MANAGING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

After years of uncertainty, I am very proud that our Museum came through the dark clouds stronger and better than ever. The team of staff and volunteers have worked diligently to bring our Museum into the forefront of our community and we have strived to be the heritage hub our Town deserves.

Our visitation has grown by 22% which I believe relates to a change in our name and branding at the Museum. It was appropriate to change our name to Niagara-on-the-Lake Museum because that's what we are: Niagara-on-the-Lake's Museum. Our Tiny Museum, a mobile exhibit gallery, had its inaugural community tour with over 3,500 visitors! Annual sponsorship support will ensure this unique program reaches the community ever year.

We have also improved our digital offerings such as an annual online lecture series, documentaries, discussion groups and a comprehensive research page. This resulted in an increase of 26% in our online engagements. What a wonderful achievement for a small museum.

Further, after a revamp of our membership program we have seen an increase in our member numbers by 20%. We hope with the new options and the benefit program this number will continue to grow!

Our future is bright at the NOTL Museum with exciting new permanent exhibitions on the horizon and a new expansion in the works. In 2024 our focus continues to be on ensuring we have the space to meet our current needs but also the ability to grow into the future. With your support, we can revitalize our Museum to be a heritage centre for residents and our visitors.

My deepest thanks to all of you for recognizing the importance of history and how our heritage can inform our future. It is about pride in our cultural identity and believing that history can provide the context behind the world around us. Your support and continued interest in participating in our programs inspires our staff and volunteers to develop new and exciting programs/events every year.

The Tiny Museum

With funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, the Tiny Museum had a full season of community events and programs. Karlene Ouellette was hired as our Tiny Museum Coordinator and she took our collection out to 15 events including all the local fruit festivals, pop-up events with the NOTL Library, and the Celebration of Nations in St. Catharines. Over 3,500 people went through the Tiny Museum!

The Poppy Project

In addition to the installations at the Museum and the Court House, our Poppy Project once again expanded to a new location - this time at Legion Branch 124 on King Street. More than 30 wreaths were created for businesses and shop owners to display along Queen Street. For 2024, our wreath-makers have already begun creating more wreaths so that every single business along Queen Street can display a wreath from November 1 - 12.

A very special thanks goes to Davey Tree Expert Company, who donated their crew for set up and take down at both sites and to our wonderful group of volunteers whom we call "The Poppy Brigade".

And More

The Museum provided outreach to the community at a number of other events and programs including a presentation for University Women in Niagara Falls, hosting the Butler Society's international gathering, producing an event to commemorate Chloe Cooley at Voices of Freedom Park, hosting the Wineries of NOTL's "Dig Our Roots" event, and participation in the Rotary Holiday House Tour and the annual Santa Claus Parade.







Lectures - Six virtual lectures were delivered via Zoom in the winter, and six in-person lectures were held from April - September (sponsored by Geoffrey & Lorraine Joyner). We also hosted a panel discussion on Niagara's Indigenous history, in partnership with Niagara Parks.

Members' Trivia Night - Members were invited back to our in-person trivia night for a night of friendly competition.

Doc Club - From February to May, and from October to December, a virtual monthly meetup was held to discuss and debate a wide range of Canadian and international documentaries.

Famous & Infamous - Monthly presentations were given by local residents about the life and times of people from the past, followed by lively discussion with participants.

Walking Tours - Tour numbers have steadily increased post-COVID and we saw an influx of private tours wanting to explore the sites in Old Town. Public tours ran Saturdays and Sundays from June to September with private group bookings throughout the year.

Anne: Older & Wiser - Maja Bannerman wrote, produced and delivered a performance looking back at the life of Anne of Green Gables, with music by Rusty McCarthy.

Yoga - Sonya de Lazzer offered six morning yoga sessions in our courtyard to get us moving in July and August.

Summer Camp - Our Kid Curators returned for a week in July and a week in August, and participated in fun activities around the community.

Doors Open NOTL - The NOTL Museum oversaw the annual Doors Open NOTL, when various historic sites and local businesses of architectural interest were open to the public, with free admission. These sites included locations rarely open to the public, such as the Lord Mayor's Boardroom at the NOTL Courthouse, the Masonic Lodge on King Street, and Butler's Barracks.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Heritage Festival - This annual community event included heritage demonstrations along with the much-anticipated treasures sale, food and live music. The event was sponsored by The Niagara-on-the-Lake Local and included: Blacksmith Neil Blythin, the Niagara Handweavers & Spinners Guild, Heritage Maps by Kathy Thomas, the St. Catharines Rug Hooking Guild, the Mackenzie Printery, a free Black History walking tour, the Town of Lincoln Museum, vendor Quixotic Minerals, the Niagara Old Tyme Fiddlers, musicians Aaron Berger and Nathaniel Goold, a pig roast by PigOut, and a bake sale with generous donations from our members. We raised over \$4,000 through the sale of your generously donated treasures, used books and baked goods. Our annual heritage festival is truly a community effort!

Band in the Barn - Over 125 people joined us for the Band in the Barn fundraiser held in July, at the historic Freel Farm. It was such a fun event, with rock and soul music provided by the Niagara band 'Dark Horse'. This was the second year for this event, which aims to highlight historic properties and provide a casual atmosphere to celebrate with our community.

We thank our planning committee of volunteers, led by Stewart Hall, for putting together a spectacular evening, and the owners of the historic Freel Farm for hosting us. Due to the generous support from our sponsors Ravine Vineyard Estate Winery, BellaTerra Vineyards, and Konzelmann Estate Winery, and an impromptu live auction, the event raised over \$15.000!

Heritage Garden Party - An inaugural garden party was held in August at the historic property called Charlou, owned by our hosts Patricia & William Garriock. The afternoon could not have been lovelier with beautiful weather, a beautiful garden and amazing support from our sponsors: Niagara's Finest Hotels, Konzelmann Estate Winery, Carol Perrin of Sotheby's International Realty Canada, the Woodwinds Foundation, and GGS Niagara Landscaping.

The event aims to celebrate the social and recreational history of some of Niagara-on-the-Lake's historic properties. Charlou was once known as the Ball-Davidson house and was originally the home of the Town's first mayor, Alexander Davidson. One of the Museum's wonderful volunteers portrayed Davidson at the event, and brought with him other characters from the Town's past, all played by our volunteers. Parks Canada even sent over some soldiers to greet the guests as they arrived.

We are grateful to our garden party committee, led by Catherine Novick, for helping to raise over \$15,000 for the Museum through this sold-out event, and we look forward to another Heritage Garden Party in 2024.





EXHIBITIONS

ALL ALONG THE WATERFRONT May 18, 2022- May 23, 2023

An exploration of Niagara-on-the-Lake's relationship with the Niagara River and Lake Ontario including industries, recreation, and environmental implications. This exhibition raised awareness of how our waterways - the Niagara River and Lake Ontario - have shaped the history of our community.

STRIKE A POSE: THE ART OF SELF OBSESSION

December 1, 2023 - April 29, 2024

This exhibition explored how the people of Niagara-on-the-Lake documented themselves, either through paintings and drawings, or photography and pixels. Selfie Mode sponsored this display with a selfie station for visitors to use.

BOUND & DETERMINED: Chloe Cooley, Enslavement and the Fight for Freedom June 2 -November 13, 2023

2023 marked the 230th
Anniversary of the passing of the first anti-slavery legislation in the British Empire, which was passed in NOTL. Co-curated by Rochelle Bush, Natasha Henry-Dixon, Sarah Kaufman, and Shawna Butts, this exhibit highlighted the story of Chloe Cooley and how little was known about the 600 enslaved people who were living in Upper Canada up to 1834.

VIRTUAL EXHIBITIONS

GOOGLE ARTS & CULTURE

We added one new online exhibition in 2023: **Hitting Rock Bottom: The Commercial Fishing Industry in Niagara-on-the-Lake**. For those unfamiliar with our participation in this platform, Google Arts & Culture allows us to feature our collection and create online exhibitions. We have over 20 digital exhibitions for you to check out.

PUBLICATIONS

COLLECTIONS & RESEARCH

In 2023, we had 33 donors with 255 items collected. Some of the highlights are:


- Postage Scale and desk set from the City of Toronto steamship, ca. 1865.
- Team Photograph of the Shepherd Boats Ladies Baseball Team, ca. 1949.
- A conviction record for Stephen Sando for failure to remove snow from his property in 1873.
- Photographs of the Larkin Farm.
- Charter of pardon to Charles Norton (alias Philander Noble) and others, for the crime of counterfeiting in 1801.
- A ship rib recovered from the Niagara River.
- A collection of items from Christ Church McNab, including photos, various WWI Honour Roll lists, a scrapbook, and more.
- An andiron set from the Queen's Royal Hotel.
- A collection of art and prints from TAG Art Gallery, which includes a pastel drawing of the Niagara Gorge by Owen Staples.
- Margarita Howe's Order of Canada and her Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, War Medal 1939-1945, 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada Medal, and the Queen Elizabeth II Golden Jubilee Medal.

Research requests were slow to rebound in 2023 after years of closed or limited research capabilities. In 2023, we handled approximately **75** requests from researchers.


Our limited research capabilities stemmed from our inability to use our database during government lockdowns. Our system, PastPerfect, had to be used while onsite at the Museum. In 2023, we were fortunate to receive the Community Services Recover Fund from the Federal Government. This grant allowed us to hire a database coordinator, who helped get our database ready in anticipation of transferring to PastPerfect Online, the cloud-based version of this platform. PastPerfect Online will allow staff to work from anywhere in the Museum, in the community, and even when working from home.

In 2023, we also added an additional **251** records to our public-facing database, bringing the total to **5,906** records or approximately 11% of our collection. With our updated database, we can make records accessible online much easier now. <u>Check out the database here.</u>

THE PHOENIX CIRCLE

In 2023, the Phoenix Circle contributed \$10,500 towards our operating costs. As a thank you for their annual contribution, these donors enjoyed a private reception at the Sailing Club, a "sneak peek" of our summer exhibition, and a special collections talk with our Curator, who brought out some of her favourite War of 1812 artefacts and archives for an up-close viewing.

As ever, NOTL Museum volunteers are the engine behind the massive output of programming, events, activities and operations, that are vital to any museum.

More than 150 volunteers actively worked with the NOTL Museum in 2023, clocking more than 2500 hours of work, with an average 200 hours per month of dedicated volunteer hours. And that doesn't include the countless hours that go unlogged by our Board of Directors. Individually, and as a solid team, they help govern the Society and provide their unique skills, consultation, and invaluable support to our staff.

Every job has its value, and every volunteer brings their own experience to the tasks needed, with a dedication, efficiency, and sense of pride that is humbling. In 2023, as always, volunteers provided the necessary, from data entry and collections management, poppy making and gardening, to being active ambassadors and tour guides for hundreds of visitors to our town.
