

THANK YOU TO OUR STUDENTS!

This summer we had two students join us to help with both collections and programming. Both positions were generously funded by the Government of Canada's **Young Canada Works/Jeunesse Canada au travail** program.



My name is Robyn Weishar, and I am beginning my first year of Teacher's College at Brock University in the fall. This has been my second summer working at the Museum as the Programming Assistant, and I have enjoyed it considerably. This year I was also entrusted to travel with the Tiny Museum to various community events. Through these opportunities I have been able to share my passion for history with visitors, members, volunteers, and the general public.

Over the past few months I have become more confident in my understanding of local history and the many ways Niagara's past relates to the greater history of the nation. I have been very fortunate to work closely with some of our members and volunteers who have imparted their wisdom with me. As the Programming Assistant and Tiny Museum Coordinator I have assumed many roles and responsibilities ranging from front desk work and planning and co-leading Kid Curator Camps, to organizing and overseeing the Tiny Museum for a variety of events and festivals.

Working at the museum has helped me to improve my interpersonal and critical thinking skills, which will be a valuable asset throughout my life and career. Being able to work so closely with the museum's collection has given me a new appreciation of the past and the abundance of history that Niagara-on-the-Lake has to offer. I am so appreciative of the kindness staff, members, volunteers, and visitors have shown me over the last two summers. I want to extend a big 'thank you' to those who have supported me and the museum, and to those who have made this another memorable summer.

COLLECTIONS CORNER

Yeeha! We Have a "new" Database! Okay this may not seem very exciting to you, but some of us at the Museum are pretty happy about this.* During the stay-at-home orders and the restrictions during the COVID-19 pandemic, we were unable to access our collection, undertake research, or perform necessary membership, volunteer, and donor services while working from home. The pandemic showed us that we had a big gap in our digital infrastructure. Renovations, illnesses, and the dreaded "double f" (fires and floods) are all things that can force us to work from home, but we need to be able to continue to access our database. Thankfully, the company that developed our internal system also offers a web-based version. So, we upgraded! Now it wasn't as easy as we thought it was going to be. We had to standardize data on over 1,000 records before we could make the change, but we did it!

I have to say the update to the online database has been a game changer. I have been able to work on exhibitions and even addressed research requests all while sitting in the comfort of my own home! Others have been able to work on membership and volunteer data management while working from home. The new database also makes searching our collection much easier, which means we can provide better research services.

I am so grateful to the whole staff at the Museum, all of whom have been staunch guides and teachers who have facilitated my work and my (near overzealous) desire to learn. Over the course of the summer, with their guidance, I have been able to switch over nearly all the displays in the Upper Gallery of Memorial Hall, as well as install "Memento Mori: A History of Mourning in Early Canada," an exhibition showcasing practices surrounding death during the Georgian (1714-1837) and Victorian (1837-1901) eras.

Memento Mori: A History of Mourning in Early Canada

The early years of Upper Canada (Ontario) were defined by constant change. Many residents lost loved ones through war or through hardships of early Canadian life. The act of mourning took on a culture of its own. This exhibit explores mourning practices and customs in Upper Canada during the Georgian (1714-1837) and Victorian (1837-1901) eras.

Funding for UV Protection

Have you ever wondered why the interior windows at the museum look wavy and weird? That is UV-film that helps protect our artefacts from fading. But it is high time these are replaced. Thanks to the Ontario Trillium Foundations Capital Grant, we will be replacing the film with UV-coated Plexi-glass!

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One of the best updates is how much easier it is for us to make collection records available on the public database, which you can access here: https://notlmuseum.catalogaccess.com/. Now we just tick a little box, and POOF, a record is immediately available to researchers, students, and of course, our members!

We were able to complete this work thanks to funding received from the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery Fund.
