Recognizance of defendant estreats, September 12, 1839.

Mary Ann McDonnell, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing two cloaks and a woman's dress (value £2.5.0.) the property of *Gage Miller*, Niagara, innkeeper, on September 6, 1839. Witnesses: Gage Miller, *Martha Ann Cudney*, *Hannah Cudney*. Grand Jury presentment attached, prisoner robbed the house of Gage Miller. Evidence of Gage Miller taken before *Thomas Butler* on September 6th: his wife's dress was stolen on August 24th. He followed prisoner to *Stoney Creek* and found the dress there. The cloaks were stolen on the same day.

Prisoner confessed, she knew where it was and would give it up. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to 18 months hard labour in the penitentiary, September 12, 1839.

John Kerr, Louth, blacksmith. Charged with assault and battery against Thomas Kilday, Louth, blacksmith, on August 20, 1839. True bill: Christopher McAlpin (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Kilday. Grand Jury presentment attached. Evidence of **Stephen Burtch**: Kerr was at **Bush's** house in St. Mary's in the evening. He put Kerr out, and not quarrel with the women. Kerr overtook the deponent near Abraham High's, after some conversation he swore he'd take their lives before morning. Deponent told him to go home, he asked where Kilday was. I said I didn't know, expected him to be at home. He was beating him with a stick and would have satisfaction before morning. Evidence of *Arnold Acre*: saw Kerr strike Kilday with a black bottle. Did not see a blow with an axe. Heard Kerr state that he'd have Kilday's life before morning. Evidence of Russell Bush: he came to Kilday's coal pit between sundown and dark. Heard Kerr use some very profane language. I told him not to blaspheme in such a manner. If anyone abused him, the law was there for protection. Same words were repeated to me. He took up an axe and shovel, and threatened Kilday. He flung them both down, the axe struck me in the leg. Can't say if the axe blow was aimed at him, he was partly turned and saw a glimpse of the axe pass his shoulder. He went home. Kerr came to his house and denied cutting deponent in the leg. He called the deponent a liar and stated that he'd draw deeper blood before morning. He was very abusive. I put him out of my house. Evidence of Thomas Kilday taken August 21st: He put up a coal pit in the village of St. Mary's. Kerr came up, took some whiskey and put wood on the pit. I told him not to put more wood on it, he was doing it badly and it would have to be taken down again. Kerr took it down, and I told him to stop. Kerr said that if I came down off the pile "he would tear him into inch pieces." Deponent came down and Kerr struck him with a black bottle in the forehead, and came up a second time with a club and shovel to strike me. Deponent cautioned him to keep back but Kerr kept advancing. Deponent shoved him down, and Kerr bit the deponent's thumb and gouged his eye. He requested to be let up and said he'd behave and deponent let him up. He got up, took an axe and drew it up over his head and said he'd split his brains out, but struck Bush a severe cut in the leg. Kerr said he'd take Kilday's life. Deponent fears for his life. Recognizance taken before *J.W.O. Clarke* on August 23rd: Thomas Kilday £50; Stephen Burtch, Louth, yeoman, Russell Bush, Louth, tanner and Arnold Acre, Louth, £10 each. Verdict: "guilty," fined £5 plus costs £4.1.0. and sentenced to one month in gaol.

John Sides, Willoughby, labourer and private in the 3rd Regiment of Incorporated Militia. Charged with assault and battery against Jane Palmerston and Sarah Carter on August 13, 1839. True bill: Christopher McAlpin (foreman.) Witnesses: Jane Palmerston, Sarah Carter, Isabella Carter. Letter from James Cummings to Charles Richardson, Chippawa, August 13th: encloses the recognizance of Jane Palmerston and Sarah Carter. I "have everything ready as the Ladies do not wish to go to Court or remain even one night in your beautiful town of Niagara---although one is both young and tolerably pretty. I told them you was a very accommodating gentleman, and on Wednesday after court commenced everything would be ready and you would not detain them. (So far so good.)" Evidence of Jane Palmerston, wife of Thomas Palmerston, Willoughby, innkeeper, taken before James Cummings on August 13th: Three men of the Incorporated Militia, Sides, Coats and Hagan, came to her house at 9 am. Her husband was away from home. They were drinking with the Dragoons there. When they had gone, Sides wanted more. She refused since their officer, Mr. Gatchill, told her not to get the men drunk. She went out and came in and found the men had succeeded with a stick and handkerchief to get the bottle. They were all

drinking. I took it away and put it on the shelf. Sides said he'd kill the deponent and everyone about the house. I went to get my shawl and go to inform the officer. Coming out, I found them in the bar. They had drunk all the liquor that she had. Sides said she had money in the chest and if she didn't behave he'd break it open and get it. Deponent said it was more than he dared to do. He said if she went for the officer he'd murder her before one week. Deponent went for the officer, Mr. Gatchell came and arrested them. Evidence of *Sarah Carter*: corroborates the testimony. When she left for the officer, the men made use of very offensive and vulgar language to me. They attempted to strike me and my sister (who is in very delicate health) which she avoided by going to another room. I came back due to my sister being ill and could not retreat. They threatened to strike me. Sides (a tall man) caught me by the sleeve but I got away. Mrs. Palmerston returned with Mr. Gatchell. Evidence of John Sides: He refused to sign the charge of assaulting Jane Palmerston, larceny in taking liquor, and assaulting Sarah and Isabella Carter. He won't disclose who took the liquor. Recognizance of Jane Palmerston and Sarah Carter, £12.10.0. each. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two months in gaol, September 11, 1839.

Charles Robert Loscombe, constable account, 10/-.

Donald McDonald, Account, the Government of Upper Canada. £1.10.0. for services done at the store house as issuer of arms and "accutrements," December 9-December 14, 1837. Certified by **Alexander Hamilton**, January 22, 1839. Petition of Donald Macdonald: In December 1837 he was ordered by the Magistrates to take cognizance of whatever might occur prejudicial to the interest of this, and superintend the issue of arms, accoutrements and ammunition. The account was audited and passed, then rejected by the Board of Claims. Charged it to the District.

Peter Grant, Niagara. Was employed as a clerk by the Magistrates at Harrington's Hotel in December 1837 and January 1838, account for £7.10.0. was audited and passed by Daniel McDougall and entered into the ledger. He has received no pay, and does not know what happened to the document. He arranged all the bills, accounts &c of the office preparatory to being sent to Toronto. Joined McDougall's Company of 6 Month Volunteers and went to Chippawa. He was delivered the key of the drawer to Mr. Lockhart and was sent as clerk to the Royal Engineer's Department to London, Upper Canada. It is inconvenient to lay out of the above sum. It has been due a long time, being a young man far from home with no prospect of employment during the inclement season. Charged it to the District.

File 36-3.

Notice to the *Committee to Examine and Report on the State of the District Finances*, requested to attend on the 30th at 10 am. Signed *Charles Richardson*, November 27, 1839.

A summons was issued to the committee, disappointed to find that only *David Thorburn*, the *Treasurer* and the *Clerk of the Peace* were present. Resolved: that application be made to the Legislature for an Act to authorize the District to borrow £1200-£2000 to liquidate the debts, and raise an additional rate of 1 farthing in each £1. Signed *John Mewburn* and *Lewis Clement*. (*Pawling, Lockhart, Clarke* and others absent.)

Thomas Shaw. In the fall of 1837 I received a tax roll from **Arthur Lambert** in Niagara and \$17.00, partly in the **Agricultural Bank of Toronto** bills. October 26, 1839.

The roll for Haldimand for 1837 was examined and approved of, report by the *Clerk of the Peace* ⁵⁶

Letter from *William W. Nelles*, collector, to *William Clarke*, treasurer, York, February 23, 1838. Encloses \$62 cash and three wolf scalp orders for \$6 collected for taxes. Many owners were absent, it will be long before I can collect the rest. Will send it as soon as I can collect it. Receipt for £15.9.5½ from William W. Nelles to William Clarke for taxes.

Statement of Collector's Rolls for the County of Haldimand for 1837.

Letter from *William W. Nelles* to *William Clarke*, York, April 26, 1838. The balance of cash due is £4.1.10.

Letter from *William W. Nelles* to *Charles Richardson*, York, Grand River, September 27, 1838. In answer to your demand for £21.11.0, the balance of taxes for 1837 for Haldimand, "I am not owing one copper." I paid to the Treasurer all that could be collected after deducting my own fees. I hold his receipts for all the money paid, remitted by mail with a statement of the roll as of April 27th last. I can prove payment by the postmaster at York. There is a vast deal of trouble attends the collecting and settling of the assessment roll as it is very annoying after all to have a demand of this description made when the whole had been properly settled. I do not therefore feel disposed to undertake the collection of the amount of the roll for the present year and will therefore return you it by my brother.

Letter from *William Clarke* to *Charles Richardson*, Toronto, October 29, 1838. Concerning the *Nelles account*, "this person pretended to have paid me two sums of \$62 on two successive days, but when you look at his letter enclosing one sum of that amount you will at once see the absurdity of the claims. I received one only." Balance due £20.18.73/4.

Letter from *Henry Nelles* to *Charles Richardson*, Grimsby, January 21, 1839. The taxes for the upper part of Haldimand could not be collected. *William W. Nelles* was appointed and served for 2 or 3 years and then declined serving. Duplicates returned. *Peter B. Nelles* (assessor) will endeavour to collect the money for last year if authorized. Let me know what can or may be done.

Letter from *Charles Richardson* to *William W. Nelles*, January 29, 1839. Concerning your letter of September 27, 1838, the late Treasurer reports a balance due by you of £20.18.7³/₄. "I wish you would come down and have the matter settled, otherwise I shall have to submit the matter to the justices."

Letter from *William W. Nelles* to *Charles Richardson*, York, January 31, 1839. Regarding your letter of January 22nd, I adhere to the statement of the roll furnished to *Mr. Clarke*, the late Treasurer, on April 26th last. I can prove the payments were made. They were not made on the same day, ie, March 8th, but two receipts "the date of one of the receipts was erroneously stated by me formerly as the 9th, the figure 8 very much resembling a 9." One payment was sent on February 23rd and when the second was made. *Mr. Garrett* gave me a receipt for both sums which I now hold. He hesitated but saw the sum passed to my credit on his books. A letter from Mr. Clarke acknowledges the payment which I have mislaid or destroyed. The last sum of £4.1.0. was remitted by mail with a statement of the rolls. Let Mr. Clarke refer to my letters and produce them- as a man of business he must have preserved them- which will settle the matter. I feel perfectly easy about it, the money was actually paid. I can prove it by receipts and the postmasters at York and Niagara. It is unfair to tax me with the expenses of postage, far less to expect that I should make a trip to Niagara. I hope this explanation satisfies you, if not bring it before the Justices. I shall be prepared to enter on my defense. [Receipts for £15.9.5½ and £15.8.10½, both dated March 8th.]

Letter from *William W. Nelles* to *Charles Richardson*, York, February 7, 1839. I have found *Mr. Clarke's* letter which acknowledges the first payment. I hope this may satisfy you of the correctness of what I have already stated. If not, "I trust I will be able to corroborate it at the proper time and place."

File 36-7. Boundary Records.

Petition from the inhabitants of Humberstone and Bertie. The *Garrison Line Road* has been opened many years and Statute Labour was performed on the south side. Now the road allowance is believed to be on the north side of the line. Pray to order the *Commissioner of Highways* to ascertain if the road allowance is on the proper line and report to the Magistrates. This will prevent future loss of money and labour on the road. Bertie, September 1, 1839. Signed *James Kerby*, *Alex Douglass*, *Lewis Palmer*, *Henry Putman*, *Henry Hershey*, *Adam Wooliever*, *Peter D. Wooliever*, *John Anderson*. There are disputes and doubts about the road between Concessions 12 and 13 leading from the *Garrison Line* north to *Black Creek*, and the side road between lots 5 and 6 Concession 13. Request a survey, August 30, 1839. Signed *John Stephens*, *Ebrem Jonson*, *John Adeare*, *Peter Tuttle*, *Samuel Adeare*, *Patrick Spillings*, *John Hussey*, *John Spillane*, *Bryan Quinn*, *Frederick Spillane*, *David* [Cree—g?], *Robert Coulter*, *Robert Stevenson*, *Daniel Pound*, *Isaiah Thomas*. [Read and filed December 10, 1839. Referred to boundary commission.]

George Rykert, Samuel Wood and Jacob Keefer appointed Boundary Commissioners for the Niagara District under the Act, June 17, 1839. To settle the boundary between Stamford and Thorold, and hear all evidence. The boundary shall remain and continue forever a straight line. Stones planted between lots 135 to 178 to the Welland River in Thorold marked "R." September 28, 1839.

L. Foote, *Clifton*. Neglected or refused to perform his Statute Labour. Evidence on the oath of *Philip Bender*, pathmaster, Stamford, October 14, 1839. Foote fined £1.10.0. before *P. Delatre*, *John Mewburn* and *Graves C. Swan*, October 15th.

George [Brown?], Drummondville, grocer. Charged with assault and battery against John Prouse, bailiff on September 2, 1839. Witnesses: George Bender. Brown fined £1.5.0. paid to the pathmaster and £1.6.6. costs, total fine £2.11.6, September 20, 1839.

Mary Carlin. Charged with assault and battery against *Stevenson Hume*, Rainham, on October 7, 1839. Carlin maimed Hume with a billet of wood. Fined 5/- plus 49/3- costs (total fine £2.14.3) before *David Thompson* at Indiana, October 11, 1839.

George Watson Black. Charged with assault and battery against Stevenson Hume, Rainham, on October 7, 1839. Black maimed Hume with a billet of wood. Fined £3.19.3 plus £5 costs (total fine £8.19.3) before David Thompson at Indiana, October 11, 1839. Confirmed December 13, 1839.

Abraham Wardell, Timothy Wardell, Peter Wardell and Joseph Miller. Charged with assault and battery against John Warren Evans, Ann Evans and Edward Hill. (or Hull?) Evidence of Ann Evans taken before William Mylne and Edward Evans, Rainham, November 12, 1839: she saw Timothy Wardell come up to John Evans and say "Damn you, John Evans, if you take that deer you take it dishonestly" and strike him on the breast. Peter Wardell approached in a threatening manner and wanted to fight. He put his fist up to his nose and damned him, saying he would shoot him. He went for and brought up his gun, laying on the bank of Lake Erie. He would stamp any person named Evans or that was an Irishman. Evidence of Edward Hill: saw [Evans?] say he'd shoot the damned Irishman. Evidence of Ann Evans: she was standing holding the deer's legs. Abraham Wardell came up and took her arm, jerked her much, nearly pulling her down and straining her arm. Evidence of John Evans: corroborates the testimony. Evidence of Edward Hill: corroborates the testimony, and questioned by Abraham Wardell. Did he have hold of the deer? Answer, no. Was there an assault on Hill? Ann Evans did not see Miller strike him, but Miller admits he had hold of Hill to pull him off the deer. Denied striking Hill. Evidence of W. Evans, a boy 8 years old. Was present at the killing of the deer, and saw Miller strike Hill on the side of the face. Timothy and Peter Wardell fined £2.10.0. each; Abraham Wardell fined £1.5.0. and

Joseph Miller fined 5/-, plus 13/6- costs each to be paid to the Township Clerk for the roads. Recognizance for appeal taken November 13th before *David Thompson*: *Solomon Wardell* and *James Adams*, Rainham, £10; Abraham Wardell, Peter Wardell and Joseph Miller £10 each, sureties Solomon Wardell and James Adams £10 each. Summons issued by William Mylne and Edward Evans to Peter Wardell, Timothy Wardell, Abraham Wardell and Joseph Miller, Rainham, to appear on November 12th at 12 pm, to answer to an assault charge on November 9, 1839.

Examination of gaol. The cells are in good order considering the state of the building and well kept. The debtors and criminals acknowledge much credit is due to *Mr. Cameron* for attention to their comfort and also to *gaoler Wheeler*, both are attentive. Stone in the corners is loose and in a dangerous state. This is due to water conductors from the roof not being in proper repair due to negligence. This must be repaired to keep the water away from the building. Recommend the stone work be repaired and a clay embankment 2 feet high be thrown around the building with a slope to keep the water from the foundations, December 12, 1839.

Gaol contains seven prisoners and two debtors. We cannot say more except regret over such unfortunates. There is a necessity for a *bankrupt law* and abolish *imprisonment for indebtedness*. This would better secure the creditor and prevent unfortunate honest debtors from prosecution.

State of *finances for the District* are in an embarrassed state. *Those caring for the insane* are compelled to dispose of District cheques for 30% less, a disgrace to our flourishing District. We recommend to find means to pay the claims by a further tax or otherwise, December 12, 1839.

There is necessity for a *House of Industry* in the District, December 12, 1839.

The gaol is in an insecure state. Facility with which implements to break gaol may be introduced. There is the introduction of liquor through the window grates. There is no secure fence. Sheriff protests against the continued state of insecurity. Signed by *Kenneth Cameron*, Sheriff, December 11, 1839.

[Verso endorsed: appealed, discharged and conviction enforced when required by *Mr. Bell*. December 13, 1839.]

Peter Nagle, has lived and boarded with **Charles Hibbard** in Bertie for 10 months. Is entirely destitute, has had no help from the Town Wardens. What is to be done with him? Prays to be paid for keeping him, or turn him out of doors to the wide world. Send a line by the bearer **Charles Anger**, December 9, 1839. [endorsed "no funds."]

Benjamin Lyons, Niagara. Has been an inhabitant of this Province since 1774. He served in the late War with the United States in a Flank Company of the **Western District Militia** under **Captain William Elliott** and accompanied **Brock** at taking **Detroit** in 1812. Was faithful to the British cause, is the son of an old soldier. Is now infirm, in old age and ill health. Is destitute and cannot earn a living. Applies for public aid, or else will perish from want, December 9, 1839. [endorsed "no funds provided by law."]

Court address. The Legislature is to amend the General Quarter Sessions Act for the purpose of holding a *Special Sessions* in a central part of each county for the purpose of granting tavern licences, December 12, 1839.

For the purposes of granting licences in Haldimand, a Special Sessions is to be held at *Decue's Inn* in Cayuga, January 5, 1840. *Clerk of the Peace* ordered to send a Deputy to this Session, December 12, 1839.

Elizabeth Gamble, Niagara, widow. Has five children dependant upon her for their support. She keeps a small grocery. Desires a licence to sell ale and beer, December 12, 1839. Witnessed by *Edward C. Campbell. James P. Ralston* consents to be her surety, December 11th. Recognizance taken before *Thomas Butler*: Eliza Gamble and *George Watts*, Niagara, shoemaker, £10 each. Licence granted December 12th.

File 36-22.

William Baker, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one bag (value 1/-) the property of Hester Eastham on November 19, 1839. No bill: John Barker (foreman.) Witnesses: Edward Honor, Mrs. Eastham. Evidence of Edward Honor, #9 Police, Queenston, taken before J. Mewburn on November 20th: He saw Baker at Thomas Humphries, tavernkeeper. Had something concealed in his vest. Watched him go to the stable shed and hide a bag. When asked where did he get it, said it was at the Widow Durham's and then later he said at some other place. He was told to show where he got it. He took me to Mrs. Eastham's stable, laid his hand on the manger and said "this is the place." The prisoner was in liquor. A man, a stranger, lost a bag with letters on it. She knew nothing, it was not her property. The prisoner took the bag that morning. Evidence of William Baker: he was warned not to state anything to incriminate himself. Statement voluntarily given was taken in writing, the prisoner said he came to Queenston to meet his companions. He drank too much, recalls nothing more. Recognizance taken: Edward Honor £20. Prisoner committed to Niagara Gaol.

William Baker, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one handkerchief (value 5/-) the property of *Daniel Quackenbush*, Queenston, innkeeper, on November 21, 1839. True bill: *John Barker* (foreman.) Evidence of Daniel Quackenbush taken before *J. Mewburn* on December 11th: a stranger came to the inn and asked me to accompany him to Niagara in his wagon. I saw a handkerchief- recognized it as his own- took it from his neck. I asked what he did this for, and he said to get more liquor. I recognize the man in Gaol- Baker is the man.

File 36-24.

John Fitzmorris, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one silk handkerchief (value 3/6-) the property of George Croft, Stamford, tavernkeeper on December 11, 1839. True bill: John Barker (foreman.) Witnesses: George Croft. Letter from J. Mewburn to Thomas Butler, Danby House: Committed a man to gaol for little infatuation and a small mistake. Evidence of George Croft: John Fitzmorris, of Halifax, Nova Scotia, ship's carpenter came to my bar at 10 am. He was not sober and called for liquor. I said he'd had enough already. Talked to two others. I went to Mr. Lemon's on the road where I mislaid the handkerchief. Came to the bar and asked if anyone saw it? A young man said the prisoner had got it. Asked if he could be searched, the handkerchief was found on him. He said someone-the deponent- had put it there. Recognizance of George Croft £20. Verdict: "not guilty," December 12, 1839.

File 36-25.

Aaron Helmer, Haldimand (Indiana), innkeeper. Charged with aggravated assault against Elizabeth, wife of George Monture [alias Montuer] on October 9, 1839. Witnesses: Elizabeth Montuer, Levina Ottley. Warrant issued by David Thompson to constable John Byrnes and the Niagara Gaoler, Indiana, October 12th: Helmer is charged on the oath of an Indian woman, Elizabeth, the reputed wife of George Monture Jr. of the Cayuga nation of Indians and on the oath of another Cayuga woman known by the name of Jaminah. Eliza Monture was assaulted by Helmer with a club, severing the flesh on the left side of her face to the bone, 1" long. Byrnes arrested Helmer on a warrant for outrage. He went to the barn and Helmer made several passes or strikes at him with an iron shovel, and was wounded severely in his right arm, and said he'd split the constable's brains open. He refused or neglected to find sureties to keep the peace towards Monture and Byrnes. Warrant to arrest and commit him to gaol issued. Evidence of Levina Ottley, swore to interpret for Elizabeth Monture, a Cayuga, October 9th: Monture was by her

house. Helmer struck her a blow on the left side of her face with a club, laid open a wound to the temple 1" long. She was holding her child in her arms. Evidence of *Jemima Butler* [or Buller?] corroborates the testimony. Helmer arrested and held to bail for trial at the Quarter Sessions. Recognizance taken: Eliza Monture £5, Jemima Butler an Indian woman 40/-. [Faint ink notation on the *mittimus*, *William Murray* and *William Orderly*-bail.] *Nolle prosequi* ordered. Defendant to pay for the drawing of the verdict, parties having settled, December 11, 1839.

Warrant issued to Byrne to apprehend Helmer for an assault on Monture, October 9th. Evidence of John Byrnes: deponent took a pistol (not loaded) out of his pocket and requested Helmer to desist and give up peaceably. The deponent said he must do his duty. Helmer continued to defend himself with a shovel. He inflicted a large, deep wound in the right arm of the deponent with a shovel. Evidence of Aaron Helmer: He denies the wound. He struck at Byrnes with a shovel but thinks he didn't hit him. He knows that Byrnes does not know that he is a constable. Helmer committed to gaol. Recognizance of John Byrnes £10. *Nolle prosequi*, parties having settled. Defendant pays cost of indictment, December 11, 1839.

William Jackson, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one axe (value 5/-) the property of *Isaac Byas*, *Lundy's Lane*, on November 25, 1839. True bill: *John Barker* (foreman.) Witnesses: Isaac Byas, William Williams, Revel Hawkins, Thomas Williams. Letter from G.C. Swan to Charles Richardson, Drummondville, December 9, 1839: The axe is not the property of William Williams, but lent to him by Isaac Byas of Lundy's Lane. Evidence in the case is enclosed. Evidence of William Williams, Stamford, labourer, coloured man: went to Hawkin's to get a glass of beer. Had an axe, which he put down behind the bench. Had a five minute visit, afterwards the axe was gone. Hawkins gave the axe to my brother, said it was taken by Jackson. Evidence of Thomas Williams: the axe in court was given to him by Hawkins. Evidence of Revel Hawkins: Knows nothing of the axe, if he gave it to me for custody it would be forth-coming. He asked Jackson twice if he knew the axe which he denied. Mr. Zebulon *Ferris* (lodger): knew nothing. He later came to me and said Jackson offered him an axe for sale. I asked him to do what he could to recover it for the owner. I called Jackson and said to bring the axe to Mr. Ferris'. He denied having the axe. I threatened him with a warrant. He went upstairs and brought the axe down. I gave it to Thomas Williams for his brother William Williams. There are two rivets in the handle by which it was recognized. The prisoner was my servant, and I discharged him on account of theft and drunkenness. Recognizance taken November 28th: Revel Hawkins, Stamford, lodging house keeper, (coloured man), Thomas Williams, Stamford, labourer (coloured man) £10 to appear; William Williams, Stamford, labourer (coloured man) £10 to appear. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one month in solitary confinement, December 11, 1839.

John Oaks, Bertie, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 2 yards of kerseymere (value 20/-) the property of James Windeat. No bill: John Barker (foreman.) Witnesses: James Windeat, William Squibs. Recognizance taken November 28, 1839 before William Smith: James Windeat and William Squibs, £10 each. Letter from James Windeat to the Chairman: Since "no bill" was found the question arises over the property of the cloth. I made a statement, viz: Squibs came to my store with the prisoner and some others. They remained and then went out. An hour later

Squibs returned and asked if had lost anything and desired me to examine the cloth. A piece of cassimere was missing. I went to *Captain Brown* (Captain of the prisoner's Company) and said I had lost a piece of cloth and gave an exact description. I requested that he call on Squibbs for further particulars. Squibs said he saw the prisoner take something, possibly the cloth. The barracks was searched and the cloth was found in his bed. The bill was ignored not because of doubt that the property was mine, but because there was no evidence that Oaks put it there. If he admits it, the Grand Jury has the evidence required. If he denies it, then the cloth [still] doesn't belong to him. The prisoner therefore cannot claim it. Captain Brown and 4 or 5 others are satisfied the cloth is mine and restored it to me. They held a Court Martial and stripped him of his Sergeants commission and dismissed him from the service. I was in possession of the cloth. If I had not been anxious to promote the ends of public justice, and entered a complaint before a magistrate, I should have been in undoubted possession of my property and saved myself the trouble of a journey to Niagara to prosecute. The court will not allow me to lose what I need not have jeopardized, had I considered my own care and interest at the expense of the public good. I do not make remarks over the value of the property, but I am unwilling that the cloth be awarded to him as a premium for committing the crime. The cloth has a ticket attached with my shop mark on it. Was on it when stolen and has not been taken off. Will come to Niagara to know what you decide, I will be indebted if the Clerk of the Court will inform me by letter. Ordered: that the goods be returned to the prosecutor, December 12, 1839.

Reuben Gunn, Niagara, labourer, coloured man. Charged with larceny, stealing a head stall (value 5/-) the property of *John J. Brown*, Queenston, tavernkeeper, on February 11, 1840. True bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman), March 10th. Witnesses: John J. Brown, Chester Wadsworth, Ann Wales, James McCardle. Evidence of John J. Brown taken before J. Mewburn on February 11th: a bridle, head stall etc. were stolen. Left in the stable, the door was locked at night. Cannot say if the bolt was broken. *Chester Wadsworth* told me that his son *Daniel Wadsworth* paid 50 cents to a coloured boy named Gunn. Evidence of Daniel Wadsworth: my mother paid the 50 cents. Evidence of Chester Wadsworth son of Chester: he knows the nature of an oath. Gunn was paid in silver in the barroom. His mother said to go to *William's* and borrow the money. Evidence of Ann Wales: saw the money paid to Gunn. Brought a head stall &c into the kitchen, Gunn followed. Evidence of *James McArdle*, baker: he came out of his shop between 3 and 4 o'clock, saw Gunn with the reins of a bridle sticking out from under his coat. He was in the habit of selling harnesses or parts of harnesses brought from over the river. He asked how much, Gunn said 50 cents. Recognizance taken: John J. Brown £25; Chester Wadsworth £50 for his sons Daniel and Chester; £25 for Reuben Gunn by John P. [-----]; Daniel Wadsworth to find bail to answer a charge of purchasing a stolen article. Verdict: "guilty," Gunn sentenced to a fortnight in solitary confinement, March 14, 1840.

File 37-30.

Charles McCarty, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a pistol (value 10/-) the property of John McGilly on February 22, 1840. True bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman.) Witnesses: John McGilly, William Waldren (constable.) Evidence of John McGilly taken before Swan on February 22: deponent is a servant of Harmonius Crysler, tavernkeeper. McCarthy worked for Crysler about a fortnight. He absconded for no reason. My trowsers were taken, worth between 5/- and 7/6-. Prisoner was brought by the police to Crysler's, was apprehended under suspicious circumstances. Had a pistol and chain taken from my box. Evidence of William Waldren: McCarty was arrested since he was not able to give a satisfactory account of himself. He took the pistol and chain from his pocket and offered them for sale at John Croft's Tavern. Recognizance taken: John McGilly £20. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol, half the sentenced in solitary confinement.

File 37-31.

Patrick Nugent, St. Catharines/Grantham, innkeeper/labourer, *Copeland Stinson*, Grantham, labourer, *James Carson*, Grantham, labourer. Charged with riot and assault against *Alfred*

Talbot, St. Catharines, labourer, coloured man, on October 5, 1839. True bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman.) Witnesses: Alfred Talbot, Dr. W. Ferris, John Clark. Evidence of Alfred Talbot taken before **E.S.** Adams on October 6th: he was in bed between 2 and 3 am. He heard people come to his door and Carson's voice, then the door burst. Talbot asked them what they wanted. Carson said for him "to play the fiddle for them at Mr. Sanderson's." He got up, intended to fasten the inner door and get out at the window. Carson said "You are a long time in coming." They shoved the door and took hold of me, forced me into the yard. They struck me there, had clubs and sticks. Threw him to the ground, beat and kicked him. They broke my arm. Deponent is in fear of his life, defendants intended to murder him. Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams on December 18th: Patrick Nugent £20, sureties Anthony Knox Boomer, St. Catharines, merchant, and Walter Dittrick, St. Catharines, innkeeper, £10 each; Copeland Stinson, St. Catharines, innkeeper £20, sureties *Samuel Stinson*, St. Catharines, innkeeper and James Carson, St. Catharines, butcher, £10 each; James Carson £20, sureties Copeland Stinson and Samuel Stinson £10 each. Grand Jury presentment: warrant to be issued for the defendants. Letter from John Clark to Charles **Richardson**, March 10th: Alfred Talbot, the prosecutor, is without his most material witness. Should the trial be put over to the assizes when he would be better prepared. He was violently beaten at night, was left nearly lifeless. Verdict: "not guilty."

File 37-32.

Hiram Smith, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one bucksaw (value 5/-) the property of *Cornelius Forsyth* on February 3, 1840. True bill: *Barnabas Gregory* (foreman.) Witnesses: Gunner William Boyd (Royal Artillery), Privates George Ingles, Jeremiah Rushbrook, and William White (43rd Regiment), William Prouse (painter) and Cornelius Forsyth, Evidence of Cornelius Forsyth taken before *C.G. Swan* on February 7th: he left his saw on the nail at the back of the house at 8 pm. The next morning it was gone. He described it to his neighbours. William Prouse found it with Boyd. The saw was taken from the stable in Boyd's absence and had it at **Ross' Coach factory**. Saw my saw there. Evidence of William Prouse; he saw Boyd, a servant to **Mr. Lane** who lives with me, cutting wood with a strange saw. The description fit, and deponent took it away to Mr. Ross. Lieutenant Kennedy states that Boyd attends to Lane's horse between his duties but doesn't remain at the house. Boyd asked after the saw, I said it was stolen from Forsyth. He said he bought it from a coloured man for a half dollar or 2/-. Didn't try to conceal it. He described the coloured man as wearing a long, light coloured coat and a small close cap. Evidence of William Boyd: he bought the saw from a coloured man. He got the money from *Mr. Franklin*. Heard that the coloured man was named "*Smith*." I would recognize him again. Evidence of *Hiram Smith*: he didn't steal or sell the saw. Never saw it until now. Evidence of *Isaac Thomas*, coloured man: Smith lives with me. He was called on that morning to sweep the barrack's chimneys. Smith got up later, and didn't have his shoes on until 9 am. He was not out of my sight for a quarter of an hour. At 4 pm he sent Smith to **Bender's** Barracks to sweep four flues. Deponent was at the Barracks Masters when retread was sounded then went home. Found Smith at home before me. Evidence of *Corporal John Ballard*, 43rd Regiment: he superintended at Bender's, the chimneys were swept between 11 am and 1 pm, was sure it was before 2 pm. Evidence of *Charles Brown*, coloured man: suffered with pains in his feet on Monday night and so was not sound asleep. Smith slept in the same bed. He was positive Smith didn't leave the house. He went out once for 5 minutes between 3 am and daylight. Had breakfast at 8 am. Smith was not out of his sight until he went out to sweep the chimneys. Evidence of *Colour Sergeant Joseph Denton*, 43rd Regiment: the chimneys in *Major Fraser's* Company were swept on Tuesday between 10 and 11 am. Evidence of George Ingles: was at the police office on February 10th. Boyd and Smith spoke near *Captain Talbot's* guarters on 8:15 Tueday morning. Smith had a buck saw on his arm. He looked at his watch in the kitchen, so he is positive of the time. He passed by them, but didn't hear what they said. Evidence of Jeremiah

Rushbrook: he looked out the window of *Captain Wright's* barracks near Talbots between 8 and 9 am. He saw Smith with a saw hanging on his right arm. Saw him cut wood at *Moxey's Tavern* opposite the barracks. Couldn't have been taken as the last breakfast horn had only just been sounded at 8 am. Evidence of William White: was on sentry duty in front of *Wright's barracks* between 7 and 9 am. After 8 am Boyd and Smith spoke near *Robinson's store*. The coloured man had boughs and sticks for sweeping chimneys but I didn't notice a saw. I don't know his name, but have seen him often before. Verdict: "not guilty," March 11, 1840.

Edward Taylor, Cayuga, labourer/farmer. Charged with larceny, stealing 1 bag and 2 bushels of oats (value 1/6- and 3/-) the property of **Smith Middaugh**, Stamford, yeoman, on January 23, 1840. True bill: **Barnabas Gregory** (foreman.) Witnesses: Smith Middaugh, **David Thompson**. Evidence of Smith Middaugh: he drove to the inn of **Aaron Helmer**. While getting his horse into the stable, someone stole his bag (labeled "Ottley") with oats out of his sleigh. It was found concealed in Taylor's house at Cayuga. Warrant issued to **constable Byrnes** to apprehend Taylor. Evidence of Constable Byrnes: he apprehended Taylor and found the oat bag in his barn. Evidence of Edward Taylor: He found the bag in the road. Prisoner held to bail. Recognizance taken before David Thompson, January 24, 1840: Edward Taylor, £10, sureties **James Hanan** and **Daniel McKenna** £5 to appear; Smith Middaugh £10 to appear. Verdict: "not guilty," March 12, 1840.

File 37-34.

Christopher Wills, Humberstone, bookbinder, Charged with larceny, stealing 140 silver Mexican dollars and £35 of Upper Canada, the property of *Charles Philip Schurrer*, Humberstone, shoemaker, on February 11, 1840. Witnesses: Charles P. Schurrer, Christel Wiess. Evidence of Charles P. Schurrer taken before *James Black* on February 13th: the theft occurred between 9 am and 2 pm. Wills threatened to kill deponent who fears for his life. Evidence of Christopher Wills: knows nothing of the theft. He went to **Joseph Daner** at Bertie in order to purchase land. He had no money and therefore did not buy it. He went to see *Samuel Springer* about buying his place, he wanted \$200 for it. Deponent expected Schurrer to help, deponent offered Springer \$150 which was refused. He then went to Daner's. Deponent lives in the same house as Schurrer, who has a chest in the room I inhabit with money in it. Deponent knew he had it, we came from Buffalo together. My wife and I saw him count out \$140. The chest was always locked. There are no strangers around, deponent has no idea how the money was stolen. My wife told me on my return from Daners that the money was gone, I said it was impossible. Evidence of Christel Wiess: Wills called on me, heard he was accused of theft. I said he had better see Schurrer or get into trouble. He said Schurrer had no money, but Wills knew what he had. He told me he had been to purchase a place of Daner, and asked me what it was worth. I said he might get \$130. Letter from James Black to Charles Richardson, Port Colborne, March 4, 1840: encloses evidence in the case. Has prepared the recognizance but hadn't entered the parties names. Schurrer has gone to Buffalo and Wills obtained bail at Niagara. "I have never been able to get payment of Armstrong's note. Shall I return it?"

Affidavit of James Black: I had much difficulty to get the examination since neither party could understand or speak English. They are Dutchmen, examined through interpreter *Emmanuel Hoover*. Had Will's evidence been admissible, more information might have been obtained. Wills had no money in Buffalo, on his way to the province, but borrowed \$20 from Schurrer to bear his expenses. There was no evidence of a threat to Schurrer's life, and so the charge cannot be entertained. If some well informed person acquainted with both languages examined the matter,

much more information might be obtained. Defendant discharged from recognizance, no prosecutor appearing, March 13, 1840.

Committee to erect a fence around the gaol, 12 feet high: Messrs. Robert Melville, Malcolm Laing and Kenneth Cameron, March 28, 1840.

Henry Rolls, MD, ordered to be gaol physician in lieu of *Dr. Porter*, deceased, salary £40.

Order of 1838 requiring the *Treasurer* to attend the office between 10 and 3 each day hereby rescinded.

Treasurer ordered to issue a debenture to *Benjamin Corwine* for the amount of a bond dated October 11, 1836 and executed by *William Clarke*, *Lewis Clement* and *Charles Richardson*. Memo of Benjamin Corwin regarding bond payments attached.

Application for position of gaol physician: *Dr. Rolls* (in favour, 6); *J.B. Matthews* (1); *Dr. Raymond* (withdrawn); *Edward M. Hodder* (3.)

Truman Raymond. The office of gaol physician and surgeon is left vacant by the death of **Dr. Porter.** Petitioner was a surgeon in the Provincial Regiments in the late war. Served 15 years, mainly in this town. Has suffered materially by his attention to prisoners unable to pay and debtors. In one case £150 by reliance upon the honour of the person. Is in embarrassed means to support a wife and four children. Has moved to St. Catharines for better prospects but will return to Niagara if appointed, March 28, 1840. [Petition withdrawn in favour of **Dr. Rolls.**]

Henry Rolls, petitioner applies for the post left vacant by *Dr. Porter's* death. Approved, March 28, 1840.

E.S. Wheeler. In the absence of **Dr.** Porter I called upon **Dr.** Roles to attend which was "invariably done so with cheerfulness and alacrity and he discharged his duties with kindness towards the prisoners and satisfactorily to me."

J.B. Matthews, vacancy left by death of *Dr. Porter*, offers himself as candidate, March 27, 1840. [Rejected.]

Edward M. Hodder, vacancy left by death of *Dr. Porter*, offers himself as candidate, March 28, 1840. [Rejected.]

My decision was appealed. Your court tried the case, I was under the presumption that *William Mylne* held the recognizance of appeal. You were justified. The court sustained my decision against Black. A speedy adoption of measures for satisfying judgment. Report the derelictions of Mylne to the Lieutenant Governor.

To *Colonel Cameron*, Niagara Gaol, July 6, 1840: We beg respectfully to inform you that since the admission of *Mrs. Baker* (a lunatic) into this prison our situation has become doubly miserable by the effect produced on our health; and the almost entire impossibility to eat our meals, the unfortunate woman remains in her room and the effluvia therefrom is almost pestilential in addition to which her noise and screams during the night destroys our rest. Trusting you will be so good as to use your influential intercession with the Magistracy so that she may be removed from the Gaol, we have the honour to be, sir, your most obedient humble servants, *James Adams* and *Thomas Bryant*.

Letter from *Kenneth Cameron* to the *Chairman*, June 27, 1840: A letter was addressed to me by *Mr. Rolls*, surgeon, regarding the case of an insane woman committed by *Lewis Clement*. And being under your notice the circumstances of her disturbing by night, as well as by day, all the other persons confined therein, and so state that I have in the mean time I have directed the Gaoler to hire a person at the expense of the District to take care of her.

Letter from *Henry Rolls* to *Kenneth Cameron*, June 24, 1840: I beg to draw your attention to the case of a female maniac, now confined in the Niagara Gaol, who is quite destitute of the necessary attendance in a cell all alone and without a bed. I think it imperative for her safety that she should be relieved from her present condition without delay.

Letter from *Kenneth Cameron* to *Charles Richardson*, June 9, 1840: I beg to report for the information of the Court of Quarter Sessions that an error in the Grand Jury report at the last assizes proceeds no doubt from inadvertence or incorrect information "that there is no Bible for the use of the gaol." Since I have been Sheriff there has always been Bibles for the use of persons in gaol.

Robert Melville, **Malcolm Laing** and **Kenneth Cameron** ordered to be a Committee to superintend the erection of a fence around the gaol agreeable to the annexed estimate, 12 feet high, for £99.3.4. 145 x 210 feet. 2" pine planks, scantling, white cedar posts and braces, spikes &c. 10 feet high of 2" pine planks not to exceed 12 feet in height. (Vote of 7:3.)

Matthew Cathline, estimate 45 days work for 2 carpenters and 35 days work for 2 labourers to erect gaol fence, £44.1.3.

Estimate for fencing around the gaol: *Mr. Heron* for materials £92.15.1½; *Mr. Cataline's* estimate to put up the fence £44.1.3; spikes and all extras £9; total £145.16.4½.

Andrew Heron, April 15, 1840: agrees to deliver materials to the gaol for a fence by June 1st, £92.15.1½. *R.M. Long* and *John Rogers* are my securities for fulfillment of the contract.

True bill: *Robert Hobson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Jacob Steel. Grand Jury presentment attached. Evidence taken before *Lewis Clement* on March 17th: Steel was attacked in the street by five men including *Charles Bolton*, *Daniel Burnett* and *Thomas Cheesman*, Niagara, between 1 and 2 am. They struck blows on my head and body. Verdict: "not guilty," June 11, 1840.

Josiah Green, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing three hams (value 15/-) and 20 lbs. of bacon (10/-) the property of *Benjamin Lawrence*, Niagara, on April 19, 1840. True bill: *Robert Hobson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Benjamin Lawrence, *Leonard Hicks, Mrs. Proctor*, *Robert Reid*. Evidence of Benjamin Lawrence taken before *Lewis Clement* on May 11: Josiah Green finished digging a well on April 17th. On the 19th the smoke house was broken open and three hams and several pieces of bacon were taken. Evidence of Leonard Hicks taken May 11th: on April 20th *Syres Green* brought me smoked bacon, said he got it at the *Cross Roads* from men for whom he'd been digging a cellar or well. Said he took it in part payment. Saw a ham in the scales at *Wainright Proctors*' Mrs. Proctor paid Josiah Green for it. Evidence of Robert Reed: said Syres Green brought ham for sale, he bought it at 6d per pound. Evidence of *Mary Ann Proctor*: Syres Green sold me a ham on Easter Monday at 6d per pound. Evidence of *Syres Green*: he bought the hams from his brother-in-law *John Brown*. Verdict: "not guilty," June 11, 1840.

William Haggerty, Stamford, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 20 or 30 fowls (value 20/-) the property of William Randolph Hopkins, Stamford, on May 11, 1840. True bill: Robert Hobson (foreman.) Witnesses: Mary Hopkins, Samuel Smith. Evidence taken before James Cummings on May 11th: Haggerty was at the fowl house of Hopkins, no one else was with him. Recognizance taken before James Cummings: Mary Hopkins £5 to appear. Warrant issued by James Cummings to constable Thomas [Nead?] The fowls are at the house of William Haggerty and [-----] Husted of Stamford. Search Haggerty's house and apprehend him. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one year at hard labour in the penitentiary.

William Harrington, Bertie, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing the razors (value 5/-) and shoes (5/-) the property of *John J. Harris* on May 3, 1840. True bill: *Robert Hobson* (foreman.) Witnesses: John J. Harris. Letter from *William Smith* to *Charles Richardson*, Fort Erie, June 9, 1840: Harris was under recognizance to prosecute but is unwell and cannot attend. He now goes down and his recognizance sent to the assizes. Letter from the *Attorney General*: the witness was unable to attend due to illness, recognizance did not estreat, defendant ordered to bail. Letter from *Robert Baldwin* to Charles Richardson: encloses papers regarding Harrington. I did not find the book you speak of. I think you could not have sent it. I have my own and don't require it. I think you will find it still on your shelves. Evidence of John J. Harris taken before William Smith on May 4th: Harrington stole my razors and shoes. Evidence of William Harrington: was intoxicated when he took the articles. Recognizance: John J. Harris £10 to prosecute. Verdict: "not guilty," June 11, 1840.

Henry Johnson, Grantham, labourer, coloured man, Charged with larceny, stealing one coat (value 50/-) the property of **Samuel Peterson**, St. Catharines, labourer, coloured man, on May 13, 1840. True bill: *Robert Hobson* (foreman.) Witnesses: Samuel Peterson. Evidence of *George H*. **Dittrick**, St. Catharines, grocer: in the night between May 12 and May 13th Henry Johnson broke open a shop in St. Catharines and stole meat, a pocket book, and other sundries. Also a black coat belonging to Peterson valued at £5. I pursued him accompanied by **Thomas Henegan**. We overtook him within two miles of St. Catharines with the coat and pocket book in his right trowser pocket. Evidence of Samuel Peterson: the defendant took the coat from my house on the 9th when I was away. I saw the defendant in the village and asked for my coat, he said it was pledged at the prosecutor's shop. I agreed to sell the coat to Johnson if he completed work enough to pay its' price but the work was not finished. Evidence of Henry Johnson: says he got the coat from George Williams. Denies the charge. In the morning he met George Williams in the streets at St. Catharines near *Dr. Converses*' building, occupied by the tailor *Mr. Franklin*. Williams had a bag on his shoulder, which had smoked meat (hams.) Was to leave it with John Johnson. Recognizance taken before E.S. Adams on May 13th: Samuel Peterson and George H. Dittrick £10 each to appear. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to 18 months at hard labour in the penitentiary.

Henry Johnson, Grantham, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 50 lbs. of ham (value 20/-) and a pocket book (2/-) the property of *George Hamilton Dittrick*, May 13, 1840. True bill: *Robert Hobson* (foreman.) Witnesses: George Hamilton Dittrick. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to 18 months hard labour in the penitentiary, June 11, 1840.

File 38-31.

George P. Kinsley, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against Thomas Sandford, Niagara, on February 12, 1840. True bill: Barnabas Gregory (foreman.) Witnesses: Thomas Sandford. Grand Jury presentment: Kinsley struck Sandford on the head at his residence in Niagara with some weapon and inflicting a severe wound, March 12, 1840. Verdict: "guilty," fined £2.10.0. plus costs and 1 month in gaol, June 11, 1840. Petition of George P. Kinsley, prisoner, Niagara Gaol: the witnesses to the prosecution, especially *Patterson*, were extremely partial in their evidence. It was quite impossible for him from the situation in which he was placed and the condition he was in to see what had occurred in the hall. Patterson swore he saw me strike Sandford with an iron wedge, then only saw the shadow of a stick on the wall. This is an obvious contradiction, shows the amount of credence which ought to be attached to the testimony. Two credible witnesses proved that Sandford threatened to murder me. He used violent language, broke nearly all the doors and windows in my house, threw a large stone in the window, petitioner had cause to dread. Ordered him on February 10th to desist breaking and destroying my property but he wouldn't. He put himself in a menacing attitude and raised a cudgel with which he was forcing the door. He attempted to strike me. I raised my arm and pushed back the stick which descended on his head. This could have been proved if my son's evidence was not deemed inadmissible. He was present and held the candle. I have a large young family to support, who are inconvenienced by this penalty. Take the case into account, your petitioner is injured in his property by Sandford, my person was attempted, although the blow intended for your petitioner recoiled upon his own head. Petitioner prays for a revision of the sentence. [Petition read June 12th. No action of the court taken upon the petition.]

At 4 pm I saw a man of the same description. I asked where he was from and he said *Lewiston*. I told him of the complaint and that I'd take him on suspicion. He said he was going to his "core" [corps] at *Gravelly Bay*. I asked for a pass and he said he'd lost it. I took him to *Dr. Mewburn*. He called his son who had a position in the core and gave him a good "carractor." Mewburn advised me to take him to Niagara if his stories didn't agree. He confessed that he took the hat on mistake and where he'd left the papers in *Mr. Dickson's* garden. Dickson's man found them there and Mr. Dickson gave them to me. Turrell said if he would clear him he would work for him for three months. Evidence of Otis Ensign taken May 12th: Turrell stopped at my house during the assizes, part of the time as my servant. He was at my house very late on May 10th, but was not found the next day. I missed my hat, papers and handkerchief. I sent men in different directions to search for him and on May 11th the constable brought him with my hat and papers. Evidence of **Richard Keneda**, innkeeper: the prisoner came to my house early on the 11th and offered the cloak for sale for 1/- but took a copper and a glass of whiskey and cider. Evidence of Matthew Turrell: he was told he need not convict himself, what he said would be taken down and used as evidence. He said he was drunk and took it by mistake. He had the cloak on him to sleep in. He looked around the room for his cap and found a hat on the floor by the stove. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to 2 years hard labour in the penitentiary, June 11, 1840.

Witnesses: Robert Tune, **Edward Bolton**, **Thomas Honor**, **Lewis Clement**. Evidence taken before Lewis Clement on August 12th: the money was taken out of the drawer in the grocery of Robert Tune. Baxter acknowledges taking the notes. Evidence of Edward Bolton: **Mr. Eastern** came to my room on August 12th early in the morning. He said that Robert Tune was robbed from the till. Eastern and Tune pursued the man who got away. They gave me a description. Bolton and Honor went to the **Ferry** at **Queenston** and met the man coming back. The ferryman saw us and two police coming and refused to take him across. We took him prisoner and brought him to Niagara. He was taken to Tune, and he acknowledged the theft. Evidence of Thomas Honor: corroborates the testimony. Evidence of David Baxter: was at Tune's, saw the bills on the counter. He asked Mrs. Tune for two buns. He took up the bills and put them in his pocket and went home. Mrs. Tune gave him two buns and a glass of ginger beer. Recognizance taken: Edward Bolton and Thomas Honor £10 each. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two years at hard labour in the penitentiary, September 8, 1840.

Samuel Cramer, Stamford, labourer. Charged with assault and obstructing an officer, **Edward** *Honor*, constable, in his duty on August 29, 1840. True bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: Edward Honor, C.G. Swan. Evidence of Edward Honor taken before Swan on August 31st; he was walking on the further side of *Chippawa Bridge*. A girl named *Philis Messenger* was encircled by men on the bridge and crying. The men included Samuel Cramer and Isaac Hicks. She cried "Mr. Honor, will you not come and save me from these men?" I walked over and asked why they obstructed her on the highway. I told her to go about her business and the men to go to the other side of the bridge. Cramer stept up and asked me who I was and what business I had to interfere. I said I was a police constable and not to meddle with me. Hicks swore an oath and said "We will take her in spite of you and you may help yourself." They went after the girl and I pursued them. I told them of trouble if they meddled. They replied that if I prevented them, that I should take it. On the other side of the bridge, nearly opposite the sentry, Cramer turned and made a fist and said "you will take it." I said "You've done enough and are my prisoner." I called to the sentry to assist me. I laid a hand on his shoulder. I warded off his blows. The prisoner tried to get the sentry's firelock. I struck at him, fearing that he'd get the musket. He let go of it and directed his fury at me, striking right and left, when he saw the sentry come to my aid he ran off across the bridge. I followed but could not overtake him. I followed him to the rear of *Evan's* **Tavern.** Hicks said "You shall not take him, you shall not get him." I applied to the Commanding Officer, *Captain Purdon*, for assistance. We found the prisoner in the archway at Evan's Tavern. I gave him over in charge of the militia in the barroom. He attempted to get away but the militia seized him. He repeatedly struck at them and tried to tear himself away. I knocked him down to prevent his escape. His shirt and trowsers were so much torn that he couldn't be held by them. He was taken to the *Guard House*, followed by 100 persons threatening him, who did not disperse for two hours afterwards. I was joined by *constable Anderson*. Evidence of Philis Messinger: resides at Chippawa. On her way home at dusk, she was stopped by Cramer and another man. They wanted me to accompany them but I refused, he put his leg between mine and threw me to the bridge, pulled my clothes up over my head. He said I must come with him. I screamed out to Mr. Honor. He followed me to the sentry but the police prevented him from following me any further. He called to the sentry for help. Cramer caught the police by the collar and pushed him up against the fence. Cramer ran back across the bridge followed by the police. I saw nothing more of them. Evidence of *James Irwin*: boards at *Crysler's Tavern* in Chippawa, was on the balcony at dusk and saw a girl come from the square to the bridge. Saw men on the bridge, one had a coat and the other did not, who stopped her. Another man came up in a frock coat who passed on. I

heard voices as if quarrelling. The man without a coat ran back, followed by the man in the frock coat. He cried to "stop in the name of the Queen." He went towards the *shipyard*, the other stayed at the corner. I couldn't recognize them. Nor can I say if the girl received a blow, but she was jostled and was crying. Evidence of *John Jones*, private, *3rd Battalion Incorporated Militia*: was a sentry on the bridge at Chippawa between 7 and 8 pm. Philis Messinger crossed the bridge with Hicks. Then Cramer, Honor and others came back. Honor found fault with Cramer for his usage of the girl. He said "he had a right to stop a whore, any whore, on the road." They fought. Tried to fire my gun and didn't succeed, and ran back over the bridge. I saw nothing more until escorted by the militia and police. Recognizance taken: James Irwin £25; *Joseph Moore and Fr. Luck*, Chippawa, £25 each for the appearance of Cramer. Verdict: "not guilty," September 10, 1840.

File 39-16.

Joseph Friesman, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one wagon wheel (value 30/-) the property of Joseph Whitney Haines, Niagara, wagonmaker, on March 31, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: Joseph W. Haines, Lewis Clement. Evidence of Joseph W. Haines taken before Lewis Clement on September 3rd: the wheel was carried away from my shop. I was told by Friesman on August 1st that he took it and would bring it back but he hasn't. If he had, I would be satisfied. Evidence of Joseph Friesman: has nothing to say. Recognizance taken: Joseph W. Haines £10 to prosecute; Joseph Friesman £10, sureties Bernard Roddy, Niagara, yeoman £10 to appear. Recognizance of prosecution estreats. Defendant discharged by proclamation September 10, 1840.

File 39-17.

Josiah Green, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing two steers (value 50/-) and two heifers (value 50/-) the property of *William Michael Ball* on June 17, 1840. True bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: William Michael Ball, *Matthew McMullin*, *David Cooper*, *Abraham Secord*. Subpoena issued for David Cooper and Abraham Secord. Evidence of Matthew McMullin, Grantham, yeoman, taken before *Thomas Butler* on June 24th: He purchased four head of horned cattle at Grantham from Josiah Green at Grantham on June 21st; Green said he purchased them at Niagara. Paid £9 for them, a horse, sheep and money. The cattle were the property of William M. Ball. Evidence of William M. Ball taken June 23rd: the cattle were stolen, found in the possession of Matthew McMullin, butcher. Stolen by Green. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to two years at hard labour in the penitentiary.

File 39-18.

Leonard Hicks, Niagara, labourer. Charged with assault and battery against Peter White, Niagara, of the steamer "Queen," on June 12, 1840. Witnesses: Peter White, Peter Craig, James Hughes, Deborah Taylor, James Finlay, Edward M. Hodder (M.D.), Frederick Tench.

Evidence of Peter White taken before Lewis Clement on June 12th: deponent was struck with a club. Evidence of Peter Craig: Hicks came out of his house with a club and struck White in the street. White ran away. Question from the prisoner: did they come back to throw stones at the windows? Answer, no. Evidence of James Hughes: heard White and Hicks disputing in Hick's house. White was in the street with a club, went to the house and pushed the door open with the club and told Hicks to come out. Hicks came out with a club and struck White in the legs. White knocked away the club. James Finlay came out and went toward Craig, Craig threw a brick at Finlay and both threw stones. Evidence of Deborah Taylor: corroborates testimony. Evidence of James Finlay: corroborates the testimony. White went to the British Hotel. Finlay and Hicks met White between Winright Proctors and Cryslers corner. They passed each other. Someone said

"there's the man who punched open the door." I saw he had a club. I went after him and overtook him, and asked what he meant by acting as he did. We spoke a short time on the subject, the man turned around to fight. Hicks struck him with a stick. Then we went home. Evidence of Edward Hodder: the wound on White's arm may be fatal but they usually heal. Peter White asked Finlay if he had a club when he was overtaken at Crysler's corner? Answer, did not know. Evidence of Frederick Tench: heard a noise in the street at Leonard Hick's. Heard a running in the street near Crysler's corner. Heard violent blows with a stick. I ran out with Dr. Hodder and saw White bleeding profusely. He was attacked by two men, one with a club. The injuries might have been more serious if it were at a public place. Recognizance taken on June 13th: Peter White £10; James Finlay £10; *John Leonard Hicks* £50, sureties Winright Proctor, Niagara, innkeeper and *Alex Anderson*, Niagara, labourer, £25 each. Leonard Hicks brought up and discharged September 9, 1840.

File 39-19.

Thomas McChesney, Thorold, labourer and Paul Carmichael, Thorold, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one white gander (value 1/-) the property of **John F. Skyring**, Thorold, labourer, on August 4, 1840. No bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: John F. Skyring, *Alexander* Winslow, Thorold, innkeeper. Evidence of John F. Skyring taken August 6th: the gander was safe in a pen at night, no others were with it. It was missing on the 5th, feathers with blood traced to Winslow's tavern. Winslow pointed to the prisoners, said they brought the gander, he refused to admit them (he suspected it was stolen.) McChesney said he took it "in a drunken frolick." Evidence of Alexander Winslow: he was awakened by his sister, discovered a light in the kitchen and thought it was on fire. He hurried down and found two men, one on the stoop, the other near it. The kitchen door was open, the fire burning. A white gander with it's head off was lying on the stoop. I was vexed and asked how they did such a thing? McChesney made no answer and walked off. Carmichael said it was a joke and went away. I threw the gander after them, have not seen it since. Pointed out the men to Skyring. McChesney boards at my house, has been very intemperate for several days. Evidence of Thomas McChesney: His head is not right, doesn't recollect anything, had offered to settle with Skyring. Evidence of Paul Carmichael: is "not guilty" of the charge. Recognizance taken before *Jacob Keefer* on August 5th: John F. Skyring and Alexander Winslow £10 each; recognizance taken August 6th: Thomas McChesney £10, sureties *Anthony* Lacey, Thorold, shoemaker and James McIntyre, Thorold, tailor, £5.

File 39-20.

Alexander McNaughton, Queenston, labourer, John Wolf, Queenston, labourer, James Chambers, Queenston, labourer, Thomas Sander, Queenston, labourer. Charged with riot and assault against William Pendergast, Queenston, shoemaker, on July 31, 1840. No bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: William Pendergast, Mary Carol, Michael Carol, Thomas Carrall, Neil McCalley. James Flannagan, Daniel Wadsworth, Chester Wadsworth. Evidence of William Pendergast taken before David Thorburn on July 31st. soldiers of the 3rd Battalion of Incorporated Militia in a tumultuous manner made an affray on July 30th or 31st. They entered my house forcibly, broke the windows and did other injuries to the house. They maltreated myself and my wife with blows. Evidence of Alexander McNaughton taken before Tench and Thorburn on August 1st: called at the house between 12 and 1 am with Duff and his comrades Chambers and Wolf to ask if Mr. Tench was there. Duff entered and the door was shut. Deponent went to Mr. Wadsworth's grocery to call for another comrade who was not there. Wolf and Chambers left me. I met Sanders and we went past Pendergasts. Two or three men were sitting near the door. One ran out with a club and struck me on the head. I clinched the assailant. Two men aided the assailant and struck me. I fell senseless to the ground. I was carried away by my comrade and the

others, came to my senses in an [orchard?] Denies having words with the complainant. Evidence of William Pendergast: was at the house of Michael Carol. Was called upon by Mr. Duff and 3 soldiers of the 3rd Battalion I.M. He asked if there were any men there? Thomas Carol replied no, but said to look and if there were any there to take them and begone. Duff entered. The soldiers left and immediately a window was broken from outside. Done by the soldiers? I ran to the officers quarters (Mr. Brown) to inform him, and have the soldiers taken away. Lieutenant *Hamilton* wouldn't take the request. Deponent went home, while going to his house he was struck by the fist of a soldier with no coat at the outer door. I struck back, and Neil McCalley and others ran to assist me. I put them out, they threw stones at the door and into the house. McCalley aided to hold the door against them and preventing their entry. Mrs. Pendergast was outside, and on hearing her voice opened the door to let her in. She was much alarmed and abused by words and blows. The soldiers increased in number, the windows were attacked with stones. They broke the sashes and 41 panes of glass. I put my wife, mother-in-law, and Mrs. Neil McCalley into the cellar for safety. The soldiers continued to throw stones and pull the roof off the house. Doesn't know why they did it, deponent never gave them any offence. The week before 4 panes of glass were broken, believes defendants did it. Evidence of Mary Carol: Sat at the table at 11:30 with her husband, sister-in-law, a female from Toronto and her husband. Had some beer. The Pendergasts and McCalleys came in. The soldiers then came in, and her brother-in-law, Thomas Carol, asked them what they wanted? They asked after men, and I told them to go. 2 or $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours later there was the noise of rocks at the outer door. Mr. Duff asked for Mr. Tench. The soldiers came with him from Mr. Joseph Wynn's. Duff came in, the door was shut and then the windows broke. Heard a noise and found my brother-in-law in the hands of 2 soldiers who were ill-treating him by blows, bowed down on the ground on his knees and hands. My husband ran to aid him and struck with a club. The soldiers ran up the street, I followed to Mr. Wardsworth's. Mrs. Wardsworth called to me to go home, fearing harm, and begged the soldiers to go back to the barracks. She called one "Alex," and said he'd done enough. He said he'd smash the house down. I asked Mrs. Wardsworth if that was the man who broke the windows before? She said his name is Alex McNaughton. On returning home, we found the windows broken and also at Pendergasts. I begged through the broken pane for them to desist or they'd get hurt. They stopped here, but continued at Pendergasts. 5 or 6 soldiers were engaged. Evidence of Thomas Carol: the soldiers said they had the right to search the house. Deponent told them to be gone, he didn't keep an open house, there were no soldiers there. Went out, and near Pendergasts two soldiers came towards the house and said "Come on, boys" and began to jostle me. I remonstrated, they struck me and had hold of the stock on my neck, pulled it and tore the back from my vest, dragged me by the neck to the middle of the road. They beat me with their fists until I was rescued by my brother Michael. Wife produced the applet of a soldier which he pulled from the coat of one who began the jostling. They continued on Mr. Pendergast's windows for a long time. I heard no offensive language, attack was unprovoked. Evidence of Neil McCalley [signed Neill McAuley]: was invited to Mr. Carol's. Mr. Pendergast was sitting near the outer door. Soldiers came along the walk. He asked what the soldiers was doing so late at night, and they said it was none of your business and put a fist to his nose. The children were put in the cellar away from danger. The soldiers kept hammering on the door and breaking windows until daybreak. They gave a hooray with every volley of stones thrown and gave cheers on leaving. Said he'd bring as many men as would pull the roof off the house. Evidence of *George Sanderson*, 3rd Batt. I.M.: He met the prisoners at *Wardsworth's grocery* at 11 pm. Went to the *tannery*, and when opposite Pendergast's house he saw men at the door. Question: were they sitting or standing? The prisoner didn't assault them. One called out "there goes the damned [-----]" and words followed with blows with a club. There was an affray in the street, the head of the prisoner was cut, lay on the ground in the street in a senseless state. Three men in the attack. I ran and returned, we carried the prisoner to an orchard in a senseless state. Don't know the names of the men. Left the prisoner sitting up against a tree, and I left for the barracks. I didn't tell the men what had taken place. The

prisoner came back to the barracks at 5 am. I didn't ask how he was. I tied up his head with a handkerchief to stay the flow of blood. Recognizance taken August 3rd: William Pendergast £25; recognizance taken September 2nd: Mary Carol, Michael Carol, Neil McCalley, Daniel Wadsworth and Chester Wadsworth £10 each to appear. Defendants committed on August 1, 1840.

File 39-21.

Ambrose Oakes, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one jar (value 6d), 5 lbs of raspberry preserves (5/-), one tin dish and milk (1/-), one pound of butter (6d) and one plate (3d) the property of *Patrick Finn*, on August 18, 1840. Grand Jury presentment attached. Witnesses: Patrick Finn. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to one month in gaol.

File 39-22.

Eliza Robison, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing one muslin gown (value 15/-) the property of *Eliza Wagstaff* on June 18, 1840. True bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: Eliza Wagstaff, *William Surby*, *Lewis Clement*. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to six months at hard labour in the penitentiary, September 9, 1840.

File 39-23.

Eliza Robison, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing one counterpane (value 5/-) the property of John Wagstaff, on June 18, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: John and Elizabeth Wagstaff, William Surby, Lewis Clement. Evidence of Eliza Robison taken before Lewis Clement and Thomas Butler on June 19: she purchased the counterpane and dress from a man gone to St. Catharines. Evidence of Elizabeth Wagstaff, Niagara: a printed muslin dress and counterpane were stolen from her father John Wagstaff's house, and found in the possession of Eliza Robison. Evidence of William Surby: he saw Robison, a wandering vagrant, come through the market place with a "collard" muslin dress and counterpane, the counterpane dragging on the ground. He suspected it was stolen and made Robison a prisoner. Identified as belonging to John and Elizabeth Wagstaff. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to six months at hard labour in the penitentiary plus six months time.

File 39-24.

Ann Warren, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing one counterpane (value 5/-) the property of *David Boyd*, on September 2, 1840. True bill: *Henry Smith* (foreman.) Witnesses: David Boyd, *Eliza Tune*, *Thomas Butler*. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to six months at hard labour in the penitentiary, September 8, 1840.

File 39-25.

Ann Warren, Niagara. Charged with larceny, stealing four pairs of children's cotton socks (value 2/-) the property of James Rhodes Boyd, Niagara, gentleman, on September 2, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: James R. Boyd, Eliza Tune, Thomas Butler. Evidence of James R. Boyd, taken before Lewis Clement and Thomas Butler on September 3rd: the socks were stolen from the yard, found in the possession of Robert Tune, Niagara, baker, and a woman who refused to give her name. Her name is unknown to the deponent. Evidence of Ann Warren: she says her name is Ann Warren. She doesn't know how she got the socks. Refuses to sign her statement, September 4th. Evidence of David Boyd, Niagara. A bed coverlet and counterpane

were stolen from the yard, value 5/-. Evidence of Eliza Tune, wife of Robert Tune, Niagara, taken September 4th: a woman named Ann Warren gave me a pair of socks in payment for bread and ham and a glass of beer. Had "Boyd" marked on them with black ink. Evidence of David Boyd and James R. Boyd: the woman's name is unknown to the deponents. Recognizance: Robert Tune £10 for his wife to appear, David Boyd £20 to appear. Verdict: "guilty," sentenced to six months at hard labour in the penitentiary plus six months time, September 8, 1840.

File 39-26.

Russell Wells, Niagara (Queenston), carpenter/labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing pantaloons, a coat (value 20/-), vest (5/-), Bible (2/-), prayer book (2/-) and 3 yards of cotton drill (4/-) the property of William Anthony, Queenston, tailor and private in the 43rd Regiment on June 30, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: William Anthony, Edward Defield. Evidence of William Anthony taken before J. Mewburn, July 2nd: the goods were stolen from my shop by Wells. Evidence of Edward Defield: heard of the robbery by his son-in-law Wells. Evidence of Ann Wells, wife of the prisoner: went to Lewiston at noon on Monday, pursued and overtook Wells on the road to Lockport. Remonstrated with him to give up the things and not bring her and the family to disgrace. After some time being threatened with gaol he threw down the bundle (coat and handkerchief) and the vest he had on which he wouldn't give up at first. Evidence of William Anthony: swears the coat and vest are his. Recognizance taken: William Anthony £25, Ann Wells £12.10.0. Russell Wells committed for want of sureties. Verdict: "not guilty," September 10, 1840.

File 39-27.

Martin Woolmansy, Thorold, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a silk handkerchief (value 3/9-), pantaloons (3/9-), boots (15/-), 5 cotton shirts (12/6-), flannel drawers (6d) and stock (1/-) the property of William Mitchel Sweatland, master of the schooner "O.P. Starkey," on June 25, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: William Mitchell Sweatland, Washington Burr, Luther Boardman. Search warrant issued by Duncan McFarland, Port Robinson, to constables on June 28th. Evidence of Washington Burr, New York, mariner: goods were carried off from the schooner "O.P. Starkey" at 12 pm, June 27th. Silver watches, frock coat, pantaloons, 2 waist coats, 7 cotton shirts. Part found on the schooner "Josephine" and the rest on the "North America." Evidence of William Mitchel Sweatland taken before E.S. Adams and Henry *Mittleberger* on June 30th: deponent missed his silver watch (value £6.5.0.) His pocket[book] was lying open, 5/3- was gone, also 3 farthings and some small trinkets, also his clothing and flannel wrapper (1/3-), socks, silver pencil case (2/-), pocket knife and comb. Evidence of Martin Woolmansy: he went on the schooner in the *Welland Canal*. He took the goods identified by Captain Sweatland and *Charles Henry Lewis*. He was intoxicated. The next morning he intended to return the goods if he could without being discovered. Thought he'd deliver the goods at Oswego since he couldn't do it as planned. Resides in Jefferson County, New York and is a seaman. Evidence of Luther Boardman, Humberstone: he received a search warrant from Duncan McFarland, and another order from Mr. Black at Port Colborne that the "Josephine" and "North America" were not to leave the canal. While preparing to search, Woolmansy left the "Josephine." W. Burr delivered a warrant to me for Woolmansy. Heard the prisoner confess the theft. Recognizance taken before Adams and Mittleberger: William Mitchel Sweatland £20, sureties Washington Burr and Charles Henry Lewis £20 each. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to 11 months in the penitentiary, September 9, 1840.

File 39-28.

Martin Woolmansy, Thorold, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one frock coat (90/-), pantaloons (35/-), satin vest (20/-), black silk handkerchief (2/6-), and cloth cap trimmed with fur (20/-) the property of Charles Henry Lewis of New York on June 28, 1840. True bill: Henry Smith (foreman.) Witnesses: Charles Henry Lewis, Washington Burr, Luther Boardman. Evidence of Charles Henry Lewis taken before Henry Mittleberger and E.S. Adams on June 30th: Deponent is a mate on the "O.P. Starkey." Did not see prisoner before today, was not on board the schooner. Also had a pocket knife (5/-) taken and 11/10½- money in his vest (ie, \$1 of the Lancaster Bank, Ohio, \$1 of the Oswego Bank and some change.) Plea: "guilty," sentenced to one year at hard labour in the penitentiary, September 9, 1840.

File 39-29.

Martin Woolmansy, Thorold, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one watch (value 120/-) the property of Washington Burr of New York on June 28, 1840. Witnesses: Washington Burr, Luther Boardman, E.S. Adams. Evidence of Washington Burr taken before Henry Mittleberger and E.S. Adams on June 30th: my clothing was stolen off the Starkey while in the Welland Canal near Lock 18. Also an English watch (value £6) and 1/6- cash were taken. Obtained a warrant from Duncan McFarland, the watch was in the possession of Edward Welch of the schooner "Albany" who got it and another, of Captain Sweatland (£7). Went with the prisoner to the old house of Philip Shaver who showed him the goods hidden in a small barn. The goods of Charles Lewis of O.P. Starkey were all delivered up to me. Evidence of Martin Woolmansy: Confessed he entered the schooner at 12 pm and found all the men asleep, entered the cabin and took the articles. He is uncertain of the value of Sweatland's watch. Nolle prosequi ordered, September 9, 1840.

The Treasurer ordered to communicate with other treasurers in the Province to ascertain the amount of *wild land taxes* received by the late treasurer *Malcolm Laing* and transmitted. Sureties to make good any such monies paid to Laing and not transmitted, November 7, 1840.

John Clark, deputy sheriff. Charge for an arrest on a felony charge on a schooner at Port Dalhousie, November 12, 1840: Morgan Stocking, Henry Ketchum, Orrin Lilley, William Hopkins, Charles Jackson, John Condin, £3.3.0.

Bernard Roddy, High Constable, £4.0.9; court constable (assizes) £4.17.6.

William Surby, assize constable, £3.5.0.

Charge for cotton for the gaol, January 22, 1838. Signed *Thomas Butler*, *William M. Ball*, *Daniel McDougall*.

E.S. Wheeler, charge for brooms, gravel for the yard, cleaning the privy, whitewashing, saw dust for the court, stationery, glazing, straw for the cells, washing, candles, 5 yards of cotton for **Donely**, maintenance of **Mrs.** Robinson, £17.7.0.

John Hawn, constable account, £1.6.6.

Boundary Commissioners: charge to establish the **Garrison Line** in Bertie, £25.9.1. Signed **George Rykert**, **Samuel Wood** and **J. Keefer**.

Silvanus Cleveland, court constable 11/3-. Bills of costs £5.1.6 and £3.1.0.

David Smith, Clinton. Has kept an inn for 4 years. Recommended by **H. Nelles**, **R. Nelles** and **J.C.** [Coon?] Recognizance: David Smith £10, sureties **Isaac Marlatt** and **Paul Marlatt** £5 each. Fee £7.10.0. paid, licence granted December 21, 1840.

Isaac Marlatt, Clinton. Has kept an inn for 4 years. Recommended by *R. Nelles*, *H. Nelles* and *David Smith*. Recognizance: Isaac Marlatt £10, sureties *Zebulon Andrews* and *John E. Jennings*, Grimsby, £5 each. Fee £7.10.0. paid, licence granted December 21, 1840.

Francis Wood, Thorold (village.) Recommended by Jacob Keefer, George Keefer, Henry Hoover and Alex Cristy. Recognizance: Francis Wood £10, sureties Ephraim Hopkins and George Kitson £5 each. Fee £7.10.0. paid, licence granted December 22, 1840.

Elijah Armstrong, Niagara. Has kept an inn for 14 years. Recommended by *Robert Melville*, *Thomas Butler* and *Bernard Roddy*. [Recognizance not complete, surety named as *Lewis Donnelly*, £5.] Fee £4.10.0. paid, licence granted December 22, 1840.

Michael Morley, Niagara. Recommended by *Robert Melville*, *Lewis Clement*, *Patrick Finn*. Recognizance: Michael Morley £10, sureties *Bernard Roddy* and *Patrick Finn* £5. Fee £7.10.0. paid, licence granted December 26, 1840.

Robert Cole, Niagara. Has kept an inn for 4 years. Recommended by **Robert Melville**, **Lewis Clement** and [-----] Recognizance: Robert Cole £10, sureties **Martin Kearins** and **W. Proctor** £5 each. Fee £7.10.0. paid, licence granted December 26, 1840.

Recognizance of *Richard Howard*, Niagara, £10, sureties *Robert Cole*, Niagara, and *W.B. Winterbottom*, Niagara, £5 each, dated December 31, 1840.

File 40-22.

Henry Bird, Niagara, labourer, (coloured man), Ambrose Oaks, Niagara, labourer, Eliza Bird, Niagara, femme covert, Eliza Oaks, Niagara, femme covert (in the custody of John Hawn). Charged with larceny, stealing one turkey (value 2/-) and one rooster (6d), the property of *George* Field, River Road, Niagara, on October 25, 1840. True bill: W. Copland (foreman.) Witnesses: George Field, Catherine Field, Betsy Suthard. Evidence of George Field taken before David **Thorburn**: the poultry was in a disturbed state about light, sound of cackling. Found the turkey and a yellow cock missing. Found the feathers of the colour of the missing fowls and picked them up. He found the same feathers near the back door of Henry Bird and a heap of fresh picked feathers near the cider house adjoining Birds'. Evidence of Henry Bird taken before **Tench** and Thorburn at *Queenston*: he denies stealing the fowls, has no knowledge of it. His family dinner on Sunday was 4 squirrels and a pheasant. Doesn't know of mutton used at his house that day. Didn't mention it in a conversation he had with Mrs. Suthard, neither did he mention the squirrels nor the pheasant. Denies that he destroyed the feathers, there were none at his back door except pheasant feathers. He told Mrs. Field the family had neither mutton nor fowl on October 26th, ie, no poultry nor tame fowls, no reference made to wild fowls. Evidence of Ambrose Oak: had no fowl meat except a wild bird. The meal consisted of 4 squirrels, pheasant, and a little mutton with pastry. Evidence of Eliza Bird: She and her sister stripped the bird, scalded it in water and picked the feathers off. They made a pudding of it with a piece of mutton neck. Squirrel was the only meat on the table, doesn't know if it was cooked with it or not. Thinks it was cooked separately. Her sister prepared the dinner, deponent being unwell. Is positive there were three squirrels. Denies that there was any fowl at dinner except the pheasant. She told Mrs. Suthard that they had squirrel, pheasant ad mutton for dinner. Evidence of Elizabeth Oak: had squirrel, pheasant and mutton for dinner. Cooked in a pot and rolled in "doe," not any part of it was without doe. My sister sat at dinner and partook of the victuals (not much) being unwell. There was no fowl except pheasant. Evidence of Betsy Suthard taken before David Thorburn on October 26th: George Field, son of George, called at breakfast and asked if we knew who took the fowls? He showed a handful of feathers picked up between the outer door of her dwelling and their cider house where fowls roosted. Said a turkey and cock were taken. A man of colour lives under her roof with Oak and their wives who are sisters with their two children. The families have to enter their respective dwellings through one front door. At noon one wife called and asked for pepper. She was cooking mutton. I gave her some red pepper. I entered their room without asking permission to give her directions on how to use the pepper. I saw the flesh of fowls in a large heap, skin side up, on a plate. Shanks of a large fowl. There was no mutton. One woman was rolling dough for pastry. She called them to her room and charged them with a lie about the fowl meat. The coloured man and two white women were present. The woman had a squirrel without the skin and swore that it was the kind of meat they had and would swear it before a magistrate. They told me to go and take my oath. They would swear it was pheasant. When she entered the room to instruct them about the pepper the two women appeared to blush. She saw a small wooden vessel, like a wash tub, with bloody water and feathers swimming in it, like the last pickings of a fowl. Evidence of Catherine Field, Wife of George Field, River Road, Niagara Township, yeoman: The fowl was stolen by Henry Bird, Ambrose Oak and their wives or two women living with them in a dwelling of *Joseph Brown's* near her residence. She and her son George traced the feathers from the cider house roost to the door of Henry Bird. Bird denied taking them. He said they had squirrel and his wife told Mrs. Suthard they had mutton. There was no squirrel. With circumstantial evidence she prays for a warrant to apprehend them and bring them in for examination. Recognizance taken before *David Thorburn*, October 27th: defendants bound £12.10.0. each; recognizance taken before *H. Tench* and David Thorburn: Betsy Suthard, wife of *Jacob Suthard*, Niagara, carpenter, and George Field Jr, Niagara, labourer, £12.10.0. each; recognizance taken before David

Thorburn: Catherine Field, wife of George Field, Niagara, yeoman, £12.10.0. Verdict: "not guilty," December 8, 1840.

File 40-23.

James Kerr, Beamsville (Clinton), merchant. Charged with using false weights. True Bill: W. Copland (foreman.) Witnesses: Patrick McGaw, James Courson, Robert Nelles Jr, Daniel Skelley, Daniel Monro, James Hy, Jr. Grand Jury presentment: Kerr placed small weights inside the hollow parts of a large one to defraud, 28 lbs. when buying and 31 lbs. when selling. On oath of Patrick McGaw. James Kerr of wicked and depraved mind and contriving and fraudulently intending to cheat and defraud the subjects of Her Majesty of ½ part, on April 15, 1840 used a weight of 56 lbs. of iron. He sold iron to Timothy Hixon, 68 lbs. by the false weights, was 6 oz. deficient of 56 lbs. He sold flour and pork using the false weight "to the evil example of all others." Letter from Patrick McGaw to Charles Richardson, Beamsville, November 26, 1840: I wish you to inform me when the Sessions commence. Should I come to see you before? Witnesses to be subpoenaed since the essential witnesses intend to leave the place rather than give evidence. I wish you would subpoena them immediately, and mail them to Israel Marlatt of Beamsville (constable.) Please write to me immediately. [Blank recognizance forms signed by Patrick McGaw, James Kerr, John C. Ball and James Boulton.] Verdict: "not guilty," December 10, 1840.

File 40-24.

Catherine Meloy, [alias Molay], Niagara, servant. Charged with larceny, stealing one child's white frock (value 2/-), a child's flannel petticoat (2/-), one cap (1/-), one blue silk pocket handkerchief (1/-), one pair of white cotton stockings (1/-) the property of **John Lowe**, Niagara, on October 6, 1840. True bill: W. Copland (foreman.) Witnesses: John Lowe, Ann Burns Lowe. Recognizance taken before Lewis Clement. October 12th: Catherine Molay £10, surety *Alexander* **Ross**, Niagara, constable, £10. Evidence of John Lowe taken October 10th: goods were stolen from our house and concealed in the house of Mrs. Cow and David Boyd. They were in the possession of his servant, Catherine Meloy, who left his house and now resides as a servant at David Boyd's and has a child at Mrs. Cow's. The articles were in the house before she left, but have not been seen since. Prays for justice. Evidence of Ann B. Lowe taken October 12th: Molay lived with us as a servant for five weeks. On October 5th I was told she was a woman of bad character and must leave. On the 6th I missed some articles. I told my husband, and he said he would obtain a search warrant. Evidence of Catherine Meloy: had the frock last winter. Bought the stockings from Mr. Lockhart a month since; bought the flannel petticoat at Mr. Young's store. One or two days after the deponent went to live with her, Mrs. Lowe said that she had lost a frock and had a mind to send for the girl who had lived there. Verdict: "not guilty," December 9, 1840.

File 40-25.

Henry McIntyre, Thorold/Grantham, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing one blue pilot-cloth coat (value 50/-) the property of John Wolf, Grantham, on December 4, 1840. True bill: W. Copeland (foreman.) Witnesses: John Wolf. Evidence of John Wolf taken before Nathan Pawling on December 4th: Around October 1st the deponent and McIntyre were in the employ of Thomas Read. Deponent missed his coat, stolen from Mr. Read's chamber upstairs. Today he saw the coat on the back of McIntyre. Evidence of Henry McIntyre: he took the coat from the chamber of Thomas Read, innkeeper, 2 months ago as it looked likely to rain. He had intended to return it. Left it at Stephen Boyle's tavern and forgot it until a week since. He took it from

Boyle's and intended to return it to Read's, but was so occupied in unloading wheat at Thorold that he had no time to return it. Recognizance taken before *Jacob Keefer* on December 7th: Henry McIntyre £10, surety *James McIntyre*, Thorold, tailor, £10. Verdict: "not guilty," December 10, 1840.

File 40-26.

George Sanderson, Niagara, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing 2 geese (value 5/-) and 2 hens (2/-) the property of *John Waters* on December 10, 1840. True bill: *W. Copeland* (foreman.) Witnesses: John Waters, *John Whitten*. Grand Jury presentment: fowls were stolen from the hen house of John Waters. Plea: "guilty," sentenced to 2 months solitary confinement in gaol, December 11, 1840.

File 40-27.

Ezra Stanhope, Willoughby, labourer. Charged with larceny, stealing a blue frock coat (value 40/-) the property of **Daniel Munz** [alias **Mundz**] on July 5, 1840. True bill: **Henry Smith** (foreman.) Witnesses: Daniel Munz, William Crysler. Blank recognizance signed by Daniel Munz. Evidence of William Crysler taken before G.C. Swan at Drummondville on July 17th: was present when Stanhope was captured on suspicion of stealing the coat of Munz. The bundle was taken from him, which had a blue coat. Stanhope claimed no knowledge of anything and said as an excuse "that he wished there was not such a thing as a drop of liquor." Evidence of Daniel Munz, 20 Mile Creek, sworn by means of an interpreter: he was proceeding from Chippawa to Buffalo by steam vessel "Cincinnati." He had a small box. Placed it on a seat in the fore part of the vessel. I found it very warm in the course of the voyage and took my coat off and put it on the box. When near Buffalo I went for my things and found the box and coat missing. I informed the Captain and he had the vessel searched. The goods were not found. I left the vessel in shirt sleeves for Buffalo. A person belonging to the vessel came to see me on the 6th in Buffalo and told me the person who stole my coat was apprehended in Canada and that I should go and claim my coat. It was a blue frock coat, nearly new with roundish black silk buttons and blue and white striped cotton sleeve linings. The coat produced in court is the one I lost. Evidence of Edward **Bolton**, police constable, taken July 6th: was in **Crysler's barroom** on July 5th. Stanhope had a silk handkerchief in which he had two coats. Shortly after the arrival of the "Cincinnati" the Captain came in and enquired where the man with a bundle was? That a passenger on board had lost a coat and the Captain suspected Stanhope of taking it. I went in search of him and found him in a house a short way out of Chippawa. He was captured by one of the crew who gave him into my charge with the coat. The coat was one of the two which he had in the handkerchief. Recognizance taken before **John C. Ball** on September 9th: Ezra Stanhope, "Pelham," yeoman/distiller, and surety Lewis Willson, Pelham, yeoman, £20 each. Daniel Munz and Edward Bolton £20 each. *Thomas Smith*, of Buffalo, New York, is a necessary and material witness. Tried unsuccessfully to procure the attendance of Smith. Affidavit of *Street Chace*, Thorold, wheelwright: he went to Buffalo after Thomas Smith as evidence in favour of Ezra Stanhope. He was prevented from attendance by a most serious illness of several members of his family. Verdict: "not guilty," December 10, 1840.

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
